RULES OF ORDER

1. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by such persons as the moderator may designate.
2. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator.
3. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission of the Association.
4. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator before discussion.
5. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion without the consent of the Association.
6. When a motion is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be considered, except a motion to adjourn.
7. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a consideration.
8. All questions except as relate to the amendment of the Constitution shall be decided by the majority of the votes cast.
9. The Association shall have the right to determine what subjects it will consider and the order of their consideration.
10. These rules may be amended at any time during an annual session of this Association by a majority.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the Godhead; The Father; The Son; The Holy Ghost.
2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and order.
3. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
4. We believe baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
5. We believe baptism in the immersion of a believer. And only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church by Christ, in faith and doctrine, and they only should take the Lord's Supper.
6. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints.
7. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgement.
8. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joy and happiness of the righteous will be eternal.
9. We believe that the right to administer the ordinances is vested in the Church, and that no persons should perform the ordinances except as authorized by a Church.
10. We believe in the doctrine of growth in grace and sanctification as set forth in the New Testament. But we do not believe that sinless perfection is attained by anyone in this life.

CONSTITUTION OF SURREY ASSOCIATION

Art. I. This Association shall be dominated and known as the Surrey Baptist Association.

Art. II. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of the Kingdom of Christ among men, and the accomplishing of this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

Art. III. This Association shall be composed of messengers chosen by the churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers for the first 100 members or fractional part of the hundred, and two additional messengers for each additional 100 members. The ministers of the Gospel who belong to churches connected with this body or are pastors of church so connected, shall be ex-officio members of this Association.

Art. IV. A letter shall be presented from each church certifying the appointment of messengers and given a record of the work of the church for the past year.

Art. V. The officers of the Association shall be a moderator, avice-moderator, a clerk, a treasurer, superintendent of Sunday School work and director of Training Union work. These shall be elected on the closing day of annual meeting of the Association and shall be by ballot when there is a contest.

Art. VI. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at and during the deliberations of the body, enforce and observe the Constitution, preserve decorum, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

Art. VII. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep and record the proceedings of each meeting, superintend the printing and the distribution of the Minutes thereof among the churches composing the body.

Art. VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent to this body by the churches for all purposes, or collected during the session of this Association, and distribute the same as ordered by the body. He shall make an annual report to this body of the sums received and from what source, and the manner of their distribution and to whom and for what purpose, and the conditions of the treasury.

Art. IX. A General Board of the Association shall be composed of one lay member elected by each co-operating church, the pastor of each co-operation church, the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Superintendent of the Woman's Missionary Union, and the Associational President of the Brotherhood. In no case shall any church have more than four members on this Board. Between annual meetings of the Association this Board shall act as the Association in matters requiring consideration, including filling vacancies among the officers elected by the Association. The Moderator shall serve as chairman of this Board and shall call a meeting as soon after the annual meeting of the Association as deemed advisable, allowing time for the churches to elect their lay members. The Moderator shall be expected to have a written report of the doings of this Board brought before the Association in its annual meeting. Fifteen members of this Board shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meeting has been given to all members. This Board shall cooperate with the churches in informing them about all causes fostered by this Association.

Art. X. Any church desiring to become a member of this Association shall present her petition at an annual meeting thereof through delegates appointed for that purpose, and if the Association decides to receive her, such church may come under the watch care of the Association until the next annual session, at such time, should the church prove worthy, the Moderator shall extend the right hand of fellowship to the delegates.

Art. XI. The Association shall have the authority to withdraw fellowship from any church that holds to doctrines or practices not in keeping with Baptist faith and practice.

Art. XII. The Association may invite visiting brethren to seats with the body, and to extend to them all privileges except that of voting.

Art. XIII. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it selects.

Art. XIV. By appointment of the Association, there shall be preached an introductory sermon, a missionary sermon if ordered by the body, and such other preaching as the Association may direct.

Art. XV. This constitution may be amended by any annual session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present.

