#### Israel's Ark of God

In the gold-covered wooden holy box (frequently called the ark of the covenant) were the two stone tablets, Moses' robes and staff, and Aaron's turban. On top—the mercy seat—crouched two gold cherubim (angels with the body of a lion for strength, the eyes of an eagle for sharp vision, the legs of an ox for submission, and the head of a man for humanity). The ark was sometimes called the ark of testimony, because it testified to the character and will of God. See Exodus 25:10-22 for a full description of the ark.



Shoals United Methodist Church was founded about 1880, and today, 104 years later, the church has 56 active members.

The pastor is the Rev. Jack Danley, a native of Surry County, who has been with the church for three years and four months.

Before moving into their present church in 1904, the members of the congrega-tion met in an old log structure, which had candle holders by each window. The entire church was lighted by candles.

After the church moved to the present building, the former church was sold to a farmer who moved the logs to his farm and made a feed barn out of them.

The biggest events in the history of the church include the building of the new building in 1903-04, the building of the new Sunday School ing of new Sunday School rooms in 1940, the remodeling of the church in 1964, and the renovation of the church in 1983-84.

# **Shoals Methodist Celebrates 120 Years**

On Oct. 29, the Shoals United Methodist Church will be celebrating a rich 120-year history with Heritage Day, a day of worship, food, song, fellowship, and reflection.

"We wanted to do something to recognize our past," said church member Vickie Westmoreland. "And after we got started we found out so much and about so many people who've been involved in our church through the years."

Westmoreland joined Cindy Hauser, Cathy Hunt, and Donna Shew to form a committee which has researched and organized the day, talking to countless Shoals residents while

"The research has been exciting for all of us," Westmoreland said, "and certainly enjoyable. Now we're looking forward to Heritage Day."

The day will begin at 8:00 am with the ringing of the church bell by Jack Westmoreland. At 79, he is the church's oldest member and has proved a valuable source of information about days past. Jack Westmoreland and his father, Joe Westmoreland, were among several who have rung the bell in years past.

Everyone will be welcome as the church's young adult class begins the morning by serving breakfast.

After breakfast and until the begin-

gathering old photos and written infor- ning of Sunday School at 9:45, members and visitors will be invited to view the photos and other items depicting much of the church's history on display throughout the church. An 11:00 am worship service will include the sharing of stories, songs, and memories from members and family representatives.

> Services will be followed by a 1:00 covered dish lunch to be served, weather permitting, on the grounds. The meal and fellowship will be followed by a 3:00 "old time" singing. An evening meal, beginning at 5:30, will consist of a chicken stew supper provided by the church.

> The day will conclude with the church's traditional "Fifth Sunday

Night Singing". "Closer Walk", a men's group from Fairview Baptist Church, will be performing.

"The planning committee wants to especially invite all who share in our heritage to come and be a part of any or all of the day's activities," Vickie Westmoreland said. "The history of this church is an important part of the history of our community."

"All of the churches in this area are close," Westmoreland added, "and all have a strong commitment to the community. Our church is like a big family. If there's a need, you don't have to ask. If it's known, someone will be there to help. All of our churches are giving churches with people who take care of each other."

The original Shoals Methodist Church was built around 1880, operating as a mission of the Mt. Zion Methodist Church. The original structure, built of logs and lighted by candle, was located on Shoals Road where the newest part of the Shoals Baptist Church cemetery now rests.

Throughout their histories, Shoals Methodist and Shoals Baptist churches shared an especially close relationship. Members often attend services at their fellow church and many Christian traditions have been shared.

"Each year," Westmoreland said, "we meet on the fourth Sunday in June at Shoals Baptist to share our homecoming services. Both congregations

attend revivals held at either church and we share a Bible School program. We're close friends who have shared a bond over the years."

"Many of the stories we've heard have mentioned the relationship between churches," Westmoreland continued. "We heard of one family who had 12 kids. The father would take six to one church while the mother would take six to the other church."

The property for the Shoals Methodist Cemetery was purchased in March of 1901, across the road from the old log church. But as Shoals Methodist Church continued to outgrow its original building, a decision

was made to move to the church's present location one fourth of a mile down Shoals Road. The deed for one acre of property was purchased from Basil E. Moser and recorded on April 5, 1904. The new church, a frame structure consisting of one large room, was built during 1903-1904.

