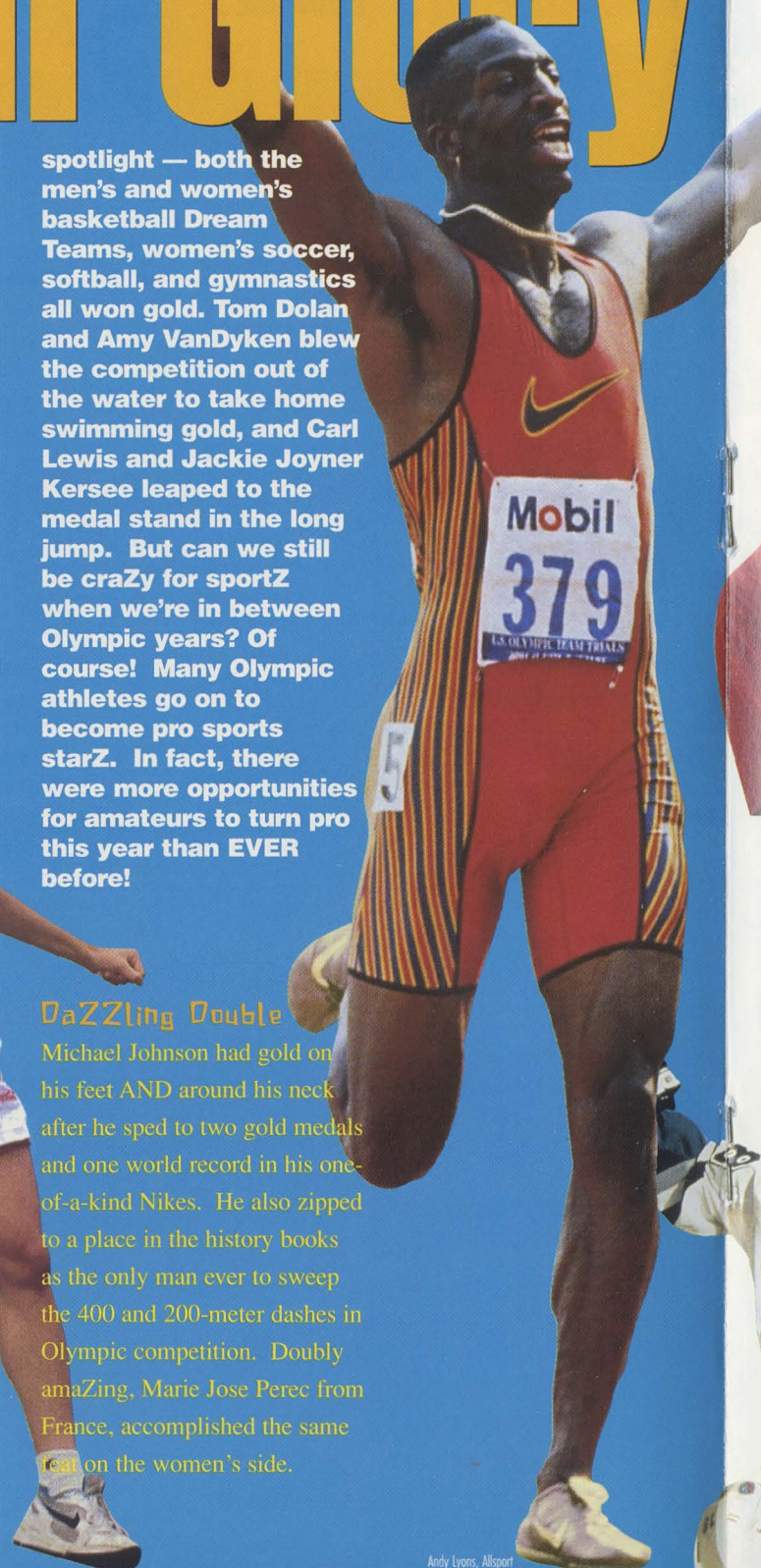
An Olympic year is always jam-packed with fantastic sportZ memories. What'Z really cool about this year is that TEAMS were in the

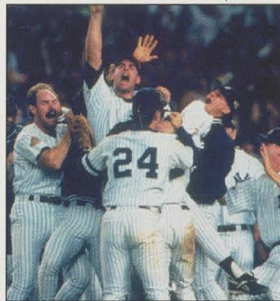

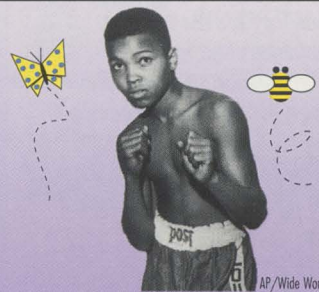

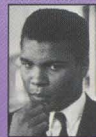

-  Shannon Lucid performed experiments on the Russian space station Mir in 1996.

