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PROCEEDINGS

Your committee recommends that a Sunday school institute be conducted in as many of our churches as possible some time in the near future and also the Sunday School Association of Surry Association meet Saturday before the 5th Sunday in October, 1921, and Saturday before the 5th Sunday in April 1922.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Our State Mission work differs from the other phases of our mission work only in location and limitation, being confined to North Carolina. The object of all mission work is the redemption of men and women from the dominion of Satan, and bringing them into the Kingdom of God. The commands and commissions for the work are embodied in a few passages in the New Testament.

"Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every

creature," included State Missions.

"Go ye therefore and teach all nations," included North Carolina.

"Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the earth," applies to our State Mission territory.

The Bible is a book full of the missionary spirit. Its limits are worldwide by the work began in Judea. The smaller community must have the Gospel preached in it, before going to the uttermost parts of the earth.

State Missions is one of the most important branches of our

entire mission work. It is in a sense the foundation of all other mission work. It is the base of supplies in religious warfare. This work should be so thoroughly, and so vigorously pushed that every stranger, or foreigner who enters our borders would go away with religious impressions so deep that he can never get away from them. We shall be flooded in a few years with emigrants from many lands bringing all sorts of notions of morality and religion along with them. It is our opportunity and our obligation to meet them in our own state with the simple truths of the Gospel of Jesus our Lord. And in addition to this work for our foreign born element there is great need for help among some of our country churches that they may be led out to do larger things. And many of our cities need help that they may be able to take advantage of the conditions for the Baptist cause.

Some of the Work Done by State Missions.

Last year there were 178 missionaries aided by the board, 279 churches served, 4,378 conversions, 1,953 baptisms, 129 mission study classes conducted, 20 churches organized, 19 church houses built, and these churches aided by the board contributed to the various benevolent causes \$86,426.23, to local church expenses \$66,375.47, and on pastors' salaries \$71,993.98.

The Mobile schools conducted for the last three years were discontinued for the present year because it was necessary to cut expenses somewhere. These schools were very important, and it is to be regretted that they were discontinued. Last year there were 1,832 in attendance at these schools, and each person attending got more training than he could have gotten at several sessions of the state convention.

The colportage work was discontinued for the present year also. This work was very important to the cause, as is shown by the following brief summary of the work for last year. Men at work during year 16; days worked, 1,595; homes visited, 8,941; prayers with families and individuals, 5,715; sermons and addresses, 994; conversions, 366; tracts distributed, 85,372; destitute places reported, 21; Recorder subscriptions, 144. It is hoped that this work can be resumed again soon.

Evangelism is another branch of our State Mission work which is of such importance that we cannot estimate its value to the kingdom work. It is the very heart of all our work. It was a part of the 75 million program, and it is for this that the largest part of the 75 million is to be used. The State Mission Board is putting ona definite campaign to win the lost this summer and fall. Every church is to be organized for this work, and every member who loves lost souls will be asked to go out and win one. The campaign is called the Win One Campaign.

Every one win one. September 10 to October 10 will be Win One Month. Every church is asked to have one week during this month set aside for soul winning. If every member will win one it will double our membership. Will I win at least one soul to Jesus? Will you win one lost one to the Saviour? There will be rejoicing in Heaven.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We as Baptists hearty believe in education. There are two kinds of education we desire to call attention to. There is a kind of education which gives training to the mind only. There is another kind which trains both mind and heart. All secular schools give mind training. But it is largely left to the denominational Christian school to emphasize education which reaches both mind and heart. For this reason our Baptist people are stressing Christian education. We believe that we Baptists should patronize our denominational schools rather than state institutions.

The following resolution was passed by the association in session at New Life church:

That the principal of Mountain Park School be requested to submit a report from the school at each session of the association. This report to contain the following:

- 1. An itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements.
- 2. All assets and liabilities—this to show how all liabilities are secured.
- 3. Number of teachers, their salaries, length of time employed, amount still due on salaries if any.
- 4. Number of pupils enrolled, average attendance rate, and amount of tuition received.
- 5. Such other information as the principal may have concerning the school and its work.

The following information was offered by C. W. Williams:

In 1911 the Surry Baptist Association undertook the building of Mountain Park school. The school was started in 1913 and has been open an average of ten months each year. The attendance is usually all that can be taken care of.

At present the property consists of 70 acres of land, two large dormitories and partial equipment for these buildings. A watter system has been installed and an administration building is being erected. It is the purpose of the trustees to install steam heating plants in all the buildings and have this ready for use by the coming of cold weather.

The property, as it now stands, is worth \$35,000. The estimated cost of the work planned for this summer is \$8000. A little more than \$7000 of this amount has been subscribed.

Eighteen of the churches of this association have contributed to the building fund of the school. The names and amounts are as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Home mission work is conducted by the Home Mission Board, which is located at Atlanta, Ga. This work is done in all the states of the Southern Baptist Convention and in Cuba. The Home Board helps do work along several lines. It has charge of the mountains schools. There are 39 of these mountain schools and they seek to reach and help three million people. These schools are in great need of forces and facilities with which to do their work.

There are four thousand homeless churches in the south. One million dollars are needed annually for church building alone.

There are 10 million negroes within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention. These need to be won, and the Baptists are responsible in a large measure for them. If we neglect them we let an opportunity pass.

Foreigners in our midst must be evangelized or they become a nuisance to our country. Our Board is trying to win them.

Evangelistic work is another important phase of Home Missions. Our Board employs a number of evangelists and evangelistic singers who give their time to conducting meetings wherever they are needed most within the bounds of our Southern Baptist Convention.

Let us rally to the support of this work with our prayers and our money.