Art. XVI. This Association will not retain a church who permits its members to manufacture or sell spirituous liquors.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

An official in the Japanese government resigned his position a few months ago to become a colporteur for the Japan Bible Society. To make his position clear he has had a large picture of the Bible painted over his front door with the words: "The Bible--A Light On Our Road."

The American Bible Society, a non profit organization, supported by gifts from those upon whom this Light is shining, is seeking to make the Bible A Light on the Road of the Millions in the world today who grope in darkness. This can be done only as the Bible is made available to each in his own tongue either at cost or no cost.

During 1952 the Scripture distribution, including Bibles, Testaments, Portions, was in the United States 7,822,644 and in foreign Countries 5,546,386 making a total of 13,369,030. A most encouraging picture. In keeping with the simplified form in Japanese, Korean, and Chinese languages, new texts have been or are being prepared for distribution among these peoples.

The program for India--that of providing new literates with the message of the Gospel in easily readable form is limited only by the Society's inability to underwrite it.

Other areas of the world--Africa, the Middle East, Europe, Latin America--look to the Society for substantial and complete aid in Bible distribution. There is also the tremendous ministry to the Blind--Braille and Talking Book records, the Armed Forces, and the bibleless Americans. Bible reading as well as its distribution is the aim of the Society. Therefore we are asked to remember this conclusion:

The church cannot live where it is already established without the printed Word of God. The church cannot fulfill its God-given mission to evangelize the world without the printed Word of God. The Bible is the sharpest and most effective tool of missionary evangelism. In a day when men are shaking off the bandage that has enslaved them for generations, grant that we shall bring to them the Word of Life which sets men free, lest they turn to some other bondage more terrible than that from which they have escaped. THIS IS OUR TASK.

REPORT ON BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD

No church can reach its maximum, nor render its most effective service, without the interest and activity of its men. No saved man can reach proper spiritual maturity without being properly related to the church and its affairs. Men need spiritual stimulation which is available only in the church. Pastors need the fellowship and support of their men.

The Brotherhood is an organization of the men of the church banded together for mutual fellowship and service. It informs, enlists, and uses its men.

We recommend that a Brotherhood chairman be appointed in our Association.

MINISTER RETIREMENT PLAN

The Minister Retirement plan is just what the name indicates. It is a plan administered by the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, that makes it possible for a Baptist minister to look forward to the day of his retirement, or to possible permanent disability, with some degree of financial security. In cooperation with his church and the denomination, a pastor can provide against the day when he may retire and receive certain benefits for life that are made possible by such cooperation.

In North Carolina the membership in the Minister Retirement is constantly increasing. Just now the total number of Churches is 3055 and the number of pastors is 2100. In surry Association, th total number of churches belong to the Ministers Retirement Plan is 3 and total number of pastors is 2. 60 North Carolina Baptist pastors have retired since the inauguration of this plan, and are now receiving the benefits of their membership.

The plan is designed to provide for the pastors of all churches. City, town and rural---whether full time or part time regardless of size or situation.

We recommend that earnest effort be mad to nroll the remainder of our pastors and churches.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

"If Thou wilt, Thou canst make me clean," was the leper's plea that touched the heart of Jesus. A like plea from the sick multitudes who need help has touched the heart of Jesus. A like plea from the sick multitudes who need help has touched the heart of North Carolina Baptist. Our ministry through our Baptist Hospital is our answer to this call.

More than ten thousand patients were cared for in our Hospital last year, while thousands of others were seen in the Clinics. Almost half of these were service patients, unable to pay the full cost of the care they received. These included old people at the sunset of life and little children at the dawn of life, mothers, fathers and young people. They included persons who had to have help if they were to carry on as mothers and wives in their homes, if they were to work as fathers and husbands to support their families, if as young people they were to be set free from handicaps for life, if as old people they were to be spared for additional years and from much of the suffering

which often attends old age. With all the advance of medical science, there is still much that it cannot do; but our Baptist Hospital is making a large contribution toward the saving of life, the relieving of suffering, and the bringing of good health for those who need it most.

