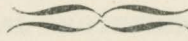

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME AND MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Surry Baptist Association.

Section 2. Membership in the Association shall be composed of the Association's Officers, ministers who are pastors of churches affiliated therewith, and messengers elected by affiliated churches.

Section 3. Churches of fifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers in addition to the pastor. One additional messenger shall be allowed for each additional fifty members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall have more than ten messengers.

Section 4. Any church found to be unfaithful in faith or in practice shall be investigated by the Officers of the Association in an effort to correct such errors. If the church fails to correct such errors and the errors are of such nature as to alienate the church from the orderly and faithful churches of the Association the Officers of the Association shall recommend to the Association that fellowship be withdrawn from the church.

ARTICLE II.—PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the churches within our bounds, and to promote and develop their energies in advancing God's Kingdom throughout the earth in compliance with the teachings of the New Testament and in cooperation with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

ARTICLE III—ANNUAL CHURCH LETTERS

Section 1. The churches shall report annually not only the statistical information but any facts concerning the general welfare. The clerk shall furnish each church with printed forms for their annual report at least six weeks before the annual meeting of the Association, and the churches are requested to have these reports returned to the Clerk at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The Officers of the body shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Missionary, and the heads of the organizations as set forth in Article IV, Section 6.

Section 2. The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside over all sessions of the Association and the Promotion Committee if available. In their absence the body shall elect a Moderator Protem who shall preside. The Moderator shall be the fraternal visitor of the churches throughout the year. He shall be elected for one year and shall not succeed himself after the second consecutive year.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the request of or in the absence of the Moderator at the meetings of the Association and the Promotion Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body, furnish the churches with the blank letter forms, supervise the printing of the minutes, and distribute them to the churches as soon after adjournment as possible. He shall also serve as secretary of the Promotion Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds of the Association, and shall disburse the same in accordance with the budget of the Association or for the purposes for which the funds were contributed. He shall render an itemized report of his receipts and disbursements to the budget committee upon request and to the Association in the annual meeting.

Section 6. The Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational Training Union Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent, and the Associational Brotherhood President shall be elected by their respective organizations according to their own methods. The names of these officers shall be furnished the Nominating Committee who shall present them to the Association for approval at the time of the election of the Officers of the Association.

Section 7. The Officers shall be elected at the morning session of the first day of the annual meeting. They assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting at which they were elected and shall serve until the close of the next annual session, with the exception of the Clerk. The Clerk shall assume his duties at the beginning of the session at which he is elected and serve until his successor is elected.

Section 8. The Associational Missionary shall be nominated by the Missions Committee at any regular session of the Association or any regular meeting of the Promotion Committee. His election shall be by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers or members present. He shall serve until the relationship is terminated by mutual consent. He shall prepare annually a Calendar of Activities setting forth dates and places of meetings of the organized work. He shall work with the churches at their invitation and as time permits. He shall promote the whole program of the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Conventions, seeking to arouse missionary interest among the churches and enlisting the churches to cooperate in the support of the cause fostered by the Association. His work shall be under the direction of the Missions Committee, and he shall have administrative supervision of such work as shall be assigned him by the Association, the Promotion Committee, or the Missions Committee.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The Committees of the Association shall be: Committee on Organization and Admission of New Churches, Prog-

ram, Ordination, Budget, Nominating, Trustees, Missions, Promotion (Executive), Place and Preacher, Resolutions, and Committee to nominate the Nominating Committee. The Moderator and Associational Missionary shall be ex-officio members of all committees.

Section 2. The Committee on Organization and Admission of New Churches shall be elected annually and shall consist of three pastors and three deacons suggested by the Nominating Committee from the churches in full fellowship with the Asso.

