REPORT ON TEMPERANCE, READ BY BRO. W. F. STALEY.

King Alcohol has always been a destructive agent. It needs no argument to convince the most skeptical. Observation and experience has taught the human race that much suffering, ignorance and poverty is due to the deadly poison, and we aver that intemperance is the greatest enemy in the land. From the use of spirituous liquors, either directly or indirectly, 150,000 souls are slain annually. Yet, it is asserted, if you let whiskey alone it will let you alone. We differ from the popular opinion, for we have seen innocent wives and children suffer untold sorrow, misery and disgrace, and immorality results from the use of intoxicating liquors. Strenuous efforts are being manifested in trying to abolish the liquor traffic. From the growth of public sentiment it will not be far hence until our state will be strictly for prohibition. The dark cloud of despair which has blackened our sky will soon disappear and the sunshine of a new day will dawn. Realizing that intemperance is not only wrong, but one of the greatest evils of the age. We regret that our government legalizes and licenses men to prosecute the work of death. Therefore, we heartily recommend that the churches of this association teach the high standard of temperance to the children of this generation. That further, We, your committee, find that while the condition, so far as results, to the manufacture, sale, and consumption of intoxicating liquors within the bounds of the association are bad and far from ideal. We rejoice to report that the manufacture, sale and drinking of liquors is on the decrease, and that there is now a strong and healthy sentiment against intemperance among the saints and sinners. We would respectfully urge that our ministers preach directly and plainly against this evil, that our Sunday Schools teach the young the dishonor and wickedness of the drink habit, that members of our churches who will not give up the habit of drink after being

advised and admonished in a spirit of brotherly love to do so, be excluded from the church whether they drink to the extent of intoxication or not.

REPORT ON EDUCATION, READ BY BRO. W. F. STALEY, IN CONNECTION WITH THE DENOMINATIONAL SCHOOL.

Education is the best legacy that parents can bequeath their children. Knowledge is power, therefore, when one has been deprived of the privilege of a literary training they feel embarrassed all through life. In this competitive era one can not advance without training. God had Moses trained for forty years before he became the illustrious leader. Saul of Tarsus was trained by being a student of Gamaliel. Hence you can see that education is an indispensable factor. The great need of our boys and girls being equipped for life is the question of the hour. Our Institutions ought to be patronized by Baptists if they desire their children to become Baptists. At the last session of Wake Forest College 341 students were matriculated 69 ministerial students, 72 received aid from the Board. It is gratifying to note that at the last convention we had 8 schools with an enrollment of 4000 pupils. We were about to lose our glorious mountain section but the Home Board rallied and saved it for our Master. Seeing the great need of education we recommend Wake Forest College, the Baptist University, at Raleigh, and our other Denominational schools of the state,

Churches gave last year \$324,000.00, half a million is the watchword for this year to Foreign Missions alone. Last year there were in the field 190 missionaries and 300 native workers, and the baptism of 2446 converts and a vast amount of other work done. Shall we not double this exhibit during the current year. What part will the Surry Association accomplish in this great work.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE READ BY BRO. J. R. LEWELLYN.

Your committee on the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina beg
leave to submit the following report; First that while we are not
sufficiently informed as to the exact detail of the Orphanage to
report its condition in all respects, but we are advised that the in-
stitution now has approximately three hundred inmates, which is
the largest number it has had under its care since its establishment.
While it has suffered dire calamities, and lost many gifts recently,
intended for it still it is in good condition. It has a credit that will
get money anywhere, is, as we are informed, well endowed, has
more buildings, and is now engaged in erecting more and better
ones than ever before.

While the rich may erect buildings, and contribute to endow-
ments, in fact endow such institutions. History clearly demon-
strates the fact that the common people always have had to feed
and clothe the children. And our Orphanage is no exception to
this rule. Therefore it is incumbent upon us to do our part of this
work. We therefore recommend that the pastors of each of our
churches take a cash collection for our Orphanage once a quarter,
and we urgently request the members to contribute to the same.
These three hundred children are the sons and daughters of our
brothers and sisters. Will we not do our part in their maintain-
ance, and support them in the sight and fear of our Heavenly
Father.
