INTRODUCTION

It is with pleasure and regret that I close the LAWRENCE History as far as I have researched. I wish to thank the many relatives for information furnished me. A note of sadness creeps into genealogy when one realizes that our ancestors knew and loved each other so dearly, as we do our immediate family, and only a few years separate a family. I only hope that you will get the thrill, when reading the past, that my wife Hazel and I experienced when finding a bit of information.

The love for my ancestors was instilled into me as a child by the many references made by my father and mother. I was too young to remember all they told me. I am thankful I recorded the memories of my mother in later years, which have been of great assistance in compiling this LAWRENCE History.

My wife Hazel and I have made several trips to various counties and state offices in Virginia, North Carolina and Washington, D. C. to search court records, county histories and to contact relatives along the route the Lawrences settled, as follows: Isle of Wight County, Va. and Nancemond, Brunswick, Mecklenburg, Lunenburg, Halifax, Fittsylvania, Henry, Patrick, Stokes and Surry Counties, N. C. The U. S. Census records in Virginia and North Carolina, and also at the National Archives in Washington, D. C. have been reviewed back through 1880, from 1820. Errors no doubt have crept in. In some instances dates did not agree, but I have tried to cite information as authentic as possible.

The ages shown in the U. S. Census records are not always accurate, as some one in the home who gave the information to the census taker could have made an error in some cases. Marriage dates sometimes differ; also, the ages of the bride and groom.

The records of the Library of Congress CS 71.L42 1858 Lawrence Genealogy show the name Lawrence "variously spelt". "Laurentius" is the form in which it was found as first given to men. First instance of an individual to whom the name Lawrence belonged was a monk, a ROMAN, who came over from Italy to Britain in company with Austin and others. When Austin died, Lawrence was appointed to succeed him as Archbishop of the See of Canterbury. He was buried in the Monastery of St. Austins, A. D. 916.

The lagend on a Lawrence family coat of arms, copy enclosed, states that this "old English name is derived from the ROMAN name, 'LAURENTIUS'."

Robert Lawrence of Lancashire, England, is the first individual to be considered the ancestor of the Lawrences of England. He was born around A. D. 1150. He accompanied Richard Coeuer de Lion on crusades in the Holy Land and distinguished himself in the Siege of Acre. Consequently, he was knighted Sir Robert of Ashton Hall, and obtained for his arms "ARGENT, A CROSS RAGULY GULES, A. D. 1191". A descendant, John Lawrence of County Suffolk, England, was born in 1609 in England and settled in Watertown, Massachusetts in 1630. There were other early Lawrence settlers in New England in addition to John Lawrence; some listed below:

Henry I, King of France, married Anne of Russia, and was the ancestor of several Lawrences; citing one in particular, THOMAS LAWRENCE (reference "Your Family Tree" -Jordan and Kimball). Thomas Lawrence of St. Albans, England, was baptized February 2, 1588/9 at St. Albans, Hertfordshire; died there March 20, 1624/5; married October 23, 1609 to Joan Antrobus, daughter of Walter and Joan Antrobus of St. Albans. They had seven children. She married the second time in 1627 to John Tuthill or Tuttell; born 1592, died December 3, 1656. They came to Upswich, Massachusetts on the ship "Planter" in 1635. The son, Capt. William Lawrence, was baptized at St. Albans, July 22, 1622, and settled at Flushing, Long Island. Capt. James Lawrence (1781-1813) was a descendant of Capt. William Lawrence, whose last words were "DON'T GIVE UP THE SHIP," as he died aboard the Chesapeake. Sons Thomas and John were of Long Island. John was Mayor of New York City in 1672. The descendants held important positions in New York State and the U. S. Federal Government. V

The original Lawrences who settled in New England in the early 1630's are not the ones who originally settled in Virginia. This I feel sure was due to similarity in dates, which you will note in later chapters. The ancestors of both in England could have been the same in many instances.

The name in the records in the new world has been spelled in various ways—Lawrence, Laurence, Larrance, Larance, etc. This is considered a misspelling of the English origin, "LAWRENCE", by various recorders.

The Archives of Raleigh, North Carolina contain notes by Winslow of Perquimans County, North Carolina, that the Lawrence family came from Nancemond County, Virginia, about 1680/85, where one John Lawrence was living very early according to records of Isle of Wight County, Virginia. He married Elizabeth Adkinson 8, 12 md, 1653 (records of Boston).

