Business Leader Has Heart Attack

Funeral services for Wayne Ronald Boyles, Sr., a leading bus-iness and civic leader of Mount Airy, were held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday at First Baptist Church. Rev. Preston Taylor and Rev. D. D. Hodges officiated and burial was in Oakdale Cemetery.

Pallbearers were W. L. Glancy, R. Posey Jones, John Frank, George K. Snow, H. P. Mills and Marty Thomas.

Mr. Boyles, 54, of 630 Willow Street, died about 1:30 p. m. Sunday in an ambulance while en route to Baptist Hospital in Winstor-Salem. He suffered a heart attack while playing golf at the Mount Airy Country Club course and was given first aid at the home of Dr. Renzo Sutter near the golf course.

Attending the funeral service in a body was the Mount Airy Lions Club, of which Mr. Boyles was a charter member and past president. He was also active in other civic and business groups,

A merchant for many years, he was co-owner with his brother, Ralph Boyles, of the Boyles Shoe Store on North Main Street.

He was a member of the First He was a member of the First Baptist Church, Mount Airy Country Club, Granite City Mas-onic Lodge, Surry Shrine Club, a director of the Surry County Loan and Trust Company and member and past president of the Mount Airy Merchants Associa-tion tion.

Local stores were closed from 10:15 a. m. to 11 a. m. Tues-day in honor of Mr. Boyles. Born March 15, 1902, in Sur-ry County, he was a son of Sam E. and Minnie Hawks Boyles of Mount Airy, Rt. 3. Such was not the case over the week end.

The Grim Reaper descended, claiming one of Mount Airy's betterknown and most popular citizens, and one of the Granite City's most successful Businessmen Sunday afternoon.

Wayne R. Boyles, one of the proprietors of Boyles Shoe Store, North Main Street, died enroute to a Winston-Salem hospital. He became ill at the local Country Club early in the afternoon and was taken to a physician.

Mr. Boyles' hosts of friends and business associates and acquaintances were shocked when they learned the news of his passing later in the afternoon. It seemed difficult, if not impossible, to believe that their friend could not now be living, especially when many had seen him only a few short hours earlier.

Mount Airy will sorely miss this business and civic leader. In addition to his business activities with Boyles Shoe Store, he was active in civic and fraternal organizations, in his church and in the community. The absence of such an individual leaves a deep mark.

Past president of the Mount Airy Merchants Association, past president of the Mount Airy Lions Club, a member of the Mount Airy Country Club, a member of the Granite City's Masonic organization, Surry Shrine club member, a member of the board of directors of the Surry County Loan and Trust Company, and a member of the First Baptist \overline{Church} : his participation and guidance in all these organizations will be greatly missed.

In a time of sudden death, it is extremely difficult to find words of comfort for the family. Perhaps their greatest solace may be drawn from the the fact that, as he lived, Wayne Boyles, as a business, church and civic leader, was an example for all.

Prominent Business Man Dies Here Sunday

Wayne Boyles Stricken While Playing Golf

One of the city's most prominent business and civic leaders died Sunday afternoon, leaving the townspeople shocked when they learned of his death.

Wayne Ronald Boyles, Sr., 54, of Willow Street, died about 1:30 p.m. in an ambulance while en route to a Winston-Salem hospital.

Mr. Boyles, co-partner with his brother, Ralph Boyles, of the Boyles Shoe Store on Main Street, was stricken with a heart attack while playing golf on the Mount Airy Country Club course.

He had just started his golf game about 1 p.m. Sunday, and had commented to others that he was suffering with indigestion. Shortly afterwards he was taken to a doctor, but passed away before he could reach a hospital.

Merchant Leader

Mr. Boyles was one of the city's leaders in merchant activities. He was president of the Mount Airy Merchants Association in 1950 and also served as director of the organization since.

He supported all activities which were sponsored by local merchants and civic groups.

Bank Director

Among his many business enterprises, he was a member of the board of directors of the Surry County Loan and Trust Company and devoted much of his time in the interest of the bank's advancement, and its service to the public.

His civic friends elected him president of the Mount Airy Lions Club and he also served on the board of directors of the club. He returned three weeks ago after attending the Lions Club convention in Miami, Florida, having taken his wife and two of his daughters along on the trip.

ters along on the trip. Mr. Boyles was a member of Granite City Masonic Lodge, Surry Shrine Club and the First Baptist Church, where he attended services Sunday morning before death in the afternoon.

The stores of this city will close Tuesday from 10:15 to 11 a.m. as a mark of respect for the memory of Mr. Boyles. Funeral services will be held


