She conceived the idea because, as she explained, "I grew up in a religious home, where the Commandment to 'Honor Thy Father' was a fundamental precept. Our family of six small children was left motherless and my father had the full responsibility for our upbringing, so my gratitude to him was particularly great. I believe young people are still fundamentally appreciative of the role their fathers play in their lives, and Father's Day gives them a real opportunity to express their feelings. You know, a little old-fashioned devotion can go a long way to solving some of today's most difficult social problems."

So, 80 years ago, Mrs. Dodd persuaded the ministers of the churches in her home town, Spokane, to set aside a Sunday in June (the third Sunday as it worked out) to preach sermons on the subject of fatherhood and the role of father in protecting and leading the development of the family.

The ministers did just that and Father's Day grew with the years until it was declared a national holiday.

Today, Father's Day is more than a time for gifts and words of appreciation. As Mrs. Dodd phrased it, the Day is "...not a one way street...Fathers today have the same responsibility to guide, protect and love their children that they had when I was young. Nothing has changed that much."

Dads remain wonderful people. Remember him on Father's Day, June 17.

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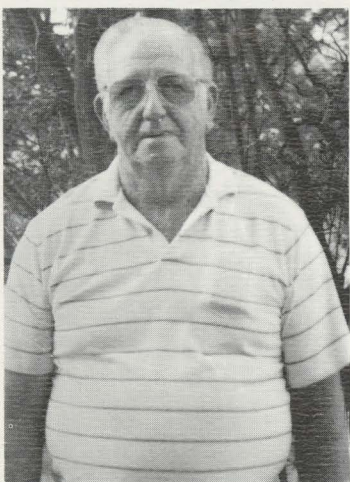

Lawrence Lyon Retires

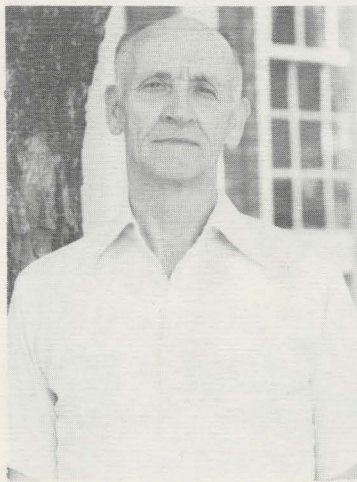
For thirty-four years and seven months Lawrence Lyon has been an employee of Chatham. The past fifteen years he has worked as a fixer in the Garnett Department.

Ray Norman Retires

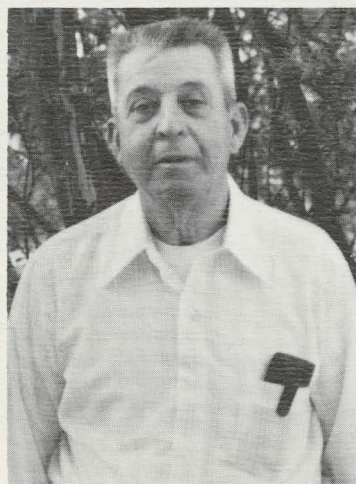
Ray Norman has been working at Chatham for twenty years and three months. For the past fifteen years, he has worked in the Wet Finish as a dryer operator.

Ernest has two daughters, Rebecca Farrington and Dana Sloop. He also has five grandchildren.

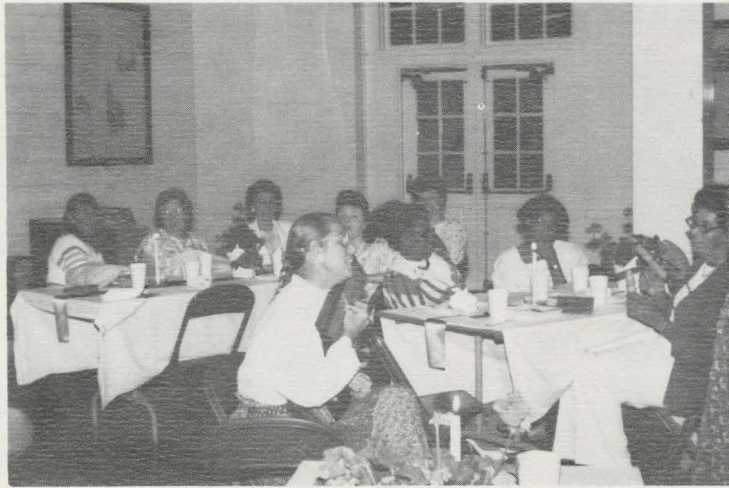
Ernest plans to do some traveling and catch up on his golfing. He said, "I traded my garden tools for a set of golf clubs."