Over the years, other projects have added considerably to the structure. Sunday School rooms were added in 1941 and again in 1986. A 1964 remodeling program featured the lowering of the sanctuary ceiling while modern stained-glass windows replaced older ones. New pulpit furniture and fixtures were also donated. A small vestibule was added in 1971 while new up-

holstered pews were introduced in 1984. A 1986 building project also saw the addition of rest room facilities and a Fellowship Hall. A new granite sign was erected in January of 1990.

"As we reflect on the great faith of our forefathers and founders," Westmoreland said, "our church family wishes to extend an invitation of welcome to all on Sunday, October 29th. It will be a day of remembrance and reflection as we make a commitment to continue our Christian mission in the local community and around the world."

# Shoals **UMC** to present 'The Giving'

PINNACLE - The congre-Shoals of United Methodist Church will be providing its own Christmas gift to local residents this Sunday evening with its presentation of "The Giving," an original one-act play written by Jere Cunningham and presented as a joint effort of the entire church.

The cast for the play will be made up completely of residents from the Shoals community. Cunningham noted that cast members have exhibited a "total commitment" to the project along with a level of talent that he describes as reaching heights that are "better than I've seen on movie sets.

Cunningham, a 25-year Los Angeles resident, has written numerous novels, major motion picture screenplays and television scripts during a distinguished career. He and his wife, Victoria, moved into the Shoals community on Valentine's Day, 2008, after a lengthy search for the ideal home.

They have since restored the more than 100-year-old Maude Truelove house near the end of Shoals Road in what Cunningham affectionately describes as

"the Deep Shoals community."

"We knew we wanted a home in the Blue Ridge Mountains," Cunningham said. "And the deeper into Shoals we came, the more we knew this was where we wanted to be. It's the sweet spot of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

After moving in, however, the couple discovered what they now view as an even greater asset. In their neighbors and the surrounding community, they discovered a warmth and caring attitude unlike any they had previously experienced.

Its production has been a joint effort of the entire congregation of the small church. The free presentation will begin at 7 p.m. with no one admitted after the play has begun.

Several of those neighbors have provided the inspiration for the characters in Sunday evening's play. According to Cunningham, the intense script will have those characters struggling with faith, doubt and perseverance in the face of personal crisis while facing their own limitations imposed by "the frailties of being human."

"We are incredibly fortunate to have several gifted actors among our congregation," he noted. "Really, you have to see and feel the emotional depth of their characters to understand what I mean. They have sacrificed huge chunks of personal and family time. I certainly didn't expect the sincere portrayals, the honest emotion and the level of power that they bring to the play. It is rare to participate in such an intense group of talent. And over the years, I have seen many professional actors at work.

That work and dedication, Cunningham said, has resulted "world-class performance," that should provide an intense, intimate experience for both cast and audience alike.

Cunningham credited the Rev. Arthur Livengood and his

message on the true meaning of Christmas with providing in-spiration for the play's theme. The play has been dedicated to Livengood, whose messages Cunningham described as being filled with "depth, power and sincerity, like a father speaking from his soul.

No admission will be charged, but, as seating is limited, an early arrival is recommended for the 7 p.m. showing. Due to the play's intensi-ty, no one will be admitted after the performance begins. Afterwards, refreshments will be served for all in attendance.

"On Dec. 13, when the play is finished and the hour is passed," Cunningham said, we hope to have become closer with each and every one of our audience. We want our guests to share the insights and emotions we ourselves have felt, together, while staging and rehearsing our play.

"And we hope most of all," he continued, "that the true meaning of Christmas, as inspired in us by Reverend Livengood, will never be forgotten by all who came

(The following facts concerning Mt. Zion Methodist Protestant Church were published in our record, later changed to Methodist Protestant Herald, June 23, 1898. The editor said that the facts were furnished mainly by W. N. Brown and wife.)

