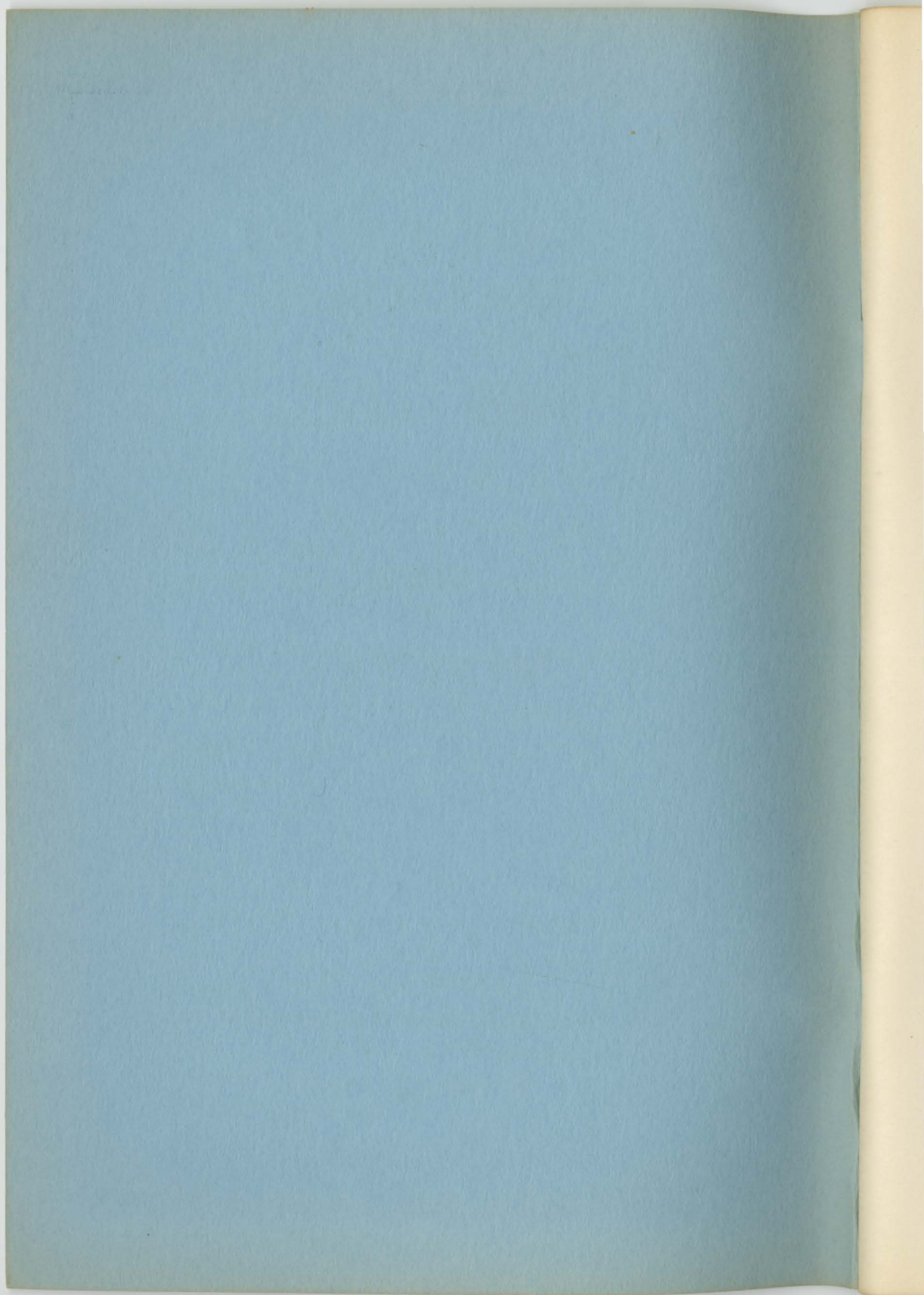

CONSTITUTION

Article I. Name and Membership

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Surry Baptist Association.

Section 2. Membership in the Association shall be composed of the Association's Officers, ministers who are pastors of churches affiliated therewith, and messengers elected by affiliated churches.

Section 3. Churches of fifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers in addition to the pastor. One additional messenger shall be allowed for each additional fifty members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall have more than ten messengers.

Section 4. Baptist churches affiliated with the Surry Baptist Association shall be expected to support through prayers and gifts the Surry Associational and Southern Baptist causes at home and abroad.

Such co-operating churches will be considered as being in good standing.

Article II. Purpose

Section 1. The purpose of this Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the churches within our bounds, and to promote and develop their energies in advancing God's Kingdom throughout the earth in compliance with the teachings of the New Testament and in co-operation with the State and Southern Baptist Convention.

Article III. Annual Church Letters

Section 1. The churches shall report annually not only the statistical information but any facts concerning the general welfare. The clerk shall furnish each church with printed forms for their annual report at least six weeks before the annual meeting of the Association, and the churches are requested to have these reports returned to the Clerk at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Association.

Article IV. Officers and Their Duties

Section 1. The Officers of the body shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Missionary, and the heads of the organizations as set forth in Article IV, Section 6.