The duties of this committee are set forth in the following paragraphs:

Any group of baptized believers in Christ desiring to organize themselves into a new church with the purpose of seeking the recognition of and fellowship and cooperation with this Association shall be requested to fulfill the following requirements:

- A. Notice shall be given to the Moderator of the Association of the desire to organize a church before any such organization takes place. The Moderator will then instruct the Committee on Organization and Admission to visit and counsel with the group desiring to become a church and bring a report to the Promotion Committee which shall study and pass upon the need and practicability for such an organization.
- B. The location of said church shall be sufficiently removed so as not to interfere with the work or encroach upon the territory of the churches already affiliated with this Association. This will be determined by the Promotion Committee.
- C. Upon being approved by the Promotion Committee the group will then request the Committee on Organization and Admission to examine the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith of the proposed church. If this committee approves the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith the group will then proceed to be constituted into a Baptist Church of the same faith and order.
- D. The new church having been duly organized and constituted may at the next annual meeting of the Association, or any annual meeting thereafter, present a letter to the Association asking for recognition and seeking fellowship with the Association, including with this letter a copy of the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith adopted by the body, as well as a report of the work since the time of organization as it regards all phases of our Baptist Program. The church shall be expected to have had a part in the support of the causes fostered by the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.
- E. The Organization and Admission Committee shall examine the letter and report of the new church and will recommend one of the following decisions:
 - a. Acceptance of the church under watchcare for one year.
 - b. Further consideration for action at the next annual meeting.
 - c. Rejection of the request for membership.

If the church is accepted under watchcare this committee will at the end of that year recommend that the church be accepted into full fellowship provided that after examination the record of work done and cooperative spirit of the church is commendable. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present shall be needed for such action. The Moderator will extend to the messengers the right hand of fellowship.

Section 3. The Program Committee shall consist of five members who shall prepare an order of business for the annual meeting. Printed copies of the suggested order of business shall be

distributed to those attending the opening session of the Association. The chairman shall be designated by the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The Ordination Committee shall consist of five pastors. Initially one member shall be elected for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year. In each succeeding year one member shall be elected for a term of five years. When necessary others may be elected to fill vacancies of unexpired terms. Churches desiring to ordain preachers are requested to place their candidate before this committee for examination on the following principles: Christian experience or conversion, call to the ministry, moral and spiritual fitness, doctrinal beliefs and knowledge of the Bible, attitude toward denominational work and objects, support of denominational causes, and purpose to serve.

A Candidate shall be looked upon with favor for ordination who is a member of a Missionary Baptist Church and who has been called as pastor of a missionary Baptist Church and who is in agreement with historic Baptist principles and is in harmony with our cooperative program of work.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in regularly recognized Baptist colleges and seminaries. Recommendation will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 5. The Budget Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Association and the Chairman of the Missions Committee. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman. This committee shall meet before the annual meeting of the Association and prepare a budget to cover all anticipated needs of the Association for the next annual Associational year. The committee will cause this budget to be printed and distributed to the messengers at the annual meeting. The committee will suggest a pro rata share of the budget for each church affiliated with the Association for their consideration and approval.

Section 6. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members. They shall be elected by the Association and serve from the close of the annual session in which they are elected until the close of the next annual session. This committee shall nominate all the Officers except those specifically provided for otherwise and members of the following committees: Organization and Admission of New Churches, Program, Ordination, Trustees, and Missions. They shall also nominate representatives for the following denominational institutions and work: Religious Literature, Evangelism, Hospital, Orphanage, Homes for the Aged, Temperance and Public Morals, Relief and Annuity, Stewardship, State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Memorials, and any other representatives that may be deemed necessary. Those selected shall be placed before the Association at the annual meeting for election. The Nominating Committee shall present for approval the names of those selected by the various organizations to head their work. The Nominating Committee will furnish a name or names to proper Officers of the Baptist State Convention for the member of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention from Surry Association. This committee shall make nominations to fill vacancies occurring during the year at the regular meetings of the Promotion Committee.

Section 7. The Trustees shall consist of three members. Initially one member shall be elected for three years, one for two years, and one for one year. In each succeeding year one mem-

ber shall be elected for a term of three years. No trustee shall succeed himself in office. The chairman shall be the member with the longest term of service as a trustee. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold in trust all property and effects of the Association, take care of and keep the same in repair, accept gifts for the Association, and perform all others duties which the Association may signify.