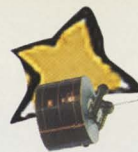

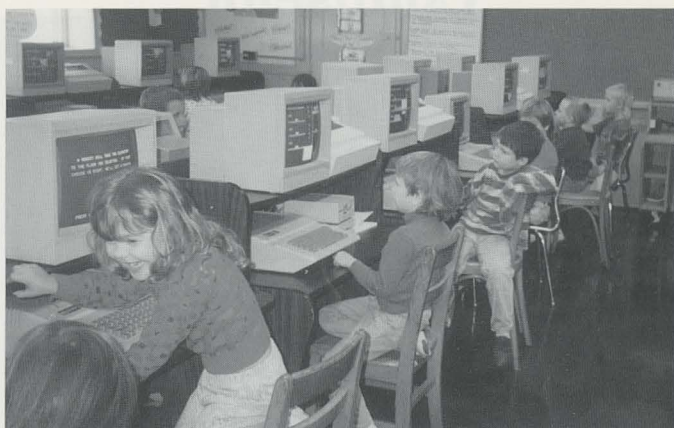


Mrs. Altic- Art

Mrs. Lewis- Computer



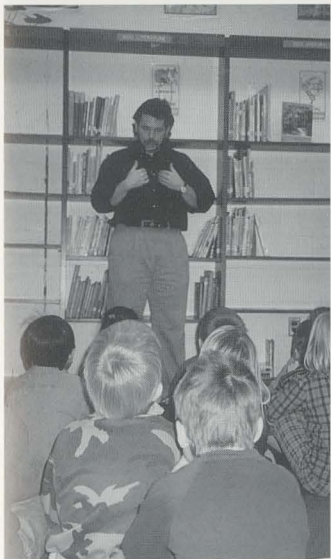
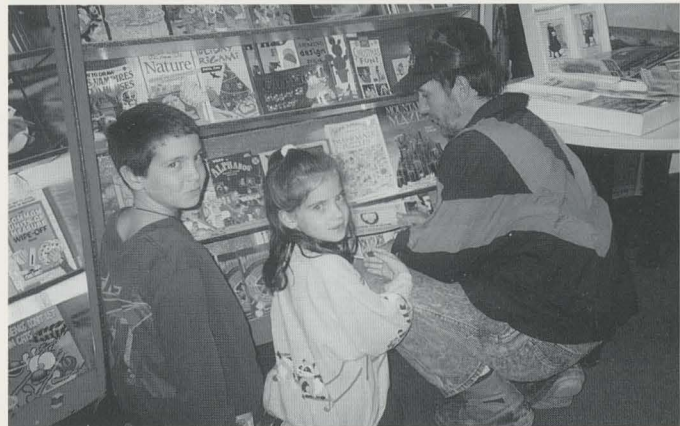

