MOGNA "A Faithful Servant"

Spring River Fountain & Journal, published weekly, Mt. Vernon. Davis, Mrs. Phoebe, d/26 Dec 1881, ae 91y. b/Surry Co, N.C. Mother of Rev. Riley Davis & Grandmother of J.B. Davis of Mt. Vernon.

Mogna was born about 1775, origins unknown, and died 1854 in Lawrence Co, Missouri. She was called Mogue (Mog, Mogg), and will be remembered and accounted for here, with Phebe Isbell Davis.

Mogna was listed as a slave in the 1806 will of David Davis in Surry Co, North Carolina: "Mog, Cleo, Abberdeen, Bob, George, Dinah, Duglas," (possible relationships not stated). Mogue was probably sold at the division of David Davis' estate in 1814. She was "given to Phebe Isbell Davis for life," sometime between 1817 and 1822 in Surry Co, North Carolina, and next appears on the 1823 estate record of Phebe's husband, William ("Billy") Davis, nephew to the above David, also in Surry County. Phebe's father, Richard Isbell, Ex. of Wm Davis' estate, notes on inventory: "Mogg aged about 60 years, Rann aged about 16 or 17," (possible relationship not stated). After Billy's death, Phebe, unsuited to managing a young family and the plantation, spent much time at her father's; leaving Mogue to look after the needs of the children, and the care of the plantation to the slaves. When the slaves became "unruly," they were sold. This must have occurred between the May 1822 court term (Wm Davis probate filed Aug term), and 11 Jan 1823, as "Mogg" and Rann are the only slaves appearing on the estate inventory. Rann was sold at the estate sale, also on 11 Jan 1823. Mogue (female slave, age 55-100) is the only slave enumerated in Phebe's household on the 1830 census for Surry County.

Mogue left children and grandchildren in North Carolina in 1831, when she was taken to Warren Co, Kentucky, with Phebe and the children, and the rest of the Richard Isbell family. She is said to have grieved over one son who was sold; as he was not allowed to say good bye. This was probably at an earlier time, as Mogue's children were likely born in the late 1700's, or the earliest 1800's, and no other mention of them is found in my known family histories or legends.

In the spring of 1840, Phebe, son Hardin, daughter Sally and husband Temple Hickman, and Mogna, left Kentucky for Barry Co, Missouri, arriving in September. They traveled in ox-drawn Tennessee wagons, with Mogna following atop a yellow mare. Phebe's eldest child William and wife Christiana Hickman, preceded them to Missouri in 1839. The Davis family lived near Heaton(ville), just southeast of present day Miller, Lawrence Co, Missouri, and Mogue once met a man in Heaton that had owned her daughter. The 1850 Slave Schedule for Lawrence Co, Missouri, enumerates her with Phebe Davis, as age 75. (Phebe's children were not slave holders, daughter Sally spoke against it.) Until Mogue became ill and infirm, she had slept on a bedroll of old quilts that was put away each morning; Sally then brought her a trundle bed, so that she would be comfortable in her remaining days.

Mogue had loved a certain oak tree on a corner of Wm "Riley's" homestead, and had requested to be buried beneath it. She was laid to rest under the oak in 1854, at about age 79. Mogue may have been the first burial on the Davis homestead, though Wm Riley's son, James Lafayette was likely buried there in 1842, as was probably his daughter, Juliett "Jeems" in 1857. Phebe's son Hardin, and his wife Nancy Baldwin Davis, were murdered by bushwhackers and were also buried there, thus establishing the Davis Family Cemetery. The old oak died and disappeared, leaving no landmark for Mogue's grave site. Years later, while digging a grave, workmen found they were encroaching upon an old burial site; it could be none other than Mogna's. Queentina Seabourn Davis, daughter-in-law of Hardin, had a monument made for Mogue: Erected to the memory of a faithful servant by Queentina Davis.

The court proceeded to pass sentence on the defendant Mogg who being brought to the Bar was delivered by Thomas Wright, Esquire, as follows that "You Mogg will remain in the custody of Sheriff who will carry you back to the jail from whence you came where you will remain until Friday the fourth of June next from whence you will be taken and carried to the place of execution where between the hours of twelve and four of the clock in the afternoon of that day you will be hanged by the neck until you are Dead Dead Dead and the Lords have mercy upon your Soul." And the Sheriff of the County is hereby charged to carry this sentence into execution.

The under signed Commissioners appointed to divide the estate of the late David Davis of said County (deceased) Report, that they have proceeded agreeable to order and allotted to each Legatee, either land, Negros, or other property, at the several prices (in dollars and cents) as charged below to their respective accounts, which in most cases it was found most elegable to allot the several species of property to the Legatee who would give the best price for it; hence it will be seen, we have allotted to some a larger portion, and to other a less than an equal divident, thereby making some of them Debtors and others Creditors. All which is submitted, August 6th A.D. 1814.

Thank you for your letter postmarked February 6, 2004 regarding Jonathan (W.) Davis who married Parthana. You stated they lived in NC in 1780 and perhaps through 1810. You also stated that they had two known children Jeptha and Keziah Davis and that the family left going to Georgia and Alabama.

Our records do not show a Jonathan and Parthana Davis. There were several Jonathan Davis' in Surry County as well as other NC counties. Information found in Surry County is listed below.

Jonathan Davis is shown in Warren Co., NC in the 1784-1787 census records. In 1790 there is one Jonathan Davis in Surry County, NC (1 M over 16). In 1800 in Surry Co. Jonathan is listed (2 WM to 09, 1 WM to 25, 1 WM to 44, 2 WF to 09 and 1 WF to 44). In 1810 in Surry Co. Jonathan is listed (1 M under 10, 1 M 26-45 and 1 F 16-26). This Jonathan is a younger Jonathan than the one listed in 1800.

In the 1774 Surry County Tax List is a William Davis and sons Samuel and Jno. (?) (this could be John rather than Jonathan).

There are three estate records for a Jonathan Davis in Surry Co. Dates are 1844, 1846 and 1849. Five Jonathan Davis' married in Surry County in early 1800s but none to a Parthana.

A will of William Davis dated 15 Mar 1803 names wife Catherine, sons John Heirs, William, Samual, Leonard, Matthew and Jonathan, daus. Ellenda, Mary, Keziah, Elisabeth, Recorded May Court 1803. (We do not know if this is your Jonathan or another.)

There was no Jonathan Davis listed in the NC Taxpayers book during 1701-1786. In the NC Taxpayers book during 1679-1790 there were four Jonathan Davis' listed - one in Warren Co. in 1784, two in Caswell Co. in 1784 and 1786 and one in Richmond Co. in 1790.

We did find a marriage record of a Keziah Davis who married John J. Angel 12 July 1835 in Surry Co. The bondsman was Lemuel J. Davis and the witness was F. K. Armstrong.

None of these records showed a Jonathan W. Davis. It is very hard to determine which would be (if either of them) your ancestor because there are so many listed in the records of NC.

We are very sorry that we cannot help you more at this time. There are many Davis families and researchers in Surry County. We will be happy to place a query in our journal if you like. Information is enclosed. If we can be of further help please write us again.

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



Searching for Caleb Davis in Surry County by Brenda Todd Larsen

In about 1993, I received a box of family letters that my mother had saved. Included were letters written by my great grandmother, Ann Barton in Russell County, VA. In the last letter, written in 1950 near the end of her life, she tells her granddaughter the connection she has to the "Davis Family" of Surry County. In this letter was the challenge that took hold of me some time later: "if you can find Caleb Davis, you will find my Granddaddy."

The letter began: "My Dear Dove. This is Sunday, a pretty day and was glad to get it. I never read the book [about Jefferson Davis]. Well, you want to know what kin we are. Ruth Davis was old Calope [Caleb] Davis' girl before marriage. She married a man by name Jahue Barton."

She describes her grandfather and mother: "He was a big proud tall man with black eyes and broad shoulders and straight as a door nail. My mother was tall and straight with black [eyes]." She records also that he lived into his nineties. I began looking for Caleb at a Family History Library in Los Angeles where I lived at the time. Several years later, I am still enjoying the search for records of this Davis family- despite there being no apparent connection to the President of the Confederacy. I've learned a great deal of history and have collected and studied maps. In particular, I've looked at Surry County genealogies and census and other writings.

One remarkable and entertaining find, is the book written in 1859 by Hardin E. Taliaferro entitled *Fisher's River (North Carolina) Scenes and Characters*. It is filled with humorous stories, similar to "Jack Tales" in some cases, but portrayed as if told by real people of the area who are found in the census. Because the names he used are neighbors of Caleb Davis', I have researched each of those 'characters' through on-line sources as well.

It is a frustration that I have not been able to go back in this Davis family further than Caleb with any certainty. There are some candidates for his family in Surry County. He had only one son and named him Thomas - that has led me to believe his father's name was Thomas, but it's just a strong possibility. Because of migration patterns, I have other theories of possible locations of his immediate ancestors. I have corresponded with one descendant of Thomas J. Davis, Caleb' son, who believes they were Quakers at one time. The following time line is the result of tracing Caleb and his children through census materials, wills, etc. And still I know there is more to be found. I am hopeful that someone reading this story may have some pieces to add to the mosaic that genealogy creates of those who came before us. I've found Ann Barton's grandfather, and now I want to know who came before him.

Family Timeline and Migration Caleb Davis ca. 1794-1884

1794 (about) Caleb Davis born in NC¹

No county of birth is ever named in the censuses which lead me to believe that he might have been born in a county that was divided into smaller counties. It is possible that he did have some Indian ancestry –his granddaughter claimed to have Indian blood in her ancestry. But, lacking proof of this, I can only attempt to find the likely Welsh ancestor who provided the surname "Davis".

Caleb marries Lydia 'Bartlett' in Surry Co. NC² Thomas Coe, bondsman The name 'Bartlett' is not found as a surname in Surry County census at this time. I believe in this instance, Bartlett and Bartley are the same family. Following this possibility, I find evidence of our Caleb Davis and the William Bartley family being connected. A will by William Bartley names his daughter, Lydia Davis. (See 1816 listing below.)

In Surry County in the 1810 census is found a Thomas Pearson Coe, 1797-1866 who might be the named bondsman for Caleb and Lydia. If this Thomas is a son of Isaiah Coe, the census provides a lead to which of the Davis possibilities is linked to Caleb.

In 1840, we find the Caleb Davis family has moved that likely short distance into Grayson County. Some of the Bartley family has preceded them into Virginia. However, in the 1840 census of Surry County, Revel Bartley is residing in the approximate position of the Davis household in the previous census. In this census year, Lydia and Caleb are predictably shown between 40 and 50 years of age. The son Thomas is still with them, aged between 10 and 15. Four daughters are in the household. The youngest, Eva¹, is under 5; second youngest, Elizabeth, is between 5 and 10. The two listed between 15 and 20 include one daughter named Ruth who was born 29 January 1824

The move to Russell County Virginia seems to be a popular direction. The Bartley family appears there, too. Whether Caleb and Lydia made it further into Virginia at this time is unknown. And before the next census, it appears that Lydia has died. Caleb is back south of the Virginia border, having returned to Surry County, NC. In his household in 1850 (No. Division, Thompson District) are listed: Caleb Davis, age 59 (or 57 – a difficult number to make out), daughter Elizabeth Davis age 20 and Eve Davis, age 13. The other children I have identified here are all in the Russell County, VA census in 1850.

CLAY DAVIS REMEMBERED

Clay Davis of Dobson recently departed this life for another place. He had heard this place described thousands of times by a countless number of preachers at funerals for 40 years.

Clay was an undertaker and was uniquely fitted for this calling. He was patient, kind, caring and genuinely concerned about people. During his career, he shepherded them through the most traumatic times of their lives when they were in shock, grief and confusion about what to do. He is remembered with gratitude by these families who will never forget his concern.

Area and community feeling for him was shown by the largest crowd ever seen at the funeral home when he died.

Clay Davis grew up with 11 brothers and sisters, a good background for learning to get along with people. One of his sisters reports that Clay never got a whipping.

His mother, Annie Jackson, was wice married. Her first husband was Sam Marion. They had four children, Gaston, Sam, Ola and Gladys Marion, Annie was married the second time to George Davis and had eight children: sons, Hardin, Calvin, Clay, Gray and Darrell Davis and daughters, Dorothy Laverne and Whitey. All are deceased except Sam and Gaston Marion, Gladys Hawks, Dorothy Mitchell, Laverne Snow and Whitey Nixon.

Clay married the beautiful Betty Moser while they were in their teens and they have been inseparable ever since. He began working for Jones Funeral Home in 1957 and after two years began working for Moody Funeral Home, where he worked for 17 years.

