# PROCEEDINGS

Indian Grove Baptist Church, Mount Airy, N. C.

Thursday Morning, September 26, 1940

The thirty-eighth annual session of the Surry Missionary Baptist Association met at 10:00 o'clock with the Indian Grove Baptist church. The Association was opened with the song, "Rescue The Perishing." The opening prayer was led by brother C. M. Caudle of the Stone Mountain Association. The devotional was conducted by Rev. A. Finch. The scripture reading was the first nine verses of Ephesians.

Brother A. V. West, moderator, read his annual report, which was adopted by the Association. The Clerk called the roll of churches when 49 answered present with delegates and letters. F. T. Llewellyn made a move which was carried, that we change the memorial service for brother Reece from 4 p. m. to earlier in the afternoon.

Brother A. Finch then read the report on periodicals which was adopted. David R. Morgan spoke on this report as did also brother McCain. The Association then came together in prayer in behalf of brother D. D. Hodges who is at this time seriously ill at his home.

The moderator then appointed the following committees: Time, Place and Preacher, A. G. Webb, chairman, E. L. Schuyler, L. P. Pell; Finance Committee, S. C. Smith, chairman, Luther Seals, Tom Cook; Committee on new churches, A. S. Hale, O. E. Ward, J. H. Hall; Committee of Entertainment, Pastor of Indian Grove church, W. T. Crisman and his board of Deacons.

The Moderator recognized the following visitors and new pastors: Visitors: David Morgan, Raleigh, N. C., Geo. Clodfeller, Pilot Mountain Association, C. L. Leftwich, New River Association, C. M. Caudle, Stone Mountain Association; New Pastors, Stephen Morrisett, pastor at Ekin, N. C., Charlie Simmons, new pastor.

As brother D. D. Hodges was scheduled to preach the annual sermon, and he being sick, brother Lonnie Flemming preached this sermon using for his subject, "The Church of Christ," Text, Acts 1-8.

Mrs. A. G. Webb, Mrs. Bessie Tilly and Charlie Simmons were appointed as a committee to investigate about the matter of a Christian worker for the Surry Association. ✓

The Association was dismissed by Lonnie Flemming with prayer.

## Thursday Afternoon Session

The Association was opened with a song, "We Are Marching On To Zion." Brother McCain led the opening prayer. Mrs. E. C. James and Elmo Renegar spoke on the B. T. U. Work in the Surry Association. The B. T. U. Report is to be handed in later.

Rev. Stephen Morrisett read the report on Home Missions and spoke on the report which was adopted. The report on State Missions was read by Lonnie Flemming and was adopted. Rev. Albert S. Hale led us in prayer especially for our missionaries. Brother M. A. Huggins, our general secretary, brought us a great message on our Mission work which was thoroughly enjoyed. Mrs. Paul Wagoner read the report on Foreign Missions. The report was adopted as read.

A special memorial service was held at this time for brother W. L. Reece, who was moderator of the Surry Association for 22 years. This service was in charge of Rev. R. L. West who was his pastor assisted by brother Frank Llewellyn.

The Committee on New Churches recommended that the Albion and the Turkey Ford Baptist churches be received into the Surry Association. These two churches were received and given the hand of fellowship by the Moderator.

The Association then adjourned until Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

### Friday Morning Session

The Association was opened at 9:45 A. M. with the song, "I Love To Tell The Old Old Story." C. A. Simmons conducted the devotional reading the 103rd Psalm. Prayer by David Day. The Clerk read the minutes of yesterday's session which were approved by the body.

Brother Claude Harris, our statistical secretary read the statistics of the Association. The Moderator read the report on B. T. U. Work which was adopted.

No report on Christian Education being ready this report will be handed in later. Dr. Blackwell of Mars Hill College spoke on this subject which was enjoyed by all. The report on Baptist Orphanage was read by Mrs. Frank Toler and adopted. Brother I. G. Greer of Mills Home spoke at length on the Orphanage. The report on the Baptist Hospital was read by Mrs. Bessie Tilley and adopted. Brother Smith Hagaman, Supt. of the Hospital, spoke on the Hospital work.

There was a song at this time by the congregation, "Near The Cross."