From all over North Carolina there is a constant stream of afflicted people coming seeking our help. Our Hospital provides skilled specialists for them in the various fields of medical care. The demand is so great that it is never safe to go without an appointment in advance. The schedules of the Clinics and doctors are almost always completely filled by appointments made days and weeks and often months ahead. If it is an emergency case the family doctor should call the Hospital and talk with a doctor there who will arrange for the patient to come as soon as possible.

One of the most important parts of the program of the Hospital is the spiritual ministry it provides. This is necessary if the full needs of a sick person are to be met. Our Hospital has trained chaplains who render an effective ministry for the sick, guidance for the nursing and medical students, and training for pastors and Christian workers.

Three floors of the New Hospital Wing are nearing completion and should be ready for use this year. This will provide urgently needed space and facilities. If any church in the Association has not contributed its part toward the building of the New Wing, we hope this will be done at once.

"If Thou wilt, Thou canst make me clean." Jesus replied, "I will." You and I answer, "I will", of we give as we should in our Mother's Day Offering. This determines how much help we provide for those who are sick and have little or no money. Let all of us answer with a generous, "I will", next Mother's Day.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

The youngest member of our Baptist family of institutions, the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc., has had the best year since it began operating, March 16, 1951.

Resthaven, with space for twenty residents, has been filled to capacity. The number of inquiries for rooms has increased into the hundreds.

The Home received its best financial support. The share received from the Nine Year Program (1952) was \$14,062.80; our first Special Day offering, February 15, exceeded \$52,000; and from individuals, churches, and auxiliary organizations we have received \$12,380.33, as of August 1st.

The response to the first Special Day offering for the Home was most encouraging. More than half of our 3055 Baptist churches responded. About seventy-five per cent of the amount came from the smaller churches.

Considering the short time our Home has been operating (2 years), and the fact that this was the first opportunity to appeal to our churches for a special offering, all of us should be encouraged by the response. Our next Special Day offering, February 21, 1954, should amount to \$100,000.

On June 18, this year, property was purchased for a Branch Home at Albemarle. This property, consisting of a vacated hospital building and a nurses' home building and nearly three acres of land, was purchased for \$25,000. It will cost an equal amount to renovate the property. Even so, it is well worth twice the amount invested. Thus, we can care for 60 residents--20 at Resthaven, Winston-Salem; and 40 at the Albemarle Home.

At the time of purchase, it was hoped that the branch home would be ready for operation by October 1, this year.

The general health of the residents has been exceptionally good, considering the range of their ages, 66 to 93. There has been only one death this year. The spirit and the general attitude of the residents have been most satisfactory.

There are many evidences of increasing interest in our Homes. Pastors, conducting worship services, have brought delegations from their churches to share the inspiration of worship with our residents. Auxiliary and Sunday school groups have frequently visited us to conduct devotional services. Gifts of supplies and cash are often received from these various organizations.

Plans for the future enlargement are encouraging. With a general Special Day offering in February, 1954, and other special gifts from individuals and corporations, we should be ready to begin construction of our administration building, which would give us room for fifty additional residents, and making our total capacity 110 residents.

Since North Carolina Baptist now number more than 700,00 members, with thousands of our constituency now over 65 years of age, we should keep in mind the great number of our elderly brethren who need a home to provide security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. Our North Carolina Baptist are able to meet the challenge to make adequate provision for the aging, and as "laborers together with God", we can meet it.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Matthew 28:19-20. These verses, commonly referred to as the Great Commission, give us the two distinct phases of evangelism. The first phase is that of teaching to the end of leading lost people to receive Christ as personal savior. The second phase is leading those who receive Christ into becoming fruit-bearing Christians. To fully accomplish both phases of Christ's commission to evangelize it must be done primarily through the local churches.

