The members of Bannertown Volunteer Fire Department will conduct an all-day barbecued chicken sale, along with ice cream, tomorrow at the fire station.

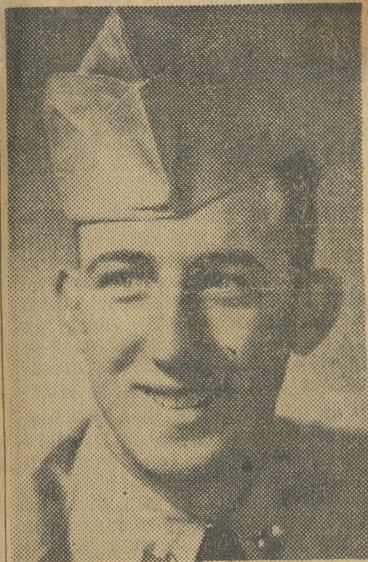

Five-Year-Old Girl of King; Rites Tuesday

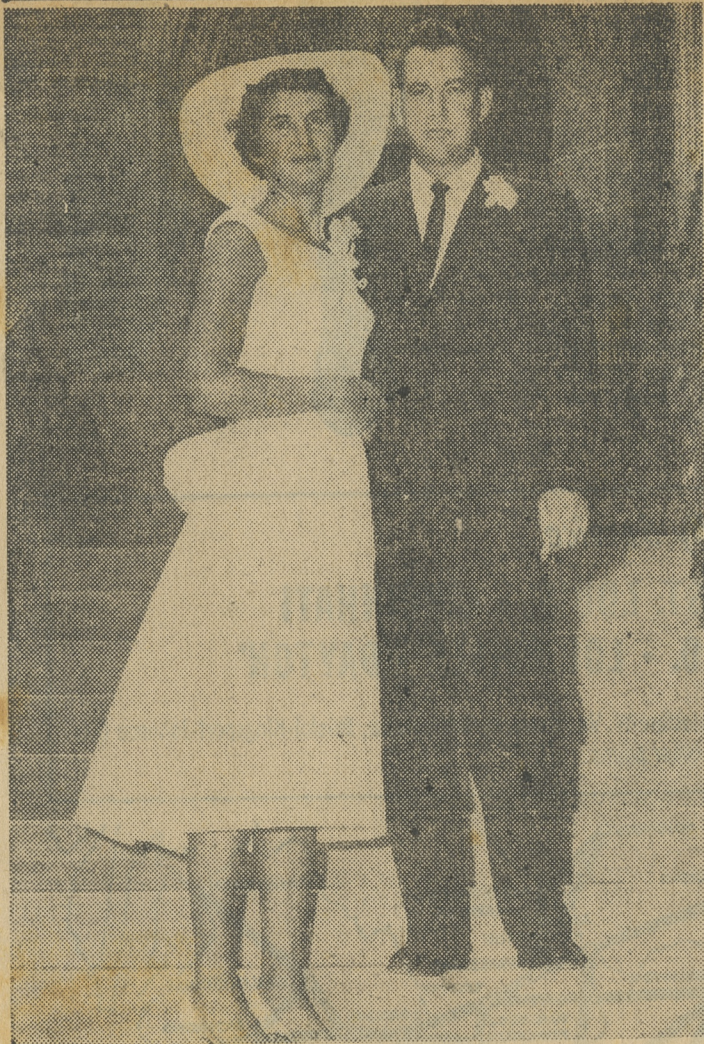

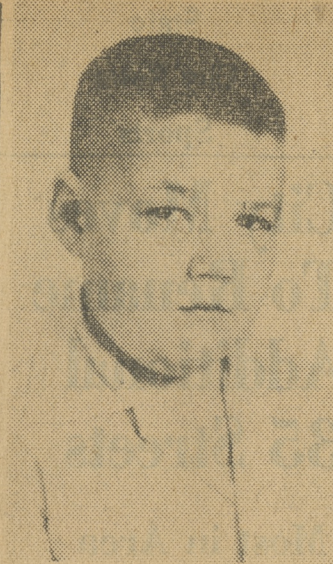

Westfield Woman, 38, Kills Self

WESTFIELD — A 38-year-old Stokes County woman shot herself to death about 10:30 a.m. yesterday while her husband and two sons were attending church.