We had at this time an inspirational address by Rev. J. C. Pipes State Mission Worker. J. H. Hall led the Association in prayer. Bro. Raymond Lanier, pastor of Haymore Memorial church, Mount Airy, was recognized by the moderator.

### Friday Afternoon Session

The Association opened with the song, "Draw Me Nearer . . ." The devotional was led by brother J. T. Threate, scripture first chapter of the Acts. Prayer by brother E. C. Norman. A prayer was offered for Mrs. Raymond Lanier, who is sick in the hospital.

Brother E. C. James read the report on Temperance and Morals which was adopted. Brother M. A. Adams spoke on this report. A collection was taken for the Dry Forces amounting to \$10.00. The report on Old Ministers Relief was read by brother R. W. Hovis and was adopted. The report on W. M. U. Work was read by Mrs. W. A. Jackson and adopted. Mrs Jackson spoke on this report.

Brother H. M. Finch read the report on Sunday Schools and spoke on the report. This report was adopted. A rising vote of thanks was given the members of Indian Grove church and the community for their kindness, hospitality and loyalty to us in meeting with them.

A collection was taken for the debt on Indian Grove Church which amounted to \$4.41. A motion was carried by the Association to secure a full time missionary worker for the Surry Association. This matter was left in the hands of the executive committee.

Report of the committee on Time, Place and Preacher: Time, Wednesday and Thursday, after the fourth Sunday in September, 1941. Place, Piney Grove Baptist Church. Preacher, R. W. Hovis, Alternate, L. M. Cook.

The election of officers came next with the following elected to serve us for the next Associational year, September to September, 1941: Moderator, A. V. West; Vice-Moderator, George Tucker; Clerk, J. H. Hall; Statistical Secretary, Claude Harris; Treasurer, J. W. Hylton.

The report of the Finance Committee was: Minute fund, \$95.83; Co-operative Program, \$6.02; Orphanage, \$1.05; Total \$102.90.

The Association adjourned at this time to meet with Piney Grove church on Wednesday and Thursday after the fourth Sunday in September, 1941. Dismissed by prayer.

### Report on Old Ministers' Relief

The Heavenly Father has always desired that His servants be cared for, both while at work and when deprived of opportunity of further active service. He sent Elijah to the brook Cherith to be fed by the ravens, and later directed him to the home of a widow of Zarephath, and the food lasted.

There has likewise been in the hearts of real Christians the desire that the Old Servants should not suffer in their declining years; but sometimes that desire has not been accomplished by sufficient active support.

For about twenty-two years now the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has been rendering a splendid service in the way of limited financial aid to these Old Prophets who have given their best years in active services for the Master, and who then find themselves in needy circumstances when their days of usefulness are past. This Board could do its work much more efficiently if, in addition to the regular limited support given through the Co-operative Program, the churches would observe at least one Fellowship Offering each year, which could well be taken at the Lord's Supper service. This would greatly help the Board in its attempt to meet the necessities of the aged ministers. Also, if people were reminded of this Board and its noble work when they make their wills, there could be a decided assistance rendered here which otherwise would go to less needy causes.

In this day practically every state in the Southern Baptist Convention is operating some form of a Ministers' Retirement Plan. The Ministers' Retirement Plan in North Carolina has been in operation since January 1, 1940. This plan is one in which the churches and ministers co-operate, each paying a small percent in accordance to the pastor's salary into the treasury of the Board; the Board also pays an amount, proportional to the percentages paid by the church and pastor, in to the treasury. The accumulative amounts with accrued interest become the minister's aid toward support in his declining years. There are now about 300 members, representing some 700 churches, participating in the Ministers' Retirement Plan in North Carolina. As indicated above, our State Convention approves his plan and is backing it to the full. This plan promises to surpass by far all previous plans, and if faithfully supported, will provide comfortably for the worthy ministers, who because of the infirmities of advanced age is incapacitated for further active work in the Kingdom.