In 1975, he went into business for himself, Davis & Son Funeral Home, and had the grand opening in March 1976. The funeral home is in the old Dobson Baptist Church building. Betty was with him every the

They sold the funeral home in 1992 to son-in-law, Greg Seivers, and to Brent Southard. Clay and Betty retired in 1995, but were often a familiar and welcome sight at the funeral home as long as they were able.

He and the others at the funeral home were always assisting those in the community in various ways. They often drove people to hospitals when they were needed. This was without pay.

For example, they drove Henrietta Gillespie to Baptist Hospital for years when she had to take treatments at least once a week during her tragic illness. They often did that for others.

One of the most hilarious things was when, one snowy day, Nell Folger called and asked that Clay bring her bridge-playing buddies to her house because they could not drive their cars in the snow. So Clay took the hearse and picked them up and carried them to Nell's.

One of Clay's greatest pleasures was that he grew a large garden and carried vegetables to other people. He enjoyed hunting and fishing and attending reunions with his Ar-

my buddies, most of the time at Lake Nor-

His greatest sorrow came when his beloved wife, Betty, was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. He spent his last days helping to care for her. One of his great joys in his last days was spending time with his greatgranddaughter, Aeriel Elizabeth Childress.

Clay was buried in Fairview Baptist Church Cemetery. In addition to his wife, Betty, he is survived by two daughters and sons-in-law, Janet and Greg Seivers and Janell and Randy Wood; a son, Daniel Lynn; his grandchildren, Miranda Gray, Jana Seivers, Jamie Church, Justin Seivers, Randee Wood, Whitney Wood and Daniel Davis; his great-granddaughter, Ariel Elizabeth Childress; three sisters, Laverne Snow, Dorothy Mitchell and Whitey Nixon; a half-sister, Gladys Hawks; and two half-brothers, Gaston Marion and Sam Marion.

It had been said that Clay knew more people in Dobson than anyone else, and that he had never met a stranger. This is true. His friendly disposition and broad smile when greeting someone will be long remembered.

Notes

Evan Davis was born June 8, 1796, near Raleigh, North Carolina. In that same state, on June 17, 1797, was born a girl by the name of Rebecca Marshall and in the historic state of North Carolina these two children grew to young manhood and young womanhood. They were married when very young and shortly after their marriage made the long overland trip from North Carolina to Indiana, and settled in Hendricks county a year before the count was organized, in 1822. Evan Davis entered six hundred and forty acres of land in this county as soon as the land was opened by the government for sale, and added to this from time to time until, at his death, he was the owner of about two thousand acres of excellent land in this county. He died on November 9, 1854, and his wife in the year following. Evan Davis and two of his neighbors founded the first Methodist church in this county, the Salem Campmeeting church, and contributed both spiritually and financially to its success. He was a large raiser of stock, principally hogs and cattle, and drove his stock overland to Madison on the Ohio river. He brought the first shorthorned bull into this state and introduced this excellent breed of cattle to the farmer. He also raised sheep and the wool from his own sheep made the clothing for the family. In North Carolina Evan Davis owned slaves, but the girl he married was a Quaker and she was very much opposed to slavery. When they were married he promised to free all of his slaves, and before they left North Carolina for Indiana he gave them their freedom. Evan Davis built the first grist-mill in this county and later built two others, but none of them are now standing. He laid out the first graveyard in the county on his own farm and called it the Davis graveyard. At first it was devoted to the immediate family and relatives, but later charity bodies were allowed to be placed in the graveyard, through the courtesy of Mr. Davis. He was a Democrat in politics, but never held office; he was a power spiritually in his community, and never seemed to weary of doing good for his fellow men. [Excerpt from biography of Arthur M. James Davis, the younger (1793-1873) of Stokes County (continued from JGSRS, Vol. II, Issue 3, Page 190)

Many of these old family stories are remembered by Kathleen Adkins Blackwell and are also told by Kathleen's cousin Gertrude Adkins Taylor, both who heard these stories told many times by people who witnessed the events, such as Billy Pitzer, the son of Lemuel and Nancy (Davis) Pitzer, Emily Davis Adkins the two women's grandmother, and their Adkins uncles.

The impression that one gets from the children of James Davis is that of a very closely knit family. Naming patterns among the children show the value they held in perpetuating certain names and honoring family members. The surviving correspondence between the Fulton family in Texas and the Stokes County relatives, suggest that the people were in constant contact, even during the difficult years of the Civil War. The Red Shoals plantation received the Lampasas newspapers; often receiving news quicker than by personal letter. Widowed daughters relied upon their father to run their estates and communal use of property is evident. The political implications of the Davis marriages is evident and also strengthened the family bonds. Two Sheriffs are numbered among Davis' son-in-laws. The Taylor and Estes families both had origins in Henry County and brought with them both economical and social connections [re: Hill; A History of Henry County, Virginia (1925)]. Repeated intermarriage with other regional families of wealth and political power is evident, especially with the Hollingsworths and the Smiths. First cousin marriages among the grandchildren of James Davis is also evident.

Margaret Davis married Madison Blackburn, a son from a pioneer Stokes County family. His mother was a Bostick whose family settled the large tract of Shoebuckle Plantation and intermarried with other large landowning families of the area. Margaret's marriage does not seem to have provided her with great wealth, but enough to remain independent throughout her early widowhood to death. The Civil War greatly affected Margaret, since her sons were of service age and she lost two of them to the War. With her widowhood coming at an early age, Margaret emerges as a rather tragic figure.

Eliza Jane Davis married Samuel Hill Taylor, a son of William A. "Uncle Billy" and Katherine "Kittie" (Hill) Taylor. Sam Taylor emigrated to Stokes from Henry County, Virginia. Mrs. Hill's history of Henry County mentions Uncle Billy settling in Traylorsville, Virginia and his brother, Josiah, as settling in Stokes County. Josiah's nephews must have followed him to Stokes, for Samuel and his brother Spottswood settle and prosper in Danbury. These two brothers did well in Danbury involving themselves in trade, carriage making and innkeeping. Samuel Taylor's

hotel, which was torn down in the 1970s, stood next to Wilson Fulton's brick house. Taylor moved to Mount Airy where he settled and became Sheriff of Surry County. The Fulton family letters have an affectionate tone in their references to Sam Taylor. Eliza's poor health in her old age is mentioned in a letter from Luretta Davis to Polly Fulton. Sam's obituary records his birth and death date and describes him as, "...one of the first settlers of Danbury...[h]e served the county of Stokes eight years as Clerk of the Superior Court, and in 1858 moved to Surry County, [where] he served as Sheriff for eight years..."

Mary Ann Davis married Wilson Fulton a member of an enterprising Stokes County family who along with their newly acquired prosperity began to connect themselves in marriage with the more socially prominent families of the region. Wilson's siblings married into the Hill, Gentry, Vaughn, and Hollingsworth families all of considerable social standing in the region. Wilson, like his family, dabbled in a surprising amount of ventures besides growing tobacco. He established a tannery in Danbury, which is considered to have probably been his main source of income. Also in Danbury he had an ice house, a store, and was involved in the development of a local railway. Wilson's brick house still stands in Danbury. Wilson left North Carolina in 1861 for Texas, where he continued to exercise his entrepreneurial skills despite the ravages of war.

In 1855, Sarah Louisa Davis married William Alexander Estes who entered Stokes County politics in 1862 when he was appointed Coroner of Stokes County. On the 24th of July 1864, Sheriff Nathaniel Moody died suddenly leaving the position of Sheriff vacant. As Coroner, Estes stepped into the position and was subsequently elected to the position of Sheriff in 1864 and reappointed after the Civil War in 1864. He was popularly elected in 1865, but resigned on June of 1867, when William H. Gentry replaced him. His resignation was a reaction to a scandal over an alleged misplacing of funds. Estes ran against Gentry in 1867, but lost. However he must have regained his popularity, since Estes defeated Gentry in 1878 and was reelected again in 1880. Estes was a very popular man in Stokes County and his obituary describes him as, "a prominent citizen, and a staunch Republican. He served his day and generation faithfully and acceptably, was affectionate in the home circle and kind of heart to all." [re: obit 13 Sept 1894]. His popularity was expressed during his lifetime in a newspaper article dated the 27th of July 1882:

PERSONAL.- When in Stokes last week, it was truly gratifying to hear the expressions of praise that were universally accorded W. A.. Estes, the popular Sheriff of that county, for the indulgence he has ever the tax payers, and for his official conduct generally. Perhaps money was never scarcer in Stokes than it has been this year, owing to the draught of last Summer, and if the Sheriff had forced the collection of taxes it would have produced great distress. We predict that the people, independent of party, will manifest their appreciation by re-electing the Sheriff by the largest majority any candidate has ever received in the county.

Estes became a widower when Sarah Louisa died in 1870. Her illness was probably long term starting in 1863. Luretta Davis describes Sarah's affliction in two letters dated 1866: "Sarah's health is very bad but is some better than it was in the Spring she has been staying at the Springs this Summer...Sister Sarah's health is no better she hasnt sit up one hour at a time in three years she started to Surry this morning Sam came down after her Dr. Joe and Willie Hollinsworth are going to take her in hand to see if they can do her any good they seem to think they can." The Estes family is mentioned in A History of Henry County, Virginia, by J. P. A. Hill. Probably of Huguenot origins, William Alexander is the son of Jesse Estes. William's mother is named as the sister of Champion Napier who married a relative of Governor Martin of Rockingham County. Notes from the Estes family of North Carolina note that William Estes remarried a Miss Watts as his second wife; however the 1925 history by Hill names his second wife as Sadie Martin. Records seem to indicate that his second wife was Sadie Martin a daughter of Edward Loftin Martin and kin to the Estes family. Another newspaper article of note is found in a local paper dated the 6th of April 1882 and titled, "The Sheriff of Stokes Co. Killed While Robbing His Own Safe". The article refers to an April first report in the Danville, Virginia paper. The story relates a tale told to the Danville paper claiming that Estes attempted to hold up his wife and rob his safe as a joke, and that a neighbor killed the masked bandit which turned out to be Estes; however, the tale itself turned out to be an April fool's joke, which the paper remarks, "If we were an advocate, under any provocation, of lynch law, we should certainly give our ascent that, in this case, the perpetrator or perpetrators of this vile joke be treated to the rope and pine limb shared by Hairston and Lindsay last November." Estes had issue from both marriages.

The Davises connected themselves to another prominent regional family, the Smiths of Drury Smith, the patriarch, was a wealthy and from what family Rockingham County. descriptions tell, a colorful and often brutal man. He had children by at least two wives and in one instance by his sister-in-law. Two of James Davis' daughters marry children from Drury's first marriage to Frances Pitcher and another from his illicit romance with Sarah Pitcher. Rebecca married Andrew Jackson Smith in 1854 and Elizabeth married John Preston Smith in 1844. Though little lore remains to describe Rebecca and Elizabeth, their husbands are well recalled. John P. Smith seems to have been an ambitious and enterprising man, who developed a reputation as a hell raiser. Census records show Smith involved in large tobacco production and owning a large lumber mill. Though much junior to James Davis, John Smith achieved greater wealth by the time of the Civil War. John Smith was one of the leaders in the Successionist movement in the county. Early newspapers mention his names often in conjunction with secessionist activities. A news article dated the 28th of April 1861 reads that from Martin's Lime Kiln "[o]n yesterday 27th inst. a large and respectable meeting of the citizens of this and the adjoining counties of Rockingham County, North Carolina, and Patrick County, Va., was held here. It was the largest meeting ever held in this part of the county, to take into consideration the present condition of the

country. Strong resolutions were unanimously adopted for the whole South to resist the aggressions of the sectional President of the North upon the rights of our people...[t]he meeting was organized by appointing John P. Smith, Esq., Chairman..." [re: Western Sentinel (Winston, NC), Friday 3 May 1861]. Smith appears to have been bankrupted by the War. He and his descendants leave behind them a legacy recalling their wild and somewhat lawless nature. Into the 20th century, their participation in the bootlegging trade was well known in the county. Common law marriage is also found in this family.

In contrast, the family of Andrew Jackson Smith leaves a somewhat different impression. Though prosperous, Andrew Jackson never achieved the wealth of his brother. His family is remembered to have been of a more religious and gentle nature. Several preachers came from this family. James W. Davis describes the death of Becky Smith in a letter dated 1891: "...she passed away this morning at 4-30-o-clock she has been a great sufferer all this winter, with something like catarh of the stomach she suffered a great deal, she will be burried day after tomorrow..."