Section 8. The Missions Committee shall consist of seven members. Two of whom shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and the remaining five shall be the heads of the four associational organizations: Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and the associational Treasurer. The chairman shall be designated by the Nominating Committee. This committee shall direct the work of the Associational Missionary and confer with the churches concerning their cooperation with and financial support of the Associational program and the program of the State and Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 9. The Promotion (Executive) Committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the ministers who are pastors in the Association, and one lay representative elected by each church. In no case shall any church have more than four members on this committee. Between annual meetings of the Association this committee shall act as the Association in matters requiring consideration. The officers of this committee shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk who shall be the secretary. The Moderator shall see that the committee meets at least quarterly and at any other time deemed necessary. He shall be expected to have a written report of the actions of this committee presented to the Association at the annual meeting. Fifteen members shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meeting has been given to all members. The committee shall act as an agency of the Association in the promotion of the causes fostered by the Association.

Section 10. At the first session of the annual meeting the Moderator shall appoint the following committees to report at this meeting of the Association:

- a. Place and Preacher
- b. Resolutions
- c. Committee to nominate the Nominating Committee.

Section 11. Other committees for specific reports and work shall be appointed by the Moderator as the need arises.

ARTICLE VI—MEETINGS AND VISITORS

Section 1. The Association will meet annually on Thursday and Friday after the third Sunday in October and can be called into special session if necessary by a majority vote of the Promotion Committee. All business shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's "Parliamentary Law", but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Moderator may exercise his discretion, subject to appeal to the Association.

Section 2. Visitors from sister churches and similiar bodies may be invited by the Moderator to sit with the Association, to participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

ARTICLE VII—POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Section 1. The Association shall have no power whatever to infringe upon the rights or usefulness of the churches. It may advise or recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purpose, and for its recommenda-

tions the very highest consideration and regard.

Section 2. The Association may withdraw fellowship from any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt its purpose and requirements, or upon the request of a church for its own dismissal.

Section 3. The churches constituting this Association shall each retain complete self-government under Christ as the supreme Head, Lawgiver, Governor, and Lord over His churches, and unite only that they may more successfully promote the cause of Christ throughout the world.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS

Section 1. Any section of this constitution, except Article VII section 3 which shall remain forever intact, may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day, provided the amendment is presented in writing on the first day and voted on and passed favorable on the second day, or that notice be given during the meeting in one year and presented in writing and voted on favorably the following year.

RULES OF ORDER

1. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by such persons as the moderator may designate.

2. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator.

3. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in subject without permission of the Association.

4. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator before discussion.

5. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion without the consent of the Association.

6. When a motion is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be considered, except a motion to adjourn.

7. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a consideration.

8. All questions except as related to the amendment of the Constitution shall be decided by the majority of the votes cast.

9. The Association shall have the right to determine what subjects it will consider and the order of their consideration.

10. These rules may be amended at any time during an annual session of this Association by a majority.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three persons in the Godhead: The Father; The Son; The Holy Ghost.

2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and order.

3. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our lord Jesus Christ.

4. We believe baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

5. We believe baptism is the immersion of a believer. And only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church by Christ, in faith and doctrine, and they only should take the Lord's Supper.

6. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints.
7. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgement.
8. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joy and happiness of the righteous will be eternal.
9. We believe that the right to administer the ordinances is vested in the Church and that no person should perform the ordinances except as authorized by a Church.
10. We believe in the doctrine of growth in grace and sanctification as set forth in the New Testament. But we do not believe that sinless perfection is attained by anyone in this life.

FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION OF
SURRY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

held with

Holly Springs Baptist Church
October 25, 1956

Highland Park Baptist Church
October 26, 1956

I. The Surry Baptist Association convening with the Holly Springs Baptist Church Thursday, October 25, 1956, was called to order by the Moderator, R. L. Wilson. With Mrs. J. W. Hylton at the piano, J. W. Hylton led in the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers". Scripture was read by Frank Sitton and Joe Crews led in prayer. Frank Sitton, pastor of Holly Springs Church brought brief words of greetings and welcome.

II. Preston J. Taylor presented the Order of Business and moved its adoption with any changes found to be necessary. The motion was adopted.

III. Moderator Wilson announced the appointment of the following committees: Place and Preacher; Resolutions; Committee to nominate the Nominating Committee.

IV. The following new pastors and the Associational missionary were recognized and presented to the Association by the Moderator: Frank Sitton, Holly Springs; Hobart McFalls, Welcome; Elmer Eldrige, New Life; Robert B. Grigg, Jr. Mtn. Park; Curtiss Leftwich, Mtn. View; Everett Marion, Highland Park and John T. Biddle, Missionary.