The death of Mrs. Lavinia Smith George, wife of Hilden O. George of Westfield, was ruled a suicide by Dr. Theodore Antonakos, Stokes coroner.

Dr. Antonakos said Mrs. George shot herself in the left chest with a .22 caliber rifle while in her bedroom. The coroner said the bullet penetrated her body and lodged in a bedpost.

The family found the house locked when they returned from church, Dr. Antonakos reported, and searched for Mrs. George. One of her sons found the body on the bed, he said.

The coroner said Mrs. George had been in declining health for a little over a year and had recently been despondent. He added that she had been receiving treatment from a Westfield physician.

Mrs. George was born July 19, 1920, in Surry County, daughter of Dr. James Thomas and Betty George Smith.

She was a member of Westfield Baptist Church.

She and Mr. George were married Nov. 18, 1939. He survives.

Other survivors are her mother; two sons, Thomas and Timothy George of the home; and a brother, Jack Smith of Westfield.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Westfield Baptist Church by the Rev. Waldo Early. Burial will be in the church cemetery.

Girl Killed In Tumble From Vehicle

Was Rising Senior At Copeland High

PILOT MOUNTAIN, Aug. 4 — Barbara Dawn Taylor, 17-year-old rising senior at Copeland High School, was fatally injured near here about 2 p.m. today when she fell from the rear of a motor vehicle.

Miss Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Taylor of Pilot Mountain, Route 1, suffered skull injuries and was dead on arrival at Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem.

Highway Patrolman J. W. Edwards said the accident happened on the Westfield highway, one and a half miles east of Pilot Mountain, when Miss Taylor fell from a vehicle driven by Bobby Palmer, 22, of Pilot Mountain, Route 1. The vehicle was described as an old model passenger car, with the rear portion cut away and altered for use as a farm pickup truck.

Edwards said Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Dean Inman of Westfield were riding in the cab of the vehicle with Palmer, and Miss Taylor was sitting on the flat-bed rear. Miss Taylor apparently was thrown off as Palmer turned from a driveway onto the highway, the officer said.

The patrolman quoted the other three occupants of the vehicle as saying they did not see Miss Taylor as she fell, but stopped after they found her missing.

Palmer was charged with driving after his license had been revoked, and with improper registration of a vehicle.

Surviving Miss Taylor are the parents, J. C. and Ida Tilley Taylor; the maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lilla Tilley of Mount Airy, Route 2; the paternal grandmother, Mrs. Ada Taylor of Pilot Mountain, Route 2; three sisters, Jewell, Linda and Betty Sue Taylor, all of the home; one brother, J. C. Taylor Jr. of the home.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Old Westfield Nine Was Scourge of Northwest

WESTFIELD, Aug. 21—Back in the days before World War I this little community in eastern Surry County and western Stokes boasted of one of the finest baseball teams in the annals of amateur baseball in northwestern North Carolina.

There is no doubt that several members of the team which performed for several years prior to 1917 could have played professional baseball. Some of them did. In 1917, or thereabouts, the team was broken up because some of its members marched off to war to help Uncle Sam fight Kaiser Bill. Although a few members played after returning from service, the team was never the same. Some key figures in the success of the team around 1914 had retired from the game, or had lost their effectiveness.

Sultan of swat on this team was Gaston L. Hill, former manager of the J. C. Penney store in Elkin and presently owner of the Dairy Queen in Elkin and Mount Airy.

After World War I he ran a general store at Westfield where the present Royal Hunter store stands. Hill could hit the ball a country mile, and he did it often.

It could easily be said that he and his brother, the late Joe Hill, contributed in a very large measure to the great success of this team.