"This Church is in Stokes County. It was started in the early sixties by a few persons meeting and fixing up a brush arbor, with slabs on logs for seats. Rev. I.N. Hunt preached here for a year or two as an unstationed preacher. Later on it was taken in as a regular appointment on the Forsyth Circuit and a small class organized, consisting mostly of a few women and boys. In 1867 this little band, by the aid of friends and neighbors, built a log house. This church was served for a few years by Brothers R. W. Pegram, A. J. Laughlin, H. W. Peables and Alson Gray. Brother Hunt is still living; the others have passed over to the land of rest. This church was formerly known as County Line, it being located nearly on the line between Stokes and Surry Counties. In 1880 the log house gave place to the present Church, a house 36 x 48 feet, well lighted, furnished with organ, and painted inside and out and will seat 300 people. The present membership is 216.

Still later on (date not known) this church was made the nucleus of a mission, known as Surry Mission, out of which have grown four other Churches, viz. Union Chapel, Pilot, Poplar Springs and Moser's Chapel, and two others on the way, viz. Hill's Grove, enclosed (now at a standstill in the midst of confusion) and the church at Pinnacle Station. This Mt. Zion Church, by the blessings of God, has been vital power in the work of Salvation as committed to the M.P. Church in all this region, and still has a great mission before it.

The intention is to have the Pinnacle Church enclosed and well on the way to completion by the next Annual Conference. It is an important enterprise."



## A Thrilling Story of a Baptist Circuit Rider

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following story by Paul Mathis of Boonville is a thrilling testimony to those stalwart Baptist preachers of another generation. The Charity Church recently honored its founder in special services. A pastor's study was built and furnished in memory of Mr. Coram.)

Robert P. Coram, founder and first pastor of Charity Church, Boonville, was born in 1860. His father, Paton Coram, was a drummer boy in the War between the States. Following the war, Paton Coram came to Yadkin County with his wife and young family from Rockingham to make a new home. From this home in Yadkin grew young Bob Coram.

Bob Coram, as a teen-ager walking along a dusty road, found his Lord. A school teacher had been praying for his students by name and after having heard his name called in prayer, young Bob knew he must do something about his relationship to God. Later, on a lonely road, the Spirit came upon him and,

dropping to his knees, the boy dedicated his life to God. From then until the moment he met his Saviour through death he lived a life of faithful service.

Pastor Coram, as he was later called by the many people whom he served, was ordained to the ministry in 1896. It was at the turn of the century that Charity Baptist Church was organized with him as its pastor. It was also near this time that Pastor Coram began serving other churches in Yadkin, Surry, Stokes, Wilkes, and Davie counties. It was from his service to the many churches of this area that he became one of the best known and best loved of circuit-riding preachers in this section of North Carolina.

#### Faced Hardships

As a circuit rider, he faced the many hardships that nature often sends her children. Zero temperatures, frozen rivers, blinding snow, spring floods and a dozen other hazards were a threat to his loyalty in service. And yet, week after week, year after year, he made his

rounds faithfully. At first, he went by horseback. Later a two-wheeled cart was used for the hard winter season. The years brought larger opportunities and a buggy to help fulfill them.

Then came one of the great moments of his life. Many of his churches, including Ben Shoals, Friendship, Union Grove and Charity, shared together in buying him a car, a tribute of which he felt unworthy and yet one which he deeply appreciated.

There were times during the revival season that Mr. Coram would be away from his family for 10 weeks at a time, only occasionally stopping by for a change of clothes and a night of rest. He was never too busy or too tired to visit the sick or help any way that help was needed. With humility and truth, he spoke of himself as a preacher of the "Old Time Gospel." His religion was one of feeling and conviction.

#### Warm, Friendly Humor

The stern-faced man of the pulpit was gifted with a warm and friendly humor. One of his greatest pleasures was to spread joy and laughter wherever he went. He lived for the purpose of spreading happiness as it is found through new life.

The long hard years demanded much strength and courage. And at last he had given so much of himself that he was compelled to lay down his saddle bags and leave the pulpit which he loved. In 1935 he retired, bringing to a close a preaching ministry which lasted better than 43 years. Above 40 of these years were spent in active service to Charity Church. Today in the cemetery at Charity the tall stone which marks his grave also marks the spot where stood the pulpit in the old log school house where Charity Church was born.



"Many church members are like the farmer's well. It had only two faults: froze up in wintertime and dried up in the summertime."