V. Preston Taylor presided while Moderator Wilson presented two proposed amendments to the constitution. Action on the amendments to be taken on second day.

VI. Preston Taylor read letter received from Lovill's Creek Church requesting withdrawal of membership from the Surry Association. Their request was granted.

VII. The clerk called the roll of churches and 233 messengers answered. Letters from all sixty-six churches received. At this point Mr. Hylton lead the congregation in the singing of My Jesus I Love Thee.

VIII. Moderator Wilson called Mr. Taylor to the chair again while he gave his report on the work done by the Promotion Committee during the year. Report was adopted.

IX. R. L. Kyzer, Chm. of the Missions Committee brought report on the work of his committee and brought some recommendations. Report with recommendations was adopted.

X. Mimeograph copies of reports by the Missionary, Treasurer and Budget Committee were distributed. Reports were read and adopted.

XI. Verbal report on Christian Literature was given by Joe Maye. He then presented the Rev. Lewis Ludlum, missionary of Pilot Mtn. Association. Mr. Ludlum gave an interesting and informing discussion on the Biblical Recorder and other Baptist publications that are available and should be found in all Baptist homes. Following this discussion we were led by Mr. Hylton in the singing of "Have Faith In God".

XII. Bobby Holder read his report on the work of the Sunday Schools, Mrs. Arlin Watson, reported on Vacation Bible Schools, and Harvey Rumpfelt read the report of Mrs. Caleb Hill on the work of the Training Unions. All reports were adopted as read.

XIII. The annual sermon was delivered by Reece E. Kyzar, pastor Westfield Church. His subject was "Being Spiritually Compelled by God". Text Phil. 3: 7-12. Following the sermon we enjoyed a bountiful dinner served by the women of the Holly Springs Church in the basement of the church.

XIV. The afternoon session was opened with the singing of "We're Marching to Zion" with Moderator Wilson presiding. W. L. Campbell led in the devotional reading from II. Cor. 4: 1-8 and Preston Taylor offered prayer.

XV. Reece Kyzar brought the report on our hospital, the report was adopted without being read in order that more time might be given to Dr. W. K. McGee, hospital representative. Dr. McGee's message was both inspiring and enlightening as to good work our hospital is able to do.

XVI. Mr. C. S. Brannock brought a partial report for the nominating committee and recommended that the Moderator call a meeting of the Promotional Committee to complete the slate of committees. His report and recommendation was adopted. The Promotion Committee was called to meet Nov. 8 at Calvary Ch.

XVII. The report on our Orphanage was not received, however, Miss Lucille Reid was present to represent this great work loved by all Baptist. She gave a most inspirational talk concerning the children in the homes, the meeting of their needs, physical and spiritual. Following Miss Reid's message Mr. Hylton led in the singing of "Standing On The Promises".

XVIII. Dr. P. W. Green expressed the regrets of Mr. J. M. Hayes Supt. of our Homes For The Aging in that he could not attend this session due to conflict in schedules. Dr. Green proved to be a worthy "pinch-hitter" for Mr. Hayes in bringing much helpful information on the homes.

XIX. Elliot Hayes report on Christian Schools was not read but was adopted. He presented Dr. Phil Elliot, Pres. Gardner-Webb, who in turn asked that Rev. W. L. Lynch, dean of Mars Hill be recognized. Mr. Lynch brought greetings from Mars Hill. Dr. Elliot thrilled all present with his message on "Training youth for leadership". Time was extended to hear more from Dr. Elliot.

XX. Paul Hester, Chm. Committee on Admission of New Churches. He reported that his committee recommended that Closer Walk and East Side Churches be admitted into the fellowship of our Association. Both churches came under watch care last year.

XXI. Robt. Griggs was recognized by the moderator to bring resolutions thanking the host church, Holly Springs and Co-host church, Bannertown for their fine hospitality and entertainment for the first day of the present session.

There being no further business to be attended, meeting was adjourned to convene next morning, Friday, Oct. 26 at Highland Park Church. Moderator Wilson led the closing prayer.

XXII. Moderator R. L. Wilson called the Association to order at 9:30 A. M., on Friday at the Highland Park Church. After singing the hymn "Faith of our Fathers" led by Mr. J. W. Hylton with Mrs. Hylton at the piano, Rev. Everett Marion led in the devotionals and asked Rev. Hubert McFalls of the Welcome Baptist Church to lead in prayer.