It appears that the Lawrences migrated from the counties in Virginia around or near Norfolk, that is, Nancemond, the Isle of Wight and others, to Brunswick County, which was formed from Isle of Wight in 1732. The following counties were originally part of Brunswick:

The first U. S. Census was taken in 1790. The U. S. Census for the years 1850, 1870 and 1880 showed names, sex and age of individuals in the family, if census was taken. These ages will not agree in all instances with the individual family records. The U. S. Census for the years 1820, 1830 and 1840 showed ONLY the name of the male head of the family; the number of males and females between certain ages. Due to the same head of the house's name appearing on different lists of census of the same year and no family name, in most instances the head of the house cannot be identified, or associated with any family by his name. The lack of identity applies to other records, such as births, deaths, marriages, wills, deeds, purchase of property, etc.

The ancestors of all of us were willing to suffer hardships for religious freedom.

If in the future it is determined that we are descendants of Thomas and Joan Antrobus Lawrence who landed at Upswich, Massachusetts on the ship "Planter" in 1635, then our ancestor was Henry I, King of France; therefore we are descendants of ROYALTY.

THE CHMEALCGICAL HISTORY OF THE

CHAPTER I

In the Archives of Richmond, Virginia the records of the Cavaliers and Pioneers Abstracts of Virginia Land Patents and Grants 1623-1666, by "Nugent" certify dates in which some of the Lawrences had previously arrived in certain areas direct from England, or otherwise:

CHAPTER I SECTION 1

John Robins granted 1200 acres of land in 1638 for transportation of 22 persons who were brought to Virginia, including John Lawrence in James City County, Virginia. Metlian Morgan was granted 600 acres of land 20 May 1638 for transportation of 12 persons, including Melchesides Lawrence. Thomas Harris was granted 650 acres August 23, 1656 in Lancaster County, Virginia for transportation of 13 persons, including Alexandria Lawrence.

"The 17th Century Isle of Wight Co., Virginia - VA 975-554-B" by John Bennett Boddie shows that land grants were issued to Robert Lawrence in 1652. Patents were usually obtained three or four years after the arrival of the purchaser; therefore, Robert must have arrived prior to 1640. There were others who were granted patents in 1633 as noted above. Mr. Boddie states in Chapter V, page 90 that William Bernard, age 21, who came in the "FURTHERANCE" (a ship) in 1622, patented 1200 acres in Isle of Wight, August 10, 1642, "at the head of Lawnes Creek along the land of Robert Eleye, Justinian Cooper and Robert Lawrence." Robert Lawrence, Jr., of the Isle of Wight and Nancemond Counties, received a grant on 25 September 1663.

The above were some of the settlers who were given permission to purchase land for transporting persons to Virginia. These persons worked for the land owners until their debt for transportation was paid; then they were free to go on their own.

CHAPTER I SECTION 2

It appears that the early Lawrence settlers to Virginia were wealthy and could buy land and owned slaves.

It is noted that by the 1700's the population of the Lawrence families in Virginia had increased considerably; consequently, by 1785, the date of birth of my great grandfather James, Sr. (his father also born in Virginia) the family was steadily thriving.

CHAPTER I SECTION 3

Robert Lawrence, Jr., along with others, founded a settlement nearby in North Carolina in 1660 or 1661.

CHAPTER I SECTION 4

On the 9th of January 1706-07, Robert Lawrence (son and heir) of Robert Lawrence, deceased, sells to Robert Crawford of Lawnes Creek Parish, Surry, 150 acres of land "granted to my father, 28 September 1643."

The family may be descended from Sir John Lawrence, Baronet. Sir John had a second son named Robert. A Robert Lawrence, who was a Puritan and followed the Puritan migration from Isle of Wight to Nancemond County, first patented land on Lawrence Creek in 1642. The father of Sir John was Thomas Lawrence of Chelsea, Middlesex, England, a goldsmith, who married Martha, daughter of Anthony Cage of London. Thomas Lawrence received a grant of Arms in 1593. Thomas died October 28, 1593, age 54, and was buried in Chelsea. His children were Sir Thomas and Sir John; also, there were daughters.

CHAPTER I : SECTION 5

Robert Lawrence, Sr., was a Justice for the County of Nancemond in 1659-60. Robert and Elizabeth's child was Robert, Jr., born 1639. Robert and wife Jane had Robert and daughters.

CHAPTER I SECTION 6

Henry Lawrence owned 200 acres in Mancemond County in 1704. His daughter Isabella married Thomas Page 15 January 1702. All the other Lawrences were at this wedding, so it seems Henry must have been the son of "Cld Mr. Robert Lawrence."

CHAPTER I SECTION 6

Henry was the name of Sir John's third and last son. The names of Sir John's sons, John, Robert and Henry, seem to have been given to Robert's oldest sons. Michael and Thomas signed the wedding book as brothers of Isabella. Then Michael and Thomas were sons of Henry.

