

The Dobson Lions club was organized in the Fall of 1945.

The Organizational meeting was held in the main courtroom of the County Courthouse. Officers were elected and the club began to function. A charter was applied for and was dated April 6, 1946, Charter night was held on Tuesday April 16, 1946.

There were 38 Charter members. Of the 38-16 are now deceased and 18 have retired or moved to other localities, Leaving four charter members that are still active.

Our dlub ws sponsored by the Mt. Airy Lions--MronJ. H.

Crossingham was President of the Mt. Airy Club at that time and Lion O.J. Allison was District Governor. Judge G.H. Hastings -Known as the father of Lionism in N. C. gave the Charter night address.

Until the organization of the Jaycees A years ago the
Lions club was the only Givic blue in Dobson. Many early
activities of our club were concerned with improvements
in the town—Activating the town government—identifying
and marking the streets—Paving streets—securing police
protection—voting bonds and establishing a water and
sewer system. The club acted in the role of a Chamber of
Commerce in helping secure industry for the town...as there
were no industries in Dobson...Piedment Silk mills—later
became Perry Mfg. Co. —Washington Mills & Wilson Company



Clubs and Districts that wish to honor an individual with the Melvin Jones Fellowship must make a one-time donation of US\$1,000 or more; the time payment plan is available only to individuals making personal donations. In addition, it is important that each donor consents that his donation may be used to honor a particular individual with the Fellowship, and that this individual's name be supplied at the time the donation is submitted.



LIONS GET BRIEFING ON TOWN GOVERNMENT

Thursday, September 22, 1983.

The Dobson Lions Club met recently at the Community Center Building. President Bob Comer, Dobson Town Manager, briefed the club on town governmental activities during the

past fiscal year.

Comer summarized actions by the Town Board of Commissioners since July, 1982 and listed a number of governmental activities, including: completion of a sewer system evaluation study by an engineering firm which gave assurrances to town officials and the EPA that wastes are properly treated by the Dobson sewer system; receipt of a \$9,000 federal grant to study economic problems faced by the town and to make recommendation for promoting economic development; completion of a master storm drainage plan; extension of Dobson zoning authority in the one-mile area surrounding the town.

Other town activities discussed were the appointment of the Dobson Better Appearance Team (BAT) Committee as a beautification advisory board; adoption of a cable TV franchise and awarding the contract to Multi-Channel Communications, Inc., who expect to begin cable service to Dobson this month; annexation of the Surry County Health Services Building property and the Dobson Plaza Shopping Center property at the request of property owners:

granting of a two-month extension for a discount on town taxes-until October 31; initiated a street and block address numbering system to be implemented later this year; prohibited yard sales more often than one every six months to prevent "continuous" yard sales in competition with legitimate businesses; approved plans for improvements to Woltz, Comer and Adams Streets; and issued a resolution of appreciation to Police Chief Robert W. (Red) Axsom and the Dobson Police Department for the low crime rate in the town as reported recently by the Attorney General's office.

The Lions Club membership agreed to set Tuesday evening, October 25, as the date for door-to-door sales of brooms and light bulbs.

Other items of interest discussed included the expected visit to Dobson on September 27 of Fred Sapp, Lions District 31-D president, and on October 11, of Ron Huber, district White Cane chairman.

EMERGENCY SERVICES TALK GIVEN TO LIONS

The Dobson Lions Club met Tuesday, November 22, and heard a presentation by Bill Hardy of Dobson on first aid and emergency services.

Hardy, who serves as an officer in the Central Surry Volunteer Fire Department was formerly captain of the Dobson Rescue Squad. He has years of experience and training in fire fighting, rescue service and emergency medical service.

In his talk, Hardy pointed out that a large number of Surry Countians had received first aid training and many have qualified in varying degrees of emergency medical services expertise. Those who become certified are eligible for membershiup in volunteer fire fighting departments and rescue squads.

Hardy emphasized that many hours of training and study are undertaken by volunteers who spend their own

time and money to be of service to their communities.

The sponsor for Surry Central High School's Leo Club, Lion Harold Davis, announced that the Leos had donated \$50 to the Jackie Dean Branch Fund. The money was raised by the group during a leaf-raking project this fall.

The Jackie Dean Branch Fund was established by local citizens to help cover the extensive medical expenses incurred by the Branch family as a result of numerous operations required by their youngest son.

Dean's older brother, Dewayne, who currently is at Gardner-Webb, was a Leo at SCHS last year,

Superior Court Judge James M. Long provided a joint meeting of the Dobson and Mount Airy Lions Clubs with an insider's view of the Greensboro Klan-Nazi trial when the neighboring Lions clubs met Tuesday, April 8, in the Dobson Community Building to celebrate the fortieth anniversary of the issuance of the Dobson Lions Club charter.

The older Mount Airy club sponsored Dobson's entry into Lionism in 1946.

Judge Long recalled the 1980 Klan-Nazi trial over which he presided as the largest criminal trial in the history of the state. Sixteen members of the Klan and American Nazi Party were eventually acquitted of 161 separate charges.

The jurist, who also presided over the bribery trial of Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green, said the defendants were later tried under civil rights laws in Winston-Salem and again acquitted. At a third trial in civil court, widows of the slain CWP members recovered some damage payments.