Section 2. The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside over all sessions of the Association and the Promotion Committee. The Moderator shall be a fraternal visitor to the churches throughout the year. He shall be elected for one year and shall not succeed himself after the second consecutive year.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the request of

or in the absence of the Moderator at the meetings of the Association and the Promotion Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body, furnish the churches with the blank letter forms, supervise the printing of the minutes, and distribute them to the churches as soon after adjournment as possible. He shall also serve as secretary of the Promotion Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds of the Association, and shall disburse the same in accordance with the budget of the Association or for the purposes for which the funds were contributed. He shall render an itemized report of his receipts and disbursements to the budget committee upon request and to the Association in the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Training Union Director, the Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent, the Brotherhood President and the Vacation Bible School President shall be elected by their respective organizations according to their own methods. The names of these officers shall be furnished the Nominating Committee who shall present them to the Association for approval at the time of the election of the Officers of the Association.

Section 7. The officers shall be elected at the afternoon session of the annual (fall) meeting. They assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting at which they were elected and shall serve until the close of the next annual session.

Section 8. The Associational Missionary shall be nominated by the Missions Committee at any regular session of the Association or any regular meeting of the Promotion Committee. His election shall be by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers or members present. He shall serve until the relationship is terminated by mutual consent. He shall prepare annually a Calendar of Activities setting forth dates and places of meetings of the organized work. He shall work with the churches at their invitation and as time permits. He shall promote the whole program of the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Convention, seeking to arouse missionary interest among the churches and enlisting the churches to co-operate in the support of the cause fostered by the Association. His work shall be under the direction of the Missions Committee, and he shall have administrative supervision of such work as shall be assigned him by the Association, the Promotion Committee, or the Missions Committee.

Article V. Committees and Their Duties

Section 1. The Committees of the Association shall be: Committee on Organization and Admission of New Churches, Program, Ordination, Budget, Nominating, Trustees, Missions, Promotion (Executive), Place and Preacher, Resolutions, and Committee to nom-

inate the Nominating Committee. The Moderator and Associational Missionary shall be ex-officio members of all committees.

Section 2. The Committee on Organization and Admission of New Churches shall be elected annually and shall consist of three pastors and three deacons from churches in full fellowship with the Association.

The duties of this are set forth in the following paragraphs:

Any group of baptized believers in Christ desiring to organize themselves into a new church with the purpose of seeking the recognition of and fellowship and co-operation with this Association shall be requested to fulfill the following requirements:

A. Notice shall be given to the Moderator of the Association of the desire to organize a church before any such organization takes place. The Moderator will then instruct the Committee on Organization and Admission to visit and counsel with the group desiring to become a church and bring a report to the Promotion Committee which shall study and pass upon the need for such an organization.

B. The location of said church shall be sufficiently removed so as not to interfere with the work or encroach upon the territory of the churches already affiliated with this Association.

C. Upon being approved by the Promotion Committee the group will then request the Committee on Organization and Admission to examine the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith of the proposed church. If this committee approves the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith the group will then proceed to be constituted into a Baptist Church of the same faith and order.

D. The new church having been duly organized and constituted may at the next annual meeting of the Association, or any annual meeting thereafter, present a letter to the Association asking for recognition and seeking fellowship with the Association including with this letter a copy of the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith adopted by the body, as well as a report of the work since the time of organization as it regards all phases of our Baptist Program. The church shall be expected to have had a part in the support of the causes fostered by the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

E. The Organization and Admission Committee shall examine the letter and report of the new church and will recommend one of the following decisions.

- a. Acceptance of the church under watchcare for one year.
- b. Further consideration for action at the next annual meeting.
- c. Rejection of the request for membership.

If the church is accepted under watchcare this committee will at the end of that year recommend that the church be accepted into full fellowship provided that after examination the record of work done and co-operative spirit of the church is commendable. A two-thirds

majority vote of the messengers present shall be needed for such action. The Moderator will extend to the messengers the right hand of fellowship.

Section 3. The Program Committee shall consist of five members who shall prepare an order of business for the annual meetings. Printed copies of the suggested order of business shall be distributed to those attending the opening sessions of the Association. The chairman shall be designated by the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The Ordination Committee shall consist of five pastors. Initially one member shall be elected for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year. In each succeeding year one member shall be elected for a term of five years. When necessary others may be elected to fill vacancies of unexpired terms. Churches desiring to ordain preachers are requested to place their candidate before this committee for examination on the following principles: Christian experience or conversion, call to the ministry, educational preparation for the task, moral and spiritual fitness, doctrinal beliefs and knowledge of the Bible, attitude toward denominational work and objects, support of denominational causes, and purpose to serve.

A candidate shall be looked upon with favor for ordination who is a member of a Missionary Baptist Church and who has been called as pastor of a Missionary Baptist Church and who is in agreement with historic Baptist principles and is in harmony with our co-operative program of work.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in regularly recognized Baptist colleges and seminaries. Recommendation will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 5. The Budget Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Association and the Chairman of the Missions Committee. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman. This committee shall meet before the annual meeting of the Association and prepare a budget to cover all anticipated needs of the Association for the next annual Associational year. The committee will cause this budget to be printed and distributed to the messengers at the annual meeting. The committee will suggest a pro rata share of the budget for each church affiliated with the Association for their consideration and approval.