CHAPTER II

So far we have not found the exact date the first Lawrences came to Virginia. The earliest dates found of record are Robert Lawrence, Jr. born in Virginia; also Robert Lawrence, Sr. received a grant of land in 1642. No doubt the Lawrences were among the earlier settlers who followed the established colony at Jamestown in 1607 or soon thereafter.

CHAPTER II SECTION 1

These settlers seemed to settle around Isle of Wight and Nancemond Counties in Virginia or nearby at first, then later as the population expanded, they began to move into eastern North Carolina and mostly into each of the counties along the southern border of Virginia, until they reached Henry County, Virginia, where most of the families settled.

CHAPTER II SECTION 2

A great number of Lawrence families were located in Henry County, Virginia as early as 1800, per marriage records.

CHAPTER II SECTION 3

The first U.S. Census was 1790 which showed a James Lawrence and family and slaves, living in Surry County, Salisbury District, N.C. Stokes County was formed from Surry County during 1790.

CHAPTER III

The history of the Lawrences, as I am presenting it, began with my great grandfather, JAMES LAWRENCE, SR. Prior ancestors have not been definitely identified in Virginia nor North Carolina from authentic records, but others will be mentioned which no doubt are closely related.

CHAPTER III SECTION 1

JAMES LAWRENCE, SR. born about 1785 in Virginia, died May 1880 at Francisco, Stokes County, North Carolina at the age of 98, according to the Raleigh, N. C. 1880 Census Mortality Record, Reference Schedule 5 Polk-Yancy Cos. F.2 137 F. Stokes County page No. 1. This mortality record shows he was married. He, father and mother were born in Virginia. Cause of death "Diarrhrea". Resident of Stokes County 18 years. Attending physician, R. Pringle.

CHAPTER III SECTION 2

Inclosed is Exhibit #1 of JAMES LAWRENCE, SR. and family beginning with U. S. Census 1820 through 1880. James was not identified in any record prior to 1820 census. The family was identified on each U. S. Census until 1850 by number of males and females between certain ages. The dates born as shown on the scheduler are estimated, based on the U. S. Census, but they are very accurate compared with the dates of James and his son Henry as of 1850 census and thereafter.

CHAPTER III SUBSECTION 1

The Pittsylvania County, Virginia U. S. Census of 1820 showed four males in addition to James, as head of the family and two females including his wife. The Henry County, Virginia Census of 1830 showed the same males but four females. Therefore the family had moved to Henry County prior to the taking of the 1830 Census. The Henry County Census for 1840 showed James and one male and three females. The absence of the three males and one female could not be identified elsewhere; possibly married or otherwise. The 1850 U.S. Census showed the same two males, but all previous females were missing. No doubt James' wife shown on prior census had died between taking of the 1840 and 1850 Censuses. The Henry County 1850 Census showed James' age as 65 and a carpenter; Henry, son of James, Sr. age 33; and a Lottie (Charlotte) age 40. It is assumed that she was James' next wife as they were on the 1860 Henry County and 1870 Stokes County, North Carolina Census together. Charlotte was on the Stokes County 1880 Census age 60 and record shows that James was married at time of death. Henry, age 33, appeared on separate census after 1850, after he had married.

CHAPTER III SUBSECTION 2

The U. S. Census for 1870 showed James' age 83 and Charlotte's age 40 in Stokes County, N. C., Quaker Gap Township, Martins Lime Kiln Post Office. They had moved to Stokes County about 1862, as James' mortality record showed he had lived in Stokes County 18 years prior to his death.

CHAPTER III SECTION 3

My parents, John Wesley and Sarah Elizabeth, told me many times that James' second wife was Nancy Woodall. No information was found on her in any records searched. They also told me that James was in the War of 1812. He died without knowing he was due a pension and after his death she drew a total sum of the pension and continued to draw monthly until her death.

The records searched in the Washington, D. C. Archives did not show James' 1812 war service from Virginia, nor Nancy drawing a pension. Further research in the Washington Archives might reveal something. If James was listed in a North Carolina Army Unit, it could be true. Charlotte, his last wife, could have drawn a pension and listed his services from N. C. even though he was living in Va. at time of service. This I did not check. If any information is located in the future, it can be inserted on this sheet.

