REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE

He who helps a child helps humanity with directness which no other help can equal.

The human family is the oldest institution of which we have

any knowledge.

It is the only foundation upon which to build the other great

soc'al structures of church, state and school.

It has made failures, yet it is still the most successful institution in society and with this conception the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville was instituted and is now caring for 602 children, including those at hte Kennedy Home at an expense cf \$20.70 each per month.

The Orphanage has several hundred applications every year

that are turned down on account of not having sufficient room.

This institution belongs to the Baptists of North Carolina and on account of not having room enough the doors are closed to several hundred children every year.

We, your committee, insist that every Baptist in North Carolina become more interested in the Orphanage work to the extent that every orphan child in it may be properly cared for.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

To the people of these lands we are the foreigners, but all are included in the "uttermost parts." Our duty and responsibility of carrying the gospel to "every creature" are not restricted by racial lines or limited by distance. So, while rejoicing and holding fast to our inheritance, it is our duty as well as a great privilege to look to other lands that stand in such sore need of the gospel of Jesus Chris.t The review of the years achievements on our mission fields, while necessarily incomplete, gives some inspiring glimpses into the achievements, opportunities and difficulties which our missionaries interpret for us in vivid and appealing fashion. Two things stand out in all these reports. First, the opportunities have grown ovrewhelmingly great within recent years. Open doors everywhere challenge us to renewed effort and to the entering of new fields. Second, the retrenchment made necessary by the Foreign Boards debt will greatly hinder the work, unless there is immediate relief.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS

We are happy to call attention to the ninety-four years of splendid work of the Baptist State Mission Board. The year that has closed is the greatest year in all that lengthy span. It has been a fine exhibition of unity and efficiency of operation, for the entire program of work among North Carolina Baptists to be grouped upder the one head of State Missions.

There are there here who will remember the days when our various South-wide and State-wide interests were contending themselves for a favorable opportunity to present their various claims for cur consideration. We praise God for the present unified plan and program of work and your committee believes that any and all movements which might disturb our present plan, should be discouraged.

We would magnify and commend all that is being done. We would not have less done than is being done in any department of the State Mission Board's work. We would remind our brethren everywhere that on the success of the State Mission Board work depends the success of every part of Baptist work to the ends of the eartr. As prospers State Missions in all of its departments, so will prosper all Baptist endeavor.

We would also remind our brethren of this Association that our State Mission success is largely dependent on our success in securing money with which to meet the expensts of the work. We would emphasize the fact that all the money that comes into the hand of the Board must come from the churches that make up the Associations of our State. We therefore, call attention to the necessity that rests upon us to subscribe and pay every cent of our subscriptions to the Unified Program, that we may be able to keep our work up to its present high standard.

Your committee presents the following specific matters for your consideration:

1. Our Secretary, untiring and self-sacrificing, in his zeal for the cause of Christ has called attention again and again through the jasters of the various churches to the various and sundry destitutions that call for help from all parts of the state. We express the hope that careful and prayerful attention shall be given to these calls in the coming year and that those of our Association who are more fortunately situated shall come to the help of the Lord and His brethren.

2. Under the present plan the State Board seeks a full cooperation with all the district boards of the State. Most of the time our associations ask for support on well thought out programs and occasions, having care not to be extravagant in their demands or requests; yet your committee feels constrained to ask that for the coming year that all churches and individuals shall take careful inventory of their own ability, actual needs and possibilities before requesting money from the State Mission Board. By a proper development of our own resources, there are few churches in our Association that should not be celf-sustaining.

3. We must enlarge our work in all departments of the State Mission program. The Sunday School work of the Surry Association should be greatly enlarged. There are few churches in the entire Association that could not have a live Sunday School, if we were willing to match the young life of our constituency with a heavenly vision. The Baptist Young People's work presents a no less challenging situation.

Our Young People's work today is noe of the most hopeful and most needed department of our State Mission endeavor. We rejoice in what has been done, but we cannot afford to be satisfied with what we are doing in this great department. There must be enlargement and Secretary Morgan ought to be made to understand that all of the Baptists of North Carolina are behind him for an enlarged program.