Ms. Wallace- Guidance Counselor



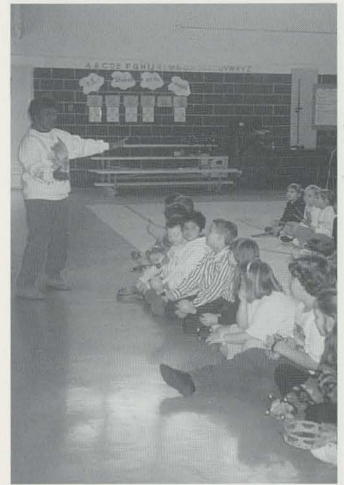

Mrs. High- Media



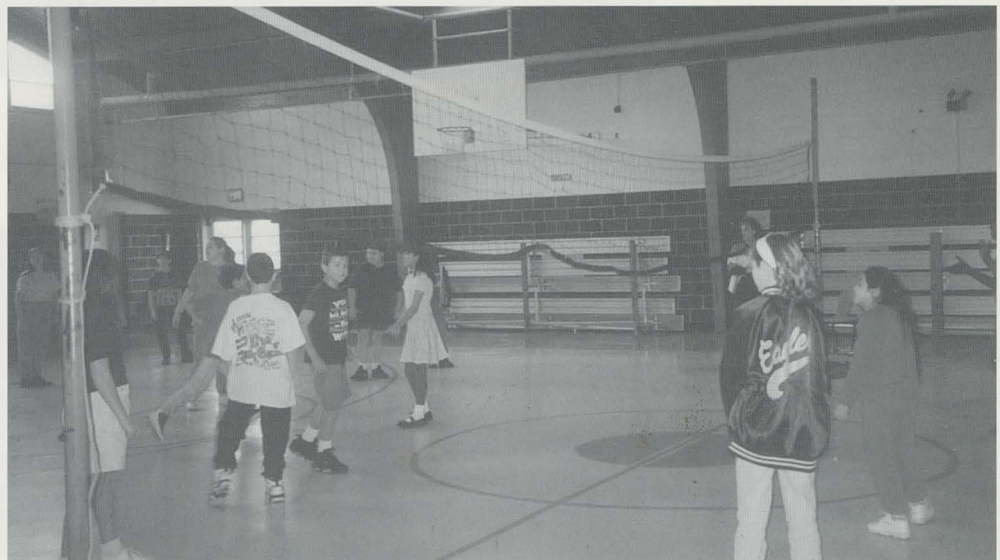
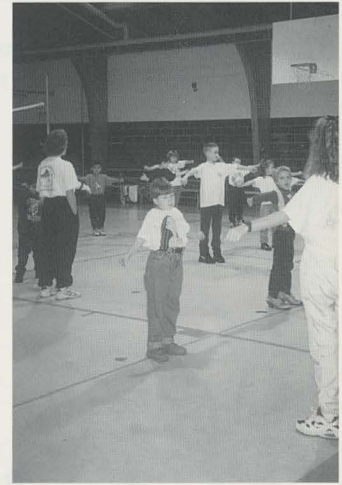
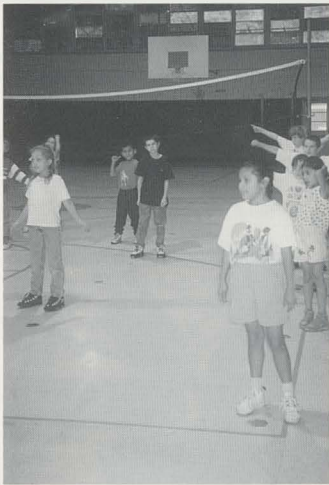

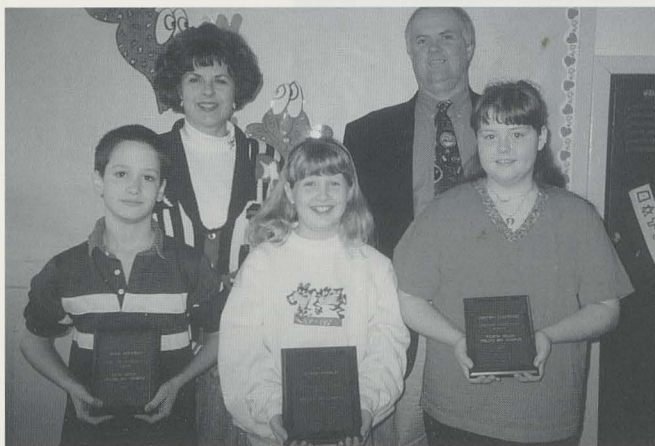
Winners

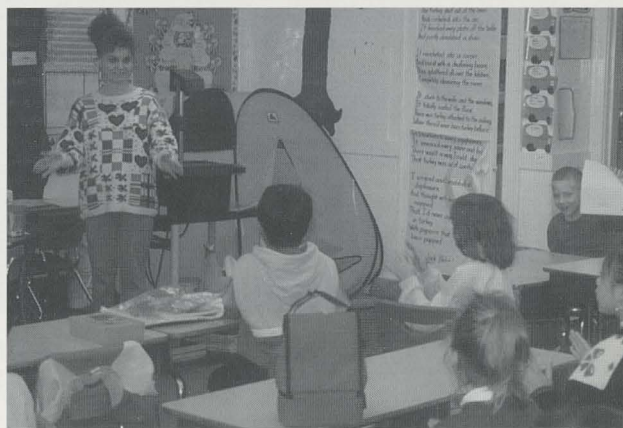

Mrs. Jeana Cox was chosen as the 1996-97 Teacher of The Year.

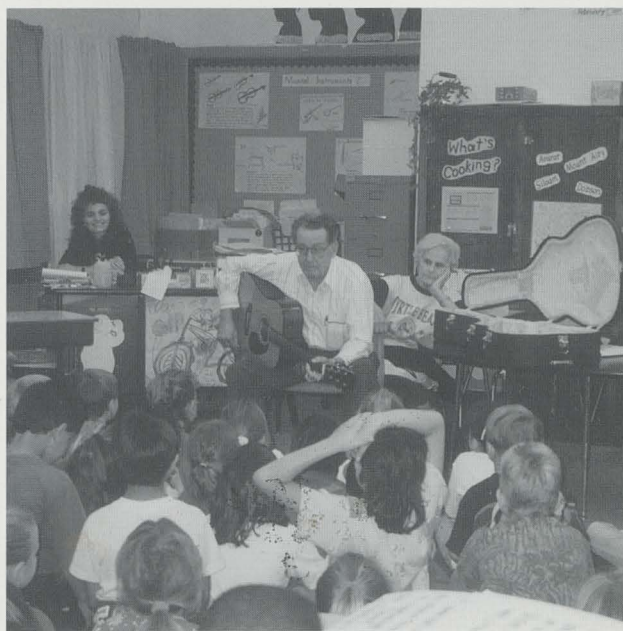