Section 6. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members. They shall be elected by the Association and serve from the close of the annual session in which they are elected until the close of the next annual session. This committee shall nominate all the Officers (except those specifically provided for otherwise — see Article 4, Section 6) and members of the following committees: Organization and Admission of New Churches, Program, Ordination, Trustees.

and Missions. They shall also nominate representatives for the following denominational institutions and work: Religious Literature, Evangelism, Hospital, Orphanage, Homes for the Aging, Temperance and Public Morals, Relief and Annuity, Stewardship, State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Memorials, and any other representatives that may be deemed necessary. Those selected shall be placed before the Association at the annual meeting for election. The Nominating Committee also shall present for the approval the names of those selected by the various organizations to head their work. This committee shall make nominations to fill vacancies occurring during the year at the regular meetings of the Promotion Committee.

Section 7. The Trustees shall consist of three members. The chairman shall be the member with the longest term of service as a trustee. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold in trust all property and effects of the Association, take care of and keep the same in repair, accept bequests for the Association, and perform all other duties which the Association may signify.

Section 8. The Missions Committee shall consist of seven members, at least two of whom shall be women. Two of these shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and the remaining five shall be the heads of the four Associational organizations: Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and the Associational Treasurer. The chairman shall be designated by the Nominating Committee. This committee shall direct the work of the Associational Missionary and confer with the churches concerning their co-operation with and financial support of the Associational program and the program of the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

Section 9. The Promotion (Executive) Committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the Surry representative on the General Board of the State Convention, the ministers who are pastors in the Association, and one lay representative elected by each church. In no case shall any church have more than four members on this committee. Between annual meetings of the Association this committee shall act as the Association in matters requiring consideration. This committee will furnish a name or names to proper Officers of the Baptist State Convention for the member of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention from Surry Association. The officers of this committee shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk who shall be the secretary. The Moderator shall see that the committee meets at least quarterly and at any other time deemed necessary. He shall be expected to prepare a written report of the actions of this committee to be presented to the Association at the annual meeting. Eleven members shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meeting has been given to all members. The committee shall act as an agency of the Association in the promotion of the causes fostered by the Association.

Section 10. At the first session of the annual meeting the Moderator shall appoint the following committees to report at this meeting of the Association:

- a. Place and Preacher
- b. Resolutions
- c. Committee to nominate the Nominating Committee

Section 11. Other committees for specific reports and work shall be appointed by the Moderator as the need arises.

Article VI. Meetings and Visitors

Section 1. The Association will meet annually on Thursday after the third Sunday in October (beginning with the October meeting in 1958) and will meet semi-annually on Thursday after the third Sunday in February. The Association may be called into special session if necessary by a majority vote of the Promotion Committee. All business shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's "Parliamentary Law," but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Moderator may exercise his discretion, subject to appeal to the Association.

Section 2. Visitors from sister churches and similar bodies may be invited by the Moderator to sit with the Association, to participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

Article VII. Powers and Prerogatives

Section 1. The Association shall have no power whatever to infringe upon the rights of the churches. It may advise or recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purpose, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

Section 2. The Association may withdraw fellowship from any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt its purpose and requirements, or upon the request of a church for its own dismissal.

Section 3. The churches constituting this Association shall each retain complete self-government under Christ as the supreme Head, Lawgiver, Governor, and Lord over His churches, and unite only that they may more successfully promote the cause of Christ throughout the world.

Article VIII. Amendments

Section 1. Any section of this constitution may be amended at the afternoon session of any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment is presented in writing at the morning session of the same day.

Rules of Order

1. Each session of the Association shall be opened with a devotional.
2. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator.
3. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission of the Association.
4. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator before discussion and the vote.
5. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion without the consent of the Association.
6. When a motion is under discussion, no new motion or proposition shall be considered, except a motion to adjourn.
7. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a re-consideration.
8. All questions except as related to the amendment of the Constitution shall be decided by the majority of the votes cast.
9. The Association shall have the right to determine what subjects it will consider and the order of their consideration.
10. These rules may be amended at any time during an annual session of this Association by a majority.

Declaration of Faith

We subscribe to the Declaration of Faith (as set forth in the New Hampshire Confession of Faith) which has been approved and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Surry Baptist Association was organized at Richmond Church, now Little Richmond, Surry County, North Carolina, August 13, 1903. Fourteen of the original nineteen churches are now members of the Surry Association. All of the churches are in Surry County except Pauls Creek and Willis Gap which are in Virginia. This Association was formed from the Yadkin Association which held its first session at Eaton's Meeting House in Rowan County on August 28, 29, 30, 1790. It extended over all the Northwest-ern part of North Carolina. The statistical tables show churches from Surry, Wilkes, Rowan, Iredell, and Burke Counties.

29. Moderator recognized Mrs. Paul Lowe who gave a report for the Nominating Committee election of officers.
30. Mrs. J. S. Belton was recognized for report on Time, Place, Preacher. The Association will meet on the Thursday after the third Sunday, with the Westfield Baptist Church. Woodville, Jessup Grove and Simmons Grove will help. The preacher will be Rev. S. D. Baker with Rev. W. D. Turner as alternate.
31. Mrs. Paul Lowe was recognized for the report from the committee to nominate the Nominating Committee. They are: Harold Stone, Mrs. W. L. Campbell, Rev. Joe Maye, Mrs. L. F. Truesdale and Claude Harris.

Moderator made a motion that the amendment to the Constitution be made as stated in the Missions Committee Report. Motion was made and seconded that the amendment be made.

