THE YARBROUGH STORY

The name is said to come from the old Nordic work "Jardbor" pronounced Yarborg. It refers to a type of earthwork fortification once used by the ancient Norsemen for their defenses. The Yarborks as they were called up to about 1600, were part of the Vikings that came out of Scandinavia in the latter part of the eighth century. They plagued the southern country by burning and pillaging the towns and villages they found in the Western World.

The British Isles were wide open to them. The Romans had ran most of the British Isles but pulled out in the 4th Century to protect Rome. One fourth of the British Isles were then taken by the Germans. This area became controlled by the Angles, Saxons, and Jutes. The Southern part was controlled by Roman-British after victory at Mount Badon. This is the time period that the term of England came to be. England was divided into seven Kingdoms which allowed the Vikings in 793 to attack the Holy Isle of Lindisfarne, off the coast of Northumbria. They continued south and by 99 were reported off the Aquitaine coast of France.

These two attacks alarmed the Western World. Two quotes from the book by Hazel Yarbrough gives the attitude of the World toward the Vikings.

"And they came to the Church of Linisfarne, laid everything to waste with grievous plundering, trampled the Holy places with polluted feet, dug up alters and seized all treasure of the Holy Church." Simon of Durham
"Never before has such terror appeared in Britain as we have now suffered from a pagan race, nor was it thought that such an inroad from the sea could be made." Alquin of York.

From 835, hardly a year passed without some terror from the Vikings. Most reports were very inaccurate, adding more terror than really was. From 851 the Vikings were on English soil, and the first reference of the name Yarberg was found in England. The Saxons tried paying bribes to the Vikings for them to leave them alone. It did not work the Vikings did much as they pleased and made strong inroads into Northern England.

Out of all this came King Alfred in 865 who became known as Alfred the Great. He gave the early Danes known as Vikings a good fight. The Danes did capture most of then North country. Kind Alfred was able to defeat the Danes in several battles but finally came to terms with King Guthram Yarburg giving the North East to the Danes. This gave the Danes the right to settle in the boroughs of Nottingham, Lincoln, Stamford, Derby and Liecester. This area became known as Danelaw. Scandinavian customs, laws and language would prevail in this part of England for many centuries, and even today their legacies remain, in place names and in the local dialect.

The little hamlet of Yarbrough lies just off the coast of Lincolnshire, a few miles south of the River Humber and a few miles inland from the North

Sea...exactly the sort of place you would imagine an old Viking would choose for himself when he got tired of raiding and trading and decided to settle down. The village today consists of about a dozen houses and an old stone church, which dates back at least to the twelfth century. We can not be sure which Yarbrough built it, or even at what point Gemund's descendants began to abandon their old pagan beliefs and to espouse the "new" Christian religion. One this is certain, though, the conversion would not happen over night..it would have been a slow gradual process, and many generations would probably have had to pass before the Lord of Yarbrough was comfortable enough with Christianity that he could have been prevailed upon to build so grand a church. A plaque inside the church identifies it as "St. John the Baptist, Yarburgh. The plaque further reads: This church is maintained by the Redundant Churches Fund, St. Andrew-By-the-Wardrobe, Queen Victoria Street, London, England, with money provided by Parliament and the Church of England, and by the gifts of the public. Although no longer used for regular worship, it remains a consecrated building."

The Norman Conquest of England has been called the greatest take over in the history of Western Europe. It came about because King Edward the Confessor was childless and the Crown was of elective power by the house of Nobels. William the Duke of N Normandy, a descendant of a Viking Chieftain, claimed that King Edward had promised the Crown to him. In 1066 with the death of King Edward the Crown was give to Harold, Earl of Wessex as Edward's successor. The problem was that Harold was shipwrecked on the coast of Normandy in 1064 and to get the help he needed he acknowledged William's claim to the Crown.

