It is fitting and proper that these minutes of the Surry Baptist Association should be dedicated to Rev. Joseph H. Hall, long one of the outstanding ministers and leaders in Baptist ranks in Surry and surrounding



counties of Northwest North Carolina and Southwest Virginia.

A veteran of twenty-nine years of service as a Baptist minister, perhaps no other minister in the nation can boast a finer record for service to his churches, for he has missed only three Sundays in twenty-nine years at his post of duty, wherever that post may have been.

During the almost three decades of his ministry, he has made "Onward" his motto, and six new churches and seven other churches remodelled and modernized stand as monuments to his progressive ideas. Those churches and others that he has served have always increased their membership under his guidance, as attested by the fact that he has baptized 3,310 persons into membership in the Baptist church.

Ever ready to answer a call from one of his fellowmen, he has conducted 2,508 funerals during the twenty-nine years of his ministry,

an average of more than 86 funerals each year and nearly an average of two each week for the entire period. He has also been ever ready to assist in the more happy events of life, as shown by the fact that he has performed 210 marriages.

Twenty-one years of service as clerk of the Surry Baptist Association would be cause enough to dedicate the minutes to him, not considering his other services as minister, for during that twenty-one years he has ever been a guiding light to the churches of the Association, which thus expresses its appreciation in this dedicatory sketch of one of God's champions.

PROCEEDINGS

Turkey Ford Baptist Church—Mount Airy, N. C.

Thursday, September 28, 1944

The forty-second annual session of the Surry Baptist Association met with Turkey Ford Baptist Church on Thursday, September 28, 1944 at 9:45 A. M. Brother J. W. Hylton, Moderator, presided over the meeting. The opening song led by Mrs. Charles E. Otey was: "Amazing Grace."

Rev. J. S. Hinson, pastor of the Turkey Ford Baptist Church conducted the devotional and Rev. M. B. Phillips led in prayer.

The congregation sang, "How Firm A Foundation" and the clerk called the roll of churches. Fifty-five churches were represented by either delegates or letters.

The pastors of the association were then recognized, there being twenty-three present. The following visitors were also recognized: J. A. McMillan of our Baptist Orphanage and G. E. Martin of Meredith College.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Union was given by Miss Elizabeth Norman, president of the Union. The report was adopted after being discussed by Mrs. R. K. Redwine and Miss Julia Swann.

The following Committees were appointed: Entertainment, Rev. J. S. Hinson and the Deacons' wives of Turkey Ford Church; Finance, R. W. Key, Chairman; Ben Edwards, and Mrs. I. O. Wallace.

The reports on Missions: State, Home, and Foreign, were made by Carl Snow.

An address by Brother M. A. Huggins, General Secretary Baptist State Convention was made at this time.

The report on Christian Literature was given by Rev. W. T. Adams, Pastor of Dobson Church, and M. A. Huggins spoke on it.

The report on Christian Education was given by R. K. Redwine.

At this time an address was made by R. H. Satterfield of Meredith College.

G. E. Martin spoke on Christian Education and the needs of Meredith College. Brother W. E. Woodruff also spoke on the College and appointed the following Committee to work at the lunch hour for the building fund: W. E. Woodruff, Chairman; Charlie Simmons, A. L. Hiatt, R. K. Redwine, Mrs. W. A. Jackson, Miss Elizabeth Norman and Miss Willa Marks.

The Moderator appointed the Committee on time, place and preacher: Claude Harris, Chairman; H. B. Willie, and Walter Brown.

The congregation sang: "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" and Rev. Felix Wagoner, pastor of Flat Rock Baptist Church, preached the annual sermon.

The Association adjourned for dinner with prayer by Rev. C. E. Otey.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The devotional was conducted by Brother George Burrus and the congregation sung: "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

The report on Ministers Relief and Annuity was given by R. F. Simmons.

The reports on the Orphanage and the Hospital were made by Mrs. I.

W. Jones. J. A. McMillan, of the Baptist Orphanage, spoke on Our Orphanage.

At this time a Memorial Service was held by Rev. L. A. Flemming, followed by the congregation singing: "Nearer My God To Thee."

H. M. Finch gave the report of the Executive Committee and spoke on the same.

Our Associational Missionary, Miss Willa Marks, made her report which was accepted and adopted.

The report on the Revision of the Constitution, Article of Faith, and Rules of Order was given by Rev. A. Finch.

Article eleven of the constitution was to be carried over until the next Associational meeting and the following committee are to report on the same: Rev. A. Finch, chairman, Dr. R. K. Redwine, Charlie Simmons, W. E. Woodruff and J. H. Hall.