Mrs. J. W. Hylton thanked Flat Rock Baptist Church for its hospitality and fellowship.

The Moderator recognized Rev. Preston Taylor who conducted the Memorial Service.

The out-going Moderator, Rev. Joe B. Maye, recognized the new Moderator, Rev. Frank Sitton, who closed the afternoon session of the Fifty-Seventh Annual Session of the Surry Baptist Association with prayer.

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REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE-PROMOTIONAL COMMITTEE
Surry Baptist Association - October 22, 1959

The Executive-Promotional Committee met three times during this Associational year; once at Calvary Baptist Church, and twice at Flat Rock Baptist Church. The first two meetings were almost exclusively devoted to the promotion of the Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade.

1- At the first meeting at Calvary Church on January 12, 1959, Rev. Waldo Early, Chairman of Evangelism for the Association, completed the organization and briefly outlined the plans for the Crusade. Rev. R. L. Kizer was elected to serve as Chairman of Prayer.

A Fellowship Supper was planned for Friday night, January 16, 1959, and all ministers and their wives were urged to attend.

Frank Hensley discussed plans for the Associational Sunday School for 1959, Tom Brown discussed the Training Union work, Mrs. Isaac Jones discussed the work and plans for the Woman's Missionary Union, and Mrs. Arlin Watson reported on Vacation Bible School work. Dr. D. P. Green reported on the offering for the Homes for the Aging.

2- The second meeting, held at the Flat Rock Church, was devoted to preparation and inspiration for the Simultaneous Crusade. Dr. Julian Hopkins, Secretary of Evangelism for North Carolina, was guest speaker.

3- The third meeting on July 16, 1959, at the Flat Rock Church, was a special meeting called by the Moderator at the request of the Associational Missionary.

The Missions Committee presented the resignation of our Missionary, Mr. Biddle. The Executive-Promotional Committee concurred with the Missions Committee in accepting the resignation of Mr. Biddle.

A motion was made and passed that the Missions Committee, working with Mr. Biddle, was to have the authority to make the necessary decisions regarding the purchase of various items from Mr. Biddle.

Mrs. Norma Gardner was appointed to serve as Associational Clerk for the remainder of the Associational year, the office left vacant by Mr. Biddle's resignation.

The Executive-Promotional Committee meetings were poorly attended by both pastors and the elected representatives during the past year. Let me urge you to take this meeting more seriously. Our Constitution states: "Between annual meetings of the Association this committee shall act as the Association in matters requiring considerations." If we are to have a strong associational program, it is imperative that these meetings be well attended.

I thank you for the privilege of serving you as your Associational Moderator for the past two years. I have acquired some valuable, appreciative knowledge of our Baptist work and those who carry it on. It has been a creative experience for me to share in your joys and your problems.

The Missions Committee of the Surry Baptist Association met quarterly to assist the Missionary in the direction of the Associational work. We received \$170.00 from Calvary Church, \$16.00 from Copeland Church, \$5.00 from Eastside Church, and \$122.00 from Fancy Gap Church in special offerings to apply against the indebtedness against the Missionary's house.

On July 16, 1959, the Missions Committee accepted the resignation of our Associational Missionary, Rev. John T. Biddle, and passed it on to the Executive-Promotional Committee.

THE BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD

The active participation by men in the program of the church is one of the most encouraging signs of our day. There are more men engaged in working, giving, and going for World Missions than at any time in the history of the church. This is true, largely, because of the challenge which has been presented to them through Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador programs. Special seasons of prayer and offerings for missions have become church-wide rather than a program for a single organization. The laymen of our churches are sharing in the pastors' keen interest for the salvation of the lost people in their own communities. The number of men who are willing and who possess the skill of witnessing to lost men is increasing every day. More men are capable of teaching and leading in the organizations of the church. Yet there are many men who are not enlisted. About 75 per cent of the men on our church rolls are still inactive. They are the Brotherhood's greatest challenge.

The purpose of the Brotherhood is to discover men and their talents and to enlist them in every phase of the program of the church and denomination. The Brotherhood seeks to accomplish this purpose by offering programs and activities in an atmosphere of fellowship, study, and action. Programs and activities are planned in four major areas: Evangelism, Stewardship, Cooperative Program or World Missions, and Royal Ambassadors.

At the present time there are thirteen active Brotherhoods in the Surry Baptist Association. Two new ones were organized this year. The quarterly meetings have been well attended and interest is growing in this work. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING
1958-1959 Surry Associational Report

In its ninth year of operation, the Baptist Home of North Carolina can report progress just as it has in all previous years since its beginning.

Albemarle, Headquarters in Winston-Salem, and also the Resthaven Branch in that city are debt free. We are filled to capacity (119 in these three branches of the Homes) and a sizeable waiting list is always on hand.

Since the beginning of the Homes, the average age of the residents has grown higher, and is now about 80 years. This growth in years has made it necessary to add 30 additional rooms to the infirmary. The Homes has on hand and in sight some \$100,000 of the \$200,000 necessary to build and equip this addition. It is hoped that construction can begin by the first of December. This expense, together with some additional funds of the \$200,000 needed for the proposed branch at Hamilton, N. C., shows that even though we are out of debt at present, cash is badly needed for our forward movement.