After the Coronation in early 1066 which was followed by a visit of Haley's Comet, this set the stage for what was to come. William called on the Danes to come to his aid. The men of Danelaw rallied under the banner of William their fellow Dane. This include don Eustacias De Yarbrugh. First an invasion force led by the King of Norway, King Herald Haardraade. He landed and was met at the Battle of Stamford Bridge by the new King Harold which was able to defeat the Normans in a bloody battle. His victory was quickly taken away for news reached him that William had landed at Pevensey. A good description of the Battle is given by R. J. White a Fellow of Downing College at Cambridge. "On October 14, 1066, after making a forced march and gathering all the reinforcements he could assemble on short notice, Harold and the battered survivors of Stamford Bridge took up position across William's route to London, on the spur of a hill six miles northwest of Hastings, a site marked today by the village and abbey of Battle. As the Normans approached, the Anglo Saxons left their horses in the rear, and formed on foot in their customary shield-ring, armed with long Danish battle axes. The mounted Norman knights, storming the hillside, were supported by bolleys of arrows fired between charges by bands of archers in their rear, and the superiority of arms and tactics finally proved too much for the defenders. When dusk fell, Harold and the men of his bodyguard lay dead at the foot of the Royal Standard, surrounded by hundreds of slain comrades, while the survivors scattered in all

directions before the Norman Cavalry. Duke William, who had fought in the front rank's and had three horses killed beneath him, could claim the victory; he could also assert that his claim to the throne of England had been vindicated by the god of battle."

What part of the battles Eustacias De Yarburch was in is unknown at this time, but he must have been in the mist of it all. William the Conqueror awarded his supporters various estates for their support and Eustacias De Yarburch was awarded a large estate in Lincoln and made the Lord of Yarbrough in Lincoln. This is recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086, which was the first census and tax digest of its kind in Britain. It was commissioned by King William so he would know all that was at his command in England, this gave almost a complete list of all people, property and lands in England.

This Eustacias De Yarburch is as of now the beginning of the Yarbrough Family. He had a son Robert De Yarburch who married daughter of Sir Lambert Munby and had a son Lambert De Yarburch.

Lambert De Yarburch married the daughter of Arthur Ormesby and had a son Sir John Yarburch who married Ursula Humbertson daughter of Sir Raphe Humbertson and had a son named Ralph De Yarburch. Ralph De Yarburch married Anne Steine daughter of Sir William Steine and had a son Robert De Yarburch. Robert De Yarburch married the daughter of Sir John Bussam and had a son, William De Yarburch. William Yarburch married Beatrix Auke, the daughter of Sir Geoffrey Auke and they had a son Richard Yarburch. Richard married Cassandra Maplethorpe, daughter of Sir Richard Maplethorpe and had a son Robert Yarburch. Robert Yarburch married Isabell Ewerby, daughter of Sir John Ewerby and had a son, William Yarburch. William Yarburch married the daughter of Thomas Angevyle and had a son Richard Yarburch. Richard Yarburch married Joan Atwell, daughter of Thomas Atwell and had a son William Yarburch. William Yarburch married Isabell Billing, daughter of Sir John Biling, and had a son Richard Yarburch. Richard Yarburch married Elizabeth Moyne daughter of Thomas Moyne and had a son Charles Yarburch. Charles Yarburch married Agnes Skipwith daughter of Sir John Skipwith and had a son Richard Yarburch. His second wife Elizabeth Newcom and him had sons, Christopher, Edmund, Bryan and daughters Ursula, Margaret, Bridget, Barbara, and Jane. Richard Yarburch married Margaret Borington and had a son Charles Yarburch. Charles Yarburch married Elizabeth Littlebury, daughter of Humphrey Littlebury and had a son William Yarburch. William Yarburch married Elinor Clifford daughter of Thomas Clifford, and had a son Henry Yarburch, William Yarburch and Nicholas Yarburch. Christopher Yarburch son of Charles and Elizabeth married Margaret Grantham and had two sons, Charles and Francis. Charles' son Edmund married and settled in Nottingham. Francis Yarburch, son of Edmund, married Sarah Wromely and lived at Balne Hall in Yorkshire and had Sir Nicholas, Thomas, Edmund, and Francis Yarburch.