Nancy Davis, known as "Nantie", marries Drury Smith's illegitimate son by his wife's sister Sarah Pitcher. Jim Tatum relates that, "the story handed down in family is that D[rury] Smith's first wife was having a child and his wife's sister Sarah Pitcher came to the house to assist in the birthing of the child and while she was there Drury knocked her up and she died and willed the child to Drury. Lemuel was raised by Drury...they say he was a fine person...when he went to Stokes County he changed his name from Pitcher to Pitzer" [re: letter, Tatum to Mahar (1989)]. There is some documented evidence of this story. Sarah Pitzer did make a will after/before the birth of Lemuel on the 20th of October 1822 and she died in the following year. Sarah's will was probated in February Court of 1823, naming her son Lemuel who she left in the care of Drury Smith and her father, John Pitcher. There is no mention of the child's father. Sarah's death was probably the result of the birth of Lemuel. Lemuel took, as was the law, his mother's surname Pitcher confirming his illegitimate status. Lemuel apparently was raised in Drury's household and probably met Nancy Davis, as a result of the marriage of her sisters to his half-brothers. The 1850 Census lists Lemuel with the name Pitcher, but by the 1860 Census the family is using the name Pitzer. Lemuel's obituary lists his name as "Pitts". By the end of the 19th century this family consistently uses the spelling of Pitzer. Lemuel seems to have carried no stigma for his illegitimacy and was valued for his own personal abilities. Lemuel is listed in the 1850 Census as a merchant in Danbury. Lemuel dies rather young from consumption, leaving his wife with two children. Nancy never remarried, but moved back to the Davis plantation at Red Shoals. Up to 1990, the Pitzer family held on to the core farm of the old Davis Plantation which consisted of around 800 acres and the Big House.

Another Smith marriage is between James W. Davis and Ednie Jane Smith. Her parents have not been documented, but are probably related in some way to Drury Smith's clan. One source thinks that she is the daughter of one of the Sheriffs of Rockingham County, Thomas

Smith. Another secondary source lists her as the daughter of G. W. Smith. Naming patterns suggest her parents might be Edward and Alice Smith, but this, too, is conjecture. The 1850 Census shows Ednie in the household of Richard Martin, Esq. and no G. W. Smith, Thomas Smith, or Edward Smith are found in the list that might be her father. It may be that her mother was a Martin and that she was orphaned, Ednie was sent to live with the Martins, where she is listed as attending school. Ednie and James went out to Texas at the dawn of the Civil War, when they emigrate to virgin lands on the Red River in Texas. The family does not seem to prosper in the West and James brought his family back to North Carolina in 1866, which turned out tragically. A letter dated the 20th of April 1866 and written by Luretta Davis to Polly Fulton in Texas, expresses the fears of the family at Red Shoals over the James William Davis family, these fears were obviously well founded. The family came into contact with some type of disease. Family stories say that the family had picked up a blanket on the trip, and that the blanket was infested with fleas or some such parasite with infected Ednie and at least three of her four children. Ednie dies in Cross County, Arkansas along with her sons William Jay and James Edward. Her daughter Alice dies months later in Stokes County. James survived along with his son Walter. James returns to Stokes and seems to have engaged in a wide variety of businesses including milling, tobacco and smelting. James marries again in 1867 to Nancy Hollingsworth the sister of Dr. Billy Hollingsworth, James' brother-in-law. Nancy dies in 1877 leaving her children to the care of her sister, Sallie (Hollingsworth) Worth. Luretta Davis writes of Nannie's death:, "...she died the 18th of May she too has gone to live with Jesus. [S]he talked and shouted a great deal before she died, beg[g]ed us not to weep for her, she was going to live with Jesus. Nannie suffered a great deal she bore it patiently..." Two years later, James marries Indianna Lindsey, the daughter of John Lindsey (1809-1902) and his wife Nancy (1810-1875), natives of Fairfax County, Virginia and wealthy farmers in Rockingham county. Indianna, some of her siblings, and her parents are all buried in the Baptist Church Cemetery in Madison, Rockingham County, NC. James had issue from all three marriages. James left many private papers which now are held by descendants of his youngest daughters.

Martha Davis who marries Thornton Hampton is also remembered, though she left no issue. It is said that the Hamptons were jealous of Martha and treated her badly when as a newly wed bride she came to live in her husband's family home. Martha dies young in 1852 and it is said that she died from neglect and mistreatment during her pregnancy. Of all the marriages, the connection to the Hamptons is the least well known. Little is known of the Hamptons and they seem to have been small farmers with little advantage to recommend them financially or politically to the Davis family. The Stokes County Will Book shows that Thornton's mother was Polly (Guinn) Hampton, the daughter of Thornton P. Guinn (died 1833) and his wife Anne, whose land was located on the southside of the Dan River. John B. & Polly (Guinn) Hampton along with the Guinn family, were probably neighbors to the Davis family and the marriage was one of love

rather than economics or politics. The name Hampton is often used as a personal name in many of Stokes County's prominent families (i.e.: Hampton Bynum). The Hamptons of the old 96th District of South Carolina, which produced politicians such as Wade Hampton, had their origins in Stokes County and Thornton may have been some type of relation to this famous family.

Emily Davis married her school master, Hiram Adkins, who was brought to the Davis' Red Shoals plantation to provide the Davis children with a tutor. Hiram was educated at Emory College in Virginia and probably knew Emily's brother Jesse who also attended Emory about the same time. The Adkins family may have been originally from Surry County. In addition to teacher, Hiram also became the preacher at Davis Chapel and became very active in that church in later years. Davis Chapel's transformation from plantation chapel to local church is probably due to Adkins' dedicated efforts. Family letters mention Hiram's activities in the smelting of iron during the mid-century showing that he too dabbled in many financial activities. Census records show him as a prosperous farmer. His family and descendants are characterized by being well educated and dedicated to the Methodist Church. It is probably due to Hiram that the Davis girls were all converted to Methodism. The old Adkins home was located on Snow Creek, though Hiram later built a new house near the old Davis place on Red Shoals, not far from Davis Chapel. It is due to the interest of this family that Davis Chapel has survived today.

Jesse Jay Davis the eldest child of James Davis is still much of a mystery today. Little is found in family letters in reference to him. He seems to have preferred farming over alternative occupations. It is said by his descendants that he was adverse to slavery, though tax records show that he was taxed for at least one slave in his lifetime. Jesse married Arrena Null, whose father ran Danbury's grog shop. The Null family was somehow kin to Nathaniel Moody, one of the county's wealthiest men and later Sheriff in the early years of the War. Arrena was brought up in Moody's home and probably met Jesse through that connection.

Luretta Campbell Davis is the only child of James Davis who never married. Several of her letters survive today and provide an intimate look into the Davis family. It also provides a glimpse into Luretta's personality and exhibit both her devoutly religious nature and her intimate involvement in the lives of her siblings, father and slaves. It is said that Luretta's true love died in the Civil War, but the man's name was not remembered. None of her surviving letters give any clues to the young man, though she does write of her male Blackburn cousins who may have had plans to marry her. Despite the stories of a dead beau, it was quite common for spinsters to use such an excuse to avoid marriage. Men also may have been in short supply by the wars end. Luretta instead fulfilled the need of nurse maid and housekeeper to her widower father in his later years. The story of her fiance's death in the War is included in her obituary. Luretta was educated at Greensboro Female Academy and seems to have devoted a great deal of her energy to the Methodist Church.

Davis' youngest daughter, Susan Ellen Davis, married Dr. William R. Hollingsworth of Surry county. The earliest story of Susan concerns the occupation of her father's Red Shoals plantation by Union troops and is related elsewhere in these notes. An early photograph survives of her and her sister Luretta decked out in their finery. Another photograph survives showing her with her husband Dr. William, both seated and holding hands. This photograph shows an engaging and handsome woman and the clasped hands suggested a forwardness and strength between the two. Dr. Willie was apparently very popular among the Davis family and is mentioned often in letters. He himself belonged to a large family of Surry County physicians. William, two of his brothers (Joseph & Edwin) and their father were all well known doctors in this region. William's sister Nancy married Susan's brother James W. Davis, while his sister Mary married Winston Fulton, Susan's eldest sister's husband's brother. Dr. Billy is mentioned several times in family letters. Both Dr. Billy and his brother Dr. Joe served as doctor to the famous Siamese twins, Chang and Eng Bunker, who were natives of Siam. The twins exhibited themselves around the world and before the Civil War settled near Mt. Airy with their large families. Dr. Joe was their primary physician, but William was equally close to the family and attended them upon their death. Obituaries survive for both William and Susan. Susan's obituary describes the couple, "Being the wife of a great doctor of his day - a doctor who was the peer of any of his contemporaries in medical skill and the ability to bring cheer to his patients - Aunt Susan came into contact with a large number of people who shared her beautiful character and her charm of manner." [re: Mt. Airy, 11 June].

James Davis' obituary survives and records:

A GOOD MAN GONE BUT NOT LOST

Died at his residence at Red Shoals Stokes County, N.C., on the morning of the 6th inst., JAMES DAVIS, in the 80th year of his age, after a protracted illness of three months, which he bore with christian patience. The deceased professed religion at Laurel Hill Campmeeting in August, 1849, and attached himself to the Methodist Episcopal Church, and from that day to the day of his death, proved to be a consistent member of the same. His house was the home for the ministers of the Gospel, and many of them can testify to the kind treatment they received under his roof. The writer of this had been intimately acquainted with the deceased over thirty years, and can truthfully say that he was a model man and Christian. The day before he died, I heard him say to a friend who spoke to him about dying, "all is well." He told me a short time before his death, that he was willing and prepared to go. He talked often to his children with perfect composure about dying, and gave them directions concerning his temporal affairs. It may be truly said that he will be missed and long missed, by many poor people who have been fed by his charitable acts, never having turned away the hungry without supplying their wants. He has no doubt met with his sainted companion that passed away to the upper and better world fifteen years ago. He leaves behind him eleven children, fifty-one grand children, and twenty-three great grand children to mourn their loss, but their loss is his eternal gain.

Dear Betty,

I certainly enjoyed getting to know you on my visit to North Carolina in May, and I appreciate the help you gave me in my searching at the Community College in Dobson. It was my first trip to Mount Airy in 3 or 4 years and we enjoyed seeing the place again. I had about decided that there was practically no one left there that I knew (or who knew me) but, surprisingly, we ran into several old friends.

One of the reasons for our visit was to try to get a bit more information on my forefathers who lived in and near Mount Airy. We spent a few days around Winsboro, SC where we were able to get more information on Nora's mother's side of the family. We were able to fill in a few dates, names, and also got some good pictures of gravestones and monuments which will give us a good record. (Wherever possible, I have gotten close-up shots of head stones which I mount on heavy paper and place in a three-ring binder. I then mount an overall view of the cemetery lot and identify it as to location, cemetery name, lot section and number, etc. so that future generations will have a pretty good "fix" on the exact location and just who is buried there.)

So far, I have not been able to go back further than my maternal great parents -- Warren and Matilda Davis of Surry County, and I only have skimpy information about them. Their son, Johathan Davis (my grandfather) worked for many years at the quarry there. He died a couple of years before I was born.

In the late 30s till perhaps the early 50s there was a steam locomotive at the quarry that was named the JONCE DAVIS. My grandfather was (perhaps) a legend of sorts and was well liked by J. D. Sargent who was then president of the NC Granite Corp. Therefore, when the quarry bought a new steam locomotive, Sargent named it the JONCE DAVIS.

I have tried about all the sources I have in an attempt to find a picture of this locomotive. I first tried Lacy Vernon at the quarry and had no luck; then I tried Ruth Minick and she had nothing. I feel sure that several people must have a picture of this engine. I am almost certain a picture exists in some old advertising or sales material for NC Granite Corp. I am attaching a separate write-up about this

locomotive. In the event you run across a picture anywhere, please let me know. I think it would be a good addition to my "family tree" material.

Again, it was nice meeting you. Perhaps our paths will cross again someday as we both search for those who have gone before us. Thanks for all the help.

THE "JONCE DAVIS"

In the 1930s the North Carolina Granite Corporation purchased a new steam locomotive. This locomotive was used for shifting cars of granite around the quarry and saw service until perhaps the early 1950s. Painted on each side of the engine's cab was the name --- JONCE DAVIS.


Jonathan Franklin Davis was my grandfather, and he worked at the quarry for many years. When the new locomotive was purchased for the quarry, Mr. J. D. Sargent named the engine for my grandfather.

I am interested in getting a picture of the JONCE DAVIS for my "family tree" file, and having it to show to my children and grandchildren. I feel sure that pictures exist of this engine but I have not been able to locate one. I can recall seeing a picture of this locomotive (perhaps when it was new) with Mr. Sargent and other quarry workers standing beside it. It is quite likely that a picture appeared in advertising or sales literature from the quarry, or that a picture appeared in the local paper(s).