Joe was a strong armed right-hander who had no equal in these parts for speed and control. So accurate was his control that he often pitched nine, ten, and twelve full innings without walking a single man. His pitching feats are still a legend around Westfield and in all parts of Surry and Stokes Counties.

Most of the time his fast ball accounted for a dozen or more strike outs per game. He was unique at holding men on base.

Most veteran observers of the game all unanimous in their opinion that Joe Hill was not only professional timber, but Big League material all the way. His career was cut short when he was in his prime by a broken arm (his pitching arm) suffered while throwing a wet ball in a game against Flat Rock. He had a shutout going against the Granite Bears until he broke his arm.

The team had other good pitchers, but Joe Hill was the best. Joel Jessup (uncle of the writer) and Sid Cook, deceased, were the catchers. It is said that Hill had such great speed that few players had courage enough to get behind the plate. Cook had the better throwing arm, but Jessup

did the better job of catching, because, as he put it, "I was the only fellow that had little enough sense to stand behind the batter."

Other members of the team were Eli Cook, Luther Inman, Dan Inman, John Inman, Richard Pell and, a little later on, Vance Dearmin, Will Hundley, Roy Adams, Johnnie Love, and others.

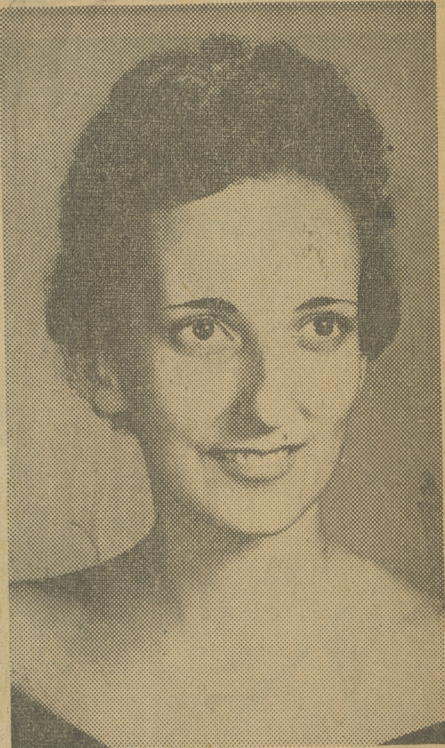
The team had a murderer's row, and were a great fielding and running team. Dan Inman, also a cunning left-handed pitcher, played any position on the infield and did a great job of base running. He copied his style after the great Ty Cobb and named his oldest son for the Georgia Peach. His brother Luther was a past master with the punt, but could hit the long ball too, as could Sid Cook, John Inman, Roy Adams, Vance Dearmin, and others.

The outfield, paced by the left-handed hitting Gaston Hill, was a murderer's row within itself. Hill, Dearmin and Will Hundley were known on more than one occasion to hit successive home runs. Often one of this trio would hit two per game.

Most of the team's opposition came from Surry and Stokes Counties against such teams as "Big A," (near the Virginia line at Stuart, Virginia, Mount Airy, Pinnacle, Pilot Mountain, Flat Rock, Germanton and Sandy Level.

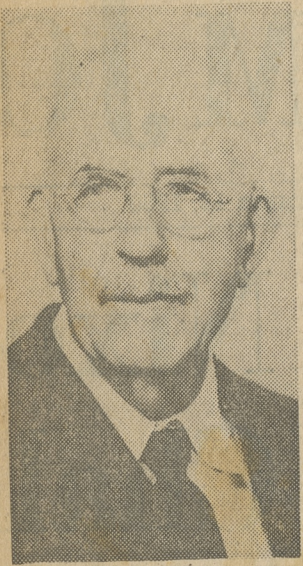

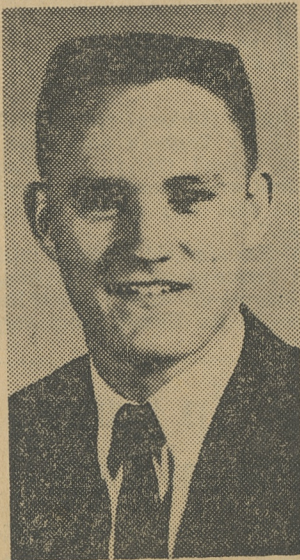

Many, Varied Groups Use Piedmont Charter Flights

Early one morning next May about 40 businessmen in a holiday mood will board a chartered Piedmont Airlines plane at the Winston-Salem-Greensboro - High Point Airport.