Rev. J. L. Powers has been an important figure in the personnel of Chatham Manufacturing Company at Elkin for the past 22 years. He received his first experience in the Mayodan mills and was a foreman at the age of 18 years. He went to Elkin as foreman of carding and spinning, making cottonwarp for blankets. He is a native of Stokes county and has been active in religious affairs during his long residence at Elkin. He served as superintendent of the First Baptist Church Sunday school for 10 years. Powers was or-dained a minister of the Baptist Church several years ago and is now pastor of three churches: East Elkin, Mountain View in Yadkin county, and Bean Shoals in Surry county. Since he entered th ministry, he has been called to conduct more funerals, perhaps, that any other minister in that section. He conducted nine funerals within two weeks at one time. He seldom refuses such a call, regardless of the condition of the rural roads, and has more than once undergon the condition of the rural roads, and has more than once undergone the experience of wading through deep mud to reach the scene where a vehicle was unable to operate. 

The King James or Authorized Version of the Bible was first printed in 1611.

The first Bible printed in this country was in the Indian language in 1663.

The first English Bible printed in this country was in 1782.

#### MOSER

A great many people around Shoals are related to either the Mosers, Scotts or Hausers and a number are related to all three as is the case of Gurney O. Kiger.

Trying to catalog the host of Mosers who came from around Stokes County is almost impossible. The immigrant LEDNARD MOSER, b. abt 1721; d. July 17, 1782 in Surry Co., N. C. He came to N. C. from Manakosy, Md. abt 1775. The Moravian Diary of July 22, 1773 records, "The elderly (Leonard) Moser from Mamakosy, Md. and his Brother (Peter) who lives in Stinking Water, came with Adam Spach. They were very friendly and said they were minded to select land in Wachovia and settle Here." And he did for on the day of his funeral July 18, 1782 in the Bethania Diary is this record, "I rode to Moser's where at the request of his wife and children, I held the funeral of the older (Leonard) Moser. Although a large number had gathered, partly English and partly German, all was quiet and orderly."

CLARK MOSER, b. abt 1780 is buried in "Old Dutch Meeting House" cemetery at Rural Hall. Little is known of him other than he had at least 5 children:

Mary Elizabeth (Polly) Moser (# 1) married Simon Kiger and became the ancestress of Henry Edward Kiger

John Henry Moser (#2) and wife Elizabeth Carmichael were ancestors of Aurelius Moser through the son E. A. Moser who married Mary A. Kiger; and were ancestors also of Rhonda & Early H. Moser and others who were children of Basil E. Moser and wife Theoremsophe Z. Hauser.

Elizabeth Carmichael Moser gave the land for the Methodist cemetery altho it has been enlarged since that time.

There are many others - too numerous to mention here - who claim descent from these old settlers.

#### HAUSER

Martinus (Martin) Hauser Was born November 11, 1696 in Reichenweyr, Montbeliard District, then a part of the German Confederacy of Wurttemberg - later France. He was the son of Hans Georg Hauser and wife Susannah Burkhart of Reichenweyr. Martin Hauser died June 12, 1761 at Bethania, N. C. He was a carpenter by trade.

In 1721 Martin Hauser married Maria Margaretha Schaefer, daughter of Johan Michael Schaefer and wife Maria Barbara Geiger of Lampertsloch, Alsace.

Maria Margaretha Hauser was born October 3, 1702 at Lamperts loch and died January 12, 1775 in Bethania, N. C.

Martin Hauser and wife came to America in 1726 on board the ship "Molly" landing in Pennsylvania where they lived on the Guschehope with her mother who had preceded them to America with a second husband. The mother soon died and they moved to Conawaga, south of the Susquehannah River. In 1753 they moved to N. C. arriving a few weeks before the first company of Moravians. They settled on the Yadkin River. They learned to know the Moravians through having grain ground at the Bethabara Mill, During times of trouble with the Indians they repeatedly refugeed at Bethabara which had been surrounded with a stockade. Martin and several of his sons decided to live among the Moravians so they built a second Moravian town, three miles from Bethabara, the place receiving the name Bethania. Thither moved Martin Hauser, his wife and four of his sons in 1759.

Herman O. Brown of Shoals is descended from Georg Peter Hauser.



- Contractor, Mike Marion, has provided an estimate for replacement of the building structure, only. His estimate was \$375,000. This does not include any contents.