Safe Household Water

Most people never have to worry about lead, radon, or other pollutants in their water. You may have cause for concern, however, if your water comes from private or small community wells, if you live in an older home that has lead pipes, or if you live in a newer home with lead solder around its copper pipes.

The Consumer Information Center offers three booklets that give you the facts on lead, radon, bacteria, and other pollutants that could affect the quality of the water in your home: **Lead and Your Drinking Water** (Item 435W, 50 cents) and **Removal of Radon from Household Water** (Item 436W, 50 cents) are two booklets published by the Environmental Protection Agency that can help you find out whether you should be concerned about these pollutants and, if necessary, how to remove them. **Buying a Home Water Treatment Unit** (Item 432W, 50 cents) is a fact sheet from the Federal Trade Commission that can help you decide whether you need a home water treatment unit, what kind to buy if you do, and how you can protect yourself from false or misleading advertising techniques. You can get copies of these publications by sending your name, address, the appropriate item number(s), and fifty cents for each publication you want to **R. Woods, Consumer Information Center, Pueblo, CO 81009.**

Radon may seem the most alarming of these concerns simply because it has been so much

in the news. The simple fact is that unless you test your air and find that it has a dangerous radon level, you don't have to worry about your water. This is because radon is a gas that causes lung cancer only when breathed. If you test your home and find that the air inside does have a high level of radon, the next thing to do is to find its source. If you suspect that the radon comes from your water, call your state radon contact. They'll probably ask you to send a sample of your water to their lab. **Removal of Radon from Household Water** contains a complete list of state radon contacts and their phone numbers, as well as directions for taking a sample.

High concentrations of lead in drinking water can also cause serious health problems. Over time it can damage your brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. Small children and pregnant women are especially vulnerable. You should be concerned about lead in your household water if you live in a building with lead pipes. These are usually buildings constructed before 1930. If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, you should have your water tested for its lead content if the home is less than five years old, if you have soft water, or if the water regularly sits in the pipes for several hours. The only way to be sure your drinking water has a safe level of lead is to have it tested by a competent laboratory. Your water supplier can help you get in touch with such a lab. **Lead and Your Drinking**

Water uses a clear Q & A format to explain testing methods, the meaning of the results, and what you can do both immediately and in the long run to reduce your exposure to lead in household water.

The Safe Drinking Water Act requires that all public drinking water supplies meet safety standards set by the EPA. People who get their water from private wells, however, are responsible for maintaining the quality of their own drinking water. If you get your water from a private well, you should have it analyzed by a laboratory--not just for lead and radon, but also for bacteria and chemical pollutants (such as pesticides) that can find their way into runoff water in rural areas often served by private wells. **Buying a Home Water Treatment Unit** tells which treatment units to use for certain water problems, as well as how to protect yourself from deceptive salespeople that may use false claims about local water quality to convince you to buy their product.

If you're concerned about your drinking water, order **Lead and Your Drinking Water** (Item 435W, 50 cents), **Removal of Radon from Household Water** (Item 436W, 50 cents), and **Buying a Home Water Treatment Unit** (Item 432W, 50 cents). You'll also get a free copy of the **Consumer Information Catalog**. Published quarterly by the Consumer Information Center of the U.S. General Services Administration, the **Catalog** lists about 200 free and low-priced publications on a wide variety of subjects.