If anyone has (or knows of) a picture of the JONCE DAVIS please contact me. If you want to keep the original, I will pay for copying the original. It may be that due to the age of the original picture a simple photocopy (Xerox) may not show the engine in clear detail. If this is true, any good print or re-copy shop will have more sophisticated means of duplicating the picture and still retain the original detail.

We checked our files on the Davis family and did not find any information that would verify the mother of children of Reece William Davis. From dates given it appears children Harden E. (born 1821) and Addison H. (born June 1823) were the children of Martha Harris as he married her in 1820. Surry County marriage bond for Reece Davis to Patsey Childers was 18 Aug 1823. It appears remaining children were born to Patsey Childers.

We found an old surname card (1979) in our file that Betty Davis Clark, 226 West Perry, Belvidere, IL 61008 was researching the Reece Davis and Martha (Patsy) Harris family from Surry and the Robert Harris and Dicey Harris family. She noted on her card that Dicey Harris was 82 in the 1840 census. If you have never contacted this lady you may want to try to get in touch with her.

We suggest you send queries for our quarterly journals and surname cards for our file. Information is enclosed. We have over 300 members to our association and there is a good chance someone could help you with this family.

JOHN DAVIS

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John Davis was born March 4, 1768, in Orange County, North Carolina. He died October 2, 1850, in Yadkin County, North Carolina. He married first on October 7, 1790, to Hannah Bills, born January 20, 1770, daughter of Daniel and Deborah (Denham) Bills.

John Davis married second on August 23, 1810, (Surry County, North Carolina marriage records) to Elizabeth Jarvis, daughter of Daniel and Nancy (Anderson) Jarvis. John Davis was disowned by the Deep Creek Monthly Meeting for this marriage but was reinstated in 1824. Elizabeth may have been received at this time, but no record of her acceptance has been found.

After the death of Elizabeth (Jarvis) Davis in 1832, John Davis married on February 1, 1834, to Rebecca (Thompson) Hutchins, the widow of Benjamin Hutchins. (Deep Creek Monthly Meeting)

John Davis was appointed guardian of three children of Benjamin and Rebecca Hutchins: Rebecca, Sarah, and Phoebe. Rebecca Hutchins, born August 5, 1828, married Daniel Mackie. Sarah Hutchins married Joshua Lace Williams. Phoebe Hutchins born August 14, 1822, married Pleasant Williams (Deep Creek Monthly Meeting).

John Davis was a Justice of the Peace of Yadkinville, North Carolina. He lived one mile from town and walked each day into town, even when a very old man. He was short, fat, and of light complexion. His mother Mary (Chamness) Davis was also of light complexion.

It is claimed that during the American Revolution he carried food to the soldiers.

John Davis was a son of John and Mary (Chamness) Davis.

The grandfather of John Davis was Charles Davis, the founder of this family in America. Charles was born about 1706 in Wales, England. He arrived in America in the year 1724/25. Charles Davis married Hannah Matson.

I had previously told you I had discovered an 82 year old lady in Kirkwood, Mo. who descended from a sister, Martha Davis, to my g.g. grandfather Creed Taylor Davis. When I wrote you before I had misunderstood her on the phone as saying Elijah Davis' grandfather was Robert Davis.—Correction——— I met with this lady(very good mind) at her home in Kirkwood. She says our Elijah Davis' father was a Robert Davis in the Revolutionary War: that her grandmother Martha Davis had told her this over and over.

What facts do you have on your Henry Davis' father Robert? and Henry Davis' brother Elijah Davis?

The first verified record of my Elijah Davis is that he applied for ground in 1827 at Franklin, Mo. (the ground being located in Boone Co. Mo.). When he sold this ground his wife's name was on it.

Martha Davis who married Joseph Warren James named her first son Robert.

Since my Elijah Davis was about 32 when he married Lucinda Haynes he could possibly have been married before. There was ancolder boy in the 1830 census of Boone Co. Mo. All Lucinda and Elijah Davis children appeared to have Haynes' names but I do not know any of Elijah Davis' family other now that his father was supposed to have been Robert Davis.

Rainwaters, of Logan County, Kyt Their children are Judidah B., Jacob C. (deceased), Jerome F. and Benjamin R. Judidah B. is the wife of M. S. Heltsley, of this county. Armon D. is their child. Mr. Davis is a minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church. Mrs. Davis is a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

W. II. DEASON was born in 1840 in Todd County, Ky.; his parents are James N. and Eliza J. (Tucker) Deason, natives of Kentucky. The father was a farmer; his death occurred in 1864, at the age of fortyseven years; the mother is living in this county, at the age of sixty-five years. These parents have eight children all living in years of maturity (a very uncommon thing). W. H. began for himself at the age of twenty years; he farmed on rented ground for fifteen years, when he bought 150 acres, located on the East Fork of Pond River; he has a nice farm and is a good farmer, responsible and well-to-do. His principal product is tobacco, having raised 4,000 pounds the past year; his farm raises good corn and wheat, and is especially adapted for the latter; it can hardly be excelled for wheat land. He was married in 1861 to Mrs. Mary V. (Tucker) Powell, of this county. These parents have six living children, viz .: Emma J. (the wife of T. N. Cathcart, of Tenn.), W. H., G. W., Mary A., Mida F. and Benjamin C. The parents and two of the children are members of the Baptist Church.

JAMES D. DUNCAN, tobacco merchant, was born in 1845, in Montgomery County, Tenn. His parents were D. H. and Mary L. (Brake) Duncan, natives of Tennessee. The father was a tobacco merchant, a member of the Christian Church and of the Masonic order. The mother's death occurred in December, 1873, at the age of fifty-four years. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church. Mr. Duncan began business for himself at the age of twenty-five years. Previously he had been interested with his father; he has been a resident of this county since 1871; he bought 135,000 pounds of tobacco the past year; he has been moderately successful in business, and takes rank among the good citizens of the county. He owns two lots with a comfortable dwelling in Kirkmansville, and at present has an encouraging outlook. He was married in 1874 to Mrs. Susan E. Boyd, daughter of Edmond and Elizabeth

and conducted the business of both until 1881, when he sold his store and has since conducted the business of the mill. Mr. Butler was elected Constable and discharged the duties of his office with credit to himself and satisfaction to his constituents. He was elected Sheriff in 1882, and will be a candidate for re-election the coming fall. It is generally conceded that he has made an efficient public officer. He owns a farm of 130 acres which he has acquired by his own unaided industry. Mr. Butler was married March 12, 1884, to Miss Nannie E. Heltsley, daughter of J. H. Heltsley, of Muhlenburg County. Mrs. Butler is a member of the Baptist Church.

JACOB B. DAVIS was born February 21, 1834, in Todd County, Ky. His parents were Jacob and Polly (West) Davis, both natives of North Carolina. The father settled in Todd County at an early day. His death occurred in 1865, aged seventy-five years. He was a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Our subject, the eighth of thirteen children, began for himself at the age of twenty-one years. He had nothing in the start but his own energy and perseverance. In addition to farming he has worked some at the carpenter trade. He has been tolerably successful in business. He owns 250 acres of land, much of which is improved. His outlook is encouraging. He enlisted October 1, 1861, in Twenty-sixth Regiment Kentucky Volunteer Infantry. He participated in the battles of Shiloh, Perryville, Stone River, Salt River, etc., besides many dangerous skirmishes. He was in the Thirteenth United States Army Corps, under Gen. Thomas. His discharge dates July, 1865. He served nearly five years. He was wounded in the Shiloh battle in the left arm, and in a skirmish he was shot in the left jaw and left leg at the same time. He was disabled by these wounds some two months. He carried the ball in his jaw from 1864 to 1883 (nineteen years), when it came into his left nostril and was taken by him from his mouth. The ball knocked out two molar teeth on the left side and one on the right, and then glanced upward toward the eyes. The ball that gave him the wound in his left limb he still carries, and from these wounds he has much discomfiture to this day. He has received a pension the last six years. He had a spell of yellow jaundice in 1862, and on convalescing from that he took the typhoid fever which disabled him three months. Mr. Davis is proud of his army record, but does not

Thank you for your letter and your family group sheets, and because of them I have somemore questions to ask. You have a marriage for your Henry and Susannah WEST but there is no place listed.

I have been going through the tax lists for Granville Co, NC and have run across the name Jackson and Henry-my problem as far as you are concerned is that right now I am going through the 1823 + lists and by 1815 your people were already in TN.

Another suggestion: if your people were from NC but moved to TN and they had part of someone's estate left to them in NC they might have given someone a power of attorney to collect what was owed them. I have read a lot of these from Caswell Co, NC, but I'm sure all the other countries had them, too. I don't know if they would be listed in both TN and NC court records, but they possibly are. They are written something to the effect:

I Henry Davis of Overton Co, TN do appoint my brother/good friend Robert Jenkins in and of the county of Drange, NC to collect from the estate of Stephen West left to me through right of my wife Susannah.

This aight get you back to the right area in NC.

I also have the same problem with authors who do not want to divilge where or not your family is listed in their books.

At this point it is still possible that your Jackson Henry and my Robert are brothers-if they are both from Granville. I have found Roberts father Robert (using the tax lists) in a section of Granville, called Abram's Plain. Whether he moved from there or died, I'm not sure because he didn't leave a will. The next thing to check is land records and after that court records.



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COPELAND/COPLEN AND ALLIED FAMILIES IMMIGRANTS TO VIRGINIA

CHAPTER I

IMMIGRATION TO VIRGINIA

The earliest permanent settlement in the New World was established at Jamestown on 13 May 1607 by The Virginia Company and Sir Walter Raleigh. In spite of severe suffering by the colonists from the new experience of frontier life and an Indian massacre in 1622, the colony persevered and survived. Tobac co planting was introduced in 1612. A headright system, which initially granted 100 acres to each person who came to the colony, was established in 1616 to stimulate immigration'. In 1619, a General Assembly, consisting of the governor, the councilors, and 22 elected burgesses, was established - the first English overseas representative body - and met in the church in Jamestown. In 1624, the Charter of The Virginia Company was revoked by King James I and a Royal Colony was organized. In 1634, the first eight Virginia counties were set up, each with its sheriff, constable, justices, clerk, and coroner. Church parishes already existed. Most Virginians remained loyal to King Charles I during his struggle with Parliament, but in 1652, Cromwell's parliamentary commissioners forcefully assumed control of the colony.

Our ancestors had a variety of reasons for leaving 17th Century England and Scotland to immigrate to the American Colonies. Major reasons were political and religious instabilities and persecutions, limited economic opportunities, the English law of primogeniture (first born son's exclusive right of inheritance) increased personal freedom, and escape from wars and

.

foreign invasion threats. A more specific cause for william and Mary Copeland's immigration prior to 1650 may have been the defeat of the Scotch and English Royalist forces of King Charles I by the Parliamentarian forces under Cromwell in June 1645, followed by King Charles' execution in 1649. King Charles I was the son of King James I. The latter was king of Scotland and later of England also. This political upheaval initiated an influx of thousands of the defeated followers of King Charles I to begin life anew in Virginia.

The Copeland family appears to have originated in the mortnernmost English counties of Cumberland and Northumberland sometime prior to the 12th Century. There are districts in each of these counties which bear the name Topeland, Copland, or Coupland, as it was sometimes spelled. The name Copeland means "bought land" and was originally used by persons who lived in these specific districts in these Scotish border counties. By the 17th Century, the name was also found in Lancashire, Yorkshire, and London, in England, and in Galloway, Ayrshire, Dumfriesshire, and Glasgow, in Scotland.

Some possibly more distantly related Virginia Copeland lines which the author has identified should be noted here:

John (Jo.) Copeland was a famous Quaker missionary to the Colonies. He repeatedly came to New England and Virginia, generally in the company of Christopher Holder and others from about 1656 on. John settled in Mansemond Co VA c1678 and lived there until c1700. He

then returned to Yorkshire, died 9 Jan 1718 and was buried at North Cave, Yorkshire. The descendants of this Virginia family are traced in "Copeland Genealogy" and will not be covered further herein.

Another apparently separate Copeland line started in Loudon Co. VA with David and his second wife, Deborah, who came from Londonderry, Ireland in 1765. He settled in Hillsboro in Loudon Co. VA. This line is traced in "Buchanan, Copeland, Ribble" and will not be covered further herein.

A third, and possibly related Copeland line, is to be described in a forthcoming book, "Copeland Pioneers to the Twin Territories" 47, which is expected to be available early in 1983. This line startes with a Joseph Copeland, b VA or NC, and he appears to have lived in Chowan Co NC c1800. His descendants migrated on to Wayne Co TN and then westward to Oklahoma and Texas. Joseph may have been the son of Charles Copeland, Sr. (3-5) (see Chapter VIII).