Forty-two of our churches in the association responded in the annual special day collection in February. The size of the gift is always appreciated, and so is the number of churches participating appreciated. Those churches participating with gifts placed our association in one of the twelve top places of the association in our State. Your representative sincerely hopes that those churches which did not have a part in our program this year will do so in the future.

Since we live so near two branches of our Homes in Winston-Salem, may I suggest that each church endeavor to make a group visitation or go as individuals and see just what is being done. Should you do this, I am quite sure that all those who have had any part will be proud of what has been done and others will wish to share in our Homes program in the future.

REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital seeks to serve our people with a complete program of specialized medical care for all who need it. Our people go in great number, with all types of serious illness, from all walks of life, and in all financial circumstances, to receive the ministry of our Baptist medical center. A constant effort is made to keep it personal and Christian in its care of sick people.

Last year Service Patients from 95 counties of the State made over 66,000 visits to the 31 clinics of the Out-Patient Department, which is open to families not able to pay the full cost of their medical care. About the same number of office visits was made by Private or full-pay patients. More than 16,000 sick persons were hospitalized for 132,000 days of bed care.

Forty per cent of the hospital service is rendered the patients who go to the Out-Patient Clinics or who enter the hospital through the Out-Patient Department. The services of the physicians are free to all these patients, but the hospital charges must be paid unless other arrangements are made by the family.

Last year the hospital spent well over one million dollars in the care of these Service Patients. The Mother's Day Fund, along with the welfare funds and assistance from other agencies and foundations, enables the hospital to provide more than half of this service free for our very poor people. The Mother's Day Fund alone, however, has not covered the full cost of the care of even the most needy.

We need to lay upon the hearts of our members the necessity of the Mother's Day Fund, if our Baptist Hospital is to provide this important service for our poorer people.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.
Associational Report - 1959

North Carolina Baptist have shown remarkable interest in their Children's Homes during the past year. Numerous church groups have visited the three campuses. Continued financial support has been encouraging. Awakened interest in your Child Care program has been evidenced in many respects.

Program Studied

During the past year members of the Children's Homes staff, under the best leadership available, have engaged themselves in a conscientious study of the entire Child Care program sponsored by North Carolina Baptists. Findings have been gratifying. The program has a commendable history and is one of the best in the nation. Every effort is being made by the present administration to continue the best care possible for dependent children.

Children Served

More than 1,000 boys and girls were served by the Children's Homes during the past year. Mills Home, Kennedy Home, and Odum Home provided care for 547 children while 197 lived in Foster Homes. Through financial assistance of the Mothers Aid program 40 children were able to live with their mothers. Supervision and financial help were afforded 30 college students. Resourceful case workers assisted 214 additional children to find homes with relatives and other social service agencies.

Cottage Construction

Three cottages are currently under construction - one at each of the three homes. The Roy Culler family of High Point is providing funds for a boys cottage at Mills Home. The H. C. Ferebee family of Camden is making possible a cottage for girls at Kennedy Home. The new cottage at Pembroke will provide administrative offices, living accommodations as well as kitchen and dining facilities for the Indian boys and girls.

Administrative Change

Mr. Vernon S. Sparrow became Superintendent at Mills Home, Thomasville, July 1, 1959. He comes to this post with an excellent background of training and experience. Prior to Mr. Sparrow's going to Mills Home he served as Associate Pastor and Minister of Education in the First Baptist Church of Lenoir.

Significant Convention Action

Significant recommendations relative to the Children's Homes were adopted by the Baptist State Convention in May following a two and a half year study by the Committee of Twenty-five. They are as follows:

1. That the number of children in the foster home care be increased to approximate the number in institutional care.

2. That the Children's Homes begin to develop new types of programs to help children who are not being adequately cared for in other ways.

3. That increased attention be given to families throughout the state by well trained, mature case work consultants to help avoid family breakdowns.

More Adequate Financial Support

The Convention has voted to bring the Children's Homes into the Cooperative Program on the same basis as all other institutions and objects. Churches may continue to send Once-a-Month offerings and special gifts. Designated gifts from churches to the Children's Homes will be administered by the Convention in the same manner as designated gifts from churches to other institutions. The Homes are encouraged with this improved financial relationship with the Convention. For lack of sufficient income the Homes operated on a \$22,000 deficit in 1958. The deficit for 1959 will be approximately \$65,000. The only way the Homes have of meeting the \$65,000 deficit this year is through a substantial increase in the Thanksgiving Offering.

What of the Future?

With the increase in population, the development of industry, the growth of cities and the mounting tensions in the present day society, there is an increasing demand for services to dependent children. Your Children's Homes are being asked by the Convention to expand their services. With your prayers, loyal and generous support, your leadership will continue to move forward as resources are made available.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The Relief and Annuity Board was organized in 1918. The membership now stands above 32,000 individual members.

There are some 5,200 persons receiving monthly checks totaling in excess of \$2,400,000 this year. This list includes pastors who have retired from the large churches as well as the small churches, aged widows along with the young widows who have been left with small children. This list also includes college and seminary presidents, missionaries, and various denominational workers.

In 1958, the Annuity Board received 1,548 applications for membership in the annuity plan. The Annuity Board in the past year has been working on plans through the various state boards of the convention to enlist every pastor in the protective plan.

The main work of the Annuity Board is to build a strong retirement plan for pastors and denominational workers.

