Do you have a Genealogical Society in Surrey County? Do you have any abstracted files such as cemetary records, land records, death records or any other abstracted records that are easy to copy and mail? I will detail what I know and perhaps you can put this letter on file and someone will get in touch with me. CHRISTIAN FENDER is the only FENDER listed on the state census of 1786. Christian died in 1800. His will lists wife, MAXXX Mary: Gabriel, Nimrod, Michael, John, Henry, Sarah and Catherine. Christian appears on the 1790 and 1800 census. Most of the boys moved to Ashe County. I am trying to find out when Christian first moved to Surry and where he came from. Are there any records that would show his wife's maiden name? I enclose a stamped, addressed envelope. Please let me knowi if there is any way you can help me. I will be happy to pay any copying and mailing charges if you are allowed to do this.

# Tracing N.C. ties that bind

## Finter descendants follow links to shared roots

#### NORTH WILKESBORO

When Linda Thompson was a young girl growing up in Kentucky, she heard her grandparents tell stories about how their family had come from Northwest North Carolina.

When as an adult she became interested in genealogy, her research confirmed those roots.

Now about 30 years after beginning her genealogical inquiries, Thompson, a grandmother from southwestern Ohio, is finally getting the chance to see the places where her mother's side of the family, the Fender line, came from.

"When you're a genealogist, that's what you want to do," Thompson said. "You want to see it because it's a part of you. It helps illustrate all the facts you've uncovered in records and gives you a better idea of what your ancestors' lives were like."

Thompson is one of more than a dozen folks who, after communicating on the Internet for three years, have traveled here this weekend from all over the county to celebrate their connection to a shared ancestor, Johann Christian Friederick Finter.

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### STATE / METRO

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Finter, whose name was Americanized to Fender by his children, was born to German parents in Lancaster County, Penn., in 1738. He migrated south and first settled around the forks of the Yadkin River in Davie County before eventually ending up in what is now the Marler Road area of western Yadkin County. He and his wife, Anna Maria, raised eight children there. Those children in turn followed the expansion of the frontier west into and over the mountains while also siring loads of children both in and out of wed-

"Christian's children all had biblical names," Len Chapel of North Wilkesboro, the reunion's coordinator, said. "But that wasn't the only thing biblical about them. That directive about being fruitful and multiplying, they pretty much stuck to that, too.

Branches of the family's tree spread north through Kentucky into Ohio and Indiana and west all the way to California and produced offspring that became both famous and infamous.

One of Finter's acclaimed descendants is Dr. Frederick A. Fender, a pioneering medical researcher at Sanford University in Palo Alto, Calif., who in the 1940s invented the electroencephalograph, a machine that graphs the brain's electrical activity.

Another is Clarence Leo Fender, who created the Fender Guitar Co. and revolutionized guitar design with the solid-body electric guitar.

A notorious member of the Fender line is Sam Bass, the outlaw.

Bass and his gang were best known for robbing trains in the frontier West.

Bass died on his 27th birthday, July 21, 1878, after being shot by Texas Rangers a few days earlier while he tried to rob a bank in Round Rock, Texas.

Chapel said that uncovering both the virtuous and the scandalous aspects of one's family history is an unavoidable part of genealogical research.

"This is one business you can't be in if you can't handle the truth," Chapel said "Anyone who says that illegitimacy, murder, mayhem and other unrespectable behavior wasn't a part of their family history hasn't done a thorough enough job of research. It's there. It's just a matter of finding it."

Chapel also said the Fenders were a typical family who fanned out across the country in pursuit of opportunity. A lot of them knew how to make money, and most of them worked hard.

"Our family is no different than any other," Chapel said "We're blue collar and white collar, rich and poor, outlaw and respectable citizen. We've got a little of everything. That's what makes us so American."

Many other American families also have roots in Northwest North Carolina, said Carolyn Spence of Trinity, who is descended from Christian Finter through one of his sons who settled in Alleghany County.

Spence is an avid genealogist who has spent years looking into her family's connections.

She said that though it may seem surprising that the men who created the brain monitor and the Stratocaster guitar were linked to Northwest North Carolina, the area's connections to fame are quite plentiful.

During the latter half of the 1700s, Northwest North Carolina was frontier.

Although land along the mid-Atlantic Coast began to fill up with arrivals, the rugged Appalachian Mountains and the hostile Indian tribes that lived there formed a barrier that funneled settlers south from Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia.

As land in the state's western Piedmont began to fill up, settlers eventually poured west through gaps in the mountains and river valleys.

Northwest North Carolina was one of the primary spots through which this migratory stream flowed, Spence said. As a result, people nationwide have ancestors who once lived here.

"This area is very unique because it was the outmost edge of settlement," Spence said. "For this reason all kinds of folks find they have ties here.

"A descendant of the Stamper family from Alleghany County started the company that became Banquet Foods and a descendent of the Cheek family, also from Alleghany County, started the Maxwell House Coffee Co. It's amazing the connections you can find if you just go back far enough in your research."

The article about the church did not mention a cemetery but with a church that old I would think there would be a cemetery. I'm sure I can find out later. Exactly what do you want me to look for in our research room. >>

Hi, Wilma.

I really do appreciate you looking into the above on the Center Church.

All those souls you mention above are related to me one way or another. What I'm trying to ascertain is this: Was Christian FENDER who married Anna Maria LONG a Methodist and were any of his children Methodists; married in the Meth. Church and was he buried in a Meth. cemetery.

His youngest son, John (Johannes), my ggggf, was baptised in the Moravian Church but his parents were not members....the baptism was listed as "friends" not members. We can't find Christian's grave nor can I find any marriage information on John although his wife Elizabeth \_\_\_\_\_\_ filed a "Petition for Relief" in 1811 in Surry County.

The fact that Christian Fender's property in Surry County became a part of Yadkin make it difficult to track this stuff down.

John Fender moved to Indiana after 1815 and was a founder of the Meth-Epis. Church in Richmond, IN....and others in the family were involved with the Meth-Epis. group.....so I thought maybe Christian associated himself with that Church group. He definitely was not with the Moravians. We've searched those records thoroughly.

I guess at this point, Wilma, don't make me copies of anything until perhaps we can find marriage lists, baptismal records and membership records from the period 1796 to say, 1815.

<< I've never heard of the Old Center Methodist Church in Surry Co. Do you mean the old Central Methodist Church? Or is the Old Center Methodist Church in another county now that formed from Surry.

According to the late Jasper Long in writing about the LONG family of Yadkin County, "in the beginning both families" (Long and Holcomb) "lived in the Center Church Community of Yadkin County. A large majority of the membership of Center Church has always been of the Long and Holcomb families or their descendants."

"John Holcomb, Jr. married Elizabeth Lawrence. About 1775 they left Virginia and came to North Carolina and settled in Yadkin County near Yadkin River about 35 miles south of North Carolina and Virginia State line. He deeded the land for Old Center Church on Cranberry Creek in 1795. For a number of years Center Church was noted for its Camp Meetings. They were a series of evangelical services that were of at least a weeks duration......"

Okay......I said Surry County because I thought it was in Surry. Many of the Long's lived near the county line and like my ggggf, he was in a part of Surry that started out as Rowan and then it became a part of Yadkin.....I think. He lived on Deep Creek. It is very close to the line.

I live in Virginia and am not all that familiar with where these places are located relative to the specific county. Perhaps this Methodist Church, now torn down, was in Yadkin. If so, where could I find any records; and, a grave yard?

Thanks for your response. I appreciate your interest especially since I mentioned the wrong county. Are you the one who searches Yadkin?