XXIII. Report on the W.M.U. work given by Mrs. I. W. Jones. Report adopted as read . . . no one spoke to the report.

XXIV. Brotherhood report prepared by Lonnie Brown, read by Rev. Paul Hester. Report adopted as read, no one spoke to the report.

XXV. We were running a little ahead of time and the moderator encouraged the men and women to do everyting possible to help the RA's in the different churches. He stated that November 12 was to be State Brotherhood meeting at Winston-Salem and the men were asked to sponsor one boy each and take them to this meeting. There is to be a barbecue supper on the Wake Forest campus that evening beginning at 5:00 p. m.

XXVI. Report on Evangelism by Rev. Joe Crews, spoke to the report himself. Report adopted as read.

XXVII. The moderator recognized the visitors, Earl Bradly, Mr. Powers from Elkin, and Mr. Hauss.

XXVIII. Report on relief and Annunity by Rev. Roy Davis. Report adopted as read. Mr. Davis spoke to his own report making an earnest plea for all ministers to enter the retirement plan. Also, he stressed the need of getting into the Family Plan beginning January 1, 1957.

XXIX. Hymn "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" was led by Mr. Hylton.

XXX. Report on Christian Morals was not presented. The time was given to Mr. Hawse, representative of the Allied Church League brought an inspiring message on our responsibility of securing enough names on the Referenrum Petetion in order to get action from the Legislature. He reminded the ones present that the Baptist State Convention voted to have December 2, 1956 as temperance Sunday and commitment day, also, that a resolution was passed to allow the Baptists to work together in

petitioning our General Assembly in giving our state a much deserved vote on liquor. He urged that every church participate and do everything possible to secure the 300,000 goal. Stated that a deficit of about \$3000. would be in his department at the end of the year. He was given the privilege of taking an offering — a good response was made.

XXXI. In the absence of a report on memorials Mr. Wilson asked the congregation to stand in honor of our members who have died in the past year. Harvey Rumpfled led in the memorial prayer.

BUSINESS SESSION

XXXII. Rev. Preston Taylor was called to the chair to preside while the two proposed amendments to the constitution were brought before the association. The clerk was asked to read Article VIII on amendments to the constitution, after which the constitution was read as it is now written, followed by the proposed amendments. Both amendments were accepted unanimously.

XXXIII. Mr. Wilson raised the question of feeding the association on the second day. No discussion was forthcoming from the members present, therefore, Mr. Wilson named a committee to investigate this situation and also the length of the program for next year. The committee is: Preston Taylor, Harold Stone, Everett Marion. Mr. Taylor suggested that this could possibly be left in the hands of the promotional committee. After some discussion from the floor, Harvey Rumpfled made a motion that this special committee make its decision and report to the promotion committee for final decision. This committee was also asked to make a study of the constitution in regards to its clarity and wording where it may need changing.

XXXIV. Mr. Biddle gave his report of the associational letters in digested form. A copy of the statistics was given to each person present. Mr. Biddle stressed the need for being more accurate in filling out the letters and suggested that possibly a school should be held in the association for the purpose of instructions for our clerks.

XXXV. Place and Preacher Report by Carl Snow. Mr. Snow stated that two invitations were received and both were accepted. The first day — Mt. Park; second day — Community. Preacher: Preston Taylor. Alternate: Everett Marion.

XXXVI. Lester Campbell reminded the moderator that the East Side Church was to be welcomed into the association. After which, Mr. Wilson called the representatives from the East Side Church to the front and gave them the right hand of fellowship.

XXXVII. Report on Resolutions by Robert Griggs, Jr. (No written report was turned in.)

XXXVIII. Hymn — "Have Thine Own Way" lead by Mr. Hylton.

XXXIX. Address Earl Bradley — on cooperative program. (Gave information as how the policies of the convention are formed — not on the convention floor but by the leaders. He urged that every pastor bring an annual message on the Cooperative Program. The Cooperative Program was explained and told how it benefits the churches:

1. Presents opportunity for people to be obedient to the great commission.
2. Increases church giving.
3. Increases spirituality of the church.

He said, "We must get down to business or we must go out of business.")

