

The Chatham Country Store has taken on a new look. The new Country Store Outlet celebrated its grand opening Saturday, October 21, 1989. The Country Store Outlet opened for business on Monday, October 16, moving from the location on North Bridge Street in Elkin. The Chatham Country Store had been located on North Bridge Street since its opening on February 15, 1956. The store is now located in Jonesville on NC Hwy. 67 at the I-77 Interchange.

The Country Store Outlet is part of Riverview Village Factory Outlets, a small strip mall. Three other stores have spaces along with Chatham. They are Carolina Designs, Ltd., Willow Creek, and Elkin Valley Apparel.

The Country Store still carries all of the items that were available at the other location such as blankets, mattress pads, towels, sheets, pillows, upholstery, and pound goods. With more floor space, items are on larger displays and easier to see. The new store has 6000 square feet as opposed to 1800 square feet at the other store. Also, more racks have been added for roll goods.

The purpose of the booklets is to instill appreciation for personal health, encourage respect for laws prohibiting drug use, develop the ability to resist peer pressure, and reinforce the positive aspects of healthy, drug-free life.

The home is also a good place to start. Parents who are knowledgeable about drugs and who can teach children the evils of drugs can have a powerful impact. But children spend

a lot of time in school.

By working together, members of a community can teach kids to overcome the pressure to use drugs. Set a good example. Take an interest in your child and let him know you care. Make yourself knowledgeable about drugs, and watch for signs of drug use.


The Fellowship Club met Tuesday, September 19, for lunch at the Western Steer. Twenty-seven members attended the meeting.

½ teaspoon ground cloves

½ teaspoon ginger

1 teaspoon cinnamon

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon baking soda

Melt margarine, add sugar and molasses, mix well. Lightly beat egg, add to margarine, sugar and molasses mixture and stir.

Sift flour and dry ingredients, add to mixture and

mix well.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cover cookie sheet with foil. Drop by tablespoon, 3 inches apart. Bake for about 8 to 10 minutes or until edges of cookies turn brown.

First shift Weave Has Picnic


The first shift Main Weave employees enjoyed a picnic at Doughton Park on Sunday, September 17. About twenty-two of the forty-one employees attended with their families.