Literature relative to the operation of the Ministers' Retirement Plan may be had by writing to the general secretary of our Baptist State Convention, Raleigh, N. C., or by writing to the Relief and Annuity Board of The Southern Baptist Convention, Dallas, Texas. It would be well if the board of deacons in each church, together with the financial committee, would inform themselves thoroughly of this plan and then lead the membership in adopting it. This would be a noble gesture on their part, and would greatly promote the unhampered services of their pastor. Our government provides for old age security for all workers, except those who give all their time and efforts to the work of the Lord. I believe the people of our Baptist churches can be brought to do as well for their pastors, who are also their servants. May the Heavenly Father lead us in our response in providing for His servants in their declining years of life. Let us not be found wanting.

### Report on Home Missions

With Europe, Asia and Africa in the throes of a great war, and with the subsequent closing of many fields hitherto have been very fruitful, the great possibilities of carrying the message of our Saviour's love to the unevangelized millions of our Southland have taken on an added romance. Many feel that just as the opportunity of spreading the Good News has presented itself to almost every nation of Europe and been rejected, so now it is being presented to the Southern Baptists. If we refuse, it likewise will pass from us. In a day when the world is going back to paganism at the rate of 6 million a year, we are not discouraged, for our Lord has never promised that we would convert the world. But rather we are more and more concerned that we shall take more seriously His great commands "Ye are the light-bearers of the world" and "Thus shall your light shine."

So it is with joy that we are able to record a year of successful "light-bearing" in the South. There are now 371 missionaries working in 756 mission stations. 39 have been added to the mission force, 64 new stations opened, and 20 new chapels acquired. During the year our missionaries gave away over 790,000 tracts and 29,226 Bibles, Testaments, and portions of Scripture. They have preached 29,454 sermons and led over 5,250 to accept Christ.

The year has also been very encouraging from a financial viewpoint. The Home Mission Board received from all sources \$513,841.80. The treasurer's report shows that \$163,660.89 was paid on the principal of the debt.

In the coming year let us double our efforts to give every man, woman and child the opportunity to hear the message of our Saviour's love, for "the harvest is ripe" and "the night is far spent."

### Report on The Baptist Orphanage

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this" To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world."

There is no institution in our state today of which the Baptists are more justly proud nor more deeply interested in than our Orphanage. The Orphanage operates two homes, the Mills Home at Thomasville, and the Kennedy Home at or near Kinston, and a Mothers Aid Department. This organization has for its General manager a man whose ability and spiritual influence have made him known and loved throughout our state. I refer you to Dr. I. G. Greer.

The average number of children cared for at the Mills Home and the Kennedy home this year were 626. The cost per child approximately \$50.00 or the total amount of \$16,000.00. This takes care of clothing, housing, health and education. This includes regular monthly contributions by the Sunday Schools, special gifts from friends, receipts from Charity and Children, and the annual Thanksgiving offerings of money, canned goods, produce and clothing which is the only income the Orphanage has. The Thanksgiving offering this past year was a little less than \$60,000.00 and was one of the best in its history.

However, it has been necessary to spend more for building and repairs. They enlarged the office building and built the Huffman House at Thomasville, and the Perry Morgan building at the Kennedy Home. The Huffman building of course was built by the money left by Mr. Huffman of Morganton and so beautifully furnished by his sons and daughters, and is modern in every detail. Mr. C. M. Wall of Lexington has also given a Farm at Wallburg to the Orphanage.

Special care is given to the health of the children, and the health record at the Orphanage is unparalleled as only two children have



died out of these two homes in the past ten years. One of these happened just about a month ago and was very sad.

The Orphanage boys and girls have educational advantages equalled to any in the state. They have a fine group of teachers and matrons whose hearts are entirely in the great work they are doing, and they act as mother, father, teacher and counselor to them, and are playing a big part in molding their young lives. They graduated 31 from the two homes this year.

The church life of the Orphanage is one of the most important phases of the work, and one feels it as he mingles with them. Their churches are financed by its members, which are made up of the children and employees and have full graded Sunday Schools, B. T. Us and Missionary Unions. These churches are led by Rev. A. J. Smith of the Kennedy Home and by Rev. J. A. Neilson of the Mills Home.

To North Carolina Baptist the Thanksgiving season and the Orphanage are inseparable. The Orphanage is a channel through which men and women who want to do something in the name of Jesus and may enrich their spiritual lives. What shall the harvest be? You have the answer, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto me."

### Report on Baptist Training Union

A great step has been taken in the TRAINING of the church members of Surry county.