The past year has been remarkable in many respects for evangelism in our association. One of the outstanding things was the Association-wide Evangelistic Meeting held in August with Dr. Eddie Lieberman as the evangelist. Great interest was shown. Fifteen made definite professions of faith, while many came for assurance, and many to declare a new stand for Christ through rededication of life. It is impossible to ascertain by statistics the great spiritual worth of that meeting to our churches.

During the year 81 revival meetings were held in our churches. These churches reported 427 baptisms, a ratio of one baptism for every 25 church members.

It is urged that all the churches and the pastors give the major consideration to the subject of evangelism during this coming year. Also that each organization continue to place evangelism as the heart of all our work, for it is to that end that our organization exist.

Wise pastors, associational missionaries, Sunday School superintendents and many other leaders have over the years promoted its circulation, and they have rejoiced at the many visible fruits of good reading. People do more when they know more. As they read, they lead. As they are informed, they are inspired.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Our Vacation Bible Schools got off to a good start this year with a one day clinic held at the First Baptist Church, April 14, with 23 churches participating. Out of town conference leaders were Mrs. Motley, Mr. L. L. Morgan, Miss May Bomar and Mrs. Hicks. Local conferences leaders were Mrs. Carrington Paulette and Mrs. J. N. Still.

Altho all of our Vacation Bible Schools were not reported there were 42 Bible Schools held this year, two of these were mission schools and one was a colored school. The total enrolment was 2,413 out of this number 128 were not in Sunday School There were 29 professions and 22 dedications.

The mission offering was \$395.49 of this \$365.85 was sent to the cooperative program and \$30.64 was designated.

May I take this opportunity to express my appreciations to Mrs. W. A. Campbell for helping with the note books and the hand work, Miss Carol King, Miss Nancy Beamer and Mr. Jim Smithwick and all the other fine folks that made these Bible Schools possible?

This has been our greatest year of Bible School work.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that I submit this report. I am indeed grateful to the pastors, superintendents, associational officers, and our associational Missionary for their splendid cooperation during this Sunday School year.

From year to year the Sunday School is being recognized more and more as the chief agency of the churches in evangelism, teaching and enlistment. The major emphasis for Baptist churches for 1953-54 is the effort to enrol a million more people in Sunday school in one year. Right of way has been granted for this, the greatest Sunday school enlargement program in the history of the world. As a result of this program, it is confidently expected that there will be substantial increases in baptisms, offerings and Christian homes.

Our state Sunday School Secretary, L. L. Morgan, reports gains this year in enrolment, and in training awards. It is expected that the number of Vacation Bible Schools will reach a new high. In the 3,055 churches in the state, we now have more than 620,000 in Sunday school.

We are reporting in our association this year 61 Sunday schools and 2 Mission Sunday schools with an increase of approximately 500 in membership which is a gain of about 6%. In April we had a Vacation Bible School Clinic which proved to be very successful. Our Vacation Bible Schools reached a new record in number and attendance. For January Bible study many of our churches studied Dr. Ralph Herring's book "Studies in Philippians". Our associational Sunday School Meetings were well attended. Through out the year our programs centered around the themes of training and enlargement.

I submit the following recommendations: (1) That the association approve the effort of Baptist to enrol "A Million

More in 54," and commend to the churches the practical plans for accomplishing this worthy objective. (2) That our churches observe a week of preparation teaching the new book "The Pull of the People," by Dr. J. N. Barnette. (3) That regular Sunday school meetings be held this year for the purpose of helping and inspiring the churches to greater zeal in reaching the multitudes for Bible study. (4) That the association seek to do its full share in enrolling "A Million More in 54," by trying to enroll at least twenty percent more people in their Sunday schools in the year October 1953-October 1954. (5) Encourage class Sunday schools to "move up" to department schools wherever possible. (6) That the churches call on the Baptist Sunday School Department, Raleigh, for help with reference to remodeling old church building or building new structures.