The report on new churches was given and Community Church was accepted into the Association. The Committee recommended Jessups Grove Church be carried over until next year.

The report on Time, Place and Preacher appears elsewhere in this Minute.

The following officers were elected: Mr. J. W. Hylton, Moderator; Rev. D. D. Hodges, Vice-Moderator; Mr. Claude Harris, Clerk; Mr. R. W. Key, Treasurer.

The Association voted to dedicate these minutes to the former Clerk, Rev. J. H. Hall.

Jessups Grove Church was received into the Association.

The Moderator appointed the following Committees:

EVENING SESSION

Rev. Delmar Hodge conducted the devotional by reading the 23rd Psalm and leading the prayer.

The Minutes of the morning and afternoon session were read and approved.

The report of the Treasurer and also the report of the Finance Committee was accepted and adopted.

The Moderator appointed the Executive Board consisting of the officers stated in Art. IX of the Constitution and H. M. Finch, Chairman, C. A. Simmons, E. L. Schuyler, J. T. Threatte, and J. H. Hall.

The report on the Baptist Training Union was made by Rev. Fred Journey and the one on Sunday Schools by Mr. C. S. Brannock.

Harvey T. Gibson made an address on "Enlistment and Training in Our Churches."

The report on Temperance and Public Morales was given by Rev. C. E. Otey.

At this time L. A. Martin, Executive Director, Allied Church League, made an address.

The retiring Clerk, Rev. J. H. Hall made a talk and the congregation sang "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," and adjourned to meet with Mount Carmel Church on Thursday after the fourth Sunday in September, 1945.

REPORT OF W. M. U.

In these difficult days brought with anxieties, strife and grief—and in the more strenuous days yet to come, the work of Woman's Missionary Union of the Surry Association, has faced a hard strain on its activities. But in the face of all these difficulties, many of our leaders and members have continued to put—"first things first." The faithfulness of these women—just keeping on—when others have been ready to quit—has made this report possible:

No report would be complete without special mention of our young people and children. Phillip Brooks once said—"The Nation marches forward on the feet of little children." Our young people's work is progressing under the fine leadership of our new young people's leader, Mrs. W. A. Campbell, of Mount Airy. Number of young people enrolled, 134.

The outstanding meetings for the year are as follows:

1. The Associational Missionary Leadership Conference was held January 25, at the First Baptist, Mount Airy. A study of our 1944 Year Book was directed by Mrs. R. K. Redwine. An inspirational message was given by Dr. R. K. Redwine.

2. Our Annual Associational meeting was held with the Mountain View Baptist Church at Lowgap, April 27. Our theme being "Face Today—Plan For Tomorrow. Interesting and challenging reports were given by associational officers. The message of the morning session was brought by Miss Kathleen Obie, our State Young People's leader, using as her subject: "Today Moulds Tomorrow." A missionary address was given by Miss Olive Lawton, a returned missionary from China. The afternoon session was devoted to the work of the young people under the leadership of Mrs. F. G. Toler.

Our next annual associational meeting will be held with Mount Carmel Baptist Church, May 15.

There were representatives from the various societies in our association, at the divisional meeting held at Lenoir last October, and also at the Divisional Leadership Conference held at North Wilkesboro in January.

We were most fortunate to have in the Surry Association during the Month of July, Miss Ruth Keller—a State W. M. U. field worker. Miss Keller visited the societies and conducted mission study classes. We are indeed grateful to Miss Keller for her great work.

We are extremely grateful to our Associational Missionary, Miss Willa Marks, for her unexcelled love for the work—for her untiring efforts and efficient guidance in our W. M. U. work.

The weakest link in our organization—is the large number of unenlisted churches. Less than 22 per cent of our churches in the Surry association have W. M. U. organizations. Upon this problem we want to center our energies and our prayers, during the coming year.

There is a great opportunity for earnest and faithful effort in all phases of W. M. U. work in the Surry Association.

May we devotedly give ourselves to the Master — that the generation to come might know.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The remarkable growth of Missionary Baptists in North Carolina—from about 20,000 in 1840 to over one-half million now (One-half the church membership of the state) — has been due to an aggressive State Missions program. There are few, if any, churches in the State who have not been aided directly or indirectly by this agency through one or more of its eleven activities. Briefly these activities are:

1. General Missionaries—one full-time and one part-time are really associates to the General Secretary.
2. Associational Missionaries—perhaps no more interesting development within the past several years than the great increase in this number—19 July 1.
3. Aid to Missionary Pastors—possibly the most important single activity.
4. Help on Buildings and Purchasing Lots—relocation and adjacent to colleges.
5. Christian Education in the Churches, Sunday Schools, Training Union, and Student Union Divisions.
6. Ministry to Other Races—Negroes and Indians.
7. Ministry to the Sick—Veterans at Oteen, sick at Sanatoriums at Black Mountain and Aberdeen.
8. Pastors' Schools and Conferences—three schools this year with attendance of 450.
9. Work Around the Camps and Defense Areas—opportunities not met as completely as they should have been. \$60,000 spent with gratifying results.
10. Support of Allied Church League—Co-operation with several denominations.
11. Other State Mission Work: South-wide and State Radio Hours, Convention Annual, Co-operation with Home Mission Board in City Mission Program (2 Missionaries in State—Greensboro and Durham), and in Study of the Rural Church.

There are now 2,644 churches with a combined membership of 551,348—an increase of 35 churches and 13,668 members over last year.

There are 36 Indian Churches with 4,127 members.

We received last year 21,308 members by Baptism—a gain of 1,766 over 1942. Churches reporting no Baptisms decreased from 629 to 608.

Gifts to all missions, education and benevolences amounted to \$1,420,868.19—a gain of 26.2 per cent over the previous year and just about double those in 1940. This is a per capita gift of \$2.58. The amount given for local work was \$5,033,949.63 or \$9.14 per capita. Total all objects \$6,454,818.82 or \$11.17 per capita. The report so far in 1944 is very encouraging. It is hoped that we will be out of debt. A goal of one million dollars through the Undesignated Co-operative Program for 1945 has been set.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

It is a tragic fact that our country is officially listed as pagan when the diplomatic representatives of the nations meet in international circles. For a nation to be listed Christian a majority of its people must profess the

Christian Religion. Roger Babson says that fully 60 per cent of the American people never attend or affiliate with churches. That means 26 million of all ages in our Southern Baptist territory are scarcely touched by Christian churches.

Some of this great unchurched host of people live within the sound of our church bells—next door to many of our church members. Millions of them, however, live where there are no churches and where the Gospel of Jesus Christ is never preached.

We have in our midst 11 million negroes; 7,500 Chinese; 650,000 Italians; 750,000 French-speaking Americans in Louisiana; the majority of 400,000 native Indians; a million Mexicans this side the border; a host of foreigners from European countries; 2,500,000 people in Western Cuba; nearly one-half a million in Panama and the Canal Zone.

If Christ died for all, and He did, then we should make Christ available for all—including these in our home-land.

Our Home Mission Board has set itself to the task, depending upon adequate support from Southern Baptists, to ultimately blanket our home-land with the Gospel so that there will not be anywhere in our land a man without a chance.

Having struggled through 15 years under the burden of a crushing debt, the Board has purposed not to make commitments in these flush times which might become a burden later on. To determine where first emphasis should be placed, the Board makes surveys of the entire field thus keeping abreast with missionary needs which naturally develop in a changing social order.

We now have 475 workers on all fields. During the year 13 new missionaries were added; 43 mission stations opened and six churches constituted.

The Board has in a great part and desires to continue to fill its quota of Chaplains for the armed forces. There are now serving about 1,100, with request from Navy for 60 more immediately.

As we approach our Centennial year and the crusade for One Million Souls—the opportunity and privileges are exceedingly great. May God help us to be able to meet them.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Jesus said, "As often as you do it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, you do it unto me," and "He that would be greatest among you, let him become the servant of all." The greatness of the Lottie Moon Offering is measured in their more than doubling their offering of five years ago—reaching \$755,231.02 in 1943.

In obedience to the above Scripture the Southern Baptist Convention has contributed to World Emergency Relief \$1,207,700.14 in the past six years: \$657,858.86 to Chinese Relief; \$200,000 to British Mission Relief; and \$22,000 to the American Bible Society. "Secretary Maddy reported to the last Convention Meeting, a reserve fund of \$1,225,021.40. At the close of this tragic war, much more than this amount will be needed to rehabilitate lands ravaged by war. We shall need more Missionaries to minister unto the millions who will be destitute, spiritually and materially. In the relief fund, \$100,000 has been earmarked for China and a Corresponding amount to Europe.

Our 74 years in Europe has not been in vain for reports from almost every country express a hope for the return of our Missionaries and the opening of the churches, and then "Greater works than these shall ye do."

The Board reports a total of 484 Missionaries under appointment: China 187; South America 184; Mexico 11; Africa 61; Europe 12; Hawaii 17; Japan 4; and Palestine and Syria 8. Many are at home on forced furlough. Following Pearl Harbor, 88 missionaries fell into the hands of the Japanese. Today, 79 of them are in America. 8 missionaries and 1 child are still in Japanese internment camps; 1 died a martyr's death.