One year ago (September 29, 1939) the Associational Baptist Training Union was organized at a meeting at the Mount Airy First Baptist Church, at this meeting the director, Elmo Renegar and the Secretary, Miss Ruby Wray were elected. Two weeks later at a meeting at the Dobson Baptist church the officers were elected. Since that time we have had five Executive meetings, two Conference meetings, and six Mass meeting.

During the past summer two churches have organized unions as a result of Baptist Training Union Study courses put on by some of the Associational B. T. U. officers. At the beginning of the year (September 29, 1939) there were twenty-two unions in all the county; at the present time there are thirty-four unions—a gain of twelve new unions in the entire county. There have been one hundred fifty-eight awards given for the completion of Study Courses in the following churches: Mt. Airy First, Flat Rock, Highland Park, New Bethel and Holly Springs. This is the largest number ever given before in the history of the Surry Association. The total enrollment in all the unions in 1939 was 558—up to date in 1940 there are 748 enrolled—a gain of 190.

We, the associational officers, appreciate the co-operation that we have received in our effort to "Go out and teach all men about Christ," and to teach them to train their young people so that they fill the places of those directing the Christian life of our county, so they may be more fitted for the tasks assigned them. It is our desire to do all that we possibly can for Him who has done so very, very much for us. If, at any time, we can help you in training your people and adults, we invite and URGE you to call on us without any feeling of hesitancy.

### Report on The Baptist Hospital

The Baptist Hospital was incorporated in 1922 and received its first patient May 28, 1923.

The Hospital was established for the purpose of providing treatment for the sick of the entire State, especially those who are not able to pay for hospital treatment. It is further felt by the Baptist denomination, we could not be true to Christ, whose representatives we are, if we did not do something in a large way to relieve human suffering, especially those who are not able to pay.

Work is now under way to enlarge the Hospital from its 108 beds to 300 beds. This will mean that instead of caring for 4,099 patients as was done last year now room is provided for 10,000 or more each year. This enlarged building will be equipped with the most modern appliances. On the same grounds is being erected the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College. The building and equipment, also an endowment, have been provided by the Bowman Gray estate of Winston-Salem. This will be a full four-year Medical School.

The Hospital has a staff of 76 Medical and Surgical doctors. A specialist for every particular case is at the call of the Hospital any minute, day or night. These doctors are the best of the country and are giving much of their time and service to the Hospital, in many cases without money and without price. There are 91 nurses, besides an adequate number of special graduate nurses, at the service of the patients day and night.

In the year 1939, 4,099 patients entered the hospital. These came from almost every county in the state. The Hospital does not discriminate against members of other denominations, nor those who do not belong to any denomination. Its doors are open to every hospital case of God's sick and suffering humanity.

Ministers of the different churches visit the Hospital daily. Almost all of the doctors and nurses and all the officials of the Hospital are active church workers. Morning services are held daily—prayers for the Divine blessings on the sick and their loved ones at home. A few weeks ago Rev. Charles Parker was elected as a full time minister for the hospital. This is a great step forward in the work of the Kingdom.

Enlarging the Hospital from 108 beds to 300 will stop turning thousands of sick away for lack of room. Last year 3,000 who applied were turned away because there was no room.

The Surry Association has pledged to this building program the amount of \$1,720.98. It is the desire of Mr. West and many others that this amount might be raised to \$2,000.00.

The Hospital has to depend almost entirely on the Mother's Day offerings by the churches and Sunday schools to provide treatment for its large number of service cases. The Mother's Day offerings have rightly been called, "the hope of the poor."

### Report on Foreign Missions

The war clouds which have been threatening for several years have burst, sending their downpour of destruction and death upon defenseless populations.

The Foreign Mission Board now has 456 missionaries and 2,900 native workers in the 16 countries in which it is operating. Scattered throughout these fields there are 1,833 churches, of which 1,180 are self-supporting, and 3,269 outstations. The total membership of these churches is 236,265. During the past year 18,606 have come into the fellowship of the churches by baptism.

The indebtedness of the Board has been decreasing rather rapidly. Indeed, during the seven years of Dr. Maddry's administration, it has been reduced from \$1,110,000 to \$245,000. It is firmly believed that the Board will be entirely free of debt when its one hundredth anniversary is observed in 1945.