The working plan now in effect for all Annuity members is as follows:

1. The pastor pays 5% of his salary up to \$4,000 maximum salary per year.
2. The church pays 5% of his salary up to \$4,000 maximum salary.
3. The convention pays 5% of his salary up to \$4,000 maximum salary.
4. If the pastor's salary is not the maximum of \$4,000 and he lives in a parsonage owned by the church, then he can add \$600 to his present salary. He and the church will then pay 5% on his salary up to \$4,000 maximum.
5. If the church chooses to do so, it may pay 10% of the pastor's salary and the Convention will pay 5%. This is being done by many churches.

This is called the protective plan for both church and pastor for many of our young pastors die, get killed in automobile accidents, or become disable to carry on their work leaving a wife and young children to support. If this should happen, they would not be dependent on the church for support but would derive their support from the Annuity plan.

Every pastor and denominational worker who derives your support from the church you serve are encouraged to join the Relief and Annuity benefits. It is one of the best investments that you can make for old age security.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

Acts 1:8b. And ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

From small beginnings, the Foreign Mission Board has been developed by Southern Baptists into a channel for outreach to a needy world. More than 1,350 missionaries now serve in 39 countries throughout the Orient, Latin America, Africa, Europe, and the Near East. One hundred and thirty-seven were appointed last year, two of these being from our neighboring city, Winston-Salem. This was the largest number ever appointed in one year by our Foreign Mission Board. Also, the largest financial support through the cooperative program and the Lottie Moon Christmas offering was given last year to Foreign Missions. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering was \$6,763,468.63 and \$7,608,182.10 was given through the Cooperative Program. Thank you, Surry Baptists, for more than 11% increase in your Lottie Moon Christmas offering last year. May our '59 gifts surpass the 12% increase this year, that there may be sufficient funds to "train and teach". Let us continue to urge our churches to adopt the "2plus" plan of giving.

We must never fail to support Associational, State and Home Missions, but Jesus said, "Be witnesses unto the uttermost part of the earth", surely this is Foreign Missions.

Dr. Baker J. Cauthen, executive secretary to the Foreign Mission Board, says he believes it will be possible by the end of our Baptist Jubilee Advance program in 1964 to have not less than 2,000 missionaries under appointment. If this desire comes true, we must pray and give as never before. The goal for 1959 is 140 new appointees.

I hope we will see the great possibilities of sharing in World Missions through evangelism. "He that winneth souls is wise." Let us never cease to become soul winners that the Home base may be strengthened. Our greatest potential is prayer. If we give ourselves to prayer, we will find power in our local churches to lead to dedication of life and possessions, and our missionaries on foreign soil will feel the effect of our fervent praying. If we fail to pray, we are saying, "Lord, let not thy kingdom come; hold back thy power; hush the cry of those who plead for the gospel; close the doors of opportunity; paralyze the feet and voices of our missionaries; let men and women, boys and girls die without Christ."

Can we fail to pray knowing there are still millions of people in the world who have never heard the gospel? Can we fail to give? The cost of carrying on the Foreign Mission program during 1958 was \$30.10 per minute. How many minutes have you sponsored this year?

Let us surrender our all to Him so that not only we, but our sons and daughters may be witnesses for Christ through World Missions. Missions is my business because Missions originated in the heart of God.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS

Baptists have a time-honored covenant. One very important article of that covenant expressly states: "We engage . . . to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage." It is highly important that these words of covenant be respectfully regarded and sincerely observed by every Baptist church member.

Alcohol is our fiercest foe. It is of Satan. It fits perfectly Peter's graphic warning: "Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking some one to devour" (1 Peter 5:8 RSV). This adversary is on the loose in America today as never before in our history. He has more resources at his disposal for propaganda purposes than ever before. Annually, the alcohol beverage industry spends more than \$325 million in a high-powered advertising and educational program to represent itself as that which it is not—as something highly to be desired, essential to complete and gracious living. It is the very opposite.

It is our greatest social problem, aggravating all others. Its tainted tentacles, with their brighting touch, lay hold of all forms of economic, civic, and social life. Its ramifications reach everywhere. Therefore it has many greedy defenders, but, as Abraham Lincoln said long ago, "Many defenders but no defense." How could it have when it is the direct cause of 40 to 50 percent of highway accidents and fatalities, of 90 per cent imprisonments, of 90 per cent of divorces? How could it have, when its destructive influences are so extensive? More sickness, suffering, sorrow, and loss; more poverty and want; more theft, rape, and murder; more insanity, suicides, broken homes; more juvenile delinquency, illegitimacy; more political corruption of every degree, stem from alcohol and the alcohol beverage industry than from anything else.

The liquor traffic is doing more to hinder and hamper the work of our churches than all other evils put together. Indeed, it is the instrument and ally of most of them. Mahatma Ghandi, the father of the prohibition movement in India, accurately described the role of alcohol in India and everywhere else when he said: "India does not cater to the vices of her people. I hold drink to be more damnable than thieving, yes, even than prostitution. Is it not often the parent of both?" And our immediate answer must be, "Yes, and of most every other evil that can ever be named."

Alcohol is our fiercest foe. What business, then, has any Christian to be counted among its patrons?

On Juvenile Delinquency

1. My church can recognize the prevalence of juvenile delinquency and the need of many children for help and guidance they are not receiving.

