Surry Man's Work Finally Is Published

Almost 100 years ago a Surry County man wrote his adventures that now appear as "A Portion of My Life" by William M. Norman.

This autobiography, written in 1865 by Norman, a Confederate soldier while he was imprisoned on Johnson's Island in Lake Erie, was published last week by John F. Blair of Winston-Salem. The hitherto unpublished manuscript, brought to the publisher by a great-grandson of the author Gorrell E. Bass of Winston-Sale, has been a valued family possession since its author walked home with it from Ohio after the war.

It records the way one western North Carolinian grew up: his adventures, his study of law and his career as a captain in the Army. His career as a lawyer was soon interrupted and never again resumed when Norman decided to enlist in the Surry-County militia to "fight for the liberties" of his country.

He was in three of the major battles of the Civil War and describes in detail what he saw and felt during the battles of Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, and Gettysburg. After being captured, Norman began his autobiography, hoping that his family would one day see it, and glossing over some of the hardships of prison life so that he might be permitted to take it away with him.

This is a book of details, not generalizations. Norman says he had with him for reference his diary of the Pennsylvania Campaign. His description of army life: the short rations, the seesaw marching through swamps and mud, the battlefields covered with wounded and dead, give details which help to fill in the picture of events taking place during the years 1861 to 1863.