The income for the current work of the Board for the Calendar Year 1943 was \$1,530,318.48 which added to the Lottie Moon Offering reached the magnificent sum of \$2,116,805.46. Our mission boards are not piling up big sums of money in order to maintain large cash balances through the years. Every dollar of these reserve funds, and much more, will be needed just as soon as this war ends. It would be not only foolish, but sinful for Southern Baptists in these days of prosperity to be unprepared when the day of opportunity dawns. We may profit from the story of the years of plenty and famine in Egypt in the days of Joseph, and from the story of the Wise and Foolish Virgins.

I recall that Jesus said, "Go ye into all the world and make Disciples of every nation, teaching them to observe whatsoever I have told you and Lo, I am with you, even unto the end of the world." Proof of due reward for this is evident today in China. A few years ago China had a pagan Empress whose aim it was to destroy Christianity. As we have supported Spirit sent teachers, schools and hospitals—we have today China as an ally rather than a collaborator with Japan against us. Wendell Willkie gave these institutions credit for the great respect of America held by other nations. Vice-President Wallace finds more of Chinese leaders have graduated from missionary colleges than in any other country.

Japan was once open to the Gospel, and the price of chewing gum and soft drinks bought by Southern Baptists would have supported thousands of missionaries in Japan. If we had reached them with the Sword of the Spirit—it converting their attitude—we would not now have to be conquering the evil in their minds and hearts with the sword and precious lives of the Sons of America.

Again it seems, soon we hope, Japan, Germany, and especially Russia will open their doors to the Gospel. Then let us remember "that we are our Brothers' keeper." Also that "God is no respecter of persons" and let us see that in every nation people learn that "He that feareth Him and worketh righteousness is accepted with Him."

For that day we need men and women—scores of them—who will hear the call of God and answer, "Here am I, send me."

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

"... Give heed to reading." I Tim. 4:13. The majority of what we learn comes through the medium of sight. What we read becomes a part of us. Certainly we have today a flood of secular literature. The only force strong enough to keep us from majoring on these secular things is the Bible and the literature inspired by God's Holy Word.

It was not an accident that the Biblical Recorder was founded in 1833. Our leaders realized that our people could not advance beyond the information they had. That is a fact which is still true. If we are to keep abreast of the times in our religion we must know what others of our denomination are doing. The Biblical Recorder ought to be in every Baptist home in the Surry Association and yet only 12 churches reported that one or more families of their membership were taking our state Baptist paper. In this paper we get inspirational writings, news, Sunday School lessons, and many other helpful articles. The circulation as of Sept. 20, was 26,851.

Another publication of worth is the Charity and Children published by our own Mills Home. This paper commends itself to anyone who will read it. There should be a club in every Sunday School Association.

Other Baptist publications are Southern Baptist Home Missions and the Commission. We are Missionary Baptist in name. Surely we want to know more about this phase of our work.

The power of publicity and propaganda has been used to great advantage to the secular world. It is time we took advantage of this method of promoting God's word wide kingdom. Our denominational press is one of

best friends. Let us give hearty support to the leaders who make this wealth of religious literature available to us.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The following significant paragraph is quoted from a report made a little while ago by the Educational Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. "With the world aflame now and in a titanic struggle over primarily secular issues, Christian education and Christian schools face the current acid tests of their intrinsic integrity. With us the heroic traditions of Christian education from the pioneer days of the founding fathers even to this good hour are a priceless heritage. Ours is the challenge to carry on this part of the kingdom work in a worthy fashion."

The record of Christian schools justifies the claim that they give intellectual training inferior to none, plus moral and spiritual culture that other schools do not give. The inferiority complex that some people have regarding the denominational schools has no foundation except ignorance of what these schools really are.

It is interesting to note that leadership in America in all realms comes from our Christian schools. Eight of our nations Chief Justices were college graduates, while seven out of the eight were from Christian schools. Eighteen of our nations presidents have been college graduates while sixteen of the eighteen were from Christian colleges. Eighteen of twenty-five Masters of American Letters were college men and seventeen of the eighteen were from Christian colleges. Two-thirds of the men who have achieved great prominence in our national congress were graduates from Christian colleges. Among distinguished men listed in Who's Who, those who graduated from Christian colleges were three times as numerous as graduates from non-Christian colleges.

North Carolina Baptists have a rich heritage in our Baptist system of schools. No other state in the south has an educational set up which equals ours. Our senior colleges are Wake Forest and Meredith; our junior colleges are Campbell and Mars Hill. Gardner-Webb and Wingate, while not under direct control of the Baptist State Convention are good Baptist junior colleges. These schools constitute one of our greatest denominational assets. They offer the best opportunities for Baptist girls and boys.