CHAPTER IV

HISTORY OF HENRY LAWRENCE, HEIRS AND FAMILIES

Henry Lawrence, a farmer, son of JAMES, SR. born 1817 in Virginia, died September 28, 1896, in Stokes County, North Carolina. He was buried in the "Lawrence" family cemetery on his tobacco farm about two miles south of U. S. Post Office, formerly Francisco, N. C. Henry is the only heir of James, Sr. who could be identified by name. The cemetery was fenced and a large head stone was installed in year 1968 by Henry Clay Lawrence, Dobson, Route 1, Surry County, Virginia.

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 1

Henry married Nancy Cobler of Virginia about 1851. The August 15, 1850 U. S. Census showed her and her parents John and Sally Bouldin Cobler, along with her brothers and sisters. John's age 49, Sally 42 and Nancy 21. Nancy's parents married January 11, 1827.

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 2

Henry and family moved from Henry County, Va. to Stokes County, N. C. and settled on Dan River near the Old Hugh's Quarter. The U. S. Census of 1370 showed they were located in Peter's Creek Township, Stokes County, N. C. The 1870 U. S. Census, Stokes County, N.C. shows the following listing of Henry and family:

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 3

The ages listed on census do not in all cases agree with the actual dates furnished by the families and on other records. This is typical of old records in many of the older families.

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 4

At the time of Henry's death, September 28, 1896, he owned the farm where he was buried. The records of the dowry of Nancy Cobler, his wife, at Danbury, Stokes County, N. C. show the farm consisted of 153 acres.

CHAPTER IV, SUBSECTION 1

"The Record of Wills Book 9, page 402, Danbury, Stokes County, N. C." showed the will of Henry Lawrence dated 21 June 1892 and June 1, 1893, one-third to wife Nancy in her life time; after death her dowry part was willed to Margaret by Henry, then the remaining to be sold to highest bidder and all proceeds to be divided equally among the heirs:

CHAPTER IV, SUBSECTION 2

The Henry Lawrence estate of 153 acres, less 44 acres of wife Nancy's dowry, was sold to the highest bidder on 11 March, 1897 by S. A. Moir, Executor, to son Henry Clay Lawrence, for \$750.00 and witnessed by A. H. Joyce 11 March 1897.

CHAPTER IV SECTION 5

The following are sons and daughters and history of the heirs of Henry and Nancy Cobler Lawrence:

CHAPTER IV SUBSECTION 1

Julia Ann Lawrence, daughter, born about 1852, died unknown. Married Melchisedeck Francis December 30, 1873; she 22 and he 25. They had children, unknown. She died prior to Henry's will which was dated June 21, 1892. Julia lived in Quaker Gap Township, Stokes County, N. C.

CHAPTER IV SUBSECTION 2

Samuel Jesse Lawrence, son, born April 19, 1854, died January 1911. Married Nancy Moss January 14, 1875; he 21, she 16, Quaker Gap Township, Stokes County, N. C. They lived and were buried on their farm about two miles south of the former Francisco, Stokes County, N. C. Post Office.

Their children were:

Anna V. Alice and Mary Lilla.

Anna V. Lawrence, born about 1876, died unknown.
Married Drewry Holt October 14, 1894; she 18, he 22.
Had two children.

Alice Lawrence, born about 1877, died unknown. Married James Bondurant July 14, 1895; she 18, he 20. Lived on their farm adjoining her father's.

Their children:

Sons, Joseph and Kermit; daughters, Lellia and Edith.

Mary Lilla Lawrence, born about 1881, died in the 1970's. Married William P. Simmons December 26, 1901; she 20, he 22.

Had children.

CHAPTER IV SUBSECTION 3

Mary Jane Lawrence Dodson, daughter, born April 19, 1859, died July 7, 1920. Married John Wesley Dodson May 22, 1892; she 30, he 40, Peters Creek Township, Stokes County, N. C. He was born October 8, 1859, died April 6, 1929. They lived near Danbury and in Walmut Cove, N. C., Stokes County.

Their children:

Daughter, Kate Dodson Bennett, born June 25, 1895. Son, Dillard, born October 13, 1898. Daughter, Pearl Dodson Harger, born June 11, 1902, died November 17, 1953 Son, Henry, died an infant.

Kate lives at East Bend, N. C. and Dillard died about 1973.

CHAPTER IV SUBSECTION 4

James Nicholas Lawrence, son, born April 6, 1850 or 1860, died July 8, 1925. Married Isabella Martin November 14, 1878; she born August 30, 1859, died November 2, 1927. Marriage records at Danbury, N. C. show him 22, her 19, Peters Creek Township, Stokess County. They moved near Mt. Airy, Surry County, N. C. in the 1900's; buried near there.

Their children:

Daughters: Mattie, Jennie, Nannie, Anna, Lula, Minnie and Maggie; Sons: Sanders and Robert.