# Fire destroys church, not spirit

MORGAN WALL STAFF REPORTER

SHOALS — An early morning blaze has left a congregation without a building for today's worship service.

Shoals United Methodist Church caught fire in a classrooms and office area in the back of the building before it spread to the sanctuary, eventually engulfing the entire building by the time firefighters arrived on the scene.

Shoals Volunteer Fire Department responded at 2:23 a.m. Saturday and spent more than two hours trying to contain the blaze in order to prevent it from spreading to a neighboring house.

"Around 2:30 this morning it caught on fire and this is what's left," said Adrian Wall, chief of the Shoals VFD, gesturing to

the ruins of the structure. "It started over in the classroom and office area and spread quickly from back to front. When I got the truck here, it was burning

everywhere but the porch. Moser, Juanita lives across the street from the church, called in the blaze. She had gotten up to go to the bathroom and noticed it was bright outside her window. Upon closer investigation, she saw that the end of the church was on fire.

"It's just hard to look there and believe what has gone on," she said Saturday morning. "It's a lot of memories. We can build a building, but the memories we have there will never be in another church."

Moser and a majority of the congregation of the church gathered in a field across the street around 3 a.m. to watch as firefighters from Shoals, Pilot Knob, Pinnacle, South Surry, Fall Creek, Franklin and Old Richmond volunteer fire departments and King Fire Department worked for around six hours to extinguish the fire.

'We got a phone call and came out. When we got down here it was gone," said Mary Marshall, a

member of the church. You hear about things like this on the news, but it's different when it hits home. You just keep telling yourself it's just a building and everybody's safe.'

Joseph Fulk just started as the preacher of the church on July 1. He will hold his first service this morning at 11 a.m. in the field across the street from the church.

"He met most of his congregation for the first time out in the dark in the field. Most of us had on our bed clothes," said Mar-

"It felt like a death call. We live a good 10 minutes or so away and it felt like 30 minutes," Fulk said of the drive to the church in the wee hours of the morning. "The church folks had gathered and we had a prayer together and we shared together.

The church would be 110 years old this year and community planned renovations to build on a choir loft and add to the fellowship hall. Workers were two weeks into the new construction. The age of the building helped the blaze to spread quickly because the timbers were dried out.

Despite everything, members of the congregation are ready and willing to move forward, saying

they will rebuild the

"We're a farming community and the people are very resilient. We don't like change but we deal with it," said Marshall. "We are going to rebuild."

"We've got a lot to be thankful for," said Moser.

"It's something they can fix. Reflecting back, it's one of those things with the Lord's guidance and help we'll come back. The Lord'll provide," said Fulk.

As the members begin the process of rebuilding, they will hopefully have relics from the church to take with them. Firefighters were able to recover the church's bell and also found the cross from the communion table and one of the candles. Firefighters also pages from a Bible that were burned around the edges but not in the middle which they gave to Moser who plans to try to preserve There was also a fire-

safe filing cabinet which

seemed to be intact though they had not yet looked inside. The cabinet contains information on the church's history. When church members began cleaning out the church in preparation for the renovations, they stored materials, including a collection of old hymnals in a trailer across the street. The congregation will make use of those hymnals during this morning's service. Rev. Sam Moore, the district superintendent for the region, will be at the service as well.

The fire marshal and a representative of the State Bureau of Investigation were on the scene Saturday morning but had no information at the time.

"I'm not really sure of the cause yet," said Wall. "I just want to thank all the departments that responded for their help.'

# Shoals United Methodist destroyed in Saturday morning fire

By Dean Palmer Staff Writer

PINNACLE — An early morning fire burned Shoals United Methodist Church Saturday, destroying the century-old building and briefly leaving its congregation without a place to meet. But in the following hours, the close-knit community responded to its neighbors in need and by Sunday morning a nearby temporary meeting place had been found.

The fire was first noticed shortly after 2 a.m. by Juanita Moser, a nearby neighbor who attends the church. She had awoken to find the night brighter than normal. Looking outside, she discovered that the back of the church was on fire.

According to Shoals Volunteer Fire Department Chief Adrian Wall, his department received the call at 2:23. Wall, who lives in the vicinity, went directly to the church and was on the scene by about 2:27.