While many people are still asleep in homes in the surrounding countryside, the plane will roar aloft in the morning sky... bound for Louisville and the Kentucky Derby.

It happens every year. Mrs. Frank E. Davis, who arranges Piedmont's charter flights, already has the next Kentucky Derby flight on her books.

This is just one of the many interesting charter flights Mrs. Davis handles. As Piedmont's supervisor for charter and convention flight sales, Mrs. Davis has booked air-lifts for such groups as the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra and such important people as Lady Byrd Johnson.

Every time Mrs. Davis answers her telephone, there is something different. Her job, she says, is never monotonous.

She has seen Piedmont's charter flight mileage grow from 700 miles during the company's first year in 1948 to 138,946 miles in 1964.

Not all of this mileage was

straight as the crow flies. For example, Mrs. Davis arranged a Piedmont charter flight last summer which circled Kinston like a merry-go-round while a young couple were married on the plane. It was a promotion event.

Piedmont frequently airlifts football and basketball teams on charter flights for colleges in states from Virginia to Georgia. There also are charter flights for spectators to athletic events in distant places.

One of the biggest single airlift events handled by Piedmont occurred in 1962 when five airliners were used to fly 168 Wake Forest basketball fans from this area to the NCAA tournament at Louisville, Ky.

Greensboro and Charlotte hockey teams also are established members of the charter flight set.

Some of the charter flights go a long way. A student group chartered flight service on one occasion for a 1,944-mile flight to Nebraska. A state Democrat group apparently holds the long-distance charter flight record with Piedmont. That state political group once was airlifted 2,161 miles to Las Vegas, Nev.

Flights chartered for hunting and fishing trips in Canada... for vacations in the Bahamas... for races at Daytona... for military men

on leave... these are ordinary bookings for Mrs. Davis.

Bookings such as charter flight passage to Ohio for Lady Byrd Johnson some time ago and a flight for the White House press to follow President Johnson on an Appalachia poverty inspection are some of the unusual charter flights Mrs. Davis has arranged.

Executives of companies often turn to charter flight service for movements of large groups of personnel. On Mrs. Davis's books are flights for oil, tractor, public utility and paper companies and many others.

Companies moving key personnel usually plan charter flights to be sure the crash of one flight would not wipe out all top management. Mrs. Davis cites a charter trip for 16 executives of a New York company. These men split into two groups, flying in two Martin 404 airliners. One of these planes can carry 40 people.

To be a member of the charter flight set, one can use certain affluence. For example, it costs \$1.25 a mile to get an empty Martin 404 to the place from which the charter group will begin a trip. Once the passengers go aboard, the price a mile rises to \$1.75... regardless of the number of passengers.