Sir Nicholas Yarburgh married Faith Dawney, daughter of John Dawney and had the following children: Sir Thomas Yarburgh, Nicholas, Richard, John, Edmund, Christopher, Elizabeth, and Faith. Sir Thomas Yarburgh married Henrietta Marie Blague and had James, Thomas, Blague, and Richard Yarburgh. Thomas Yarburgh son of of Edmund and Sarah married Anne Ellys. Edmund or Edward Yarbrough the youngest son of Edmund and Sarah married Anne Stanhope daughter of Thomas Stanhope, and had a son Thomas Yarbrough born in 1661.

I know this is a long list of names, but through it all it brings us to the family of Richard Yarbrough (this is when the name changed to Yarbrough) born in 1615. he was the first known Yarbrough to come to America.

YARBROUGHS IN VIRGINIA

England had a Civil War in 1642 that lasted to 1649. It mostly evolved the upper class but the lower class was also used as soldiers. This caused some problems for some of the ruling Nobles. During this time many of the Royalist families migrated to the Virginia Colony. The Yarbrugh family had close ties with the Royal family and so this may be reason the Richard Yarbrough left England in 1643. It may have been a political decision that insured their safety and their families safety.

It also could be that his brother Sir Thomas Yarbrugh got all of the birthright which left very little to Richard. This would mean that he had no real wealth of his own and would have to live off the blessing of the family and what work he could find that would fit his station in society. Richard may have decided to break out of the family mold and try something new.

Richard Yarbrough married Frances Procter in 1635 in England. Richard, born in 1615, made the migration to Virginia in 1643 from England. Some of his children may have been born in England. For his son, Richard, gave in a court case in 1690 in New Kent County, Virginia, that he was born in Lincolnshire in England. He gave his age to be 38 which would make him born in 1652.

Some insight into the character of Richard is given in the audio-visual presentation at the Blandford Church in Virginia. It states that Richard Yarbrough, and a few other wandering families ventured up the James River into the wilderness. What courage it took to sail past the ruins of Walstenholme Towne, where only eighteen years earlier Indians had massacred the entire population and burned it to the ground. They continued into the country of Virginia where no white man had ever been before. From the records of the Virginia Company of London, it gives that only one out of three of the early pioneers survived from starvation, disease, and Indians.

Virginia in the early 1640's was far and away the wildest, most sparsely populated, and the least attractive of all the British colonies that were in existence at that time...a colonial backwater, really. The high hopes with which the London Company 'adventures' had begun their 'grand experiment' in 1606 had long since given way to the realities of life in the wilderness. Gone were the visionaries with their dreams of vineyards and silkworm plantations. They had been replaced by planters of a more practical lifestyle, who had long since given up worrying about what wouldn't grow in Virginia in favor of concentrating on what would grow there...tobacco. Now, thirty-five years after the colony's founding, they were growing this crop to the exclusion of just about everything else. So successful was tobacco in the colony's barter system that Virginia did not issue a currency until 1755, and even then tobacco remained important as a medium of exchange.

Without a doubt, the most serious problem that these early Virginia settlers had to cope with was the Indians, who had never really been able to come to terms with the white man's ideas of land ownership. From the beginning, peace between the two races had been fragile at best, with each race regarding itself as the superior one.

Edward Yarbrough and Christian Yarbrough are listed in records in 1653 and 1657 in Virginia. This shows there were other Yarbroughs that came over after Richard and they were of the family of Richard. Edward, known as Edmund in England, and his wife was Sarah Wormely, he was Richard's grandfather. Edward died and it is recorded that his son Edward was to be passed "to the next court to be delivered to constable and from that constable to another constable until he be delivered to Col. Robert Abrall, who is desired by this Court to dispose of him to his Mother or other ways which are fitting. next Court to be 24 August, 1658." (* found in "Virginia Colonial abstracts," Series 2, Vol. 5, Duvall York Co. 1657-1659)

Surviving records of early Virginia are scarce, most of them having fallen casualty over the years to fires, carelessness, deterioration, and Union soldiers, who ransacked local courthouses during the Civil War and carried off the record books as souvenirs. The earliest record we have of Richard Yarbrough in Virginia is found in the archives of Old Bristol Parish Church, which have miraculously survived. They name "Richard Yarbrough, an Englishman" as one of the founders of the parish (ca.1643). The parish records also mention Richard as a member of the expeditionary party who first explored the upper reaches of the James River.