The Virginia Copeland line traced in this work started with William and Mary Copeland who came, probably from Glasgow, Scotland, and settled in what is now Middlesex Co. VA (then Lancaster Co.), on the south bank of the Rappahannock River, prior to 1650⁴.

A land patent was issued to Sir Thomas Luntsford on 24 Oct 1650 for 3,423 acres "lying on a bay on the south side of the Rappahannock River" for the "transport of 65 persons" including Wm. and Mary Copeland After 1616, every immigrant to Virginia earned a headright (a

right to patent 50 acres of land - 100 acres if he came by 1616) for the person who paid for each immigrant's transportation. In cases of repeated entries into Virginia, several headrights could be legally earned.

William and Mary immigrated to the south side of the Rappahannock River into what was then Lancaster Co VA⁴. William's first wife, Mary, apparently died cl660 and he then married Grace¹³. William and Grace's children, William and John, were christened in Christ Church, Middlesex Co VA and their birth dates, as recorded in the Parish Register¹³, were 26Marl667 and 21Marl669 respectively.

Based on Lancaster Co VA records 11, William (or Will, as he was called) was known as a carpenter in his early years in VA. In 1655, he bought 537 acres of land "on S. side of the Rappahannock River and on the N. side of Sunderland Creek, bordering land of Richard Lewis" from Daniel and Elizabeth Welsh 11. In 1663, Will Copeland was appointed Constable of Lancaster Co 12 (in the portion south of the Rappahannock which became Middlesex Co in 1673). Will was still living there in 1668 12 and died there probably c1700.

William Copeland (2-1) lived in Middlesex Co VA until c1712 when he removed to Chowan Pct NC14. Prior to the Tuscarora War in North Carolina, from 1711 to 1713, the Indians had been a serious threat to the settlers. After the victory which concluded that war, the rate of NC settlement rose steadily. The Carolinas presented a unique opportunity then to secure cheap, fertile land and a more favorable climate. Settlers from VA, PA, and MD moved there in large numbers. In 1712, William received a land grant and purchased additional land in Chowan Pct NC to make his total holdings 1,040 acres 14. His patented land grant was located adjacent to Sandy Run, and near Bear Swamp and Bennett's Creek²⁶ in what is now Gates Co NC. In the 1717 tax list for Chowan Co NC, William is shown as holding 900 acres and as having two "taxables" (total whites and blacks) 25. He was most likely a factor (merchant) but probably also farmed.

Richard Copeland, Sr. lived with his father, John, in Surry Co NC until c1798 (at age 24) when he evidently left home. He married Euphamie c1800 and his first child, James, was born in VA in 1802⁵⁷. He migrated westward with his family and was in Belmont Co OH when his second child, Asa, was born in 1805. He remained in Belmont Co until c1818 when he moved to Coshocton Co OH. He served during the War of 1812 as a Sergeant in James Campbell's Company (a Belmont Co OH Company) Odd Battalion, Ohio Militia, commanded by Major Samuel Connell. In 1823, Richard subscribed for one student, probably Henry, in a school to be held in the Methodist Meeting-House near William Coulter's, in Perry Twp, Coshocton Co OH, to be taught by John L. Meredith. Richard was living in Perry Twp, Coshocton Co in the 1820 Cen-

sus and in Newcastle Twp, Coshocton Co in the 1830 Census. He is not found in subsequent Census, so we presume he died c1835.

There are several family traditions relative to the prior history and ancestors of Richard Copeland, Sr or I (6-24), known to the author. These traditions are described and discussed below:

- (1) According to 44, Richard Copeland I was born in Culpepper Co VA (a northern neck Co) and was a private in the Revolutionary War. He was a son of John Copeland, also born in the colonies, and a grandson to Percival Copeland, born in Londonderry Ireland of Scottish parentage, who came to America early in the 17th Century. Richard Copeland II, Richard I's son, was born in Rockbridge Co VA near the Natural Bridge over the Cedar River,
- (2) According to ^{45,54}, "About the time of the Revolutionary War, Richard Copeland and his brother, James, immigrated from France to Pennsylvania where they separated. Richard went to Virginia".
- (3) According to ⁵³, Richard and James Copeland left England for France to escape the Church of England. In France, they joined Lafayette's army and came to Pennsylvania. From there, Richard went to Virginia.

Now, to discuss the possible validity of the above traditions:

(1) Our research has not shown that Richard fought in the Revolutionary War, although he was a Sergeant in

the Ohio Militia in the War of 1812. We further have not found a trace of John or Richard Copeland in Culpepper Co VA, and no trace of a Percival Copeland immigrating to the colonies.

- (2) In the 1880 Census, three of Richard's sons stated that his birthplace was in America; two, Asa and William said VA, James said MD. From this evidence, the author believes that Richard Copeland, Sr. was born in VA and did not "come to America with his brother, James".
- (3) A John Copeland (5-23) had a son, Richard, b 29Nov1774, and a careful study has shown that he is the father of Richard (6-24). A subsequent study shows an ancestor relationship going back to a William and Mary Copeland 4, who immigrated to Virginia, probably from Glasgow, Scotland, prior to 1650.

From the above, it is apparent that three, and possibly four of the items in tradition (1) above are probably correct out of the nine presented. However, it appears that only the "Richard went to Virginia" item is correct in traditions (2) and (3).

Richard Copeland/Coplen (Coplin in 1840-50 in IN, reverting to Copeland in MO) moved with his family to Fulton Co IN in 1838. Richard Copeland Sr. lived with his father, John, in Surry co. NC until C.1798 (at age 24) when he evidently left home. He married Euphamie c 1800 and his first child, James was born in Virginia in 1802. He migrated westward with his family and was in Belmont Co., Ohio, when his second child, Asa, was born in 1805. He remained in Belmont Co. until Ca. 1818, when he moved to Coshocton Co. Objo. He served during the War of 1812 as a Sergeant in James Campbell's Company (a Belmont Co. Ohio Company) Odd Battalion, Ohio Militia, commanded by Major Samuel Connell

Asa Copland/Coplen was the father of William, Lyman, (Lemuel) and Chauncey He was born in April of 1805, in Belmont Co Ohio. He died 12 May 1896, in Joliet, Will. Co. Iil, aged 91, (Oakwood Cemetery) He first married Lucretia Ann Abbott, on 9 Apr1832, in Ohio. She was born lin 1810 and died in 1859, the daughter of William G and Sarah (Field) Abbott.

His second wife was Minerva Jane Fisher, married on 12 Oct 1869 in Indiana. She was born in 1841 and died in 1927, the daughter of and Mary Fisher.

Asa Copeland/Coplen (Coplen after 1845 in IN) moved with his family from Coshocton Co. OH to Fulton Co. IN around 1836 or 1837 and bought 40 acres of government land just east of the current site of Talma. He purchased adjacent land at various times until he had acquired 200 acres. He owned and operated a saw mill to provide lumber for houses and farm buildings. In 1852, he sold his 200 acres to Pete Kessler for \$1.500. In 1853, Asa bought 52 acres which including the site of Bloomingsburg (now Talma). The application for recording the townsite of Bloomingsburg was signed solely by Asa. In 1858, Asa cought the gold fever and decided to go to Colorado. He sold enough of his property to finance the trip and they left. Enroute, Asa's wife, Lucretia Ann became deathly ill and died at Fort Riley Kansas. Before she died Lucretia made Asa promise to return to Indiana with the children. As a evidently did so because he resumed his trading in land in 1860 in Bloomingsburg, IN. At some time Asa took out a

license as a Tavern Keeper under the exise law. As a remained a widower for about ten years and then married Minerva Jane Fisher. In 1888, As a sold his remaining property in Bloomingsburg and moved, with his family, to Joliet, III. Around 1889. They lived there until he died in 1896 at the age of 91.

William Coplen and his first wife must have accompanied Asa, and his family on the trip to Colorada in 1858/9 since his first child, Jayman, was born in 1859 in Kansas. Nothing more is heard of the child, Jayman. William's second child, William A. was born in 1861 in Indiana.

William Coplen's first wife was Martha Ann Washburn, whom he married July 23, 1857. She was born in 1841 and died March 1, 1861, aged 20 years and 1 month.

William then married Pricilla Faulkner and had Alvah Franklin, James Hudson, Charles Elmore (buried at Reichter Cemetery), Mary (Aunt Mace), and Orsa, who died at 21.

William Coplen was reputed to be a very strong man and could lift a keg of salt upon his shoulder and walk off with it.

William Coplen died in November of 1872, probably of septicemia as a result of injuries suffered in an explosion, of which there are two stories. One is that they were dynamiting stumps in the process of clearing land. The second is they were tamping gunpowder down a hole in an anvil while celebrating the 4th of July when it went off prematurely. (Of the two, I would subscribe to the former.) *See Pricilla Faulkner Obituary.

Aunt Mace married Quimby Cling, who died, Charles Stansbury, who died, Curry Eytcheson (divorced), a Mr. Kelly (divorced), and then she remarried Curry Eytcheson.

James Hudson married Nettie Cling, Pearl, Laura, Minnie and Julia. James Hudson fathered Guy, L.D., and Hudson jr. by Nettie, and Pricilla and Woodrow by Minnie.

Charles Elmore Coplen married Amanda Craft and had children Herman & Tully (Ted.)

Aunt Mace had one adopted son named Hudson.

Alvah Franklin Coplen married Delilah May Davis, daughter of George Davis and Barbara Critchfield of Starke Co, Ohio. Their children were: Vida Glow, George William, Gladys Marie, Lester Lurville, Hester Izora, Mary Olive, and Artimus (Bill) who is still living in Talma. Indiana. Lester died in the great influenza pandemic of 1918. Hester died as an infant at the age of about 6 months. (During the course of writing this account, Artimus Coplen passed away at the age of 93, on Sept 15, 2002, the last of the children of Frank and Delila Coplen.)

Mary C. Bugby married (sometime after June 1890) Silas Clinton Partridge who owned a farm outside of Talma (where she was known as Grandma Partridge by her grandchildren in later years), and there she raised Esthel Raymond Fish. S. Clinton Partridge had several children from a previous marriage to Martha S. Eidson, including Francis E., Olive, and Mina. These were Esthel's step brothers and sisters. When S. Clinton Partridge died, Mary Bugby married (marriage record unknown) her childhood sweetheart, a Mr. Holly (first name unknown) and they lived in Mishawaka. Indiana (a suburb of South Bend) where he was a barber. When Mr. Holly died, she lived with her only child, Esthel Raymond Fish, and his wife Vida in Grand Rapids, Michigan until she died at the age of 77 on 1/16/1940.

The following I remember very vividly. When I was way young, about 5 years old, my mother took me to visit Olive and Mina Partridge. I know they were cousins of your grandfather. They were a couple of old maids. They drove about a 1930 vintage dodge sedan and they wore turbans like Gloria Swanson did in Sunset Boulevard.

They lived not too far north of Talma in a smallish, ancient house with a low pitched roof. It was a weathered silver color, from either never having been painted or it having been a long, long time since it's last coat. The lawn was given over to a growth of Hollyhocks, Pink Rambling Roses and wild grapevines.

Inside, we were ushered into the front parlor, which, as was the custom, was kept in a semi gloom by the means of green roller window shades. The furniture was all Civil War era. I plopped down hard on a red plush Eastlake settee and threw my head back at the same time, bashing the back of my head on a piece of solid walnut trim and damned near braining myself. Ever since then I have had an inherent distrust of little old spinster ladies with High Victorian Furniture in their front parlors.

Esthel Raymond and Vida Glow are buried in the Reichter cemetery in Rochester, Indiana, as is Mary Bugby under the name of Mary Partridge.

Donavon Fish married Virginia Delta. This marriage ended in divorce. He then married Esther Wolford and had Esthel Raymond Fish II who lives in Pittsburg. California This marriage also ended in divorce. His final marriage was to Pat Williams (which also ended in divorce), and had Herbert James Fish who lives in Woodbury, Minnesota. Donavon Fish died on 9/30/1977 in San Diego. California.

Charles Fish married Ethelyn Toren and adopted a daughter, Judith Kay Fish. This marriage ended in divorce. He then married Nina Irene Moore (no children). Charles and Nina live in Meadow Vista, California. (note: Charles Fish was born on April 18, 1913 and died in June or July of 2004 at age 91. His widow, Nina, survives.)

Gladys Marie Coplen married Everett Stockberger and had a son named Arlos Lowell who died at birth. They also had a daughter named Juanita Daphne who married Welcome Snyder. Juanita and Welcome had three children and moved to California. Gladys and Everett died a day apart in the first week of January, 1919 in the Great Spanish Flu Pandemic. They lay side by side in the Reichter Cemetery in Newcastle twp

Artimus married Helen N. Sanner on May 20, 1937, in Plymouth. She died Oct, 28, 1999. They had two children, Steve E. and David. Steve lives in Florence, Kentucky, and David Inves in Elkhart, Indiana.