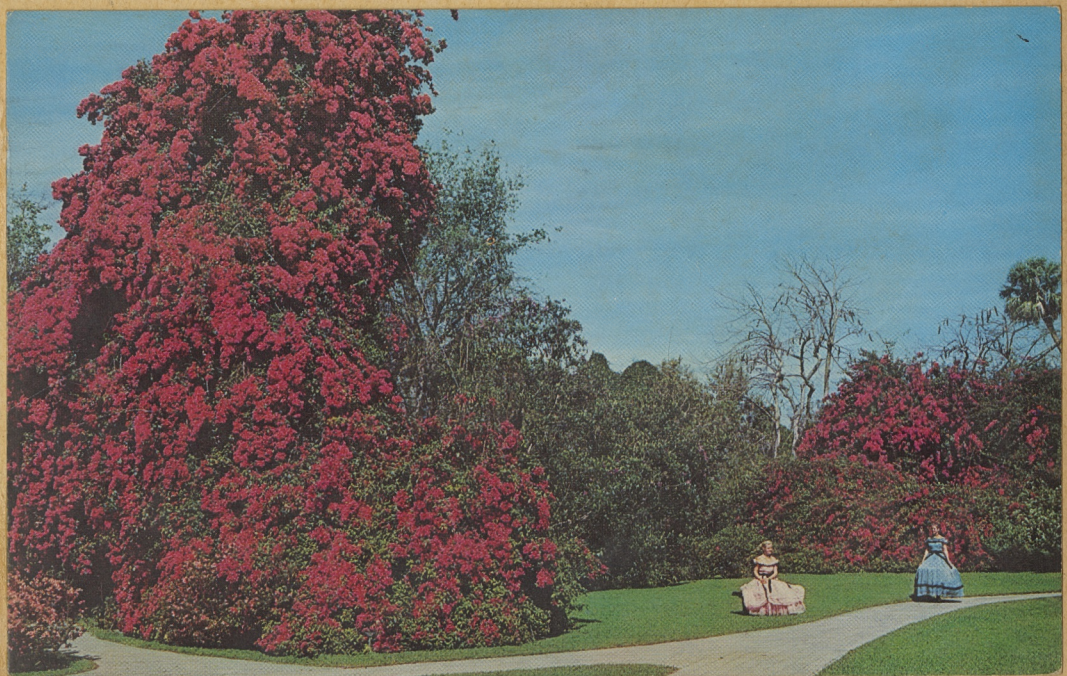

The body will lie in state at the church from 1 to 2 p.m. Nephews will be pallbearers.

