Chatham Prepares for New Technology



Chatham Manufacturing is in the final stages of implementing technology to track inventory in the Finishing Plant. The Finishing Plant Tracking System will incorporate an IBM AS/400 Mini-Computer and Laser Gun bar code readers to allow operators and managers to know where every piece of cloth is located at any time. Although this system is still in the final development stages, user training will soon commence for all involved.

Chatham, along with IBM, performed an ATS (Application Transfer Study) to determine where the most significant improvements in doing business could be made. This study pin-pointed the tracking of inventory through the Finishing Plant as a crucial item of concern. The primary objective was to obtain a system that would provide ease of use and timely information about where all cloth was located and its status. A team consisting of Jim Shaw of Production Control, Tim Gentry of Finishing, Richard Schwanhausser and Dexter Thompson of Data Processing, and Cheryl Pardue of Cost Accounting was created under the direction of Frank Williams to determine a solution to this need. The team reviewed Chatham's procedures and requirements in detail and visited many manufacturing plants. At this time IBM was contracted to define system requirements. The team also investigated multiple computer software packages and hardware alternatives in search of a solution for Chatham's needs. Suzanne Wade of IBM identified a package from Camstar Systems, Inc. called Wiptrack. After an in-depth review, it was decided that Wiptrack would satisfy 85-90% of Chatham's requirements. This software decision led to the selection of an IBM AS/400 Model D35 computer which provides ease of operation, excellent reliability, and expandability for future demands.

Bar coding technology similar to that used in grocery stores will be used to identify each piece and set of cloth. Bar code technology has been around for a long time and has experienced rapid growth in manufacturing facilities. The current technology in bar code printing and reading offers the reliability and consistency needed to track inventory. Since the most important person using this system is the employee, it was essential to provide a quick and easy system to use. The operators of the system will use hand-held laser guns to read bar coded piece and set tickets. They will also have a bar coded menu which will virtually eliminate keyboard usage.

There are many benefits that will be achieved from the installation of this system. The major one will be improved cloth visibility. As a result of this improved visibility, Chatham should be able to virtually eliminate manually searching for cloth on the plant floor. Other benefits are: 1) Improved Quality - This will result in speedier communication of defects and corrective action measures being taken, 2) More Efficient Scheduling - Managers and supervisors will have more timely inventory reports of cloth at various stages in the finishing process, 3) More Accurate Information - Bar codes will provide less errors and the computer will check manual input for accuracy, thus reducing incorrect information, 4) Reduction in Paperwork - Many manual reports will be replaced by computer inquiries, and 5) Improved Decision Making - This will be accomplished due to more timely and accurate information. All of these will help Chatham become more competitive. These are just a few of the initial benefits to be realized.

This system will require a high level of commitment from everyone involved to help make it a success. It will enable Chatham to continue to grow and remain competitive in the market place. It will also send a signal to our competitors that they must work harder to catch up to us. It is an exciting time at Chatham as we embrace this new technology to improve everyone's jobs.


