

Tracking down lost burial plots

Joe Hicks steps carefully between the marble monuments.

Some stand tall. Some are short. Many are faded after years of abuse from the elements.

He holds up a hand-held GPS marker and hits a button.

The Round Peak Primitive Baptist Church cemetery will now never be lost.

"The goal is to keep a lot of these little family cemeteries from getting lost," Hicks said recently. "A GPS reading, hopefully from now on, won't change."

Many small cemeteries have disappeared in Surry County. Markers have fallen down, nature has grown up.

There is just one problem — "The bodies haven't been moved," he said.

For Hicks and several other genealogy enthusiasts from Surry County, getting information organized is a big goal.

"Our main object is to find, record, locate and write new driving directions" to each cemetery, he said.

So far, the group has catalogued 358 cemeteries — a number Hicks believes represents about a third of what's here. Each cemetery has its coordinates recorded by a GPS system and then a form is filled out that includes name of the cemetery and specific directions. Pictures are also taken of the site.

• All that information is uploaded to cemeterycensus.com/nc/surr/index. htm and is available free of charge.

"One of the main things is, as land is developed and everything, so many of these cemeteries — little bitty ones and big ones ... it's important to know where they are," said Esther Johnson, president of the Surry County Genealogical Association. "Also, if they (buyers) are aware of the cemetery being there and we're aware of the cemetery being there, the

Continued from front page cemetery won't be damaged or destroyed. So much of our history is lost through cemeteries that were destroyed."

It's not just the information on the markers that are important, she said. Many times, the markers themselves are historical in the way they were constructed, the materials used or the way they were set up.

"It's another way to learn something different about our ancestors," she said.

The project went quickly at first as the group — Johnson, Andy Hennis, Bob Carter, Teresa Smith, John Edwards, Wilma Hiatt, Matthew Norman, Dean Brown, Charles Crabtree, Donna Edwards and Rodney Johnson — targeted areas that are well known.


"It's slowed down quite a bit," Hicks said. "I've been getting out and finding a lot in the woods. I find so many of these little family cemeteries. I take leads from anybody that wants to give me one."

Just like the one from Dorothy Ray Smith. She contacted the group about finding the grave of a long-lost sister — Baby Ray — who died in 1950.

Hicks started investigating — the child was born on May 7, 1950, and was buried on the farm of a Mr. Guyer where her mother and father were tenant farmers. Guyer gave permission to bury the baby on his property, He helped by buying a casket and vault. The baby's parents — Jessie "Lost John" Ray and Lucille Woodring Ray — were well known. "Lost John," who was blind, was one of the best fiddle players in this area.

Ebenezer Methodist Church, which borders the land where the child was buried, decided to move the body to its cemetery and bought the stone marker for her grave.

Hicks found the grave.

he said.

The ultimate goal is to not just mark the cemetery, but inventory it, listing who is buried there along with any information available from the tombstones.

"That data — birth and death dates — are important to genealogists," said Bud Cameron, the retired longtime county register of deeds. "It helps those trying to track genealogies. Getting that information together and then, what really needs to be done, is move it to the tax maps."

By doing that, Cameron said, potential developers or homeowners would know if a body might be buried on land being purchased — and families would not lose treasured history.

The group does have some cemeteries listed as "Unknown" on the website because the markers have fallen or the stones smoothed over through time. They are still marked and catalogued.

Aerial photography made in 2005 is online to give those looking for some landmarks to follow.

so be alert for unusual opport tunities to pop up when and where you least expect them. found those types are 'protected' by growth. I've seen some with chain link fences out in an open field. On the markers, you might have a name, but don't know when they were born or died."

Hopefully, the information will be gleaned off the markers before it disappears.

The first step is to mark and save the cemeteries.

"The sad fact is that family cemeteries are disappearing — being destroyed by people through vandalism and development," Cameron said. "Hopefully, this (project) will put a stop to that."

MARY CHARLOTTE WRIGHT HICKS BOLT

My great-grandmother, Mary Charlotte Wright Hicks Bolt (1854-1925), was a resident of Mt. Airy, N.C. for 45 years (1880-1925). She was born in Grayson Co., Va. March 24, 1854 to Malinda Ann Phillips (1826-190?) and Churchwell O. Wright (1824-1874). She was the fourth child and first daughter in a family of twelve: William Richard, Churchwell O., Samuel F., Mary C., Carloine F., Emily "Emma", Elbert M., Virginia "Jennie" E., David, Martha "Alice", Robert "Bob", and Lenora. Mary Charlotte's mother, Malinda Ann Phillips, was the daughter of James J. Phillips and Elizabeth Mallory (both of Grayson Co., Va.) who were married in Grayson Co. (mb 1824). James J. Phillips was the son of James and Peggy Phillips.

Mary Charlotte married first James Franklin Hicks (183?-1891) in Grayson Co., Va. on February 1, 1874. They had three children while living in Grayson Co.: Marville Thomas (1875-1945), Lola Mae (1878-1939), and Hattie Anne (1880-1938). In 1880 they moved to Mt. Airy and had a fourth child: George (1882-1928), who died in Buffalo, N.Y. of TB. He never married. Marville Hicks moved to High Point, N.C. taking his sisters Lola and Hattie with him in the mid 1890s.

Marville married Lula May Albertson (1877-1954) of Aaron, Va. in 1898 and they had seven children: Howard Mason, Lillian Payne, Ruby Mae, Mary Pauline "Polly", Marjorie Hazel, Marville Thomas Jr., and James Franklin.