If you sail far enough up the York River you will eventually come to a fork where the York separates into two smaller rivers, the Mattaponi and the Pamunkey. The area between these streams is known as Pamunkey Neck, and it was here that Richard Yarbrough purchased a vast tract of land from the Pamunkey and Chichomony Indians while the area was still wilderness.

Richard had at least two sons, for they were listed in his estate. His son John Yarbrough was deeded land in King William County on 12 February 1695 from Richard. This was most likely a wedding gift as John had married Abigail Whitehead a few days before the transaction. his other son was Richard Jr. born about 1652 in England. He also made sure his sons were educated and this drive to educate the children of the family was passed on to his descendants. This made the Yarbroughs an educated family who took an active part in the community they lived in.

Richard was a very religious person he was part of the found party of the Old Blandford Church. There is a memorial to Richard today. "Richard Yarbrough, immigrant, one of the founders, 1642, of Bristol Parish, Prince George County, Virginia" (died 1702, aged 87) rests in his grave inside the church yard enclosure. The slab in front of the old headstone is the result of a project started in 1980 by R.P. Yarbrough of Charlotte, North Carolina. With the support of other Yarbroughs, this new marker became a reality and was dedicated at the National Yarbrough conference held 1982 at

Old Blandford Church, Petersburg, Virginia. Richard Yarbrough was buried in this spot when it was known as Well's Hill in the town of Blandford. The brick church was erected in 1735 within a few feet of Richard Yarbrough's grave which is the oldest grave in the cemetery. Old Blandford Church and cemetery is located on US Routes 301-460; Crater Road. The graveyard holds thousands of Confederate soldiers and the grave of Lieutenant Wales Hurt, age 17, he was among a group of soldiers left behind to protect a hospital from the advance of 1300 Union Cavalrymen, who were advancing on Petersburg on 9 June 1864. Lt. Hurst went down in history as making one of the most valiant stands in the War. Most of his men died with him and were buried by him, but he held his post long enough for reinforcements to arrive.

Throughout this time frame there has been more immigration of the Yarbrough family to the colonies. Land records throughout the 1700's prove this. William Yarbrough was listed as having 400 acres in King William County. Edward and William later have recorded (1723) land holdings in St. Johns Parish. In 1724 William patents 400 new acres in St. Johns Parish, on the branch of Reedy Swamp of the Mattawponi River. In 1724 Richard patents 400 new acres in St. Margarets Parish. In 1725 Charles patents 400 new acres in St. Margarets parish. In 1735 Ambrose Yarbrough migrated to America from England and settled in Price George County, this area became Amelia County. William and his wife Eleanor built a plantation in Amelia County on the banks of the Little Nottaway River. here William died in 1748 and he listed his sons in his will: Samuel, William, Ezekial, Moses, Micajah.

Some of the family migrated south into North Carolina in about 1750. A Richard Yarbrough witnessed a deed in Anson County, North Carolina in 1750. In 1755 a tax list shows Thomas Yarbrough and son Manoah and also a John Yarbrough. 1770-71 tax list for Butte County, North Carolina shows James, Richard, Henry, Micajah, Joshua, John, and Zachariah Yarbroughs.

William, son of William, married Diana Smith, daughter of James and Ann Cary Smith. They lived in Lunenburg County, Virginia and had the following children: James Smith, Richard, Elizabeth, Oswell, and Joseph.

REVOLUTION

The North Carolina roster of Revolutionary Soldiers list these Yarbroughs: David, Edward, James, Jephtha, Rowland, Joseph, Nathan, Benjamin, Ruben, Richard, and John. So by the time of the Revolution the family became quite numerous in North Carolina. It was this time period that some of the family moved into South Carolina. We have found land transactions in Craven County and Granville County.