REPORTS

REPORT OF THE MODERATOR CONCERNING THE ACTIONS TAKEN DURING THE YEAR BY THE PROMOTION COMMITTEE OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Promotion Committee of the association, which has the responsibility of carrying on the work of the association between the annual sessions, has met during the year in four regular sessions & three special sessions. The special sessions were made necessary by the unusual amount of work that had to be attended to during the year.

The main items of business that have been transacted were as follows:

1-Various associational committees were named.

2-A request was made of the Baptist State Convention for a \$1200.00 supplement on our missionary's salary. (\$1140.00 was the amount granted by the state mission board.)

3-A request of the state convention from the Woodland church for \$1200.00 per year to help with the pastor's salary and a grant of \$500.00 to help buy a church lot was approved.

4-A Seminary Extension Center was approved and one semester was held in the Spring and another is now in progress.

5-A special three nights mission emphasis was discussed and approved and was subsequently held in the Spring with several of the churches participating.

6-Brother Jenkins resignation was accepted with regrets.

7-One of the Special meetings was called to specifically consider and try to determine the course we should follow regarding an associational mission program. A plan whereby our association would join two neighboring associations and share a missionary's time was discussed, but the feeling was that our association from the standpoint of both size and need demanded a full time missionary itself. Therefore, the joint plan was not further considered.

9-\$50.00 was paid to Mrs. Arlin Watson to help pay her expenses in Vacation Bible School work.

10-Mr. John A. Simmons was elected temporary clerk, filling the gap left by Bro. Jenkins leaving our association.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

An education is very important to any individual, especially if it is a christian education. In any business or profession the properly trained person does his work well.

Our Baptist colleges are giving culture and knowledge needed in this present day. In our colleges there is emphasis placed on the teachings of the Bible and the principles exemplified in the earthly life of our Lord.

Here in North Carolina our seven Baptist Colleges, namely, Wake Forest, Merdith, Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, Campbell,

Wingate, and Chowan, we had a total enrollment of 5,921 students and more than this number have already been accepted for the coming college year. Our leaders are concerned about our growing educational needs and are hoping that we can build one or more new colleges in the near future.

Of the 750 students enrolled as ministerial and mission volunteers in our North Carolina Baptist Colleges, 450 are training for the ministry. Hundreds of other are studying for ministers of music, directors of Christian education and Church Secretaries

In our association we have had a Seminary Extension Center located at the First Baptist Church. One school has already been completed and another is now in progress. We would like to encourage the preachers and laymen to enroll in the next school which will begin in the spring.

We can best express our interest in our youth and those trying to advance by first, praying for our collegers and seminaries, second, by encouraging the young people in our churches that are graduation from high school to choose one of our Baptist colleges and third, by continuing to provide financial support through our present nine year programs of advance.

REPORT OF BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

The Baptist Homes of N. C. are in their sixth year of operation, (sixth in Winston-Salem, third in Albermale). Needless to say with a realization upon the part of our Baptist of the services rendered by our Homes in behalf of our elderly friends has resulted in this being our greatest year of operation.

Construction of the new administration and dormitory building on the 34 acre tract of land in Winston-Salem was begun in February of this year and it is believed it will be ready for occupancy in February 1957. The beautiful landscaping, together with the building designed to take care of our aging friends will make any Baptist, I am sure, proud of this latest step in our denominational efforts when they see in person this latest unit of our Homes in Winston-Salem. When the new addition is completed we will be able to care for an additional 44 new residents, this together with the 20 we are now caring for plus the 36 residents of the Albermale branch of the Homes will make a total of 100 the two units will be able to take care of.

The total investments in Winston-Salem and Albermale in the Homes will probably be worth \$750,000.00 when the new unit is completed in Winston-Salem. It is hoped when, and if we reach our goal of \$125,000.00 in our special day offering in February our Homes will be debt free.

Since our once a year special day collections begun there has been an increasing response on the part of our good friends of the Homes. In 1954 our second special day collection, State wide, we received approximately \$70,000.00; 1955 approximately \$90,000.00; In 1956 we have hopes of reaching \$100,000.00 as many of our churches place the Homes in their budget and wait until the end of the year before making a report. No exact figure can be given at this time.

