We found that Patrick County, VA had many Nolen/Nowlins in some of their records. James Nolen was born 23 Oct 1796, married Nancy Shelton 17 Oct 1821, and died in the 1880s in Patrick Co., VA. Patrick County, VA is near Surry Co., NC.

There is information on a Mary Nowlin in the "Surry County Will Abstract" book (1771-1827): I:148a. 19 July 1780. Mary Nowlin to James Coffey power of attorney to convey to me in fee simple deed for 200 A on Boulus Crk adjoining Job Martin.... Her children listed are James, Sarah, and Susan. The 1786 Surry Census shows her with 1 male-21, 1 F.

David, John, Mary, and Richard Nowlin are listed in the index of the book, "Joseph Winston His Entry Book Surry County, NC Land Entries 1778-1781."

John Nowlin is listed with 3 taxables on the 1771 Surry Tax List.

There, in 1794, he married Jemima Reece born on North Deep Creek July 9, 1772. daughter of Abraham and Mary (Huff) Reece John and Jemima (Reece) Dobbins spent allo their married life near what is now Boonville Jemima died July 14, 1824; John in 1826. Both are buried in the Deep Creek Friends Cemetery.

John and Jemima (Reece) Dobbins were the parents of twelve children as follows:

Jacob Dobbins (1795-1863) is described below. Abraham Dobbins (1796-1856) married Catharine Baker and died near Boonville, Jesse Dobbins (1799-1872) married Elizabeth Chappell (1794-1874) and died in Rush County, Indiana. Miles Dobbins died in Iredel County. Levi Dobbins (1804-1855) married Jane ? (1815-1873) and died in Hancoch County, Indiana. Sarah Dobbins (1808-?) married William Burcham and lived in Wilkes County. John Dobbins (1809-?) married Eliz abeth Carrender and died in Yadkin County Keziah Dobbins (?-1825) died unmarried Pleasant Dobbins (1812-?) married Elizabeth Carter (1817-?) and died in Yadkin County Nancy Dobbins married Hiram Spencer and died in Martin County, Indiana. Joel Dobbins (1817-1860) married Sarah Carter (1814-?) and died in Yadkin County. Jemima Dobbins married James Spencer and lived in Crawford County, Indiana.

Jacob Dobbins, oldest son of John and Jemima (Reece) Dobbins, was born in what is now Yadkin County June 8, 1795. His marriage bond to Jane Carter is dated April 19, 1825. Jane was born on North Deep Creek March 19, 1805, daughter of Joseph and Margaret (Hinshaw) Carter and granddaughter of Isaac and Mary (Bray) Carter and of Thomas and Hannah Hinshaw. Both spent their lives within a few miles of their birthplaces. Jacob died May 26, 1863; Jane March 14, 1871. Both are buried in the Deep Creek Friends Cemetery.

Jacob and Jane (Carter) Dobbins were the parents of four children. Nancy Dobbins (1827-?) married Alexander Beeson. Mary Dobbins married Robert Fletcher. Jesse Virgil Dobbins (1830-1883) married Sara Catharine Mackie (1837-1906). William Dobbins died while serving in the Union Army during the Civil War.

BURRUS

William Matheson Burrus, born 6/ 29/27, a retired newspaperman and medical journalist who lived at 1015 Oaklawn Ave., Winston-Salem, died Saturday, June 17, 1995, at N.C. Baptist Hospital from lung cancer. Mr. Burrus and his wife, the former Mary Ruth Dobbins, a Winston-Salem native, moved to Winston-Salem in 1989. Each had lived in New York City for many years. Mr. Burrus was a writer and editor for major newspapers in the 1950s, '60s and 70s, including the Johnson City (Tenn.) Press, the San Antonio Express-News, the Dallas Times Herald and the New York Post. Subsequently, he became a fulltime medical journalist and at the time of his death he was a national correspondent for Oncology Times, a J.B. Lippincott Co. publication. He was the author of hundreds of articles in lay and medical

publications, and co-authored two health-related books on jogging and vasectomies. He was a member of the National Assoc. of Science Writers and the American Medical Writers Assoc. Among many honors Mr. Burrus received during his newspaper career were the Albert M. Lasker Memorial Medical Journalism Award in 1964 for "Tomorrow's Damned," a series of articles on mental illness in children, published in the Dallas Times Herald and the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism's Paul To-benkin Award in 1967 for his "fight against racial and religious hatred, intolerance, discrimination and every form of bigotry ... in two series of articles on welfare and poverty published in the New York Post. Mr. Burrus was born in Taylorsville, N.C. and grew up in Johnson City, Tenn. He was an enlisted man in the U.S. Navy in the latter months of WWII (1945-46) and returned to active duty in the Korean War, 1952-53. After both periods of military service, Mr. Burrus attended East Tennessee State University and became editor of the school newspaper, The Collegian, and a member of the Student Council. In addition to his wife, Mr. Burrus is survived by one son, Hayden Burrus of Boca Raton, Fla.; one daughter, Mrs. Kathy Moats of Omaha, Neb.; one grandson and one granddaughter, Brian Moats and Mrs. Peggi Busch of Omaha; and a great grandson, Dre Busch, also of Omaha. The family will receive friends from 7-9 p.m. Friday, June 23, at Hayworth-Miller Funeral Home, 3315 Silas Creek Parkway, Winston-Salem.