2. The need can be seen when we look at the alarming increase in juvenile delinquency.

- A. This increase in delinquency is not confined to any section of the country or to any color, creed, or social status.
- B. Serious trouble caused recently by delinquent children in the schools of New York City as well as other cities over the nation makes it evident that delinquency is a problem of the schools.
- C. Many new juvenile courts and officers have been set up across the nation to try to cope with the rising tide of juvenile delinquency.
- D. Many civic and fraternal organizations have been enlisted in the fight against juvenile delinquency.

3. The one organization that must tower above all others in meeting juvenile delinquency and every moral problem of society in the church. My church and yours must be awakened to recognize the need of positive assistance in the battle against delinquency.

On Gambling

Fifty million adults and large numbers of minors wager each year thirty billion dollars in these United States. Six billion of this amount is the operator's take. This profit is more than the combined profits of U. S. Steel, General Motors, General Electric, and a hundred others of the largest manufacturing concerns in our country. After deducting the winner's and the operator's take in this illegal enterprise, there is still left a colossal sum which goes into false business fronts, political bribery, traffic in dope, immoral relationships, and many other channels of corruption.

Often the promoters of a city or other community claim that gambling and its attendant evils will advance the prosperity of the place and its people. The claim is not based on the facts. A few years ago one of the great cities of the Southwest went all out for the opening of race tract gambling. The bankers and business men supported the movement because they said it would advance the economic life of the city. Just three years after the tracts opened, these same men led in a movement to close them because the gambling craze had so undermined the economic structure and credit of the people that business was facing ruin instead of prosperity. No movement will build a city that destroys the character of its citizens.

STEWARDSHIP

When men stop thinking "The world owes me a living" and begin thinking, "I owe the world a life", then the power of God can begin to work through the churches more effectively. We must remember that all we have belongs to God. There is no accomplishment in our lives that is not rooted in opportunities and powers that we have nothing to do with achieving. "What hast thou that thou didst not receive". Then, if God gives us all that we have, we must recognize his Divine ownership of our very lives.

We listen attentively as the minister speaks of stewardship of time, talents and opportunities, but when the subject of money is discussed, we get restless.

Whose silver dollar is this? It is mine. I did not beg it, borrow it or steal it. It was earned by my labor. I find the word liberty on it and this suggests that I am at liberty to do what I please with it, hoard it, spend it foolishly, invest it or give it to the Lord's work.

I also find the words "United States of America". What does this mean? It means that the government issued it, guarantees it and has a claim on it. Every year our government asks for an accounting of all the money we have received during the past year. We must pay income tax for using the government's money. And as Christians we must be honest with our government.

Now looking at this dollar again, I find the words "In God We Trust". Now what does God have to do with it? Does he have any claim on it? We trace the silver back to the mint and from there to the mine. The good steward will recognize God's prior claim on all his money. Not only did God put the silver in the mine, but he gave man the power to mine it, mint the coin and use the money. "The silver is mine, the gold is mine, saith the Lord of Host". (Hag. 2:8) "Thou shalt remember the Lord thy God, for it is He that giveth thee power to get wealth". (Deut. 8:18)

We know that the work of the church costs money. Our question is, "Does the Lord have a plan for financing his work?" Our guiding principles are found in 1 Cor. 16:2- "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God has prospered him". This verse states three aspects of giving: First it is to be regular or systematic, "on the first day of the week". Second it is to be personal, "let every one of you". Third it is to be proportionate, not what we feel like giving, or until it hurts, or according to the need but "as God hath prospered him."

Nor the Lord does not leave to our discretion the interpretation of the word proportionate. Going back to the prophets and continuing through the Bible, the tithe is considered the legal standard. But Jesus reminds us that the righteousness of the Christian is not to be limited to the legal standard of the law. If it was unlawful for the Jew to contribute less than the tithe for his religion, is it not disgraceful for the Christian, under GRACE to contribute less than the tithe for his religion.

If Southern Baptist would tithe their income through the local church, budgets would be doubled, mission gifts tripled, the endowment to our institutions quadrupled and a sizeable sum would be left over to greatly expand the work of our Lord in the communities in which we live. God has a plan that will work, if His children will work it.

Let us not consider tithing a duty we owe to God, but rather one of our most blessed privileges.

"Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there will not be room enough to receive it". (Mal. 3:10)

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The 1959 report of Home Missions deal with figures given as of May 1, 1959. At that time the number of missionary personnel reached an all time high of 1,386. In addition, about 450 student summer missionaries worked for ten weeks under the direction of Home Missionaries, and 382 Southern Baptist Chaplains were on active duty.

During 1958, your Home Missionaries saw 41,859 professions of faith and the Chaplains reported 11,203 professions of faith.

Home Missionaries led in constituting 399 new churches and 564 new missions during the year. Your Home Missionaries entered 30 new fields in language missions.

To meet the ever increasing needs, the Home Mission Board must have our sincere prayers, our financial support and the dedication of every believer, especially our young people as Mission workers.

Baptists have no need to buy or read such literature, for they have an immense volume of clean, uplifting Christian literature coming from Baptist presses and other sources to suit every age and need.

North Carolina Baptists are indeed fortunate in having two denominational papers, ably edited and efficiently managed by a Christian staff, the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children.