Steve Coplen was born Jan 25, 1939 and was married to Sharon Eliott Dec 26 1960 in the First Baptist Church in Rochester, IN. Sharon was born Aug. 30. 1942. They had three children; Melody Faye born Sept 30, 1961. Barry Lee, born Feb 13, 1963 and died Feb. 17, 1993, the result of a hunting accident. Barry's wife's maiden name was Jackie Hagon. Mark Stephen born Sept 30, 1965, married Allison Keyton 6 grandchildren and 1 step-grandchild. Melody's first husband's name was David Andrews and second husband's name was Robert Kitson. Melody has 1 son and 1 daughter. Her son's name is Derik Born 1-25-89 and a daughter, Nichole born 12-28-2000.

Barry has a son, Brandon Lee, born 1-25-85 and a daughter Erica Nichole born 12-7-88. Mark has a son, Steven James born 9-90. A daughter Jessica born 7-19-91 and a stepson Devon Born 10-12-92.

Harry Wenger died May 25, 1962 and Olive died April 8, 1982. Daniel lives in Denver, Colorado, and Haila Jane lives in Greenfield

Haila Jane Wenger was born 12-29-44 and was married in the Talma Methodist Church on Oct. 15, 1966 to Thomas Earle O'Neill. They have three children; Christopher David b. 10-28-69, unmarried. Kevin Gene (adopted) b. 4-16-71 Married and with one son, 10 or 12 years old and Mary Katherine b. 4-15-80, Engaged to be married May 31, 2003.

Vida Glow Coplen (B 6/10/1891 at Delong, Fulton Co., D. 1/2/1987 in Meadow Vista, California) married Esthel Raymond Fish on January 23, 1909 in Argos, Indiana and had Donavon Herschel Franklin Fish, Charles Wayne Fish, Mary Loudella Fish, Winifred Ruth Fish, James George Fish, Herbert Coplen Fish and Barbara Ann Fish, who died as an infant.

Esthel Raymond Fish (B 1/14/1886 near Talma, D 9/30/1964 in Tucson, Arizona) was the son of John Herschel Fish and Mary C. (middle name sometimes recorded as Elizabeth) Bugby (sometimes spelled Bugbee).

Mary Bugby was born in 1867, the daughter of Nelson and Nancy (Bell) Bugby. John H. Fish (age 22) met Mary Bugby (age 16) at a barn dance where he was playing the fiddle, and after a brief romance, he married her on 9/23/1883. Their first child, Delman H. Fish was born 6/10/1884 and died 1/8/1885 as an infant of 6 months and 28 days.

According to the 1880 census for Fulton County, John H. Fish listed his age as 19 years, his occupation as harness maker, and his residence as the Wallace House (a boarding house) in Rochester, Indiana. Thus, he was born in 1861, but his birth date, birthplace (somewhere in Indiana), parents, and siblings (if any) are unknown. There were several Fish's in and around that time and place who were doctors, but apparently John H. Fish was not a doctor.

Sometime after they had Esthel Raymond, John H. Fish divorced Mary Bugby and married (marriage record unknown) another 16 year old girl (name unknown). John H. Fish and this woman had the following children: Reba (died at age 16), Hazel, Zella, and Mable. These were Esthel R. Fish's half sisters. After this wife died, John H. Fish married (marriage record unknown) a woman (name unknown) who owned a farm in southern Michigan, which was where he lived until he died (date and place unknown). Hazel and Zella were last known (1964) to be living in Galien, Michigan (near Niles).

Mary Fish married Thomas Gerald Humbarger and had David Paul, Darla Lee, Daniel Phillip and Winnie Susanne. Mary and Gerald live in Battle Creek, Michigan.



Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of The act of Congress of the 7 of Jan 1832 State of North Carolina County of Surry

On this 14th day of August 1832 personally appeared before the undersigned Jonathon Whitaker, Geo A. Jervis or Jas Clanton acting justices of the peace of the County of Surry NC, Robert Davis, a resident of the county and State aforesaid, aged 77 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth un his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the pensions made by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 that he enlisted in the army of the United States in the years with Capt Isaac Taylor and served with the 1st regiment of the Virginia Line under the following named officers Capt. I. Taylor Major Quirk Col. John Montgomery.

He enlisted for the time of three years in Botetourt County Virginia Marched to the Mississippi River, past the Mississippi he marched to a place called the Illinois Towns, from thence to the Waubash thence to the Sandusky plains where he was in a battle against the Indians from thence he was marched again to the ---- banks on the Mississippi and thence to the falls of the Ohio where he was wounded in the shoulder and where he remained until discharged by Col Montgomery. His discharge he has lost. He was during the time engaged in many skirmishes with the Indians during all which time he was a Sergeant Major. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and he discloses that his name is not on the pension role of any agency in any state or (if any) only on that of the agency in the State of Virginia

James Davis, the younger (1793-1873) of Stokes County

James Davis, Jr. was born on the 23rd of December 1793 in Stokes County, probably on his father's Snow Creek plantation. He is the eldest son of James and Margaret (nee Dunlap) Davis whose origins are obscured by time. The family Bible labels James the Elder as "of Augusta county, Virginia" and it seems likely that this family emigrated to Stokes along the Great Wagon Road through the Virginia Valley. Though the details of the early family history has been lost to time, James the Elder is well remembered mainly for his role in founding the family fortune. During his ninety-one years, James Davis the Elder accumulated over 4,700 acres in the region and his will lists forty-six slaves and land in Tennessee. He left all his children, and especially his two sons, with considerable fortunes.

Most personal history of the earliest generations of the Davis family remains more in the realm of folktales, rather than in documented historic fact. A good example of these family myths is the tale of James Davis, Jr.'s birth. Kathleen A. Blackwell, a descendant who has been the custodian of most of the Davis family history, recalls being told that at the moment of James' birth, [a]"huge rock broke off a cliff above the road, where it crossed the Morris Field Branch, rolled down and crushed a [black] woman carrying a baby". This story may be factual or merely folklore, but it has been part of the local oral history for 200 years. The origins of the story is unknown, but it appears to have been passed down from black servants to their white wards. This tale is the earliest image we have of James Davis.

More concrete evidence of James Davis' life and personality is reflected in his own correspondence. Three known letters exist along with a supper invitation that was written by James Davis. These writings represent a fragment of correspondence between Davis and his children that only in recent times have been collected and transcribed. Probably the largest collection of his letters were those written to his daughter Polly Fulton, who had emigrated to Texas before the Civil War. At her death, Polly's extensive collection of letters were split up amongst her children; however, only one set is known to have survived and is now owned by Elizabeth Drouet of Denver, Colorado. In general, James Davis' letters show a strong hand and diverse word usage that suggest a high level of literacy and probably formal education. These letters reveal an affectionate father whose daily routine was consumed with plantation and county business. In addition to the letters to Polly, a very early letter dating from the 1840's is found addressed to his son Jesse who was attending Emory College in Virginia [re: Stokes County Heritage Book]. The supper invitation was found in the papers of Dr. John Pepper. The

invitation was sent by James and Elizabeth Davis to the Peppers and dates from the 1850s [re: Ellen Pepper Tilley].

Few details are known of James' early life. It is assumed that most of his life revolved around the running of his father's plantation. Though wealthy, the Davises appear to have been involved in every aspect of the running of their farms. Even in his late sixties, James Davis was still driving his own crops to market as far off as South Carolina. Though James' sons were sent to college, the extent of James' own education is unknown. His letters suggest a good education, probably conducted at home. James, the younger, was old enough to have served in the War of 1812, but instead hired Stephen Ryerson to take his place. Stephen Ryerson (1763-1849) signed a statement naming himself as a substitute hired by James Davis to serve Davis' term for the War of 1812. Ryerson enlisted in 1814.

The exact location of the old Davis homestead is unknown, but it is said James' wife Elizabeth McAnally grew up on the plantation opposite of the Davis homestead on Dan River. However, Stokes tax records and deeds suggest that James Davis, the Elder, settled and built a house further away in the Snow Creek District. It is known that James, Jr. built his own house on the Dan across from the McAnally homestead, which may be the source of the confusion.

The marriage bond for James Davis and Elizabeth McAnally is dated the 2nd of January 1817. In addition to connecting James with one of the most active political families in the region, the marriage produced thirteen children who, both through their own contributions and the actions of their descendants, left a considerable mark on Stokes County.

Elizabeth was born on the 23rd of November in 1796 to Jesse and Elizabeth (Morgan) McAnally. Her father died when she was only four years old and her mother never remarried. Probably her grandfather Capt. Charles McAnally and her uncle Charles Banner played the role of father to her and her orphaned siblings. The McAnallys were active members in the formation and governing of Stokes County. Though the McAnally's family wealth was more modest than that of the Davis', their mark upon early Stokes history is somewhat more dramatic. Elizabeth's father and grandfather served as Justices in the region. Her grandfather was one of the founders of the county and his activities were notable enough to be recorded in the papers of the nearby Moravian community. The farm reported to be the homestead of Jesse McAnally stands, nearly in ruin, near the Dan in the Meadows District.

Little personal information is known about James' wife, Elizabeth McAnally Davis. Elizabeth's birth and death are recorded in the family Bible. One photograph survives of her which must date fairly close to her death. The photograph shows a woman who is not physically well. One eye seems affected, perhaps from a stroke and her hands appear somewhat swollen. Elizabeth died on the 19th of March 1858 and a family story recalls this event. In the Fulton family, Emily Jarvis Davis recalls a story her grandmother told her. Her grandmother, Emma Fulton Nevans, is the daughter of Wilson and Mary Ann (Davis) Fulton and Elizabeth's

granddaughter. It should be noted that Emma Fulton was only three when her grandmother died, so she could not have been an eyewitness to the event. Even the supernatural element of the story makes it suspect to its accuracy; however this powerful story has survived and is worth noting.

Polly Fulton woke up in the middle of the night having dreamt that her mother was in danger. The dream was so vivid that Polly insisted that her husband Wilson wake the household and send for the carriage, even though the weather was bad and the roads icy. The couple, who were living in Danbury, made the difficult trip out to Red Shoals in the pitch of night. Upon their arrival, they found Elizabeth dead, having fallen in front of the fireplace.

In all, the marriage of James and Elizabeth (McAnally) Davis produced thirteen children. This would provide James' greatest legacy. Surprisingly, there is no evidence in the family graveyard or in the family Bible that there were any miscarriages or early deaths of children. The family as a whole seems to have had an unusually long life span per individual with an average of 50 years of age. The longevity found among these people is an indication of both a relatively health living environment and a high standard of living.

The children of James and Elizabeth (nee McAnally) Davis are well recorded by Bible record. Tombstones, obituaries, and public documents can all confirm most of the dates and events. The dates of birth, death, and marriage provided here are all derived from Bible records, except where noted. The original family Bible exists today in the possession of Kathleen A. Blackwell of Pine Hall, NC; however, this Bible was also copied by hand around 1861 into the Fulton family Bible. A comparison of these two Bibles suggest that James Davis copied the Bible himself for his daughter Polly Davis Fulton. The pages from the Fulton Bible exist and are today owned by Elizabeth Drouet of Denver, Colorado. Whenever possible tombstone and obituary dates have been taken into consideration to confirm or to take the place of the Bible records. The below listed grandchildren of James Davis are named in many records including Bibles, tombstones, census and school records. Civil War records have also been surveyed for evidence of service and for some death dates. Descendants of these men and women have also been consulted to confirm information, namely: James Tatum, Kathleen Blackwell, Hilda Taylor, John Brown, Jr. and Rachel Fulton Rawls.

Margaret Davis born 30 Nov 1817 Stokes County; died 31 May 1890 Mt. Airy, NC; married 5 Sep 1836 in Stokes County to Madison Blackburn (1809 - 28 Jul 1849), son of William & Susannah (Bostick) Blackburn. Children: James Oliver Blackburn (1837-1864; died in Civil War), William N. Blackburn (1840-1896), John A. Blackburn (1841-1862; died in Civil War), Margaret Eliza Blackburn (born 1846), Susan E. Blackburn (born 1843; married Wilson Vaughn).