Baptist people, appreciate your schools more, support them more liberally, patronize them unanimously.

REPORT: MINISTERS' RELIEF AND ANNUITY

The Relief and Annuity Board of our Southern Baptist Convention was formed in 1918, and in its last report to the Convention there is shown the total number of members, or certificates issued, 8,182 to March 1, 1944, of this number, about 1,200, aged preachers and their wives, or widows are now on the relief rolls to whom financial aid is being extended regularly in the name of the greatest fellowship in the world, the fellowship of Southern Baptist.

Some of these 1,200 lives in every state are affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention. We do not have available the number in North Carolina, but according to the table published in the last issue of the Biblical Recorder the Churches in North Carolina gave to this cause in the month of August this year the small sum of \$128.36 designated. Can we as witnesses of our Lord and Savior be satisfied with this showing for our state? We do not have available the figures showing just what our Association has given, but we are hoping and Praying that we may enlist all our Churches,

in the Relief of our Denominational workers who become incapacitated while serving.

This last report of the Relief and Annuity Board referred to above shows that we have in this state 841 active pastors, of this number 493 have certificates, leaving 348 unenlisted, 2,574 churches, 665 enlisted and 1,909 unenlisted.

Let us all go back to our Churches with a determination that another year shall not pass without, our church and pastor being enlisted, or at least a contribution to the Board so that we may all have a share in this noble work.

There are several different plans for participation all of which will be fully explained by our State Secretary if we will but communicate with him.

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

The Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina maintains two homes, the Mill's Home in Thomasville and the Kennedy Home near Kinston. Each home has a superintendent but Mr. R. D. Covington is treasurer and Mr. I. G. Greer is general superintendent of both.

In the Social Service Department Mrs. Louise Blake, Director, receives all applications for entrance and after investigating them refers them to Mr. Greer, who makes final decisions. If he accepts a child, he says which home receives him or whether he goes to a boarding home or mother's aid home. In 1943, 698 were cared for in the two homes, 23 in boarding homes, and 60 in their own homes.

The children in the Kennedy Home attend the LeGrange and Kinston Schools. At the Mill's Home, a well-balanced unit of the Thomasville system is maintained. School attendance reached 99 per cent last year due to the good health of the children. This is far above that of outside population.

The farm produces vegetables in abundance, poultry and beef. From the dairy each child receives a quart of whole milk a day. Last year North Carolina friends filled 100,000 half gallon jars of fruits and vegetables. Under the direction of trained workers, well balanced meals are prepared in the 19 kitchens of the two homes.

Clothing is mostly made by the girls who also do most of the laundry. Colored help is employed for the heaviest laundry work. Physical Education goes on the year round.

Churches, self-supporting, are maintained at both homes with graded S. S., Training Union, and W. M. U. These help in rounding out the lives of the boys and girls.

Charity and Children is published each week at Mill's Home and keeps us posted on all their activities. Money sent for this paper must be specified "Charity and Children" while our regular Orphanage Funds should be marked Current Funds.

It has been recommended that each Sunday School give one Sunday's offering each month for the support of these 600 children who are depending on us. At this time we have only 12 churches in our association who give this monthly offering. Because of the increased cost of living we should make our monthly and Thanksgiving offerings larger this year.

In the name of Christ who said, "In as much as ye did it unto one of the least of these," let us rededicate ourselves to the task of making of dependent boys and girls, men and women who will be worthy and capable of rebuilding a shocked world and carrying on the work of the Kingdom of God.

REPORT OF BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The Baptist Hospital has just finished a year of satisfactory progress. The Baptist Hospital and Bowman Gray School of Medicine working as a unit have more than doubled facilities for medical and hospital care in this section of the state. The building program now under way will again double the capacity. Announcement has just been made of a gift of \$100,000 for the construction of a building for the out-patient department. Work on this building is expected to begin at once. When completed this will provide for 200 patients daily and will release 30 beds now being used. We now have an institution that is equipped and provided with professional talent to care for practically any disease.

Many Charity patients were cared for in 1943. It is for these that our Mothers' Day offering is made. Many mothers were cared for whose families anxiously awaited their return.

Ministers, missionaries, ministerial students, and children from the Orphanage are treated free of charge.

One of the functions of the Hospital is to train as many nurses as possible with the Christian ideal of service. The nurses' home now under construction will increase this number. Many of the Medical staff are serving in the armed forces but the staff, most of whom are specialists, now number 75.