CHAPTER IV SUBSECTION 5

Henry Clay Lawrence, son of Henry and Nancy Cobler, born November 18, 1861 in Stokes County, N. C., died November 14, 1923, buried Dobson, Surry County, N. C. Married Susan Emma Moss of Patrick County, Va., born November 18, 1864, died September 21, 1904. Had ten children by Susan Emma Moss:

William Jesse, Henry Clay, Samuel, Thomas Jasper, Robert E., Charles Edgar, Susan, Claude Crocket, Alpha and John.

His second marriage was to Louise Blansett. Buried in Surry County, N. C.

Two children: Arthur Jackson and Elsie Louisa

William Jesse Lawrence, born October 26, 1886, died February 24, 1971. Married Katherine Virginia Shepard December 27, 1905; he 19, she 18. She was born April 4, 1888, Quaker Gap Township, Stokes County, N. C. They had 12 children.

Jesse lived a considerable time in Surry County, N. C. before moving near Greensboro, N. C. Most of his children live around Greensboro and High Point. Jesse was a retired farmer.

As time went on he purchased equipment to make farming less difficult, such as a wheat binder, machinery for harvesting hay, etc. They both helped their neighbors when they needed more help to get things done. He was a real baseball and basketball fan. Actually I (John Graham) played on the same team many a time when he was umpire.



LAWRENCE FAMILY RESEARCH

William Lawrence, born circa 1760 probably in either Halifax or Pittsylvania County, Virginia. William Lawrence was married on 5 May 1785 to Rachel Fuller, daughter of Arthur Fuller, and Sarah (maiden name not known), of Pittsylvania County, Virginia.

William had son, James H. Lawrence, born circa 1786 after the month of February in Pittsylvania County. Other genealogy records show him to be born several years earlier, however, with his parents marriage date and his War of 1812 Pension File records, the year 1786 seems to be accurate.

William's second son Jesse was born circa 1788, and third son Arthur Fuller Lawrence born circa 1800. William had daughters Nancy and Feroby (sometimes spelled Pherbe and Pherbey).

William Lawrence and family moved from Pittsylvania County to Henry County, Virginia. First land records in Henry County, Virginia:

My note: This Henry Lawrance is the first in the records of Pittsylvania and Henry Counties, Virginia. He might be the Henry who married Patty, dau. of Arthur Fuller of Pittsylvania Co., Va,. In my opinion Henry Lawrance and William Lawrance were brothers, who married Fuller sisters, Patty and Rachel, both daughters of Arthur Fuller. This Henry Lawrance must be the father of the younger Henry Lawrence born circa 1798, age taken from 1850 and 1860 Census, Henry County, Va. William Lawrence did not name a son "Henry." The younger Henry Lawrence married Gilley Allen on 5 February 1820, Henry Co., Va. His will was dated 13 July 1861, and probated 12 May 1862, Henry Co., Va. He named his sons, Samuel, Darling, Meredith C., Henry, William, and John Lawrence. His daughters were, Sally Martin, Raney Law, Eleanor, Missouri, and Elizabeth. At this time I have no proof that William and Henry Lawrence were brothers. The time frame of marriage, land records, and their wills indicate they were of the same generation, with Henry Laurance probably a little older.

I WILLIAM LAWRANCE of Henry County a citizen of Virginia do make and ordain and declare this instrument to be my last will and testament working all others. Item: to my beloved wife RACHEL LAWRANCE, is my will and desire that she shall remain in possession of my land during her natural life. Also my stock of horses, hogs, sheep, and cattle, household and kitchen furniture and plantation utensils that she shall retain them on the plantation for her benefit during her lifetime and at her death the above name stock of horses, hogs, sheep, and cattle, household, and kitchen furniture, and plantation tools to be equally divided among all my children.

Item: to my two sons Jesse Lawrance and Arthur Lawrance I give and bequeath to them and their heirs half of my tract of land forever. The other half I give and bequeath to my other three children namely James Lawrance, Nancy Lawrance, and Feroby Ferguson to be equally divided among them.

Lastly, I constitute and appoint my two sons Jesse Lawrance and Arthur

Lawrance executors to this my last will and testament.





The age of Henry 33 figures out close to the one on page \$2 on census 1870 in comparison and our grandmother Mancy shown on page \$6 Aug. 15, 1850 and the one on page \$2 works out very close in comparison. And the James under Sept. 19, 1850 I hope to be able to prove that he is our greatgrandfather. If we can find where they are listed on the census prior to 1850 maybe we can identify the whole family. Wade's greatgrandfather James Harrison had moved to N. C. prior to the 1850 census, see listing on page \$3 attached, as Zillah \$4 was 22 in 1870 therefore James had moved to N. C. prior to 1850.