Gifts from the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering have been growing larger through the years, the 1939 ingathering having reached the high mark of \$330,424.70.

From practically every part of the world there come reports concerning the progress of the Gospel. In recent weeks reports have been received of the marvelous work of grace in the hearts of Japanese students. In the boys' school 550 declared their purpose to follow Christ, and in the girls' school 531 accepted Him as their personal Saviour.

Thrilling stories come from China. Margie Shumate writes: "The slain lie in the streets. The women and maids are ravished. The young men in territory occupied by the enemy are taken for forced labor, while other millions pour out their life's blood on the battlefields.

Dr. George Green, Secretary for Nigeria, calls his report "A year of Progress." He says: "The year 1939 has been a good one in our Baptist work.

Although Europe and the Near East are torn and bleeding, our missionaries are staying by the staff and the Lord is blessing their labor. The Baptist of Rumania have been recognized as cult by decree. This is a step forward, but there are still those who insist that our friends in that country will not have full liberty until they are recognized as a religious community by a royal law.

Because of the unspeakable circumstances that the war has occasioned, British and other European Baptists have been forced to limit their missionary activity. Indeed, the time is at hand when

more than 400 British Baptist missionaries are likely to be cut off from the mother society.

While there have been trying times in South America, the general trend has been forward. As one missionary expresses it, "Our churches with their pastors and workers are constantly seeking the lost."

In Mexico there is encouragement because of the arrival of new missionaries.

### Report on Periodicals

Solomon has said that much study is a weariness to the flesh to which we may add that moderate study is profitable to the flesh. Reading, it is said makes a ready man, and reading denominational literature begets denominational loyalty. This our denomination knows and to facilitate which suitable literature is provided. Our three boards, Foreign and Home Mission Boards, The Sunday School Board and the Women's Missionary Union furnish us abundant and unsurpassed literature.

In our state we have The Biblical Recorder, published at Raleigh and Charity and Children, our Orphanage paper published at The Mills Home in Thomasville.

The importance of our own papers can not be over emphasized. Dr. Maddry says, "The Baptist papers are by far the best agencies for Foreign Mission propaganda. The Foreign Mission Board would be in a sad plight indeed without the co-operation and support of our papers.

There is a movement on foot to vastly increase the circulation of our eighteen denominational papers of the Southland. A committee was appointed last May by the Southern Baptist Convention to increase the circulation of these papers up to 500,000 by May, 1945. For the attainment of this goal an intensive campaign is being made. Our part is to increase the number of Subscriptions to the Recorder from the present, 13,589 up to 50,000. This is our goal. Haphazard work will not reach it. Our hope is in a Recorder Club in every church in the Association. At present there seems to be but four clubs, leaving 46 churches to be reached. How can this be done.

Appoint a committee of one in each church to accomplish this. The requirements are: For a full time church, 7% of the resident membership (resident membership is 80% of reported membership). For a half time church 6% of the resident membership. For a fourth

time church 5% of the resident membership. For club members the price is \$1.50 per year. Full amount to be sent with the club list.

We recommend: First, the appointment of a Recorder representative in each church, not now having one; second, that there be secured a club in each church, and third, that we request the pastors and delegates of the various churches to co-operate in the formation of these clubs.

### A Resolution

**A Resolution Regarding the President's Appointment of A Pesonal Representative To The Vatican:**

The Surry Association now in session at Indian Grove church virgorously protests this appointment. We assert that this act of the President's—