A worthy offering from each Sunday School in Surrey Association at this time, will greatly help in Winning North Carolina to Christ.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The purpose of foreign missions, in the words of the late Dr. M. Theron Rankin, is to "lead people to a personal faith in Christ Jesus as Saviour and Lord, to bring them together in Churches for worship of God and service in His kingdom, to teach and train in stewardship and in cooperative service, and to aid them in developing their own schools and institutions for training their own pastors and other Church workers."

As of June 1, 1953 Southern Baptist had 911 foreign missionaries distributed in 32 countries.

To maintain these missionaries and the institutions in which they serve, Southern Baptist gave in 1952 through the Co-operative Program, Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, and designated gifts \$7, 785, 699. 64.

About 29 percent of our missionaries are ordained ministers, of whom about 1/3 serve as pastors of churches. Most of the ministers serve as field missionaries, extending the gospel message far beyond the cities in which they live. All the missionaries are active in the Churches on the field in which they serve.

About 10% of the missionaries are members of the medical profession, doctors, dentists, nurses, technicians. They work in 8 hospitals, 7 clinics, and 11 dispensaries maintained abroad by Southern Baptist.

About 48 per cent of our missionaries are engaged in some form of educational work. Southern Baptists maintain 460 schools, including 17 theological Seminaries and 6 Women's Training Schools. Enrollment in them totals 61,705.

A Foreign missionary is a Christian doctor, minister, teacher or editor, using his earthly profession for Jesus' sake in a country not his own. She is a Christian homemaker, school-teacher, W.M.U. leader, social worker or nurse transplanted in a foreign land to spread the seed of the Christian gospel. Foreign missionaries are living witnesses of Christ's love in lands where Christian witnesses are fewer than in their own.

As we think on these things, can we not hear Christ say, "If I could afford to die for them, can you not afford to tell them?" May each point of our record be a challenge to us as we remember that more than half of the churches in our own association have no missionary organization.

We were sorry to lose Mrs. A. Finch after so many years of faithful service in W. M. U. as stewardship chairman. The rest of us would like to pay tribute to her. Also, we miss Mrs. Ed White who recently resigned as community missions chairman.

Mrs. Isaac Jones has done an outstanding job this year in mission study—an increase of 31 classes over last year. She reports that this is largely due to three associational-wide classes; the first on Feb. 24 at Calvary, the second the following night at Pleasant View Baptist Mission when Mrs. John Wacaster taught *The West Is Big* to 190 ladies (including both). Just last week, Mrs. Foy J. Farmer, a former president of W. M. U. of North Carolina, taught her own book *Sacrifice and Song* to a group of about 200 ladies from 17 of our churches at Haymore Memorial.

Our annual meeting was held with the Westfield Church on April 28, 1953 with 150 present.

Attendance at our quarterly meetings this year has been very good. At our last one in July, we had 90 ladies present representing 18 churches with 17 of the 24 presidents there.

We have several new associational officers in W. M. U. this year. Mrs. Henrietta Gillispie of Dobson was elected secretary-treasurer to fill the vacancy caused by Mrs. Brunner's leaving the association. Mrs. R. E. Hiatt of Calvary and Mrs. Bill Tilley of Westfield were elected at our annual meeting as stewardship chairman and literature chairman, respectively. The other officers are the same as last year. To all of these faithful workers we owe our thanks, as well as to the workers in each local organization.

We rejoice with Highland Park and Woodville who are organizing their youth into all the Young People's Organizations. There is such a great need for more of this in our association. Our young people need missionary training. In this work too many of our W. M. S.'s have failed. How can God call our young people to go into all the world if they have not been taught the Great Commission? Will they give their tithes if they are not taught God's plan of giving? From tithing we go on to giving and living as worthy stewards.

Our Union hopes to stress every phase of stewardship more earnestly in our new year, beginning soon, next year we hope to bring to this meeting a much better report. Pray sincerely with us that we may dedicate ourselves to carry out, as never before, the challenge of our hymn, "We will give, we will pray, we will witness every day that the millions of the whole wide world may know our Savior's love."

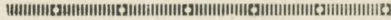
