





Harry Lambert and Gladys Wright are great players on Broadway. Gladys Wright is a great character actress and her manager says she is the find of the season.


T.W. Estes is a Bi-State League ball player

Bluefield, West Virginia. Christine has three sweet children -- baby Ray, Judy and Preston.


Who is that young Admiral of the Navy I see? Why it is Coy Kirkman. Coy, still has his contagious smile and has a girl in every port.



The girls basketball season showed a fair record for a new team. Starting with only one regular player, Lela Moseley, new recruits were soon welded into a smooth working combination. The end of the season saw a record of eight victories and twelve losses.