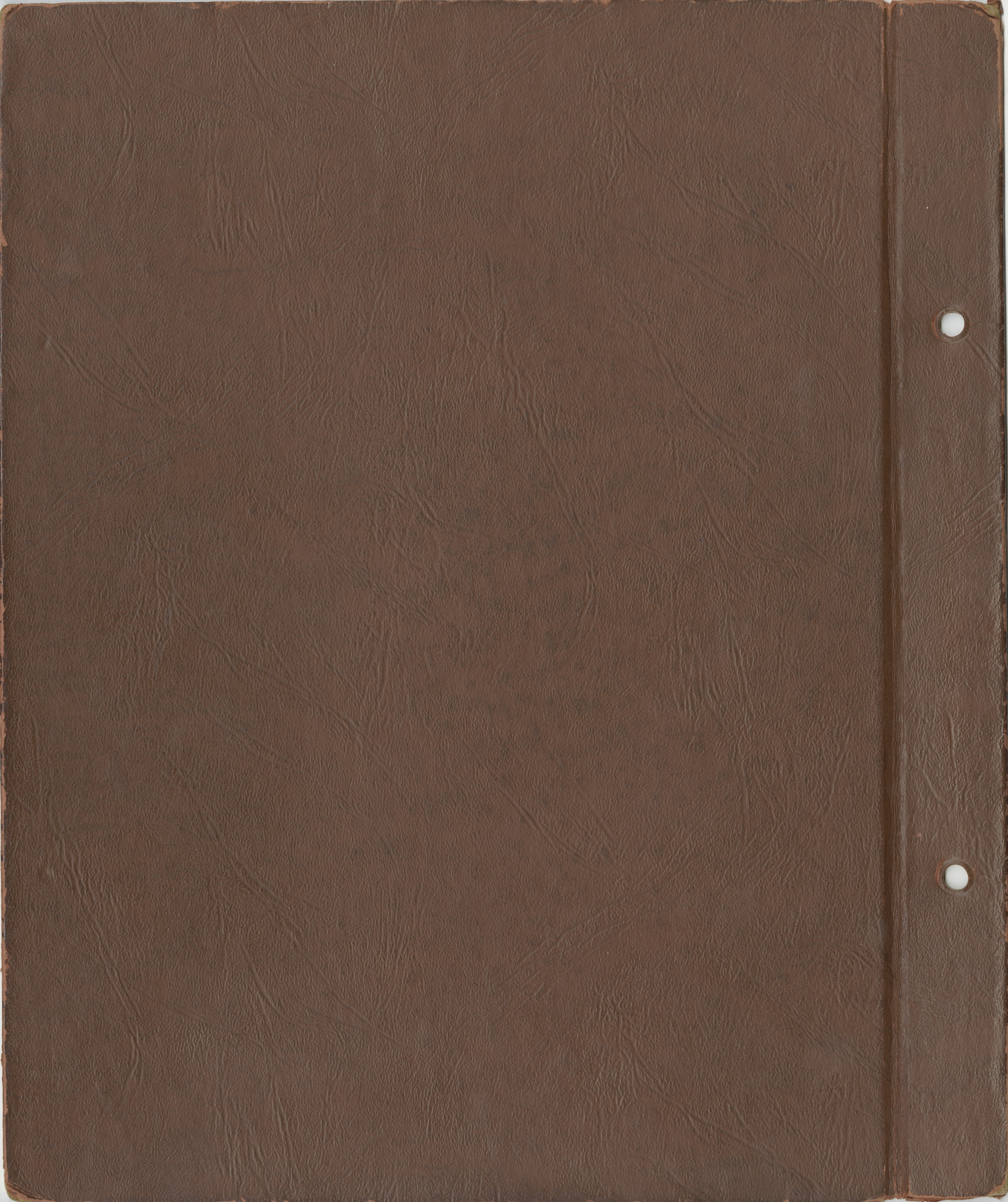

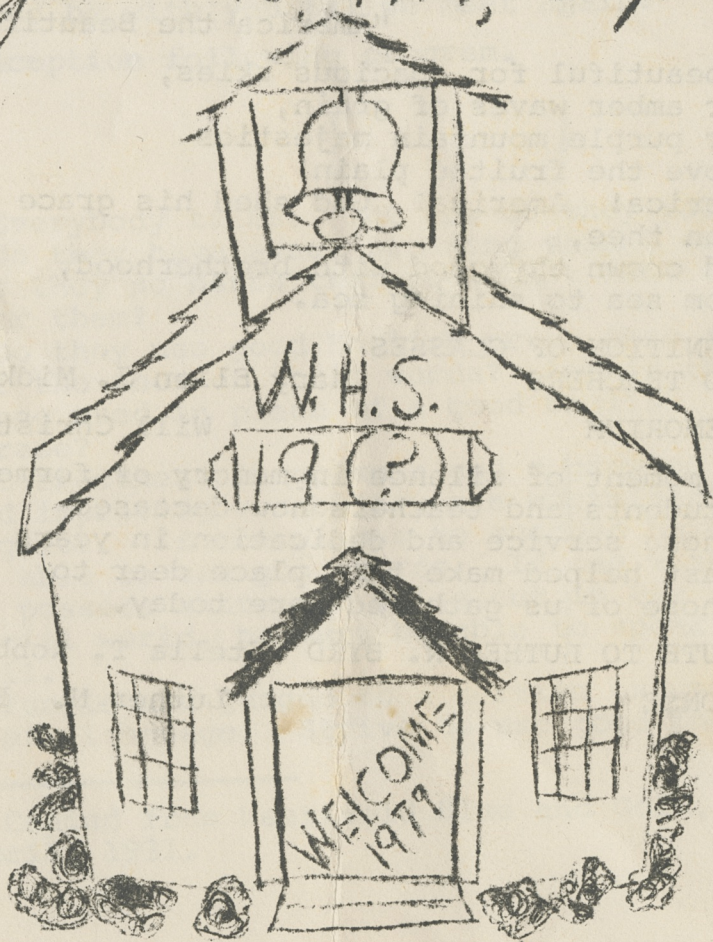