We are very proud of the fact that the American Medical Association has given the Hospital the highest rating of any in the south save one.

The Hospital is grateful for the 51 per cent increase over last year in the Mothers' Day Offering from the Surry Association, and for all the gifts of hospital linens.

This hospital was built and has since operated with one purpose, that it shall be an institution through which our half million Baptists in North Carolina may render a definite Christian service to the sick and suffering who could not in most instances have hospital treatment otherwise. It is the purpose of Baptists and the management that it shall forever remain true to this purpose in addition to its wider service.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

My first word is one of gratitude—thankfulness for the privilege of working with you and with God in His vineyard here.

My purpose as your missionary is to be used of the Lord in winning people to Christ and causing Christians to grow. Personal witnessing and organized church activities are expressions of that purpose. My conception of a church program is a unified whole—not independent units, but for convenience sake my report will be given by organizations.

Work with our pastors—whom I recognize as the leaders of the church—comes first. One of the most encouraging achievements of the year has

been the organization and growth of our Pastors' Conference. The plan for such a conference was discussed at a supper meeting at Flat Rock in December. The organization was set up at a meeting in January at the Haymore Memorial Church. Twelve pastors were present that night. All deacons were invited to the last meeting and 35 deacons and pastors were there. I do the publicity for the meetings, usually make announcements, and sometimes discuss my plans. One of my keenest disappointments was our failure to have representation at the Pastors' Schools. I attended the one at Mars Hill. I have had numerous individual conferences with pastors and would like here to express my appreciation for their counsel and assistance in transportation.

In the Sunday School work I make a brief report; assisted the State department in two campaigns; attended and reported the State S. S. Convention in February; represented the Association at the Association Officers' Conference in April (Very much regretted that none of our officers were able to go); assisted with the three fifth Sunday meetings—helping arrange, print, and mail programs—announcements (mailed program for the fourth meeting but had to cancel it); attended 12 group meetings—spoke at 9, announcements at 3, mailed programs for most of them; with association leaders lined up churches for the Sunday School Revival in 19 churches using 27 workers including our State Staff; in connection with the Revival and in 2 additional churches we arranged Vacation Bible School 10 (3 other churches had their own—making 13 this year in spite of the polio ban); visited several schools; a great many individual conferences with association group and S. S. leaders.

In the Training Union my contribution has been: assisted the State T. U. Department in one association and one week at Ridgecrest; assisted with three mass meetings—spoke at one, led conferences at two, (Secured State Intermediate Leader for one); prepared the skit given at our last General Meeting; met with officers 2; arranged for delegation to attend State Association Officers' Meeting in Statesville in October. (Largest representation there); went to Regional meeting (only one from our Association); taught six study courses; visited all churches organized; set up the organization in three churches; arranged for Leadership Conferences with our State Leaders next November.

In the Woman's Missionary Union my work included: attendance at Divisional meeting; substituted for Superintendent at Council meeting; two Executive Committee Meetings; arranged delegation to go to Divisional Leadership Conference; helped with Association Leadership Conference; lined up work for the State Field Worker for month of July; visited all societies in the Association; taught 14 mission study classes; organized one society; prepared programs for annual meeting; accompanied Superintendent and Mission Study Chairman to Ridgecrest for Foreign Mission Week.

I have now visited 40 of the churches. It is with genuine regret that I come to the end of the year this far short of my goal—that of reaching every church this year. The polio ban and transportation difficulties have contributed to this result.

Besides my work in the individual churches and with the various organizations, I do some general work. I have made a beginning with our association; library; with filing records of lasting interest in the Association Missions Office; with gathering there materials useful for use by the people all over the county in their work; preparing information for the churches such as the explanation of the Co-operative Program; charts of valuable information leading toward a Calendar of Activities. I prepare a News letter giving my monthly report and such items as claim special attention.

As we go into another year, we are increasingly aware of the need of Divine Guidance and of your constant prayers. May we all earnestly pray for laborers in our harvest field here for "The harvest truly is great."

3. We recommend a restatement with a slight change of emphasis of Number 9 in Articles of Faith.

4. We recommend that the constitution be amended in Article 3, Article 4, Article 5 and Article 9 and that Article 11 be omitted from the Constitution.

Carmel with 2.

Counting two churches that are just getting started we have Training Unions now in ten churches.

We are looking forward to the first week-end in November when our entire State force of Training Union Leaders will be in our Association for Leadership Conferences. Every church in the Association is cordially invited to share in this unusual privilege.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

A Baptist Sunday School in the Surry Association: What should it be?