"The promotion of missions, education, and social service and the distribution of sound religious literature" was the main purpose of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina when it was organized in 1830. In 1833 the Biblical Recorder was founded to help carry out these aims of our Baptist forefathers. If Baptists would grow, then they need to know. Biblical Recorder gives you a chance to be informed about all the phases of Baptist work in this State. It belongs in the home of every Baptist family.

Charity and Children is published by our own Mills Home. This paper commends itself to anyone who will read it, and there should be a club for its support in every Sunday School of this association.

Other publications of worth are: Southern Baptist Home Missions and the Foreign Mission Board's Commission. We are Missionary Baptists in name, surely we want to know more about this phase of our work.

The Sunday School Board publishes sixty periodicals. They are designed to encourage Bible study, to lead to personal faith in Christ, to cultivate Christian character, to develop faithful and skillful workers in our churches and to motivate worthy participation in the cause of world redemption.

Let us support and encourage our Baptist leaders and writers; let us use Christian literature to make our lives more abundant and more useful for our Master.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is much broader than college education, however, this report will deal primarily with the Baptist colleges in North Carolina. Our seven Baptist colleges include: Wake Forest, Chowan, Mars Hill, Campbell, Wingate, Meredith and Gardner-Webb. Campbell is now engaged in a campaign to raise its status to that of a four year college to take its place along side of Wake Forest and Meredith. If Campbell succeeds in doing this, as she undoubtedly will, then Eastern North Carolina will be fortunate in having a four year college, even as Western North Carolina is fortunate in having Wake Forest.

In these seven colleges are enrolled each year nearly 8,000 students, or more than one-eighth of all college students in North Carolina. The annual operating budgets total more than \$10,000,000, of which our Baptist people, through church offering, provide approximately five per cent. Students, through tuition and fees, pay approximately 60 per cent and the remaining 35 per cent comes from endowment and gifts.

These Baptist colleges will continue to be faced with competition of all other colleges in both quality of their work and the cost of operation. Our college young people must be convinced that these schools are academically as good as the best. As Baptist church leaders and parents of these young people, we want our colleges to be Christian and to present a positive Christian witness at all times and in all respects. Our young people need to realize that these colleges provide them with the right type of influence to make community citizens.

It is the earnest desire of our North Carolina Baptist Council on Christian Education that we be alert in all our Baptist churches to recognize and to direct promising young people into one of these Baptist colleges.

For the past three years our Christian Education emphasis has been observed in our churches on Father's Day. The response this year has been the most encouraging of any year thus far. Through this special offering, all of us can participate in helping to give our young people a Christian Education.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

57th Annual Session - Surry Baptist Association

The Cooperative Program is the best plan ever found by Baptists to support all the work we are undertaking to do in obedience to the commands of our Lord. Through it many millions of dollars are given each year by grateful Baptists to maintain the work of state missions, Christian education, hospitals, seminaries, home missions throughout our nation and foreign missions in nearly forty nations of the world. Many more millions of dollars are given gladly each year through this unified plan of support than could possibly have been secured through any plans of special solicitation for all of the causes. This plan also substantially reduces administration cost.

One of the great benefits of the Cooperative Program has been the spirit of cooperation and uniting which has resulted. On any other than a co-operative basis, there would be continually increasing numbers of denominational causes in the field seeking the contributor's dollar. This would not make for harmony or unity. The Cooperative Program on the other hand has been one of the strong unifying forces among Southern Baptists. Leadership from all causes sit down together in planning what is to be done. And in a spirit of give and take the equitable distribution of the funds has been maintained.

The promotion plans are developed jointly by those who represent the several states and the several causes. So there is unity in the presentation of the causes to the churches.

The first year of the Cooperative Program, 1926, the states reported \$4,604,174 in distributable funds through the Cooperative Program, for state and Southern Baptist Convention causes. In 1958, 32 years later, the total receipts through the Cooperative Program reported by the states amounted to \$42,929,283. This tremendous increase reflects a spirit of sacrifice, loyalty and cooperation of which we Baptists should be justly proud.

The Southern Baptist Convention messengers in Louisville, Kentucky, this year took action saying: "It is our conviction that the Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists is the fundamental, effective, and indispensable channel of providing for the needs of all our work; and we urge all Baptists to join in giving the Cooperative Program their loyal and undivided support."

I strongly urge that each and every church in our Association recognizes its responsibility as Missionary Baptists and give liberally through our Cooperative Program. As it is my observation that missionary minded churches are better able to improve their own properties, build new sanctuaries and provide comfortable homes for their pastors.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Jesus' command to us is, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the world." Here Jesus summed up God's purpose in the world and the objective toward which God's people must ever move if they are to be in His will.

The purpose of God in which He uses His people is the evangelization of the world. Every Association but one participated in this great effort.

It is heartwarming to hear that the reports reveal about 15,000 baptisms, 20,000 total additions and that more than 2,000 young people offered their lives for full time Christian service.

In the Surry Association it is believed more praying, planning and effort to win the people to a full committal to Christ was made than has ever been made before. Twenty-three churches held revival services during the two week period with nearly all of them reporting a noticeable increase in interest throughout their church communities.

Reports show more than 100 men, women, boys and girls were won to Christ during these Services.

Let us therefore be encouraged to double our efforts for next year and strive to sustain programs of Evangelism with soul winning in the forefront of the total program in all of our churches.