"At first," he described,
"it was a small fire. But in about two minutes, it was fully involved. Once it

# Shoals Methodist congregation finds comfort in early morning gathering

PINNACLE — It was a time of dark despair for members of Shoals United Methodist Church Saturday morning as they gathered in an open field across from the burning church and watched as firefighters fought a losing battle to save their sanctuary.

But as darkness gradually gave way to light, members reached out to each other and to God and were able to find hope in the midst of their hurt as well as inspiration in the prayers of a pastor who many did not yet know.

In the early morning hours of Saturday, as flames began to engulf the Shoals Methodist sanctuary, word of the tragedy spread like fire among the congregation. Members quickly began to arrive at the scene, some carrying sleeping children, others still in their own bedclothes.

Fresh tears were shed as new families and individuals arrived and hugs were shared. Within an hour, members of virtually every family in the church were on hand.

"We'd lost memories," Jason Hicks explained. "It was a landmark. Nobody in this community can remember a time when that lot was empty."

In their pain, members turned to a new face among them. The following day was to be Joseph Fulk's first day as pastor of Shoals, Pilot View and Whitaker Chapel United Methodist churches. Although he does have family in the area, Fulk had not yet had the opportunity to meet many in his new congregations.

"I got the call a little before 3," Fulk remembered. "It was like getting a death call. It took a few seconds to take in the reality of what was happening."

When he arrived at the scene, Fulk found members gathered together along with others in the community who had come out in support of their neighbors.

"There was a community of people standing close," Fulk recalled. "God's word speaks of a community of believers and I saw that, along with others who were reaching out to them. I saw the larger body of Christ. It was a community in action and it was amazing to see.

"I think the Lord is pleased with the way they came together," he continued. "I believe God is in this place and in the people's hearts. They're a strong, solid people."

What followed was a moment of healing, a shared time that impacted all present in a powerful way.

"We gathered in a circle," remembered Vickie Westmoreland, a lifetime member of the congregation, "and we held hands. We said a prayer, led by our new preacher. Before, we had said that our church was gone. But we realized our church wasn't gone. We were the church, and we were still here. It was unspoken, but we knew we'd be right back here."

"I knew they were hurt," Fulk said. "They'd lost a lot of memories — funerals, weddings, worship and other happenings. They'd lost the building, but the church was intact in its people. They were very fortunate that no one had been hurt.

"If we put our hope and trust in the Lord," Fulk continued, "we'll come out stronger. We'll be alright"

"We knew we still had each other," Mary Marshall said, "When we joined hands, you could feel the love and the strength to go on."

Afterwards, many lingered, sharing memories as the sun came up. The hurt remained, but it had been joined by the hope of a new day.

reached the sanctuary, we were fighting a losing bat-

"I looked out and saw a fire in the back," noted Vickie Westmoreland, a lifelong church member who lives beside the location. "I said to myself that the sanctuary was going to be OK. But by the time I got outside, it was burn-ing. It was unbelievable how fast it went."

Wall noted that the historic sanctuary was made from long-dried wood that burned quickly with an intense heat. In all, he said, nine area departments re-sponded to the scene. Firefighters battled the blaze for 2 1/2 hours before getting it under con-

Both the N.C. State Bureau of Investigation and Surry County Fire Marshal's office were on the scene Saturday morning and the investigation is continuing as a cause is sought. Arson is not suspected. Area residents are asked to stay outside taped lines at the site as a safety and preservation precaution.

Throughout the day Saturday, Shoals residents and other churches contacted members with support and offers of help. By Sunday morning, a res-olute congregation was olute congregation was ready to begin a meeting in a shaded grove across from their burned sanctu-

After opening with a mn, "The Church is hymn, One Foundation," members were called into a meeting to discuss the church's immediate future. Greg Sawyers' initial question of "Do we continue?" was met with an emphatic "Yes!" Church

of unanimous support continuing to worship as a

congregation.

Members then relayed numerous offerings of a place to meet from other Shoals area churches as well as from the Shoals Ruritan Club. In the end, members decided to stay as close to the location as possible by meeting in the Baptist Shoals nearby Church fellowship hall. The location will be used for the next two months before reevaluation.