It should be (a) the teaching agency of the church, strictly under church direction, using the Bible as the textbook and supplemented with good Baptist literature; (b) teaching and ministering unto every Baptist within its scope of influence; (c) a far-sighted agency enrolling every baby at birth into a well-organized Nursery Department; (d) a far-reaching agency which has a program of visitation beginning with the Nursery Department and extending through the Extension Department through which the aged, cripples, and shut-ins have the privilege of Christian visitations.

It is the aim of our State Sunday School Board, under the direction of Mr. L. L. Morgan working through our Surry Associational Missionary, Miss Willa Marks, to have the best Sunday School possible. With the help of Miss Marks it was possible to enroll 19 churches in the Association-wide Sunday School Revival which was held in June. The average daily attendance was 551, with a grand total attendance of 2,751. We believe that Mr. Morgan with his group of 25 well trained Christian workers rendered a truly great and lasting service to each of these churches.

Our fifth-Sunday Associational meetings have been helpful and well attended, having an average of 181 present at each meeting.

We have approximately 42,000 people in Surry County and about the same number in the Surry Association, of whom about one-half (or 21,000) are Missionary Baptist or indicate Baptist preference. We have about 6,000 (or approximately 28½%) of our prospects enrolled in Sunday Schools. Of this 21,000 only 8,000 (or approximately 38%) are church members.

We have 55 Churches in the Surry Association. Four of these churches do not have a Sunday School.

We have a few Sunday Schools that still go into "winter quarters" which means their Sunday Schools will be discontinued during the winter months. We should be diligent at all times in our work of Christian teaching, keeping our Sunday Schools at work continually.

Some 18-20% of our young men are in the Armed Services of our Country. Many of this group were serving as our finest officers and teachers, thus it has been necessary to press others into the places they vacated. We are looking forward prayerfully for their speedy return, and we hope to enlist them again in the services of Christ; not relinquishing our new workers—but launching out until it will require adding new classes and departments to our Sunday Schools. By this means we shall be enabled to reach a high standard in our Surry Sunday School Association.

TOTAL ABSTINENCE

The true disciple of Jesus Christ must stand absolutely against the liquor traffic which means that he must be a total abstainer himself and must use his influence to see that others realize the importance of total abstinence. Since the repeal of the eighteenth amendment there has been such a change in attitude of the people toward liquor and such an increase in the amount of alcoholic drinks consumed that we need to take heed lest our own attitude toward this monstrous human curse be changed. We must still see alcohol as a great destroyer of human life, a great menace to human morals and a great enemy of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The word "alcohol" is derived from an Arabic word meaning "evil spirit." Surely it is an evil spirit that has killed more people than all the wars in history and has brought more disease, more poverty, more disaster and more heartaches than any other one thing in the world.

It was once thought that alcohol was a stimulant but it has been found that instead it is an "irritant, narcotic, depressant drug, classed along with chloroform, opium, morphine and ether."

A terrible effect of drink today can be seen in the number of automobile accidents due to drinking drivers. Since repeal automobile accidents in the United States have increased in the same proportion as liquor sales have increased. It is estimated that at least sixty per cent of all accidents are caused by liquor. Gasoline and liquor do not mix.

One thing the world needs to learn with increasing conviction is the harm in a little drink. The liquor forces are deceiving millions of people—even some Christians—by making them believe that it is safe to drink so long as too much is not taken. Not temperance or moderation but abstinence is the word which we must apply to the use of drink. We know that there is great danger in beer and wines. Science gives the indisputable evidence that alcohol in moderate amounts is harmful physically and mentally.

The fallacy that a little drink doesn't make a drunkard is responsible for most of the highway accidents caused by drink. It isn't the staggering or the dead-drunk man who is the danger behind the steering wheel, for usually either his friends or the officers of the law prevent his driving in that condition. The man who has the automobile accident is he whose glass of beer has had no effect on his outward appearance but nevertheless has confused his judgment of distance, color, signals and sense of speed. Not wobbly legs but a staggering brain is the menace of the highway.

In the face of these facts, proving the danger of even a small amount of alcohol, the true Christian discipleship demands total abstinence. That means no whiskey taken even for medical purposes, for doctors have found that this is neither necessary nor beneficial. That means no pouring of wine over or into our Christmas fruitcakes, no "spiking" of the punch at our parties, no whiskey used to flavor our boild custard—none of these sometimes considered "harmless" things whereby Christian people are snared into tampering with this evil spirit, alcohol. Total abstinence must be our stand on this subject. Any other stand is dangerous, sinful and not Christian.