- 1 Is a violation of our cherished doctrine of the separation of church and State.
- 2 That the religious freedom of the American people is imperilled by this action of the President.
- 3 That Since the expense of this commission is (a) underwritten by the government and since (b) the Vatican has received the President's appointee as an Ambassador this becomes a matter that concerns all of the American people.
- 4 That the presence of the appointee in the United States does not cancel his appointment nor close the ambassadorial office in Rome.
- 5 That this dangerous precendent may be perpetuated unless protested with persisitence and determination.
- 6 We note with serious concern that the President has passed over in silence the multiplied protests of numerous religious denominations of our country.
- 7 We request the State Convention in its approaching session in November to voice our protest along with its own to the President of the United States. To insure it being brought to his attention we urge the appointment of acommittee to present its resolution in person to the Prësidnt and report his answer.
- 8 We request the clerk of this body to see that the State Convention is duly informed of this action of the Association.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. That we believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the Godhead: The Father; The Son; The Holy Ghost.
2. That we believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and order.
3. That we believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
4. That we believe baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
5. That we believe baptism is the immersion of a believer. And only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church of Christ, in faith and doctrine, and they only should take the Lord's Supper.
6. That we believe in the final perseverance of the saints.
7. That we believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment.
8. That we believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joy and happiness of the righteous will be eternal.
9. That we believe no minister has the right to administer the ordinance of baptism only such as have been called and set apart by the imposition of hands by the presbytery.
10. That we believe in the doctrine of growth in grace and sanctification as set forth in the New Testament. But we do not believe that sinless perfection is attained by anyone in this life.

## CONSTITUTIONS OF SURRY ASSOCIATION

- Art. I This Association shall be denominated and known as the Surry Baptist Association.
- Art. II That the object of this Association shall be the promotion of the Kingdom of Christ among men, and the accomplishing of this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.
- Art. III This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches composing it (each church being entitled to four delegates and four alternates). The ministers of the Gospel who belong to churches connected with this body or are pastors of churches so connected shall be ex-officio members of this Association.
- Art. IV That the Messengers from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment, giving an account of the conditions of the church, and account of the contributions for each purpose during the year.
- Art. V That the officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually by ballot: a majority of the ballots cast shall be necessary to elect in each case, and they shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and are ready to assume the duties of their respective offices.
- Art. VI That it shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at and during the deliberations of the body, enforce and observe the Constitution, preserve decorum, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.
- Art. VII that it shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep and record the proceedings of each meeting, superintend the printing and the distributions of the Minutes thereof among the churches composing the body.
- Art. VIII That it shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent to this body by the churches for all purposes, or collected during the session of this Association, and distribute the same as ordered by the body. He shall make an annual report to this body of the sums received and from what source, and the manner of their distribution and to whom and for what purpose, and the conditions of the treasury.
- Art. IX That the Association may annually appoint an executive

board of five members which shall have charge of the Associational Missions and such other objects as may be entrusted to them by the Association. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid them by the Treasurer of the Association for objects under their charge, and to collect and disburse funds for their objects during intervals of the meeting of this body, and they shall make an annual report of all their doings to the Association, including a report of collections and expenditures.

Art. X That any church desiring to become a member of this Association shall present her petition at an annual meeting thereof through delegates appointed for that purpose, and if the Association shall decide to receive her, the Moderator shall extend the right hand of fellowship to the delegates.

Art. XI That the Association shall have power and it shall be its duty to withdraw fellowship from any church or churches that neglect or refuse to maintain gospel order.

Art. XII That the Association may invite visiting brethren to seats with the body, and to extend, to them all privileges except that of voting.

Art. XIII That this Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it selects.

Art. XIV That, by appointment of the Association, there shall be preached an introductory sermon, a missionary sermon if ordered by the body, and such other preaching as the Association may direct.

Art. XV That this constitution may be amended by any annual session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present.

mits its members to manufacture or sell spirituous liquors.

Art. XVI That this Association will not retain a church who permits its members to manufacture or sell spirituous liquors.

#### RULES OF ORDER

1. That the officers of the Association shall be elected at the close of each session instead of at the opening. That these officers serve through the following Associational year.

2. That each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by such persons as the moderator may designate.

3. That at each daily session the names of the delegates shall be called and the proceedings of the previous session read before entering upon the regular business of the day.

4. That the members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy that becomes Christians.

5. That any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator.

6. That no member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission of the Association.

7. That all motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator before discussion.

8. That no motion shall be withdrawn after discussion without the consent of the Association.

9. That when a motion is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be maintained or considered except to adjourn, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. That after a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a consideration.

11. That all questions except as relate to the amendment of the Constitution shall be decided by the majority of the votes cast.

12. That the Association shall have the right to determine what subjects it will consider and the order of their consideration.

13. That no member shall absent himself from the session of the Association without the consent of the Moderator.

14. That these rules may be amended at any time during an annual session of this Association by a majority.