Mary Ann "Polly" Davis born 28 Jan 1819 Stokes County; died 6 Jan 1913 Lometa, TX; married on 12 Jan 1841 in Stokes County Wilson Fulton (12 Jan 1819 - 23 Dec 1873), son of Samuel & Nancy (Redmon) Fulton. Children: Nancy Elizabeth Fulton (married Richard Hill), James Samuel Fulton (married Emma Woody), Charles Edwin Fulton (married first Josie --?--; second Mary Rogers), Mary Ann Bethenia Fulton (married Samuel Hood), Margaret Jane Fulton (married John Townsen), Wilson Davis Fulton, Martha Emily Fulton (married John Nevans), Jesse Francis Fulton (married Kate Smith), Sarah Susan Loretta Fulton (married first William Gooch; second James Stockton).

Airy; married on 13 Oct 1842 in Stokes County Samuel Hill Taylor (5 Jun 1820 - 9 Dec 1892), Sheriff of Surry County, son of William A. & Katherine A. (Hill) Taylor. Children: Roxy Ann Taylor (1843-1846), James J. Taylor (married Miss Thompson), Lucy E. Taylor, Dr. William Samuel Taylor (c1850-1934), Martha E. Taylor (married Mr. Peele) John S. Taylor (born c1856; died Texas), Eliza Jane Taylor, Mary Blanche Taylor (1860-1861), Charles Walter Taylor (born 1863). The Taylors were originally from Henry County, Virginia. Samuel's obituary dates his birth in 1829 & his marriage on October 13. Eliza's obituary lists her son James as a resident of Arkansas.

Nancy J. "Nantie" Davis born 6 Jul 1829 Stokes County; died 6 Dec 1915 died Mt. Airy, NC; buried at Davis graveyard, Stokes Co., NC; married on 22 Dec 1853 in Stokes County Lemuel Pitzer (7 Aug 1823 Rockingham Co, NC - 19 Feb 1859 Danbury, NC), son of Drury Smith & Sarah Pitcher (died 1823). Children: John William "Billy" (married Marhlar Kerner), Sarah Elizabeth "Bittie" (married Joseph Fulton), James J. (1856 -1859). Lemuel is an illegitimate son of Drury Smith. It is said that Drury Smith seduced his wife's sister, Sarah. Sarah Pitcher bore the child and died leaving her son, Lemuel, to be raised in the household of Drury Smith. Lemuel used the spelling Pitzer, rather than Pitcher, though early Census records use the spelling of Pitcher. An obituary from a local paper lists the death of Lemuel "Pitts" and his three year old son, "DIED At his residence, in Stokes County, on the 19th inst., of consumption, Lemuel Pitts, Esq. Also, at the residence of Jas. Davis, on the 17th inst., of inflamation of the brain, a little son of Lemuel Pitts, aged about 3 years." James J. Pitzer's tombstone in the Davis graveyard gives a birth year of 1859 and a death of 1861, but the child in the article is believed to be him, so his birth year has been estimated from the newspaper.

Smith), William Jay (1866-1866). All died from some disease picked up enroute back to North Carolina from Texas. Most of the family died in Cross County, Arkansas, though Alice died in Stokes; married second on 15 Aug 1867 in Mt. Airy, NC to Nancy D. ("Nannie" or "Nanty") Hollingsworth (28 Feb 1838 Tom's Creek, NC - 18 May 1877 Mt. Airy, NC), daughter of James & Elizabeth (Golding) Hollingsworth. Children: Joseph Edgar (born 1868; married Margaret Vaughn), Nancy H. (1876-1900), Mary Eliza (born 1874; married Jesse Carter); married third on 6 Apr 1879 at the Baptist Church, in Madison, NC to Indianna Henrietta Lindsey (10 Apr 1838 Rockingham County, NC - 16 Oct 1903 Stokes County), daughter of John & Nancy Lindsey; Children: Lindsey (born 1880; married Wade Martin), Margaret (born 1884; married Clarence E. McGehee).

Bethenia Rebecca "Becky" Davis born 15 Sep 1833 Stokes County; died 9 Feb 1891 Stokes County; buried in Davis graveyard, Red Shoals, Stokes County; married on 2 Nov 1854 in Stokes to Andrew Jackson Smith (15 Nov 1825 Rockingham County - 9 May 1909 Stokes

County), son of Drury & Frances (Pitcher) Smith. Children: James Francis (born 1856; married first Emma G. Wall; married second Doris Dunlop; married third Mary Scales), Andrew Jackson "Tat" (born 1857; married Mary B. Smith), John P. (died 1871), Jefferson Davis (born 1859; married Mary Ellen Easley), Drury, Jr. (born 1861; married Eliz. Outlaw), Mary Elizabeth "Babe" (born 1864; married Walter F. Davis), Nancy Ednie (born 1866; married Charles Hutinson), Sarah E. "Sadie" (married Rufus M. Tuttle).

Emily Caroline Davis born 19 Jun 1835 Stokes County; died 28 Feb 1916 Stokes County; buried at Davis Graveyard, Red Shoals, NC; married on 31 Oct 1858 at Davis Chapel to Hiram Washington Adkins (26 Jun 1822 - 31 Aug 1891), son of James M. & Laramy V. (Collier) Adkins. Children: James Phillip "Jimmy" (married Addie Kerner), William Jay (1861-1939; bachelor), Sarah Louretta "Lizzie" (1863-1939; spinster), Susan Emily Vines "Susie" (1865-1945; spinster), Edwin Miles "Ed" (1868-1944; bachelor), Charles Hiram (1868-1913; bachelor), John Summerfield Davis (married Della G. Martin), Nancy Margaret Eliza "Nannie" (married Marion T. Chilton), Henry Oliver Tillett (married Eloise J. Yarborough).

Sarah Louisa Davis born 13 Feb 1838 Stokes County; died 19 Jul 1870 Stokes County; married on 25 Dec 1855 in Stokes to William A. Estes (1 Dec 1834 Henry Co., VA - 10 Sep 1894 Winston, NC), Sheriff of Stokes County (1866-7;78;80), son of Jesse & Betsey (Napier) Estes. Children: John Francis (1856-1919), Lilla Elizabeth (born 1858; married Thomas Prather), James William Gegard (23 Feb 1870 - 4 Aug 1870). The Estes family was originally from Henry Co., VA. Betsey Napier's brother Champion married the daughter of Govenor Martin of North Carolina. William A. Estes remarried to Sadie H. Martin (1847-1885), daughter of Edmund Loftin & Harty (Williams) Martin, and had three children: Jesse Edwards (1877-1879), Charles Watt (1879-1932), & Annie Lelie (1882-1885).

Luretta Campbell Davis born 6 Jun 1840 Stokes County; died 4 Aug 1907 Stokes County; never married.

Susan Ellen Davis born 18 Aug 1842 Stokes County; died 1 Jun 1928 Mt. Airy, Surry County, NC; married on 15 Aug 1865 in Stokes to Dr. William R. "Billy" Hollingsworth (14 Jan 1836 - 14 May 1901), son of James & Elizabeth (Golding) H.ollingsworth Children: Elizabeth D. (1866-1867), Katie S. (born 1868; married S. P. Graves), James M. (born 1869), Sadie E. (born 1871; married Mr. Ashby), Dr. Robert E. (born 1873), J. Frank (born 1875), M. Maggie (born 1877; married N. G. Williams) Information on the Hollingsworth family is found in the publication, Descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth (1925). This genealogy identifies this family as descendants of Joseph Hollingsworth (c1765-1819) who settled in North Carolina from Amherst County, Virginia. William's birth date is found in this publication, his death date is provided by his obituary which lists him as age 66.

The Davis' house was built overlooking the Dan River near an area known as Red Shoals and across from the [Jesse] McAnally Place. The site of the home must have been low and near the river, since it is remembered that one could fish off the porch, when the Dan flooded. From bits of oral history and a fragment of a photograph, the Davis house can be described as a large two story wood house probably T or L shaped and skirted by a verandah. The original house burnt down about 1914, but soon after James William Davis built the present house, now known as the Pitzer Place. It is said that the foundations of the Pitzer House are the same as the original Davis homestead. Only one torn photograph of the original house remains and gives the only glimpse of how the house looked. The house appears to have been typical of the area with a wooden clapboard sheath over a wood frame or log structure. The house may have been two or one and a half stories tall. It clearly has an upper story and the photograph shows an outside staircase. It is unclear at what angle the house is viewed in the photo, but Louretta and Nancy are shown sitting on the verandah of what seems to be the ell addition. The doors seem unusually wide and are clearly fine handmade doors with cast iron fixtures. It is said that the boy's wing was accessed through an outside staircase, while the girl's rooms were accessed only by the staircase in the parents bedroom [re: Interview, K.A. Blackwell]. Pieces of the plantation furniture still exist in the Adkins family. Emily Davis Adkins bought many pieces from her father's estate, including a large walnut corner cupboard which was once a set made for the dining room [re: probate records; James Davis 1873]. The cupboard's twin was bought by the Taylor family. James Davis provided for each of his daughters a trousseau, which included an elaborately carved poplar bed (two of which are known to have survived), bed furniture, a spinning wheel, sidesaddle, a horse, a cow and a slave [re: interview, K.A. Blackwell].

Within walking distance of the Davis Place, is Davis Chapel. The first known structure was originally built by James Davis Jr., though it is said a place of worship had been there since the time of James Davis the Elder. The original Chapel burnt down, but was rebuilt by Davis' son-in-law, Hiram Adkins and still stands today. A good photograph of the original chapel exists showing a traditional wooden rectangular meeting house sitting on a rock foundation with a front bell tower of about one and a half stories tall. The Chapel and Davis Graveyard are now administered by the Davis Chapel Historical Association, Inc. Individual (\$10) and Family (\$20) memberships are available from John Brown, 417 Pine Lake, Siler City, NC 27344. Although regular worship services are no longer held, two annual reunions do take place at the Chapel.

Industrial Census records show that James Davis Jr. was involved in both planting and in tobacco manufacturing by mid-century. The earliest tax records have not been surveyed, but by 1838 James Davis Jr. owned a 574 acre farm and eight taxable slaves in the Meadows district. James Davis wealth holdings can be traced through the tax records and provide us with some idea of the life style the family lead. The 1840 tax records show that James Davis Jr. owned 874 acres worth \$2,500.00 and was taxed for ten slaves. After his father's death James' holdings naturally increased, and by 1854 he was taxed on a 2,500 acre plantation worth \$5,400.00 and was taxed

for sixteen slaves. The 1850 Census Schedules list James as one of the largest farmers in Stokes County. Owning 2,500 acres, James was not the largest landowner; however, with 400 acres improved land he owned the fourth largest in improved lands for the county. William Orrender owned 600 acres, William Ware owned 500 acres, and William Withers owned 466 acres. Unlike these other planters, James seems to be a more diversified farmer producing only 2,500 lbs. of tobacco, only a tenth of William Orrender's 25,000 lbs. In 1850, James is listed with 29 slaves, 16 who are over the age of 20 years, giving him a rather large percentage of adult (full-hands) labor. Compared with other large slaveholders James had one of the highest proportion of full-hands in his slave population; numbering over half his slaves. The Industrial Census of 1850, lists Davis as a tobacco manufacturer producing 5,420 lbs. of processed tobacco. On the eve of the Civil War James Davis owned 2,075 acres, an additional 560 acres were taxed for his son Jesse, and James was taxed on 14 slaves. The Agricultural Census of 1860, breaks down the Davis household into 300 acres of improved land and 2,400 acres of unimproved land with a net worth of \$14,000.00. This land sustained 3 horses, 5 mules, 7 milk cows, 15 cattle, 45 sheep, and 60 swine valued at \$1,396.00 and which produced \$500.00 worth of slaughtered meat. Forty five pounds of wool was produced in 1860. The main crop was the 4,000 pounds of tobacco. The plantation also produced 1,400 pounds of corn, 400 bushels of wheat, 100 bushels of rye, and 200 bushels of oats. Other foodstuff was raised such as, peas, beans, Irish potatoes and sweet potatoes. The 1862 tax list show James Davis with 2,692 acres worth \$12,950.00 and 29 taxable slaves worth \$7,500 and cash amounting to \$6,440.00. The tax list for 1863 shows James with 1,764 acres worth \$8,500, 32 slaves worth \$12,250, debts of \$2,400.00, cash of \$6,000, Confederate bonds worth \$1,050.00, a house worth \$75.00 and one dog. The Census records of 1860 poll James Davis with an estate of \$45,700.00 making him the sixth wealthiest man in Stokes County. James' brother William is shown as the fifth wealthiest.

James' brother, William, who in 1863 is listed with an estate worth over \$38,000.00, is taxed on Confederate bonds valued at \$7,000.00. This large holdings of bonds show one reason why William was so short of money at the end of the War and was almost ruined by a loan he and other Stokes County leaders had made, to provide clothes and supplies to the County troops. Though there is evidence that James supported South in the war, he was far more cautious in the risks he took, perhaps because he had children to support. As a result, James' wealth though devalued after the war, survived in tact.