Liquor is the root of 75 per cent of broken homes in America today.
 "The average citizen now pays \$120 a year tax to live in a land where 12,000 are murdered every year, 46,981 commit felonious assault, 247,346 steal some one's automobile.

Out of 460 youths sentenced to the Mass. Reformatory 421 never attended church.
 America is spoken of as a Christian Nation, yet with a population of 126,000,000 (in 1936) only 50,000,000 were identified with any religious body. Taking no account of the children who are still not eligible to membership. There are still 50,000,000 responsible persons who are not actually church members.

(Examples of great Christian Leaders).
 George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson and others, besought God for Guidance and strength in the hour of National Crisis. Jefferson Davis, Stonewall Jackson, Robert E. Lee and other leaders of the Southern Confederacy were devout Christian Leaders. In the South today, the majority of the Governors are Christians. This is also true of our Congressmen and Senators.

RULES OF ORDER

1. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by such persons as the moderator may designate.
2. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator.
3. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission of the Association.
4. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator before discussion.
5. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion without the consent of the Association.
6. When a motion is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be considered, except a motion to adjourn.
7. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a consideration.
8. All questions except as relate to the amendment of the Constitution shall be decided by the majority of the votes cast.
9. The Association shall have the right to determine what subjects it will consider and the order of their consideration.
10. These rules may be amended at any time during an annual session of this Association by a majority.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the Godhead: The Father; The Son; The Holy Ghost.
2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and order.
3. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
4. We believe baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
5. We believe baptism is the immersion of a believer. And only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church of Christ, in faith and doctrine, and they only should take the Lord's Supper.
6. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints.
7. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment.
8. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joy and happiness of the righteous will be eternal.
9. We believe that the right to administer the ordinances is vested in the Church and that no person should perform the ordinances except as authorized by a Church.
10. We believe in the doctrine of growth in grace and sanctification as set forth in the New Testament. But we do not believe that sinless perfection is attained by anyone in this life.

CONSTITUTION OF SURREY ASSOCIATION

- Art. I This Association shall be denominated and known as the Surrey Baptist Association.
- Art. II The object of this Association shall be the promotion of the Kingdom of Christ among men, and the accomplishing of this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.
- Art. III This Association shall be composed of messengers chosen by the churches. Each church is entitled to four messengers for the first 100 members or fractional part of the hundred, and two additional messengers for each additional 100 members. The ministers of the Gospel who belong to churches connected with this body or are pastors of churches so connected, shall be ex-officio members of this Association.
- Art. IV A letter shall be presented from each church certifying the appointment of messengers and given a record of the work of the church for the past year.

Art. V The officers of the Association shall be a moderator, a vice-moderator, a clerk, a treasurer, superintendent of Sunday School work and director of Training Union work. These shall be elected on the closing day of annual meeting of the Association and shall hold their offices until their successors are elected. Election shall be by ballot when there is a contest.

Art. VI It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at and during the deliberations of the body, enforce and observe the Constitution, preserve decorum, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

Art. VII It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep and record the proceedings of each meeting, superintend the printing and the distribution of the Minutes thereof among the churches composing the body.

Art. VIII It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent to this body by the churches for all purposes, or collected during the session of this Association, and distribute the same as ordered by the body. He shall make an annual report to this body of the sums received and from what source, and the manner of their distribution and to whom and for what purpose, and the conditions of the treasury.

Art. IX The association may annually appoint an executive board composed of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, superintendent of Sunday School work, director of Training Union and superintendent of W. M. U. work of the association and five other members. The Executive Board shall have charge of Associational Missions and such other objects as may be entrusted to them by the association. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid them by the treasurer of the association for objects under their charge and to collect and disburse funds for any necessary work in the bounds of the association. Their chairman shall make an annual report of their doings to the association. It shall be the duty of the churches to send up to the Association in the hands of their messengers a sufficient fund to pay for printing the minutes and a reasonable amount for clerk hire.

Art. X Any church desiring to become a member of this Association shall present her petition at an annual meeting thereof through delegates appointed for that purpose, and if the Association shall decide to receive her, the moderator shall extend the right hand of fellowship to the delegates.

Art. XI The Association shall have power and it shall be its duty to withdraw fellowship from any churches that neglect or refuse to maintain gospel order.

Art. XII The Association may invite visiting brethren to seats with the body, and to extend to them all privileges except that of voting.

Art. XIII This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it selects.

Art. XIV By appointment of the Association, there shall be preached an introductory sermon, a missionary sermon if ordered by the body, and such other preaching as the Association may direct.

Art. XV This constitution may be amended by any annual session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present.

Art. XVI This Association will not retain a church who permits its members to manufacture or sell spirituous liquors.