"We wanted to be close to home," West-

moreland explained. The move is a natural one given the long history of shared worship between the two churches. The previous Sunday, after a groundbreaking service for renovations at Shoals Methodist, members of both churches had gathered at Shoals Baptist for an annual shared homecoming service. Earlier this summer, the congregations also had shared a Vacation Bible School program.

"It's unusual," noted Shoals Baptist Pastor noted Tommy Martin of the relationship between the two churches. "It's something I had never experi-enced before coming here. It's been an exciting eye-opener for me that denominations can come together and worship like

that.

"Everyone is heartbro-ken," he said of the fire. "But in time, God will heal and their church will move on to bigger and better things."

## Fire stuns Surry flock

Congregation is displaced after church burns

SHOALS

The Rev. Joseph Fulk was supposed to stand in the pulpit for the first time today as pastor of Shoals United Methodist Church, a fixture in this rural Surry County community since the turn of the 20th century.

Instead, as the church's ruins still smoldered last night, congregation members made plans for the new pastor to lead worship this morning from a makeshift pulpit set up under a small grove of trees across the road.

The sanctuary of Shoals United Methodist Church was destroyed in a fire yesterday morning. Flames were shooting from the roof when firefighters arrived. The vestibule, with its twin columns, was about all that remained standing.

The church was formed about a half-mile up the road in the

late 1800s, where the cemetery remains with its view of Pilot Mountain. The current wood-frame church building was dedicated at the new site in 1904, and additions came later. Last Sunday, they broke ground for a new choir loft, and took lots of photographs.

"No one thought those would be the last pictures of that sanctuary," said church member Lorrie Sawyers, 43, who has been in the church since she was born.

"That building has been a constant in my life," she said. "It's where I grew up. It's where I got married. My grandparents — their funerals were here."

The 911 call came in at 2:23 a.m. yesterday from Juanita Moser, a church member who lives across the street. She happened to wake up and looked out the window and saw light.

Surry County Fire Marshal Doug James said that the church was burning so intensely that there was nothing that could save it. Flames were so hot that firefighters wet down an adjacent house to try to keep it from burning.

Its vinyl siding and shutters melted, but the house was saved.


"They did keep that house from burning," James said. "Just a few more minutes, and it would have been on fire."

That house is the home of a church member, Vickie Westmoreland. Charred pages of the Bible were airing out on her front porch yesterday, including this passage from Job: "God is wise in heart and mighty in strength."

The fire that destroyed the church started in the attic area and

appears to be accidental, James said. Investigators are still working to determine the cause.

About 35 to 40 church members worship here on a typical Sunday, although the Fifth Sunday-night sing and other special gatherings may pack the church with more than 100 people.

Word quickly spread in the predawn hours yesterday, and most of the church members gathered with their new pastor in a field across the road.

"He was there in the middle of the night last night and gathered us all around and prayed with us," said church member Victoria Cunningham. She's a harpist, and her music stand will be the pulpittoday.

The church will gather in the yard of the home she shares with her husband, Jere.

They had just moved here after their honeymoon 2½ years ago, when Ann Moser, the choir director, and Moser's mother-in-law Juanita and daughter Alicia all arrived with a coconut custard pie.

"That was just the first vanguard," she said. "Church ladies kept coming and coming,"

Sawyers said they don't know where they will worship after today.

"It won't be in the same building," she said, " but it will be the same church."

## Shoals UMC still has plans to rebuild

In the fire **PINNACLE** the three weeks since the that destroyed Shoals United Methodist Church, the congregation has found a new home while waiting for the OK to begin the re

building process.

Church members have every intention of rebuilding the structure that would have been 110 this year before it was destroyed by an early-morning blaze July 3. They are anxiously awaiting the investigation into the cause of the fire to be concluded and the insurance company to gather all of its information.

"There's not really much going on right now. We're having to sit still and let all the investigations wrap up and take place, said Joseph Fulk, the pastor of the church who preached his first sermon in the field across the road from the church the day after the blaze. "We have all inten-tions of building it back. But we need to have a little more information ourselves before we can do so.

"Just as soon as the in-surance turns it loose, we're going to start again," said Juanita Moser, who lives across the street from the church and first report-

ed the blaze. In the meantime, the congregation has started meeting in the fellowship hall of Shoals Baptist Church, which sits just up the road from Shoals Unit-ed Methodist. They are still having Sunday school at 9:45 a.m. and worship service at 11 a.m. and plan on being in that building for at least a couple of months.

