Committee on State Missions report:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

At the first session of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, a board of managers were appointed. The board thus constituted is called the Board of Missions. It was stated in this first session that the object of the Convention was to repair and build up the waste places in North Carolina, and the Convention has been endeavoring to do this ever since. This work is known as State Mission Work.

State Missions is in some respects more important than other missions. It is the foundation on which other missions are built. In religious warfare it is the base of supplies, and no army can succeed if the base of supplies fails. The beginning was in Jerusalem and Judea. The gospel must spread and take root in our own State before we can send that gospel to other states and nations.

Dr. Charles E. Maddry is general secretary of our State Mission Board, and associated with him in the work are A. C. Hamby, head of the Enlistment Department, and Rev. H. T. Stephens, head of the department of Evangelism.

The Board is aiding many weak churches in paying their pastors' salaries. This makes it possible for these churches to have stronger and better prepared pastors, and in many cases they have services twice a month instead of once a month.

Associated with Brother Hamby in the Enlistment work are ten enlistment workers, or there is to be ten when the department is complete. These workers are distributed throughout the State. They hold stewardship, and general training institutes, form fields and in all ways possible serve to enlist our folks in church work.

Associated with Brother Stephens are three other evangelists. They conduct evangelistic meetings wherever invited, and go to weak churches for the purpose of reviving the work. In some instances they put on evangelistic drives in an entire association. In these meetings all phases of our work are emphasized, Sunday-schools are organized, Recorder subscriptions taken, tithers secured and other denominational interests fostered. Much good is resulting to our churches from the work done by these new departments.

It is not only the opinion of your committee that we should do more for State Missions but it is the earnest desire and prayer of your committee that every church in this Association do more for, and give more, to this worthy cause.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

We, the Committee on Home Missions, beg leave to make the following report:

Home Mission work is conducted by the Home Mission Board, which is located at Atlanta, Ga. This work is done in all the States by the Southern Baptist Convention and in Cuba. The Home Board helps to do work along several lines. It has charge of the Mountain Schools, and there are thirty-nine or forty of these schools, and they seek to reach and help three millions of people.

These schools are in great need of forces and facilities with which to do their work.

There are four thousand homeless churches in the South and one million dollars are needed annually for church building alone. There are ten million negroes within the bounds of the Southern

Baptist Convention. These need to be won, and the Baptists are responsible in a large measure for them and if we neglect them we let a great opportunity slip by. Foreigners in our midst must be evangelized or they become a nuisance to our country.

The Home Mission Board employs a number of evangelists and evangelistic singers who give their time to conducting meetings wherever they are most needed in the bounds of the Southern Board. Let us rally to the support of this work with our prayers and our money.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS

It is self-evident that an earnest Christian will gladly avail himself of every possible means whereby he may become better qualified to serve his Lord. An informed Christian is a useful Christian. To know about the world's needs is the first step in the direction of supplying the world's needs. To excuse one's self from rendering service because one is ignorant of the need of service is not acceptable to God when the information could have been secured. Christ said, "Lift up your eyes and look upon the fields." Our Baptist periodicals are the eyes through which we are to see the fields

whitening for the harvest. Not only so, but they are also the source of information as to how the harvest may be garnered. Much of the inspiration and enthusiasm which are needed to enhearten the reapers and to increase their capacity for enduring toil are therein provided.

There are three Baptist periodicals which should be read in every North Carolina Baptist home, namely: "Home and Foreign Fields," "The Biblical Recorder" and "Charity and Children." Christ's crowning command to His disciples indicated that they were to have as their field for witnessing Jerusalem, Judea, all Samaria and the uttermost parts of the earth. Such is the compass of the scope of the periodicals mentioned. Some will read others in addition to these, but certainly these should be read by North Carolina Baptists.

Your committee, therefore, recommends that pastors and laymen in every church make an earnest effort to see to it that the above named periodicals be placed in every Baptist home and that the people be encouraged to read them faithfully.

The following order was passed by the Association:

It is hereby ordered by the Surry Baptist Association in regular session assembled, on the 15th of July, 1922, at Pine Ridge Church, that the Trustees of Mountain Park School be and are hereby ordered to execute a deed of trust in the sum of \$14,418.00 on the lands and buildings belonging to said school for the purpose of paying the debts against said school and settlement in full with C. W. Williams, former Superintendent of said school. Upon the execution of said deed of trust, R. L. Haymore, Esq., agrees to give said school the sum of \$10,490.00, and in the gift he is to cancel the old deed of trust that he now holds on said property for \$9,800.00. Out of the money arising from said proposed deed of trust, the Board of Trustees of said school are to pay off all indebtedness against said school; the debts outside of the debts for piano and typewriters are to be paid and the difference between said debts and the sum of \$6,000.00 is to be paid to C. W. Williams; the remainder of the money is to be used for improvements at said school. C. W. Williams is to furnish the Board of Trustees an itemized statement of all the outstanding indebtedness against said school. Also, out of said new deed of trust the \$700.00 due on the first deed of trust is to be paid.

The following resolution, offered by W. T. Baucom, was adopted:

Resolved, that following method of electing Trustees of Mountain Park School in the future be adopted:

1. That all members of the Board shall be members of Baptist churches in the Surry Baptist Association.

2. That all members shall be elected by the Surry Association in annual session.

3. That the term of office shall be three years.

4. In order that the foregoing may become effective at once, the newly elected trustees at their first meeting shall prepare three ballots with 3 years written thereon, two ballots with 2 years, and two ballots with 1 year; then each trustee shall draw one ballot and the number written thereon shall indicate the number of years of his term of office.

When we think of how much we owe our ministers for what we are as a nation and as a church today, and especially our pioneer preachers, who in years gone by labored so long and faithfully in the rural sections of our country, we confess that we have been very

derelict in our support and loyalty to these self-sacrificing heroes of the Cross. So many times we have not only failed to give financial aid, but we have neglected to offer our moral support and words of cheer and encouragement which they so much needed. Our lack of co-operation has oftentimes been almost criminal. They journeyed through heat and cold, over rough, muddy and tiresome roads—sometimes on horseback, sometimes on foot—to preach the gospel and tell the precious story of the love of Jesus Christ to those who had no other opportunity of knowing about it. Many of these pioneer preachers were forced to toil in the field or shop most of the time in order that the actual necessities of life might be provided for their families, and nothing could be saved up for the proverbial “rainy day.”

Brethren, we owe a debt both of our substance and the gratitude of our hearts—that we can only partially pay—for this faithful service, and when the shades of evening draw close about these veterans and they can no longer earn a support because of disease or the infirmities of age, and the step has become feeble and tottering, let us not neglect them, but see that their last days may be made as comfortable as it is possible for us to make them.
