Aunt Wilma,

The store owner in the 1920's-1930's probably was not William Jones Key because he and his wife both lost their sight in the 1910's and went to live with their son, Gabriel Jackson Key (my mother-in-law's father). Prior to this William Jones Key operated a store that was located on his farm. The house and store building is still standing and is pictured in my book. The house is located at the end of the road and the store is on the right just yards before you reach the house. The house and store are located off Rock Hill Church Road near the Eldora/Ararat communities.

Gabriel Jackson Key owned a store at Ararat, NC that was located by the RailRoad tracks at the Ararat River. Their first home was on the same side of the road as the store, but this house burned on January 22, 1926. Gabriel built a new home across the road. Gabriel was quite affluent during the 1920's but he lost the store during the Great Depression. The store is no longer there but the house remains although it has been sold out of the family.

Another possibility is the brother of Gabriel's wife. Emma's brother Charles Westley Key and his wife, Eliza Denny had a farm and a store located on their farm. They lived in the Shoals community.

I hope this will help. Please let me know all you can find out about Jan Childress. If she is researching the same line as Joe's family, perhaps we can share some info.

TIPS FOR THE BEGINNING GENEALOGIST

1. Collect as many birth dates, marriages, deaths and places for your parents and grandparents as you possibly can from your own family members.
2. Black ink photocopies better.
3. Make a note as to where your information (source) came from.
4. Don't trust your memory!!
5. SASE means send a self-addressed stamped envelope, with all correspondence. This is a courtesy, and many researchers will not respond if you fail to do so.
6. Be specific in all requests for information.
7. Get into the habit of writing dates properly. 10 Nov. 1983. Numbers can be confusing.
8. Don't be afraid to ask a question, even if you think it might be silly. We all had to take that first step and learn.
9. Keep a record sheet of letters you wrote, date, and date of the answered letter.
10. Use large loose-leaf binders.
11. Develop a filing system to suit your needs.
12. Family group sheet for each head of household.

 old-fashioned dress. The resemblance was uncanny! So, the Kee/Key
 family is dear to my heart, and any information I can add to the line is
 a treasure.

*Census records show that Peter Key was married to Jane in the 1850
 Surry County federal census. The 1860 federal census shows Rebecca Key
 living with her children in the Western District, Lee County, Virginia.
 Online records at the LDS Family Center indicate that Jane is Jane
 Suttle and the records show that she married Peter Key; the records also
 show a Rebecca Suttle in the same family, married to a Key. Given the

age of Jane and Rebecca and the years married that are listed in the censuses, not to mention the same children, I believe that Rebecca and Jane are the same person.

** The Key family farm is still located in Umatilla County Oregon, near the town of Weston. Hezekiah Key was the first to go west. He was born in 1847, and was part of the Confederate Army. He married in 1866, and moved to Iowa and then to Sacramento, California, About 1875, he moved his family to Weston, Oregon. Hezekiah and his wife had twelve children, but only six lived to adulthood.

Hezekiah made a living by making and distributing whiskey to local saloons. In 1880, he acquired 160 acres from the U.S. Government, and bought 640 additional acres soon after. He returned to North Carolina for a visit, and the dream of success hit many Surry County families. Families that moved to the Weston area after Hezekiah's visit included the Badgetts, Yorks, and Bannisters. Many of this family's children married Hezekiah's children. His sons-in-law had names of York, Badgett, Read and Wyland.

Joe and Ruth Key were owners of a small store in Mt. Airy, N.C. At just 21 years of age, Joe and Ruth decided to go to Oregon with their new baby girl, Ollie. They came on the train directly to Weston, in March 1889.

Late News.

FREDERICKSBURG, Feb. 15.—The Herald of the 13th says the holders of cotton on the 11th advanced the price, asking 92 to 93 cents a pound for middlings. The Herald, commenting on a report that the people of Charleston are leaving that city in expectation of an attack, advises them to steer clear of Savannah. It thinks the Federal force between Charleston and Savannah sufficient to attack both simultaneously. The Herald "knows that Hooker and his soldiers are ready to seize the opportunity, even of a partial hardening of the mud, to open the road to Richmond."

John Van Buren, in a speech before the Democratic Union Association at New York, in view of the determination of the seceded States not to return to the Union, said, "Our friends, the Democrats in Illinois who propose to hold a convention, will find it a barren task, because the South is determined not to return until their armies have power to resist and put us down. This war must go on; and those who would attempt to stop it will be carried away by the torrent."

From Vicksburg.

VICKSBURG, Feb. 14.—One of the enemy's gunboats passed our batteries last night at 12 o'clock, under cover of darkness. Several shots were fired at her, but none believed to have taken effect. All quiet this morning.

CHARLESTON, Feb. 14.—Three steamers, the Ruby, Leopard and Wagner, from Nassau on the 9th, arrived here this morning with valuable cargoes.

The steamer Douglas ran out successfully last night, and took Hon. James B. Clay, of Kentucky, for Liverpool.

The blockade is virtually raised, as not a gun was fired at any of these vessels.

Capt. Carlon, who was captured last July with the steamer Memphis, and imprisoned in Fort Lafayette, was released at the instance of Lord Lyons, as a British subject, in January, and had arrived at Nassau. He represents the horrors of the Abolitionist as terrible.

Col. Zarvona was still kept in solitary confinement, and was expected to die from cruel treatment.

The steamer Florida, Capt. Maffit, which the Yankees falsely reported burned or captured, had been at Nassau, loaded up and departed, and since her leaving it was rumored in that place that she had taken a Yankee transport with seven hundred men on board.

On Tuesday last there was at Nassau the steamers Eagle, Emma, Havelock, Nicholas I, and Calypso. The last named vessel arrived out safely on Monday the 9th inst. The Antonia had arrived at Nassau, and afterwards left for Havana in charge of the mate, Mr. Robert Thayer, Capt. Coxetter having remained to take charge of the fine steamer Havelock, which had just arrived from England via St. Thomas.

Nothing had been heard at Nassau relative to the steamer Nina, which left that place several weeks since.

FREDERICKSBURG, Feb. 15.—The New York Herald of the 15th has been received. It says the movement to settle the present difficulties by a convention of representatives from the free States, is progressing in the West. The Illinois Legislature has appointed a committee to confer with those of Indiana, Kentucky and other States, to meet at Louisville in March. Foremost on the committee is a strong adherent of Lincoln, and heretofore a strong Republican.—The loyal gentlemen in question urged all his friends to vote the Democratic ticket in November last, to save the country. Other eminent Republicans are on the same committee. The measure was opposed in the main by the Abolitionists. It is expected that Ohio, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and New York will combine in the movement.

The Weehawken, iron clad, has arrived at Port Royal.

News had also reached Nassau that the Alabama was positively the vessel which destroyed the Yankee gunboat Hatteras, and sunk her in thirteen minutes after opening fire, the Hatteras carrying down most of the crew with her.