As I have written Wade, the mearest thing I have found to our family if the ones listed on page # 6 of the attached under Sept. 19, 1850 census. The age of Henry 33 figures out close to the one on page # 2 on census 1870 in comparison and our grandmother Wancy shown on page # 6 Aug. 15, 1850 and the one on page # 2 works out very close in comparison. And the James under Sept. 19, 1850 I hope to be able to prove that he is our greatgrandfather. If we can find where they are listed on the census prior to 1850 maybe we can identify the whole family. Wade's greatgrandfather James Harrison had moved to N. C. prior to the 1850 census, see listing on page # 3 attached, as Zillah # was 22 in 1870 therefore James had moved to N. C. prior to 1850.

Bright outlook on life has always made Frank Lawrence shine

Anyone brave enough to admit that his favorite food is chicken livers has got to be someone with personality. Meet Frank Lawrence. He is the kind of person who has never met a stranger and who loves to share a laugh.

Lawrence also loves to tell stories and he is pretty darn good at it. He shared a few for

this profile.

"In 1930 my brother, Edward Lee, and I entered the Children's Home (in Winston-Salem). I was 10 years old and Edward Lee was eight. Edward Lee stayed in the Children's Home only four years while I stayed there through high school. We were in the middle of the Depression. Mom had four children and Daddy had died. We had a hard time getting over that, sending us there away from home, and she did, too, but in the long run it was for the best."

Lawrence said the arrival of local hero W.D. 'Bill' Murray changed things for the better. The orphanage hired Murray, a football star who had just graduated from Duke University, to be the athletic director. A football team was formed and Lawrence was on it.

'At 15 years old you were on the scrub football team. We scrimmaged the Varsity team and they beat us up pretty well. We learned how rough and

Lawrence remembers his experience at the Children's Home fondly, and he remained close to his mother. During those difficult times, though, he realized he was better off, in

many ways, to be in the home.
"Everybody had a job at the
Children's Home. As you elevated up, you had a different
job to do, pulling weeds, etc.
When you were young, you
worked on a farm. You pulled
weeds out of the garden: you weeds out of the garden; you hoed the garden; or maybe you'd pick greens, or you'd dig potatoes. You may not be the one digging them, but you'd clean them and put them in bushel baskets, ready to eat year round. It took a lot to feed those approximately 400 chil-

"At one time I told some of them that we had made a good decision about staying there, because we ate better than the

people outside in that hard time. We had all the milk we could drink; all the meat... good meat, donated by the Chathams in Elkin. We had everything that we needed to eat, and we ate... the more we

ate, the more we grew.

"Little girls would work in the laundry first and then they'd move up to waiting on they'd move up to waiting on tables, working in the main dining room kitchen, and then continue on to different jobs around the place. My job at the children's home when I was about 16 years old was to go around and get the fires started in the morning in all the buildin the morning in all the buildings. I had to get up early to do that—throw coal on them, get them started. One of my housemates got up at four a.m. to go milk the cows. He'd come in and raise all the windows-it'd be freezing outside. He'd say, 'All right! It's time to get up!'

"My job the last few years I was there was mowing all the grass on the property. I got so suntanned in high school. I got nicknamed 'Blackie."

"In 1937 I missed a whole year of school and football because of rheumatic fever, but I went on to play again after that year. Bill Murray left after I did and went to coach at the University of Delaware. He had a good record there, and then went to Duke once a job opened up there. And he had a good record there, also. After he retired from coaching alto-gether, Bill Murray said that going to the Children's Home was the best thing he had ever done. He found out just exactly what one could get out of himself when he wanted to.

"I graduated from Reynolds High School and told Pop Woosley (the headmaster), 'If you have anybody here that you can't place after they graduate, or if you have anybody here you can't handle, you just call me up, and I'll see if I can't do something about it. A few years later, after I was married, he called me and said he had one that had no family, no family at all. I said, 'Well, send him up here, which he did, and

we merged. That child merged right into our family. We had one other time when he had a boy down there that he just couldn't control. I said, 'Well, bring him up here, Pop. Let me have him.' He lived with us to start with, merged right into our family. I gave him a job up at United Technology. I was foreman then, and he loved that work. It was a very fine job, and he loved it. Both of these children that came up from the Children's Home married girls here in town and had a family, and did well, but both of them passed away in their 40's. But they did well here in Mount Airy. The mother of one of them came up one day and thanked me for all that I'd done. I said, 'I haven't done anything-he did it all!"

