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Advisor Mrs. Frances M. Bradford TO TAKE A STAND

In recent months, much of controversy has been heard from the Women's Liberation movement. It, and those associated with it, have drawn national recognition, in the forms of ridicule and praise, scorn and condemnation, taunt and acclamation.

Perhaps the individuals in this movement should be praised for one noteworthy characteristic, however: their conviction and belief in the principles they hold.

It must be conceded by even the most ardent opponent of the Women's Lib movement that those associated with it indeed have a profound dedication to its objectives.

This dedication probably has its roots in an event which occurred 54 years ago, an event of significance in its day, but which seems to have been lost over the ensuing years.

On November 1, 1916, for the first time in the history of the United States, a woman was elected to the U. S. Congress. She was Jean-ette Rankin, who served from 1917 until 1919 as the Congresswoman-at-large from Montana.

Perhaps her most outstanding characteristic was her resolution—her firmness and ability to formulate a good opinion and defend it.

She wasted no time in promoting her convictions, evident in the fact that on the very day she was elected to Congress she openly opposed President Woodrow Wilson's views on World War I.

. . . Elected again in 1940, she was similarly noted in 1941 as the only Representitive to cast a vote against entering World War II.

Even though her vote had no effect on the almost-unanimous endorsement of (America's entry into) the war, she did not "join the bandwagon." She steadfastly held her ground, remaining aloof from those enthusiastic about the war.

This is not to suggest that she was morally or diplomatically correct in her decision, nor that her political position should be defended from a diplomatic standpoint, nor that it should be commended from a political point of view. However, it did take more than a superficial interest and conviction on her part to vote the way she did.

A valuable commodity in an age of half-hearted ambition is sincere dedication. Perhaps if more individuals held well-defined principles, some of the confusion and chaos prevalent in today's turbulent society might be alleviated.