"They've been really good about it," said Moser of Shoals Baptist allowing them to use the fellowship hall. "They meet upstairs and we meet downstairs.

According to Fulk, the two churches have a long history of working together for the betterment of community. They homecoming together each year as well as Vacation Bible School He said that having a church that is of a different denomination be willing to work so closely is proof of a unique history between the two. When preachers still visited the area in circuits, meaning they were only at a church one or two weeks a month, it worked out that Shoals United Methodist and Shoals Baptist had preachers on different weeks. On the off weeks they would weeks they would go to each others' churches to hear a message.

"These churches have a long history together. There's a lot of inter-marrying between families and a lot of the people have lived around each other for generations," he said. "It speaks volumes in itself. This is what Christians need to look more towards. There is one Lord, Jesus Christ, who is our core."

Fulk also said that other churches in the community and across the state have continued to send cards with thoughts and prayers as well as donations of

money and hymnals.

"We greatly appreciate people's thoughts and prayers and other donations."

Having lost building to fire, congregation holds outdoor service, plans for future

SHOALS bout 50 souls gathered yesterday under a canopy of trees with the burned hulk of their church in the background and only the sound of birds to accompany their hymns.

Pastor Joseph Fulk, who was to have celebrated his first service at Shoals United Methodist Church, instead preached in front of a makeshift altar that held some of the remnants rescued rom the church — a candlestick and sold cross. The church was all but destroyed in a fire that started in the attic early Saturday and appeared to be accidental.

"I know today's a little bit unusual," he said, as he began the service. "We're a little bruised, a little sore, a little shaken. We may even feel a little beaten."

He reminded the congregation,

many of whom had come from neighboring churches to grieve with the church's members, that although they had lost the building, they hadn't lost the memories that went with it. He

asked them to share special memories of the church.

Pam Stowers called the congregation

"a tiny nation," where people supported, loved and prayed for each other.

"The building was a place where I could come and feel refreshed when I left," she said.

Throughout the morning, church members spoke of the strength and fellowship of the community. Though the church started in the late 1800s and many of its members have roots sunk deep in the area, it was the type of church that welcomed newcomers with gifts of baskets and pies. Victoria Cunningham,

who had moved to the area with her husband Jere, 21/2 years ago, said that she had felt welcomed from the moment they arrived.

Before the service started, Dolly Hauser, 79, said that she had been a church member since 1941 and had started attending in 1935.

"I was married here in 1951. The church was full that day," she said. "My husband was what you'd call a cornerstone of the church. He taught Sunday school here 50 years. He died six years ago. His service was here. I had planned to do the same."

Yesterday, Hauser and other members of the small congregation talked about how they would go forward, where they would worship and even if they would rebuild. In a business meeting that preceded the regular service, church members shared memories, hopes, tears and even a few laughs when someone said that

they would like the church to be rebuilt exactly as it was, minus the groovy 1970s green carpet.

Greg Sawyers, the chairman of the church's administrative board, asked members if they wanted to carry on.

"Absolutely," the congregation shouted.

Several area churches and a community group had offered Shoals members the use of their buildings for worship.

What an amazing problem to have, that we have so many options, Sawyers said.

Church members voted to accept an offer from Shoals Baptist Church.

Sawyers said that, with the church's new minister, he had seen a lot of positive energy developing around the church.

Eddie Brown, 66, said that he had been a member of the church since 1963, and that his grandfather helped organize the church. Brown was among several people who said that he had felt the church, which has about 50 active members, was stronger than it had been in a long time.

There are choir practices, Bible study and Sunday school.

"When someone moves into the community, we feel like we need to be good neighbors, he said, "and that's what we've always done.

Fulk said that he had served Shoals for four years as a student and that he had looked forward to celebrating with the congregation for the first time as their pastor.

He was encouraged in the wake of the fire, Fulk said, by the outpouring of community spirit he witnessed not just among church members but among the different firefighters who came and the community members who expressed concern and offered the use of their buildings.

He reminded congregants that they were celebrating Independence Day, and he asked them to think about what would have happened if the colonies hadn't hung together. "This is a new direction. It's a time to grow," he said. "It's a time to lean on each other."

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