It's that kind of outlook on life that has made Frank Lawrence so liked and loved in his community. A positive attitude and always faithful, has given him lasting values to

CHAPTER III SUBSECTION 2

The U. S. Census for 1870 showed James' age 83 and Charlotte's age 40 in Stokes County, N. C., Quaker Gap Township, Martins Lime Kiln Post Office. They had moved to Stokes County about 1862, as James' mortality record showed he had lived in Stokes County 18 years prior to his death.

CHAPTER III SECTION 3

My parents, John Wesley and Sarah Elizabeth, told me many times that James' second wife was Nancy Woodall. No information was found on her in any records searched. They also told me that James was in the War of 1812. He died without knowing he was due a pension and after his death she drew a total sum of the pension and continued to draw monthly until her death.

The records searched in the Washington, D. C. Archives did not show James' 1812 war service from Virginia, nor Nancy drawing a pension. Further research in the Washington Archives might reveal something. If James was listed in a North Carolina Army Unit, it could be true. Charlotte, his last wife, could have drawn a pension and listed his services from N. C. even though he was living in Va. at time of service. This I did not check. If any information is located in the future, it can be inserted on this sheet.

CHAPTER IV

HISTORY OF HENRY LAWRENCE, HEIRS AND FAMILIES

Henry Lawrence, a farmer, son of JAMES, SR. born 1817 in Virginia, died September 28, 1896, in Stokes County, North Carolina. He was buried in the "Lawrence" family cemetery on his tobacco farm about two miles south of U. S. Post Office, formerly Francisco, N. C. Henry is the only heir of James, Sr. who could be identified by name. The cemetery was fenced and a large head stone was installed in year 1968 by Henry Clay Lawrence, Dobson, Route 1, Surry County, Virginia, V. C.

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 1

Henry married Nancy Cobler of Virginia about 1851. The August 15, 1850 U. S. Census showed her and her parents John and Sally Bouldin Cobler, along with her brothers and sisters. John's age 49, Sally 42 and Nancy 21. Nancy's parents married January 11, 1827.

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 2

Henry and family moved from Henry County, Va. to Stokes County, N. C. and settled on Dan River near the Old Hugh's Quarter. The U. S. Census of 1870 showed they were located in Peter's Creek Township, Stokes County, N. C. The 1870 U. S. Census, Stokes County, N.C. shows the following listing of Henry and family:

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 3

The ages listed on census do not in all cases agree with the actual dates furnished by the families and on other records. This is typical of old records in many of the older families.

CHAPTER IV, SECTION 4

At the time of Henry's death, September 28, 1896, he owned the farm where he was buried. The records of the dowry of Nancy Cobler, his wife, at Danbury, Stokes County, N. C. show the farm consisted of 153 acres.

CHAPTER IV, SUBSECTION 1

"The Record of Wills Book 9, page 402, Danbury, Stokes County, N. C." showed the will of Henry Lawrence dated 21 June 1892 and June 1, 1893, one-third to wife Nancy in her life time; after death her dowry part was willed to Margaret by Henry, then the remaining to be sold to highest bidder and all proceeds to be divided equally among the heirs:

The Henry Lawrence estate of 153 acres, less 44 acres of wife Nancy's dowry, was sold to the highest bidder on 11 March, 1897 by S. A. Moir, Executor, to son Henry Clay Lawrence, for \$750.00 and witnessed by A. H. Joyce 11 March 1897.

Jesse lived a considerable time in Surry County, N. C. before moving near Greensboro, N. C. Most of his children live around Greensboro and High Point. Jesse was a retired farmer.

Henry Clay Lawrence, born April 5, 1888. Married (first) to Eva E. Blansett September 25, 1907; she born April 8, 1890, died July 6, 1919, Quaker Gap Township, Stokes County, N. C. Two children: Dorsey E. and Flossie.

Henry's second marriage was to Etta Mae Smith, July 3, 1920; she born April 18, 1896, Surry County, N. C. They had eight children.

Henry Clay was born in Stokes County, N. C., Quaker Gap Township. He moved to Surry County, where he owned and operated a tobacco farm for many years near Dobson. He was a supervisor in the operation of a tobacco warehouse in Winston-Salem, N. C., during season, for years. He retired at home on the farm. A dairy is being operated on his farm by his family.

Samuel Lawrence, born 1893, died 1955. Married Bertie George of Francisco, Stokes County, N. C. He owned and operated a tobacco farm near Francisco for many years. No children.

Thomas Jasper Lawrence, born May 5, 1894, died October 21, 1919. Served in the U. S. Army during World War I. Unmarried. Died after the war.