The hour has come for a rally along I'nes in finishing the

task. The eyes of the South are on North Carolina Paptists

and the honor of our Master is in our hands.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS

Dr. E. P. Alldredge, Secretary of Survey, Statistics and Information, has recently written an article, or panishlet, of the title, "The South a Home Mission Field." Dr. Allredge says, "For Baptists, the South is the greatest, richest, ripest, most "For Baptists, the South is the greatest, richest, ripest, most far-reaching mission field on earth. Not even a summary of its varied and pressing needs, its matchless and uncountable opportunities, its certain and uncalculable returns can be set down in the limits of this article. Only a few points of this highest range in the realm of Southern Baptist opportunity may be touched upon.'

The South presents a wonderful opportunity field. In area it extends from Maryland to Florida, and from North Carolina to Arizona. It has a total population of 36,-824,826, divided as follows: Negroes, 9,025,096; Chinese and Japanese, 7,180; Indians, 95,636; foreign born whites, 1,282,-217; native born whites, 26,414,597. Of this total population there are 13,104,000 non-church members 10 years old and up.

7,000,000 of these are Baptist inclined.

Some pressing needs of Southern Baptists are as follows: There are 100 small towns in the South, ranging from 1,000 to 6,278 inhabitants each, which have no (white) Baptist church.

There were almost 9,000 white Baptist churches in the South in 1923 which reported not a single addition by baptism during the year.

There were 6,592 churches in 1923 which did not have a Sunday school of any kind, and 3,321 other churches which maintain Sunday schools for anly a part of the year.

There are 14,027 rural churches in which there is no organized woman's work.

There are 16,424 churches, town and rural, which have no organized young people's work.

There are, upon an average, 4,142 rural churches and 154 urban churches, which are pastorless.

There are 5,433 churches among Southern Baptists without houses of worship.

There are opproximately 500,000 white Baptist Homes in the South, with 2,500,000 of our Southern Baptist church members living in these homes, which are without any denominational paper of any character, and are cut off completely from all information concerning our state, South-wide and world-wide work.

Dr. B. D. Gray, our Corresponding Secretary, reports a total indebtedness of \$1,105,750.41. If every Southern Baptist would give to the Lord the tenth of his income, as the Scripture teaches us we should (Mal. 3) our indebtedness would be wiped out and a great number of additional missionaries could heed the call to preach the "gospel to every creature."

While our progress has not been as rapid as it could have been with the co-operation of every Baptist in every Baptist church in the South, yet there are many gratifying edidences of progress. One outstanding accomplishment has been in the field of Evangelism. There have come into our churches by baptism nearly 200,000 new members during the past year. There was one baptism to every 17.8 members during the year 1923. Let us pray that God will speed the day when it can be said that every Baptist has brought at least one to Christ during the year.

Home missions is due to receive 20 per cent of the Southwide budget for 1925. Our motto should be: Every member of every church contributing every week to every cause, in proportion to his ability. That is the Scriptural plan of financing God's kingdom here on earth. (1 Cor. 16:2.)

We close our report with the following outline of Home Missions activities:

- 10 departments of home mission work carried on.
- 17 States, District of Columbia, Cuba and Panama form field of Board's work.
- 1,250 workers employed last year.
- 4,250,000 foreign-speaking and 500,000 Jews to whom Board seeks to minister.
- 30 Mountain Mission schools maintained with 4,920 pupils.
- 235 new workers needed.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We are glad to report some of the work of our Sunday schools. These have been wonderful years because of the great forward-looking Sunday school program of Southern Baptists.

Many things are to be desired, but there are many facts which encourage and thrill with a hope of still larger and better things in the future. There now seems to be 2,169 schools with a membership of 286,793. We cannot but think of Sunday schools as of other things in terms of 5 years because a vital part of the 75 million program invalued larger and better Sunday schools. Five years ago there were 2,094 Sunday schools with a membership of 213,755. This is a gain of 75 schools and 73,048 members. During the time we have had 96,367 baptisms with a net gain of 55,006 in church membership.

We, therefore, recommend teacher training in our Sunday schools. We also recommend that the pastors urge their churches to take more interest in the Sunday school convention that is held twice a year in the Surry Association.