Lola Mae married John William Moon of High Point, N.C. in 1897 and they had five children, three of whom lived to adulthood: Marjorie (1899-1910), Samuel Lafayette (1901-1965), Mary B. (died in Mt. Airy - 3 months old - is buried in the Bolt family plot at Oakdale Cemetery, Mt. Airy), John William Jr. (1908-1970) who married Beatrice Sebastian of Wilkes Co., N.C., and Ruth Louise (1912-) who married John Alexander Holbrook Jr. of Wilkes Co., N.C. in 1935. Ruth Louise and John are retired and live in Traphill, N.C. (Wilkes Co.).

Hattie Anne married Charles Edgar Kellam Sr. (1874-1955) of Guilford Co., N.C. in 1899. They had twelve children: Dandridge, Henry Hicks, Lena Bessie Mae "Kay", Charles Edgar Jr., James Alfred, Helen, Hugh Roland, Joseph Marville, Frances Parker, Julia Mason, Carey Moodye, and Samuel Redding. All but one of the twelve were born in N.C., the last seven being born in Montgomery Co., N.C. (Biscoe) where Charles E. Kellam Sr. operated a machine shop and foundry.

James Franklin Hicks was one of thirteen children born to Elijah M. Hicks and Elendor Johnston of Iredell Co., N.C. Elijah's parents were Henry S. and Elinor Hicks. James F. Hicks had a family by a first marriage (mb 1855 in Warren Co., Tenn.) to Martha Jane Miller. Together they had _____ children: Elijah M. and Sarah.

In the early 1870s after Martha died, James Franklin moved to Grayson Co., Va. He was a cabinet maker, a maker of coffins and fine furniture, which was a trade he had learned from his father and which he handed down to his son, Marville T. Hicks. He served in the War Between the States with the Tennessee troops. After James Franklin Hicks died in 1891, Mary Charlotte remarried a neighbor, William Alexander Bolt "Bill" (1856, Carroll Co., Va. - 1904, Mt. Airy). They had four children: Ned Washington (1892-1930), Jessie (who died in infancy), Myrtle Granell (1896-1918), and Donna Helena (1897-1935).

Ned Washington never married. He was in the first World War. He was killed in an accident while working on scaffolding. He is buried in the Bolt family plot, Oakdale Cemetery, Mt. Airy.

Myrtle Granell married Lee Roy Poore (1895-1921) of Mt. Airy in 1917 and they had one daughter, Myrtle Bolt Poore (1918-). Myrtle Poore married George Yandell Watson of Southport, N.C. in February 1945. They have one son, George Yandell Watson Jr. Mother and son reside now in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Donna Helena married Sanford Perry Keziah Sr. (1893-1937) of Union Co., N.C. in 192?. They had one son, Sanford Perry Keziah Jr. (1930-) who is a lawyer and practices in High Point, N.C.

William A. Bolt had five children by a previous marriage: Victor C., Josephine Ada, James Paul, Maude Marie, and Willie G. The mother of these children was, I believe, Roxie (Martha) Green. William A. Bolt was from Carroll Co., Va., being one of the youngest of thirteen children born to William Alexander Bolt Sr. and Catherine Sutphin (both of Carroll Co., Va.). His grandparents were John "Mean Johnny" Bolt and Rebecca Dillard (both of Carroll Co., Va.).

I am a granddaughter of Hattie Anne Hicks and Charles Edgar Kellam, and a great-granddaughter of Mary Charlotte Wright Hicks Bolt and James Franklin Hicks.

Local woman surprised to see brother while watching TV show about Iwo Jima

MOUNT AIRY -- In 1944, Fred Hicks left his home in Surry County and joined the Marines. He could not have known it was the last time he would be in Surry County.

"He was only 16 years old when he joined," said Sadie Hicks Bullin, Hicks' sister. "I was the baby of 11. We were all born at home, so we didn't have birth certificates (and) he just told them he was 18."

"He wrote home from Iwo Jima in one letter that if he had to do it over again he wouldn't have lied," she continued. "I was about 12 years old when he left and remember him walking up the road and stopping and looking back every few feet. It was like he had that feeling, I guess, that he would never come back."

She said three of her brothers were in the military at one time.

"There was Fred Hicks, who was killed on Iwo Jima; Sammy Hicks, who was wounded in Guam and brought back to Virginia in a cast from the waist down; and Daniel Watson, who was drafted, but had a bad eye and didn't make it overseas," she said.

Last fall, while watching television program called "Heroes of Iwo Jima," Bullin spotted her brother Fred among the soldiers.

"After I saw the show I ordered the tape, but I couldn't get it stopped

enough to get a good picture of him," she explained. "Recently, I took it to Video Works and Mr. Hawks was able to get a picture from it for me. He didn't even charge me. I think he was just so excited for me."

During the war, Life magazine did a two-page spread on Iwo Jima and Bullin said her mother spotted Fred in one of the pictures.

"She always said that was him," said Bullin.

She said the guy in the film, although it is not the same exact picture, looks like Fred.

"It's not the same picture," she said, "but it is similar."

The last time Bullin and her family heard from Fred was just after he died.

"He wrote my mother the last of February 1945 and he was killed on March 7, 1945. We didn't hear about his death for two or three week after it happened, because at that time news was slower -- it was the 20-something of March. They used to call the postman where you lived and he would bring the news to the parents," Bullin said.

She has Hicks' Purple Heart and a picture of him in his uniform. She and her 87-year-old sister of Burlington are the only two siblings left out of 11.

Hicks is buried in the city cemetery in Dobson.