James' wealth made him an influential man in the county. At the end of the War, the U. S. Army commander was advised in a letter to contact James Davis, as one of the County's leading citizens [re: Correspondence of the Union Forces]. The letter reads as follows:

HDQRS. THIRD DIVISION, TWENTY-THIRD ARMY CORPS. Greensborough. N.C., May 10, 1865 Instructions for the officers in charge of the

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detail from the One hundred and twelfth Illinois Volunteer Infantry: You will proceed to Danbury, Stokes County, N.C., by the following route: Via Krusess' Cross Roads to Madison; northwest course form Madison to Cardwell's Mills; from there to Sandy Ridge; form Sandy Ridge to Danbury. On your arrival there you will, as far as practicable, consult with good, responsible, loyal citizens, for the purpose of organizing a small company of the most respectable loyal citizens to serve as a loyal police force until further orders...A list of names is appended to this; these persons are represented as good citizens, who may be able to give you assistance...W.B. Taylor, R.B. Hay, Samuel Hall, Spottswood Taylor, James Davis, John J. Martin, Zach Alley, William O. Lash, James Rierson, Joel Hill, Jacob Hill, Joseph Fulp, Benjamin Bailey...By command of Brigadier-General Carter: L.A. Gratz Major and Acting Assistant Adjutant-General[re: Correspondence, Etc. - Union; Operations in NC, SC, S. GA & E. FL, pg 460-61]

Consequently, the Davis plantation was occupied by General Palmer, who led part of Stoneman's raid through North Carolina. The Adkins family remembers stories relating to the occupation. Confirmation of the occupation is found in a letter contemporary with the event written by Luretta Davis to her sister in Texas. Billy Pitzer and other grandchildren of James Davis, many who were eye witnesses, were the primary stories tellers in the family. According to the Pitzers, the Union forces arrived at Red Shoals and occupied the house. The Davis slaves managed to hide the hams in the skirts of the beds. James Davis' favorite horse was spared from confiscation by a slave named Caesar, who hid the horse in the woods; however, James' rifle was taken and broken in half over the fence in front of the house. That same rifle was passed downed for generations in the James W. Davis family and is now owned by Hiram Martin of Lynchville, Virginia. Kathleen Adkins Blackwell was told by her grandmother, Emily Davis Adkins, of the Union soldiers camping in the graveyard and of Louretta Davis begging the General to spare her ancestors such a disgrace, a wish which Palmer granted. Another story tells of Susan Davis who was mortified when asked to break the Sabbath and mend the General's button, and sobbed as she complied with her captor's request [re: K.A. Blackwell, interview & Stokes County Heritage]. A contemporary letter survives describing the situation in Stokes, during Stoneman's raid. The letter written is by Luretta Davis to her sister Polly Fulton in Texas mentions an earlier more detailed account, now lost, written by Sam Taylor to Polly. Louretta writes, "If you could have seen the place the day the Yankees left you hardly would have known it. General Palmer and his staff stayed in the house they acted very gentlemanly treated us with respect they did not plunder the house, I believe we are get[t]ing along now as well as we were before the negro'es were free. Father has hiered Burl & Mealy Sarah & Brum (her husband) the children are all here and one of Isham's girls & [Joe?][.] some of our negro's are starving I expect some of them will perish if they do I blam[e] no body but the mean inpertinent black hearted Yankees." [re: letter; Luretta Davis to Polly Fulton: 20 Apr 18661

LEONARD DAVIS bondsman for EMILY DAVIS and JOEL HILL of Surry County, North Carolina

PROBLEM:

Emily Davis¹ (1816-1880) and Joel Hill² (1812-1884) both of Surry County, NC married after a marriage bond³ was signed by Leonard Davis in that county on 03 Feb 1836.⁴ Emily Davis has been difficult to identify and link with parents because the marriage bond does not specify the relationship between Leonard and Emily. In addition, Emily does not appear in a Federal census until 1850 when she is listed as Emily Hill,⁵ wife of Joel Hill. Further complicating research is that Leonard Davis does not appear in any other context regionally in the 26 years before the bond and not at all after it was signed.

This analysis identifies **Leonard Davis**, **Jr.** (abt 1797-aft 1880) as the bondsman. He was the son of **Leonard Davis**, **Sr.** who appears in Surry County, NC in the 1800 and 1810 federal censuses. The familial relationship between Leonard Davis, Jr. and Emily Davis remains unproven.

BACKGROUND

Leonard was presumably a grandfather, father, brother or uncle. If her grandfather, he would have been born about 1750. If her father, he would have been born about 1775-1800.

Leonard Davis (abt 1750-aft 1830) born in Orange County, VA was the son of Matthew Davis (1722-1809) and Martha Ann McKinney (1722-1755). On 1 Jan 1776⁶ he married (Juda) Susanna Burrows (1759-?)⁷ of Louisa County, VA. Children of the family are listed with some consistency in numerous online sources as: Isaac, Jacob, Jesse Lee, Jonathan, Lemuel, Mary, Matthew, Molly, Nancy, Sarah, Thomas, and William. A son with the name of **Leonard** is generally *not* found in family listings.⁸

Davis moved to North Carolina before 1786⁹ and located in the Willeses District of Surry County. ¹⁰, He was listed in the federal census in Stokes County in 1810. ¹¹ He moved thereafter to Overton County, TN, where he appears in the 1820¹² and 1830¹³ U.S. censuses. He was followed in subsequent years by a number of his children. The move to Tennessee may explain the failure to identify the signatory to the Surry County marriage bond from North Carolina records. Data from various censuses between 1786 and 1880 indirectly support this theory.

For space considerations "L. Davis" is substituted for "Leonard Davis," the actual text found in each census entry.

Leonard Davis appears in Overton County, TN in censuses from 1820 to 1880, with the exception of 1870. The 1850, 1860, and 1880 censuses state that he was born in North Carolina. Some researchers have accepted that the Leonard Davis found in the various Overton County, TN censuses is one person—a possible conclusion if the context of the years in Virginia and North Carolina are not considered.

However, with that context and analysis of all of the data, it is impossible to draw this conclusion—specifically because the lifespan of the one individual would have been more than 130 years. Furthermore, in 1840 the calculated birth year for Leonard from census data changes from 1750 to 1797.

CONCLUSIONS:

The absence of a Leonard Davis, Jr. from most family descriptions of Leonard Davis and Susanna Burrows notwithstanding, the question of who signed the Emily Davis-Joel Hill marriage bond is resolved if the census appearances of Leonard Davis are interpreted to document a Leonard Davis, Sr. (1751-aft 1830) as well as a Leonard Davis, Jr. (1791-1880).

This leads to the following conclusions:

- Each lived for a time in Surry County, NC.
- They moved to Overton County, TN at different times.
- Evidence for two Leonard Davises.
 - Discontinuous age: 1830 Leonard is age 70-80 while 1840 Leonard is age 40 to 50.
 - 1840 Leonard is described as "Leonard Davis Jun'r."
 - No suffix appended to Leonard Davis before or after 1840 census.
 - Consistency of calculated age with census dates after 1840 census suggests it is the same person despite the lack of a suffix.
- Evidence for migration from Virginia to North Carolina to Tennessee:
 - 1850, 1860, and 1880 censuses each record that Leonard Davis was born in NC, while Leonard Davis, Sr. was born in Orange County, VA.

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Who's who?

Leonard Davis, Sr. (1750-aft 1830) Born in Orange County, VA:

- Named in 1786, 1800, 1810, 1820, and 1830 censuses.
- Husband of (Juda) Susanna Burris.
- · Father of Leonard Davis, Jr.
- · Grandfather of Emily Davis.
- Relocated from Surry County, NC to Overton County, TN between 1810 and 1820.
- Died between 1830 and 1840.

Leonard Davis, Jr. (1797- aft 1880):

- Son of Leonard Davis, Sr. and (Justina or Juda) Susanna Burrows.
- · Father of Emily Davis.
- 1800 census: father's household; an enumerated, unnamed white male aged <10 years.
- 1820 census: father's household; the enumerated, unnamed white male aged 26-44 years.
- Signatory to the 1836 marriage bond for the marriage of Emily Davis and Joel Hill.
 - Based on the dates and migration patterns, I believe, but cannot yet prove, that Leonard Davis, Jr. was the father of Emily Davis.
- Relocated from Surry County, NC to Overton County, TN between 1830 and 1840.
 - Presumably after 1836 when he signed the marriage bond the distance of travel from Overton County to Surry Co, of almost 400 miles makes it unlikely that he returned to Surry County to sign the bond.
 - His married daughter, Emily Davis, remained in Surry County, NC with her husband. Joel Hill.
- Named in 1840, 1850, 1860 and 1880 censuses of Overton County, TN.
- Husband of Elizabeth LKU in 1850 and 1860 in Overton County.
- Widower of 1880.
- · Died after 1880 census.

PROBLEMS WITH THEORY

- There are several inferential conclusions in this analysis drawn on coincidental information found in the relevant names, dates, and locales.
 - The familial link between Emily Davis and Leonard Davis has not been established.
 - A link between the Davis family of Surry County and that of Overton, County is not proven due to the non-specificity of the early censuses.
 - However, a link between Orange County, VA and Overton County, TN is strongly suggested with both a Leonard Davis and Juda (Susanna Burrows) Davis of one family in both locales.
- Leonard Davis, Jr. remains a frustrating enigma.
 - Why do most listings of the family of Leonard Davis and (Juda) Susanna Burrows include 12 children but omit a son named Leonard?
 - Is it due to the fact that father and son had the same Christian name resulting in the distinction between the two being missed by researchers?
 - Leonard Davis, Sr. moved to NC before 1786, which means Leonard Davis, Jr., was born in VA.
 - However, NC was given as the birthplace for Leonard Davis, Jr. in 1850, 1860, and 1880.
 - Why doesn't Leonard Davis, Jr. appear in the 1830 NC Federal census if he was in Surry County until 1836 when he signed the marriage bond?
 - Was he living in Surry County in a household where he was not the head of household?
 - If Leonard Davis, Jr. was in Overton County, TN in 1830, why does he not appear in the 1830 census there as head of an independent household?
 - He would have been about 35 years old at the time, married with children.

- He was not living with his father because the census records only one white male (age 70 to 80) and two white females (ages 30-40 and 70-80) in that household.
- Why is the marriage of Leonard Davis, Jr. to wife Elizabeth LNU not found in North Carolina records?
- Why is there no Leonard Davis at all in Overton County, TN in the 1870 Federal census? Where was he living at the time?
- Does not address the fact that Leonard might be uncle, brother, a more distant relative, or even an unrelated Davis.
- The 1850 census gives a calculated birth year for Juda Davis of 1771—a discrepancy of 12 years from the generally available birth date of 1759.

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Text: State of North Carolina, Surry County, Know all Men by these Presents, that we, Joel Hill and Leonard Davis in the State aforesaid, are held and firmly bound unto the governor of the state of North-Carolina for the time being, in the just and for some of 500 pounds, current money of the State, to be paid to the said governor or his successor or assigns: To the which payment well and truly to be made and done, we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors and administrators. Sealed with our seals, and dated this third day of July Anno Domini 1836. THE CONDITION OF THE ABOVE OBLIGATION IS SUCH, That whereas the above bounden Joel Hill hath made application for a License for a Marriage, to be celebrated between him and Emily Davis of the county aforesaid: Now in case it shall not appear hereafter that there is any lawful caused to obstruct the said marriage, then the above obligations to be void—otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

SEALED AND DELIVERED, IN THE PRESENCE OF F. K. A (illegible) Seal Joel Hill Seal Leonard Davis.

two thousand Dollars to him in hand paid by the said William the Recpt. Whereof is hereby fully acknowledged have bargind Sold and delivered unto the said William a certain tract or parcel of Land situate lying and being in the County aforesaid on Stewarts Creek. Beginning at a Black Gum Mordicai Fleming's corner on the south side of sd Creek Running west seventy five-chains to a Stake in the new Haystack Road near the head of the mire Branch thence with said Road as it now runs to where it intersects the old Haystack Road thence down said old Road 'till it strikes John Zachrys line, thence East on said line crossing Stewarts Creek to a Burch tree at the mouth of the first Branchempting in said creek, thence up said Branch a conditional-marked line to a white oak Matthew Davis line, thence west on sd line crossing said Creek to a pine stump said Matthew Davis & Flemings corner thence on Flemings line to the Beginning containing four hundred Acres more or less. To have and to hold to the sd William that he the sd William may from the date of these presents peaceably enter into hold occupy and enjoy the above described land with its appurtenances free and clear and forever discharged from all incumbrances from him his heirs and from all other persons what ever Witness my hand & seal the day and date above-