Ambrose Yarbrough son of the emigrant Ambrose who came over in 1735, married Elizabeth Culpepper. She was the daughter of Captain John Culpepper. Ambrose's sister, Mary married John Culpepper the nephew of Captain John Culpepper.

Captain John Culpepper was in the Kings Militia in Anson County, North Carolina. He is listed in the Archives , "Field Return of the Regiment of Militia Rocky River Company, of Anson County, at a general Muster the nineteenth Day of November 1770.) It listed Captain John Culpepper's Command as follows: One lieutenant, One Ensign, Three Sergeants, Three Corporals, One Drummer and One Hundred and One men under arms, all sworn to the service of King and Country. When the War started Captain John Culpepper and his entire command deserted their King and joined the Rebel Forces.

Not all of the Yarbrough family was for Independence. A list of British Loyalists from South Carolina shows James Dandridge Yarbrough and Lt. John Yarbrough, both from Colleton County. There was a Thomas Yarbrough in Georgia who worked for both. He sold goods and his service to the Revolution and the British. However, he was drafted into the Georgia Battalion for a term on two years.

Some of the family tried moving to new areas to get out of the War. Clement Yarbrough was one of those who chose to leave the States. However, he was captured by the men of the Executive Council of the State of Georgia and charged with Tory activities. It was ordered that they be executed by hanging. During the night a guard came by and asked each one if he had the opportunity to serve the Revolution would he. The next morning they were taken out to be hanged. All those that answered yes to the question the night before were spared and watched those who answered no be hung. A pardon had come that stated, "That on the consideration that they enter into the service on board one of the Vessels of War of the United States." Clement Yarbrough was one who answered yes and entered the service. After the War he did not return to Georgia.

There were some settlers of the Colonies who were able to get out of the country. Historians have found that some of the people of West Florida or as now known as Louisiana moved there to get away from the War because they were loyal to England. They chose to leave the Atlantic States to avoid the war. One of these was James Smith Yarbrough born 2 September 1745. He left

the North Carolina-Virginia area early for he was able to see what was coming. It is reported in the Louisiana Genealogical Register, Vol. 20, P. 7, that James Smith Yarbrough arrived with his wife, five children and his brothers in May 1773.

The following story is recorded, "After the War in 1791, President George Washington toured the South to show good will, but his real reason was a to strengthen the Federalist Party. On 30 May 1791, the President was met by the Salisbury Light Dragoons and ceremoniously escorted to Salisbury. The tiny village of Salisbury extended all the courtesy and pomp due the first President of the United States. There were parades, a banquet and a ball. George Washington was the house guest of Edward Yarbrough. He slept there and ate at this table. The people of the Carolina's like most Americans saw him as a hero and idolized him."

WESTWARD

Some of the YARBROUGHS decided once again to become pioneers. With a group moving to Georgia, and other moving west to areas such as Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas, and the area of West Florida (Louisiana). A lot of these did not use covered wagons, for there were no roads. They used the trails that had been developed by the Indians and game. This made it hard to get oxcarts down these trails so many had to walk and carry what they could. Their early homes were made of hastily erected cabins of rough hewn logs. They had dirt floors, unglazed windows covered by animal skins or wood, and what little furniture they could make from what was at hand. There was also a decline in educating their children. The work of survival took all their time, so there was no time for schooling the children. Some were taught the basic things but that was very little.

James Smith Yarbrough and two of his brothers made it to West Florida. Oswell was one brother and he witnessed a will in Natchez District. James received a land grant (#363, 400A) on the Mississippi River. This took place on 2 June 1777, it was not clear whether this was an English or Spanish Land grant. He was known as "a West Florida Yeoman". He was educated, but his children were not. James and his wife Mary had eight children. We have not learned Mary's Maiden name. (John Swanson Yarbrough was one of these eight children.)

Two of James' children fought in the War of 1812, on the side of the United States. They settled in what was known as Galves Town. Records show that James Smith Yarbrough applied for beef, corn and provisions in April 22, 1784. Records also show that on March 20, 1804 Anna Smith was married. She was the daughter of Mariah Yarbrough and Santiago Smith. This record also states that Ann Smith was a native of Galvez Town, indication that her mother, Mariah Yarbrough was born c 1769 and no doubt was one of the five children who arrived with James Smith Yarbrough.

