The Committee on State, Home, and Foreign Missions reported.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS.

State Missions includes all mission work done within the bounds of our own State, which is paid for out of our State Convention funds. During the past year this work has been of normal progress. This is a very important phase of our work, and if the day ever comes when we weaken on this work the whole of our Mission work will be handicapped. Our Lord gave His command to His discoples to preach the gospel first in Jerusalem, then in Judea, and then in Samaria, and to the uttermost parts of the earth. If we want people to whom we go with the gospel to accept and follow the teachings of our Lord, we must not fail to do our best to Christianize all people within our own State. Let us begin at home, but not stop until we reach the uttermost parts of the earth.

Last year the State Board had 170 missionaries employed, and served 242 churches. There were 1,478 conversions, 1,012 baptisms; received by letter, 1,176; and there were 10 churches organized by these missionaries. This and much other work done by these missionaries cost the State Board only \$49,762.65; and these churches served paid on our various Convention objects.

outside of pastors' salaries, \$35,297.31.

The colportage work in connection with our State Mission work is another phase of this work which is very important. There were 14 employed in this work. These visited 8,951 homes, prayed in 659 of these, distributed 117,279 tracts, secured 1,450 subscriptions to the Biblical Recorder, along with many other kinds of work.

Since our State Mission work is so important and the results are so gratifying, we, your committee, beg to recommend:

1st. That we, all pastors and laymen, pray earnestly and regularly for this work.

2d. That we, both as individuals and as churches, resolve to greatly increase our contributions to this work.

The Committee on Education reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Surry Association is in the educational business. It was at the annual meeting with Gum Orchard Church nine years ago that we moved to establish in our midst an associational high school. With sure, if slow, progress this enterprise has gone forward all the while, and now we have a very valuable plant in Mountain Park. There are now two great dormitories on the ground, with a handsome church building, and Sunday-school room available for uses of the school pending the erection of an administration building.

The last session was a very good one, and the outlook for the next session is good.

The grounds of this school plant are quite an asset, and surpass

in beauty and utility all others.

We believe in education. Educated minds rule in this world. The bee does his work perfectly and by instinct; he makes no progress, but moves on as he did thousands of years ago. Man has a mind, and thinks and reasons about his work, with the result that from time to time he strikes upon better plans of accomplishing his work.

The goal of education is character, developed and tempered in noble things and noble efforts to help humanity to go on into perfection, to usher in the Kingdom of God; hence we call it Christian education.

The Moderator appointed C. W. Williams, F. T. Lewellin, and D. S. Hubble a committee to nominate trustees for Mountain Park School. The Nominating Committee reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO NOMINATE TRUSTEES FOR MOUNTAIN PARK SCHOOL.

The term of office of all the trustees of Mountain Park School having now expired, it is, on motion, ordered that the number of trustees for said school be reduced from nine to five, and that R. L. Haymore, A. W. George, W. L. Reece, John Wilmoth, and D. S. Hubble be and are hereby appointed trustees for said school for two years from and after this date.

The following resolution was offered by C. W. Williams:

- 1. That C. W. Williams be authorized to give full time collecting money for the school.
- 2. That \$3,500 be set aside out of the money collected for the purpose of paying teachers for this year.
 - 3. That all tuition fees be turned into the general fund.
- 4. That those who give the school \$100 may have free tuition for one student for three years.
- 5. That we try to raise \$100,000 by our next Association, one-half of which shall be used to endow the school, and that we continue to endow the school till tuition is made free for all students.
- 6. That the churches give one-half of their collections to Mountain Park School.
- 7. That we authorize the installing of steam heat in the Girls' Home before the next session opens, if it is possible to have it done.

On motion, each church in the Association was asked to name one of their members as a member of the board of education to confer with the trustees of Mountain Park School.

The Committee on Home Missions reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

There is no phase of our denominational work that needs more careful consideration at this time than Home Missions. Conditions are altogether different now from any time in our history. The great world war has brought us face to face with different problems of a very grave nature here in our Southland that we had never dreamed about. Our educational institutions and Mission work was at one time looked upon as matters of minor importance, but now they must mould the thought, not only of the Southland, but the whole world. The world recognizes the fact now, as never before, that the wrong kind of teaching and preaching in Germany had no little to do with causing the great world war; so the great challenge thrust upon Americans, and especially the South, is wonderful. Let us realize the great responsibility F. T. LEWELLIN, that rests upon Southern Baptists.