Robert E. Lawrence, born January 26, 1892, died October 27, 1941. Married Ima Ayers, born May 1, 1896, died April 20, 1967. Served in the U.S. Army. Later served as Chief of Police of Mt. Airy, Surry County, N.C. for many years, until his death. One Son: Robert E., Jr.

Charles Edgar Lawrence, born September 30, 1892, died March 20, 1929. Married Minnie Ring, born January 13, 1893, died September 16, 1958. They lived in Mt. Airy, N. C., Surry County. Four (4) children.

Susan Lawrence, born December 24, 1896. Married Eugene Hill April 2, 1921. He born August 14, 1883. Both live in Mt. Airy, N. C. Four (4) children.

Claude Crocket Lawrence, born May 15, 1899. Married Nellie M. Fitzgerald August 12, 1923. She born April 16, 1903. He retired and living near Sanford, Florida. Four children, all living near him. He was in the contracting building of homes in Alexandria, Va. before retiring to Florida.

Alpha Lawrence, born April 29, 1901. Married Carl Gentry. He died. She lives in Mt. Airy, N. C. Three (3) children.

John Lawrence, born January 1, 1903. Youngest child of Henry Clay and Susan Emma Moss. Married Mallie Carrico December 24, 1924. Retired and living in Mt. Airy. One son: Roy L.

Henry Clay Lawrence, son of Henry and Nancy Cobler Lawrence; Second marriage, was to Louisa Blansett. Two (2) children:

Lucinda R. Lawrence, daughter, born 1864. Married George W. Hudson January 16, 1882; she 20 and he 23. Danbury, Stokes County, N. C. records. They had children.

John Wesley Lawrence, son, born July 10, 1869, at Francisco, Stokes County, N. C., died February 5, 1948, same address. Married Sarah Elizabeth Francis December 23, 1888, same address, Quaker Gap Township, N. C. She was born July 19, 1871, died January 23, 1949, daughter of William Riley and Mary F. Aaron Francis. They married October 6, 1870; he born December 12, 1834, died July 14, 1907, she born June 15, 1852, died May 18, 1927.

After the marriage of John and Sarah, they moved into a cabin located on the approximately 100 acres of wooded land deeded to them by William Riley Francis. There they were pioneers in carving a living, raising a family, building a permanent home and raising mostly tobacco and corn. They had to cut down trees and clear the land before any planting could be done, because only two or three acres of land was ready for planting. They soon built a permanent home, where they reared a family of eleven (11) children, and they both died in this home.

John Wesley was one of the most progressive farmers in the area. As time went on he purchased equipment to make farming less difficult, such as a wheat binder, machinery for harvesting hay, etc. They both helped their neighbors when they needed more help to get things done. He was a real baseball and basketball fan. Actually I (John Graham) played on the same team many a time when he was umpire.

There were eleven (11) children born to John Wesley and Sarah:

Dovie Lee, William Henry, Grover Cleveland, Alpha, Eugene Vester, George Wesley, John Graham, Bessie Queva, Raymond, Woodrow Wilson, Welbern Richard.

<u>Dovie Lee Lawrence Francis</u>, daughter, born November 25, 1889 at Francisco, N. C., Stokes County, died February 19, 1972. Married Robert Edgar Lee Francis Marcy 10, 1907; he born February 22, 1882, died February 2, 1935.

Their farm adjoined that of John Wesley Lawrence. They were tobacco farmers. Lee Francis, in addition to being a farmer, also delivered mail in the rural area for the U. S. Post Office for many years. He was also a progressive farmer. The crops varied, such as tobacco, hay, oats, and a large apple orchard. Their children:

Luther Edgar, son, born March 17, 1908, died December 11, 1970. Married Lucy Hanks July 9, 1957; Lucy born June 13, 1907. Luther was buried at Francisco Presbyterian Church, Francisco, Stokes County, N. C. He served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II. He had a cattle farm and raised black angus.

Walter Graham, son, born March 19, 1915, died May 7, 1955. Married Mozelle Schuyler November 25, 1939; she born June 30, 1917. He served in the U. S. Marines during 1935. He was an independent tobacco buyer, during the season. Children:

Larry Graham, son, born February 1, 1943. Married Sandra Collins June 1963; she born April 16, 1945.

Jerry Eugene, son, born October 8, 1949. Graduated from Wake Forest College, Winston-Salem, N. C. Now teaches in private schools.

Gracie Maye Francis Cole, daughter, born December 18, 1917. Married Dr. John Walton Cole, Sr., November 27, 1937; he born March 2, 1909. She received her mursing training in Winston-Salem and practiced for a number of years as a registered nurse in Arkansas.