"Lower Mississippi" by Hodding Carter, in his series, "Rivers of America," write that the English had hopes of dredging out Manchac so that their ships could enter the Mississippi River without the hazards of entering the mouth of the River. Their engineering attempts to clear the channel were a failure, but they went on with their plans to build a fort. Fort Bute, it was called, was a little backwoods fortification, garrisoned by a few officers who were soon replaces with Scots Fusiliers and English Colonials and veterans of the Seven Years War.

Below the Iberville River, The Spanish watched with envy the trade which the English controlled. By 1777 the English had wrought a miracle of colonization. Along the river, scores of comfortable, solid homes gave proof of the prosperity under England. These homes were of brick and mortar and nestled, white and cool, under oak and magnolia trees, back some forty feet from the Mississippi to Manchac to the bayou's conjunction with the Amite.

The settlers of Galves Town were at peace with their Spanish neighbors, and lived only a short distance from Manchac, where the warehouses of Mr. Swanson and Co., Indian Traders, emphasized England's mercantile dominance. The two small forts were joined by a wooden bridge. The English and the Indians in this area dominated all others. This was Spanish territory at this time. Galves became Governor in 1777 and heard of the War between Spain-England and the English plans to reinforce Manchac. Governor Galves planned to strike first for fear the English would take this land from the Spanish. His plans were delayed due to a hurricane in August of 1779. He was able to gather troops from the Indians, Arcadians, farmers, trappers, and 170 Spanish Veterans. At sunrise on the 21st of September 1779, the battle began with an artillery barrage. By 3:30pm the English Fort was in ruins and Galves demanded the surrender of Baton Rouge and Fort Panmure at Natchez. This ended the English threat to New Orleans and as time passed both Manchac and Galves Town faded away over the years.

James' sons were not blessed with the education their father had, they became farmers, trappers, and general frontiersmen. With the purchase of the Louisiana Territory in 1803 this land became part of the United States. Because of this they fought in the War of 1812. However, it is not known what battles they were in. Being on the Mississippi River, close to Baton Rouge, they probably were in both the Battle of Horseshoe Bend and in the Battle of New Orleans.

The Indians were being supplied by the British and they went to War in 1813. The Creek Nation was determined to get rid of all the white men in their territory. The settlers moved to Fort Mims for protections but the Indians attacked and killed several hundred. In 1814 General Andrew Jackson known as "Old Hickory", moved his army into the area to avenge the loss of Fort Mims. He got the help of the Cherokees, who were traditional enemies of the Creek. Andrew Jackson and Chief Sequoia caught up with the Creek and the Battle of Horseshoe Bend began. The Creek were totally defeated and succeeded to the United States almost half of what is now the State of Alabama, which became a state in 1817.

ON TO TEXAS

John Swanson Yarbrough born 25 December 1777, is the son of James Smith Yarbrough. John Swanson Yarbrough Sr., his eldest son Joseph Randolph Yarbrough and John Swanson Yarbrough Jr. all received land grants for having arrived in Texas in 1832, and for serving in the Army of the Republic of Texas. John Swanson Jr., was killed in the Battle of San Jacinto.

In 1845 or 1846 John Swanson Yarbrough Sr. Married Mrs. Frances Coker Moore Tope, a widow who had been left with small children at home, after the death of her second husband. He was thirty six years older than she, but he also had small children at home. She was born in Arkansas in 1813, and family legend has Frances a sister of John Swanson Yarbrough's second wife, and when she went to their home after their marriage, Dow's greeting to his step-mother was "Hello, Aunt Fanny"! They were married for seventeen years and had one daughter, Amanda. She was born October 20, 1846 in Crockett, Houston County, Texas where she spent most of her childhood and attended school, before moving to McMullen County where she married Joseph Walker.