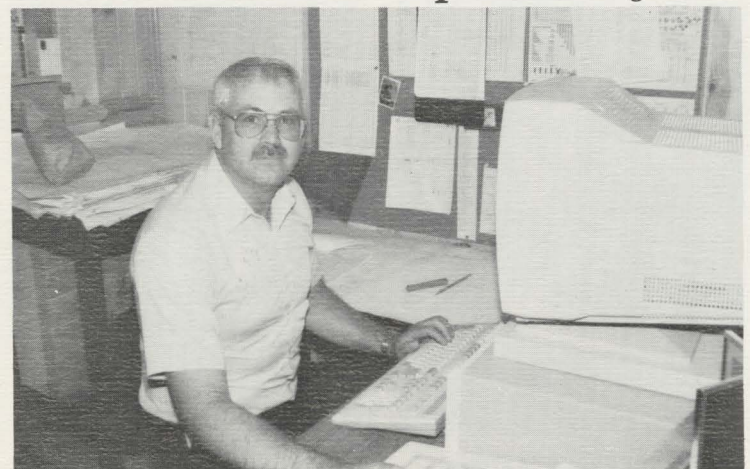

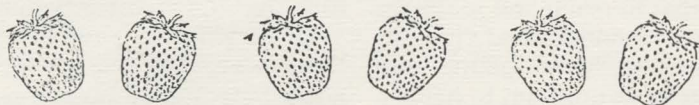
Strawberry Pie

After paying the fine, the angler approached the judge and cheerfully asked, "And now, Your Honor, if I may, I'd like several copies of the court record to show my friends."

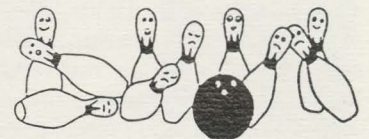

Exercising Into The 1990's

Remember when people used to ask, "What is aerobic dancing?" It's hard to believe, but it's been more than a decade since Americans began the exercise craze. As we head into the 1990s, the majority of Americans not only know what "aerobics" are, but they have at one time or another participated in them.

And it doesn't stop there. Whether it's cycling, running, walking, swimming or countless team sports, Americans enjoy being physically fit. Since the early 1950s, the American Heart Association has encouraged exercise as one way of reducing an individual's risk of developing heart disease, the nation's leading killer. And 40 years later, the encouragement continues.

According to the American Heart Association, exercise training can improve cardiovascular fitness in healthy persons as well as most cardiac patients if it is done on a regular basis.

Additionally, exercise can positively influence some of the major risk factors for coronary artery disease in most people. For example, exercise can be a factor in lowering high blood pressure and in helping to maintain proper weight. Recent studies have also shown that regular exercise significantly increases the levels of high-density lipoproteins

or HDL in the blood. HDL is often called "good" cholesterol because it is believed to carry dietary cholesterol out of the blood vessels.

Evidence also suggests that regular, moderate or vigorous physical activity may protect against coronary heart disease and may improve the likelihood of survival from a heart attack.

In short, exercise is good for people of all ages. Remember that to reach and maintain cardiovascular fitness, moderate to vigorous exercise (such as cycling, brisk walking, jogging, jumping rope or swimming, to name a few) should be performed for 30-60 minutes at least three to four times per week.

How will you benefit from the fitness craze? You'll look better, feel better and have more energy for work and play. Many people who exercise regularly have a greater resistance to stress, anxiety and fatigue, not to mention improved efficiency of the heart and lungs.

Before beginning an exercise regime be sure to visit your doctor. When you get a clean bill of health - go for it!

Let the 1990s be the decade that you exercise your way to a healthy heart!

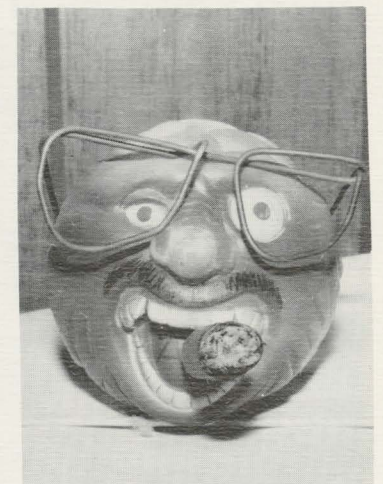

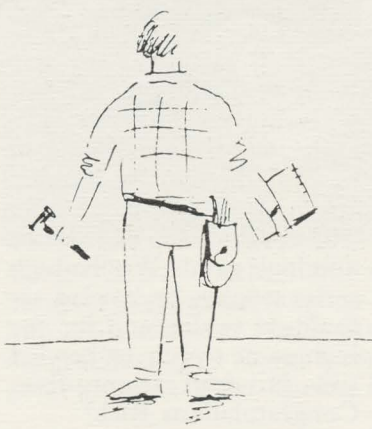

Af Nachemson, M.D., of the University of Gothenburg, Sweden, studied a group of back sufferers, half of whom were treated with rest and massage while the other half exercised to strengthen the lower back muscles. The surprising results: the active group returned to work seven weeks earlier and had fewer problems with recurring back pain.