Surry Association contributions since beginning in 1954 has also had a gradual yearly increase. In 1954, 44 churches of the Association contributed \$1,226.64; In 1955, 43 churches gave \$1,673.97, plus special contributions of friends of \$1,275.00 or a total of \$2,948.00 by Surry Associational residents; In 1956, 43 churches in the Association gave \$3,011.31 plus contributions of friends of \$290.00 or a total of Surry Association residents of \$3,301.31. This gives a total of \$352.34 more in 1956 than in 1955.

Your Associational Representative contacted our Sunday School Supertendents and Pastors twice by correspondence and sent Home Bulletins for family groups prior to our special day collection. He also with our Homes Representative, Mr. J. M. Hayes, saw some of our Baptist who failed to contribution the day the special collections was taken in behalf of our Homes.

It has been a pleasure to work with my friends of the Association the past several years and I would like to thank all who made it possible to report another good year in the consideration we are giving our aging friends.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The year 1955 was the best in service our Baptist Hospital has ever had. Our churches gave the largest Mother's Day Offering they have ever made, and the Hospital was able to serve more people than ever before. More than 115,000 days of bed-patient care were rendered to almost 15,000 sick people, and more than 100,000 visits were made to the clinics and offices of the medical staff.

Following the completion of the new south wing and the moving of a number of departments into new quarters, much of the original building which was constructed in 1932 had to be renovated. Most of this work has been completed, as is evidenced by the new waiting rooms for visitors and many other changes. Our Hospital is not only larger now, but it has the best facilities and staff to serve our people that it has ever had.

The new x-ray department is one example of improvement. Just recently, three new type x-ray machines have been installed at a cost of over \$30,000. A small concrete building is now under construction to house a cobalt machine, which is much more safe and much more effective in the treatment of certain types of cancer than any x-ray machines now being used. The cost of this will be \$75,000. No other hospital in North Carolina has equipment equal to these new machines. We now have the best x-ray department in the South. The doctor who heads the department is one of the outstanding radiologists in America.

Most other departments have been improved and new departments added. Regular services are being held in the beautiful new Chapel which was opened in June. We now have a fine specialist for testing and advising those who have defective hearing. A highly skilled plastic surgeon is joining our staff this fall. Our Baptist Hospital is trying to stay in the forefront in providing for our people the best there is available in medical service.

The most urgently needed new facilities are a new nurses home, in order that the nursing school may be enlarged, and additional parking facilities. Anyone who has visited the Hospital recently is probably aware of the serious parking problem, and the nursing school need is equally acute.

Costs in all hospitals have increased steadily and every indication is that they will continue to increase. Such medical service as is provided by our Baptist Hospital cannot be made available without great cost. All who can possibly do so should carry hospital insurance with a reliable company. Those of us who can pay for our medical care must do so. Then we need to give generously through our Mother's Day Offering to help care for those who cannot care for themselves.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL TRAINING UNION ACTIVITIES

1955 — 1956

"If a man therefore purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel unto honor, sanctified, and meet for the Master's use, and prepared unto every good work."

One of our aims for Training Union is to help us grow as Christians. As we grow we prepare ourselves for more effective Christian service. Some of the means by which we endeavor to accomplish this are as follows: By increasing the number of Training Unions, increasing Training Union enrollment, conducting study courses, encouraging all members to engage in daily Bible reading and prayer, and in general, trying to improve the quality of training our people receive when they come to Training Union.

During the past year we have held quarterly Executive Committee Meetings, mainly for the purpose of planning the Mass meetings which are held the third month of each quarter. There was much more work which should have been done, such as (1) organizing new Training Unions, (2) planning, teaching, or conducting study courses, (3) presenting demonstration programs, (4) visiting churches in the Association to promote Training Union work, among other things. Now that Mr. John Biddle, Associational Missionary, is here to give us the benefit of his years of experience in work of this type we hope to make much progress in some of these areas during the coming year.

As Associational Director, and in view of the need as I see it, I should like to recommend that there be an evening set aside for a workshop or study period at which time the Associational Officers come together for a study of the Associational Training Union Handbook. I believe that if all the people who have accepted positions for some part of this important work could take part in this study they would find it most helpful.

The Mass Meetings held during the year were as follows:

I. September 27, 1955 — Meeting held at Fairview: 49 persons attended the meeting — 11 churches were represented — Installation of officers was held — A panel discussion by directors & pastors.