On March 27, 1837, Swanson was living in Nacogdoches County when he sold his rights to two-thirds a league and labor of land. On April 22, 1837, John Swanson and his son Joseph Randolph were in Nacogdoches County and signed the petition to form Houston County. Swanson Yarbrough is listed on the 1840 Houston County Census and Tax list. In October 1842, in Houston County, he appointed Isaac Parker to locate his headright. In December 1850, he sold his San Jacinto Donation Certificate in Harris County to C., Ennis. In 1858, he received a headright grant in Washington County and in that same year, moved to the newly formed McMullen County where he and about thirty families settled on the Frio River. The settlement was named Yarbrough Bend for him and a Texas Historical marker can be found there today. It reads "Founded 1858, named for John Swanson Yarbrough, an original settler. Town contained about 30 log picket houses. Settler were often harassed by Indians, cattle thieves and wild animals,. Other original settlers were: Dr George Ditworth, John Moore, James Tope N.H. Walker, Joe Walker, and Benjamin Franklin Winters." The Texas State Historical Committee erected this marker in 1968, at the site of the County's first settlement, Yarbrough Bend.

Yarbrough Bend was a site on a bend in the Frio River, chosen by John Swanson Yarbrough and about thirty other families as the first settlement in McMullen County in 1858. The location was twenty-five miles northwest of Oakville, extending as far east as present Calliham, and about five miles west from the present town of Tilden. A trail connected Yarbrough Bend with Oakville, the Live Oak County Seat. Oxcart roads ran up from the San Patricio colony of McMullen and McGloin on either side of the Nueces River and intersected at Oakville.

Although there was never a post office or general store, there was a school in the western part of the settlement near Ellis Crossing on the Frio River.

Since families settled on either side of the river a ford located north of the settlement was used to cross over when the river was on a rise. A foot bridge was made of large tree trunks, and small boats were made of green willow with bull hides stretched and sewn on the framework.

With John Swanson Yarbrough were his wife, Frances, his daughter Amanda, two sons by previous marriages, Alfred and Lorenzo Dow Yarbrough, and his two step-sons John Moore and James Tope. Benjamin Franklin Winters, Nathaniel H. Walker, Dr. George Dilworth, Joseph Walker and their families were also among the first settlers.

A great amount of courage was required for our ancestors to leave the security of familiar surroundings every few years and face the dangers of an unsettled land. They were not only brave, but adventurous people to take the necessary provisions with a few prized possessions packed in covered wagons and leave their homes without a thought of looking back. Perhaps the fact that many were neighbors, friends, and relatives provided the support and confidence needed to risk the dangers of such a journey.

When they arrived at their destination, the wagons continued to serve as temporary homes, and provided shelter until the land was cleared, gardens planted and log cabins built..in that order. The oak, elm, willow, cottonwood and ash were felled to build two and three room cabins with logs used upright "picket-style". The logs were driven into the ground side by side and the cracks filled with mud. Wooden beams and rafters were pegged into place and the roofs made of shingles were added. Hand made shingles were seldom nailed down but were weighted in place by rocks and poles.

The floors were simply smoothed, packed earth covered with deer skin rugs. The beds had straw or feather mattresses. At times an additional bed was needed and a scaffold was built. It was made by tying skins to a temporary framework in the corner of a room and came in handy when there was a shortage of "bedsteads."

Fireplaces were one of the most important additions to cabins as they not only were for heating in the winter but were used for cooking as well. Big black pots over the open fireplace were used for boiling, skillets for frying, and Dutch ovens for baking meat, bread, cakes and cookies.

Since raising livestock was the main occupation most of the men started herds from the maverick longhorn cattle and mustang horses that belonged to anyone who could catch them. they roamed the open range on the Frio and Nueces Rivers as there were no fences. herds were rounded up, branded, and

ear marked. These early brands and marks were later recorded in McMullen and surrounding counties.

Farming was not profitable due to droughts and lack of rain, but as gardens were a necessity most family members helped in some way with cultivating the land and harvesting crops. Vegetable were planted with corn being high on the list as it was used for making bread. Cornbread was cooked in the Dutch oven with a lid and was "mighty tasty with clabber."