II. December 6, 1955 — "M" Night at the First Baptist Ch. 157 present — 22 churches represented — Dr. Claude Bowen of Greensboro brought an inspirational message.

III. March 27, 1956 — Tournament night at Flippin Memorial — 109 people there — 10 churches represented. There were participants for all the phases of Training Union work, and the Association was represented at the Regional meeting which was held in Elkin the following month.

IV. Youth Night was held at Highland Park Baptist Church with about 38 persons attending. The Youth Choir from the First Baptist Church presented special music and Rev. Preston Taylor was the speaker.

V. The June Mass Meeting was held at Friendship — 29 were present — 5 churches were represented. Rev. L. H. Hollingsworth, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Boone was the speaker. He spoke on "Christian Discipleship".

This brings us up to the present. We have not reached all of our proposed goals for the year. Needless to say, we have not done our very best. We feel, however, that some progress has been made; at least we are on the right track. With all of us pulling together, and with God on our side, how can we lose?

I am predicting a great year ahead for Training Union in our association. The task seems almost overwhelming when we think of the 44 churches that have no Training Union at the present time, but we tend to limit our thinking to our own human capabilities and forget about the greatness of God, who is willing and able to help us.

Let each of us determine in our hearts to carry the torch just a little higher, so that more of our people may see what Training Union can mean to a church and to an individual.

12 churches had study courses and 273 awards were received.

From its beginning down to the present day, Sunday school has proved to be the church's most effective way of reaching people for Bible study, leading them to accept Christ's kingdom, and giving those saved a place of service in Christ's kingdom. In this modern world of ours, the need for the Bible teaching agency of the church to touch the lives of all men continues to increase. Sunday schools will never be out of date so long as people remain upon the earth for they will need evangelizing, teaching and placing in service in God's kingdom.

We are happy to report that Sunday School enrollment and attendance continues to increase in the churches in our Association. But even in the light of this, each of our churches needs to take an inventory of where that now stand in relation to the numbers of unreached people and what its possibilities for the future growth are. Until we have enrolled every person in our Association for Bible study our job is not complete.

During the past year we have four Associational Sunday School meetings at the following churches: Fairview, Fancy Gap,

Bannertown, and Holly Springs. Attendance at each meeting was good, but we are hoping for participation by a greater number of churches during the coming year. The Associational Sunday School organizations meets on Tuesday night after the 4th Sunday in February, May, August, and November.

The Associational Sunday School officers make the following recommendations to the churches in our Association:

1. That the churches encourage their Sunday School officers and teachers to attend Associational meetings on Sunday school work.
2. That each church observe January Bible Study Week in 1957 using as a guidebook "The Gospel According to Paul" a study of Romans, by Clifton J. Allen.
3. That each Sunday school provides at least one training opportunity for its workers during the coming year.
4. That each church in the Association observe Sunday school Preparation Week during September, 1957.
5. That the churches in our Association be divided into permanent groups so as to make promotion and training activities more practical and efficient.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

And thou shalt teach them diligently to thy children. Deu6:72

To do a good job teaching, much training is needed, three vacation Bible School Clinics were held in our association this year, in different parts of the country to give every church the opportunity of group training. There were 50 white and two colored schools held this year, with 34 churches reporting, the enrollment of 1,346 pupils with an average attendance of 1,052.

The mission offering to go through our cooperative program \$412.46.

Churches visited 18, Sermons 10, other messages 7, Study courses 5 nights, Individual conference 58, Group conferences 12, Committee meetings 3, Statewide meetings (S. S. Planning, Raleigh) 1, Radio talks 2, Letters, cards and tracts mailed 457, many telephone calls and miscellaneous services rendered.

As we look ahead we are planning for at least one church-wide central training class for each group of churches and we hope many individual church study courses. Pastors and church officers are invited to call upon me for any service we can render. Below is a proposed new grouping of churches which after much study by the heads of all departments of our associational work we believe will greatly increase efficiency in promoting the work of the kingdom. This Association was formed from the Yadkin Association which held its first session at Eaton's Meeting House in Rowan County on August 28, 29, 30, 1790. It extended over all the northwestern part of North Carolina. The statistical tables show churches from Surry, Wilkes, Rowan, Iredell, and Burke Counties.