There were many kinds of fish in the river. Wild game was plentiful with deer, hogs, squirrel, turkey, quail, rabbit and bear. Venison was frequently made into jerky so it could be kept will, especially for cowboys, travelers, and school children.

Wild animals were also a threat as there were wolves, coyotes, panthers, and mountain lions. One day when Mandy Yarbrough's colt didn't come to the cabin as it usually did, she went out to look for it and found it dead, partly eaten and covered with leaves. When she told her father he said a panther had probably killed it and would come back later to eat. She took an old muzzle loading gun and went back to wait by the dead colt. As she went near she saw the panther had come back and was eating. She took aim and fired. That panther had killed his last colt. Her father was very proud of her and told everyone what she had done.

There were many dangers to be faced everyday. Band of outlaws and rustlers were roaming throughout the country. Mexican bandit attacks and hostile Indian raids were always a threat, especially occurring during the full moon.

The fences around the corrals, about one hundred yards from the Walker cabin, were made with posts, wire and bullskins which had been tied when they were wet. One time a band of Indians rode up near the corrals. When the men heard them they ran out on the porch and while the shooting was going on the bullhides on the fences were cut and the horses stolen. They found out later it was a group of Mexican bandits disguised as Indians. Another time several Indians chased Bud Walker and as he was almost home his horse fell, he got up and ran to the cabin with the Indians shooting arrows at him. He wasn't hurt but his horse and saddle were stolen.

Clothing was a difficult undertaking for women and girls of the families as the material was homespun and sewn by hand. The spinning wheels, hand looms and knitting needless were kept busy until late bedtime. Wool clipped from their own sheep was spun into yarn and woven into cloth. The dye was made from local plants and weeds. Current berries were used to make a yellow color, the agarita for gold, brazil root and indigo weed for a beautiful blue.

Later many articles of clothing were bought in San Antonio or at the coast. Every lady had at least one good dress of calico or velvet worn only for special occasions. He hat and gloves were always worn in a public place.

Some of the men and women tanned leather for handmade shoes, with no certain one for the left or right foot.

The weekly laundry was taken down to the river to be washed with homemade lye soap. The soap was made in a big pot by rendering tallow from animal fat. Ash logs were burned very slowly to make an ash which was mixed with water to make a strong alkaline solution. This was added to the tallow and produced a very good soap. When the clothes were hung on the line to dry every girl wore her sun bonnet and long sleeves to protect her from the sun.

Even with all the hours of hard work, time was made for recreation. At times the men would get together for hunting and fishing. Cutting of bee trees was a challenge and riding wild horses a contest.

Weddings and all night dances were special occasions and the whole family would travel many miles on horseback and in wagons to attend. Square dancing was popular with fiddles, guitars, and accordions to provide the music. Taffy pulling contests, quilting parties, and barbecues were great entertainment, and a house raising would attract almost everyone around.

When the War between the States was declared many changes took place in the settlement. The young men went off to war and the older ones stayed behind to protect the families from outlaws and Indians. Soldiers would go into a community and gather up all the able-bodied men and boys they could find between the ages of eighteen and fifty, but the remaining settlers would keep out of their way as much as possible.

In October 1862, John Swanson Yarbrough, Sr. 88 years old was shot and killed in his corral by a horse trader in a dispute over a horse.

Frances Yarbrough was known throughout the county as an excellent midwife and nurse. She would often ride for many miles to help a family during a time of illness. A man rode in from Fort Ewell to ask for her help as it was time for his wife to give birth to their baby. Frances had been ill for several days but she gathered up supplies and got her horse ready for the long ride. Fort Ewell was on the Laredo-San Antonio stage coach road located near the Nueces River in southeastern LaSalle County. Mandy had a premonition which she could not ignore and begged her mother not to go. Frances told her she must go as they were depending on her to be there.

After many hours of riding, Frances was delirious with a high fever and there was no help for her. She died at the age of 55 and was taken back home to be buried by her husband's side.

A low red rock wall surrounded the cemetery located near the settlement. It isn't known how many of the settlers are buried there as only two of the grave stones are legible, but are not standing:
