PROCEEDINGS

Little Richmond Baptist Church

Rusk, N. C.

August 5, 1932

The Thirtieth annual session of the Surry Baptist Association met with the Little Richmond Baptist church, and the meeting opened at 10:00 a. m. with the congregation singing "Amazing Grace.

W. L. Reece, moderator, called the Association to order, read part of the Sermon On The Mount in Matthew's Gospel. Dr. I. T. Jacobs led the Association in prayer. The clerk called the roll of the churches, with 48 answering.

The election of officers followed, with W. L. Reece reelected moderator, A. V. West elected vice-moderator, Rev. J. H. Hall re-elected clerk, Eph Whisenhunt elected assistant clerk and F. T. Lewellyn re-elected treasurer.

The program of the Association was adopted by the body. The reading of the by-laws and constitution was dispensed until later on in the meeting.

At 11 o'clock Dr. J. Thomas Smith preached the annual sermon using for his subject the "Christians' Hope" text, Romans: 8th chapter, 24-25 verses.

Dr. M. L. Kesler reported for the Orphanage, Brother Eph Whisenhunt reported for the Recorder. The Brethern were recognized from the other associations as follows: Dr. Kesler from the Orphanage at Thomasville, Rev. R. E. Adams and Rev. J. P. Davis from the Yadkin Association, Rev. C. C. Coggins from Stanley county and Rev. C. C. Hayes, a new pastor in this Association. A committee was appointed on finance consisting of Delmar Hodges and Paul Burch. A committee on new churches was appointed consisting of I. T. Jacobs, T. S. Draughn and Eph Whisenhunt. A collection was taken for Brother C. C. Arrington which amount was \$10.92. A motion was carried to adjourn for dinner. Benidection by Dr. Kesler.

Friday Afternoon Session

The Association convened at 1:30 o'clock with song by the congregation. Prayer by Brother Whisenhunt. An in vitation was given new churches. Pinnacle View Baptist Church came and was recommended by the committee and was received into the association.

To send the committee a copy of the bylaws and articles of faith to be filed along with the church letter and application for membership in Surry Baptist Church. The right of fellowship was extended to the pastor by the moderator.

Dr. I. T. Jacobs read the report on Foreign Missions and spoke on the report. Brother Whisenhunt spoke on it also. The report was adopted.

The report on Orphanage was read by J. H. Hall and spoken on by Dr. Kesler. The report was adopted.

Brother T. S. Draughn reported on Home Missions and spoke on the same. Dr. Kesler spoke on this report. The report was adopted.

The report on the W. M. S. was read by Mrs. W. A. Jackson and was adopted.

Wallace Shelton read the report on B. Y. P. U. Dr. I. T. Jacobs and Eph Whisenhunt spoke on the B. Y. P. U. work. Report was adopted.

After oppointing a committee of three on organization the moderator appointed the following committees:

Evangelism: I. D. Fergerson, T. S. Draughn, A. V. West. Time, Place and Preacher: F. T. Lewellyn, J. F. Fields and T. G. Marion. Nominating: H. R. Stanley, A. V. West and T. V. Cockerham. Resolution: Job Melton, T. G. Marion and O. H. Hauser. Executive: O. H. Hauser, chairman, Eph Whisenhunt, vice-chairman, E. B. Draughn, J. H. Hall, Mrs W A. Jackson, Mrs. T. E. Mock and George Tucker. Others will be added later.

The Association adjourned with prayer by D. G Reece to meet again Saturday morning at 9:45 o'clock

Saturday Morning Session

Opening song by the congregation. Devotional conducted by Brother T.S. Draughn. Scripture lesson, The Pslam 19. Prayer by Brother Robert Neal. The minutes of meeting of yesterday were read and adopted.

The report on Hospitals was read by A. V. West and this report was spoken on by the following: A. V. West, T. S. Draughn, O. H. Hauser and J. H. Hall. The report was adopted.

J. H. Hall read the report on Religious Literature Bro. Eph Whesienhunt and A V. West spoke on this report. The report was adopted.

The report on Christian Education was read by Brother O. H. Hauser, who spoke on same. Brother Hoyt Blackwell, of Mars Hill College, also spoke to us on Christian Education.

The report on State Missions was read by H. R. Stanley. Brother Huggins, secretary of State Missions, delivered us a great message on State Work. Report was adopted.

Brother Whisenhunt made a motion to elect Bro. Hauser as chairman of the promotion committee, and appoint 6 others on the committee. A motion was made to adjourn for dinner. Prayer by G. W. Tucker.

Saturday Afternoon Session

The Association reconvened at one thirty and united in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "To The Work." Prayer was offered by Brother Norman. The congregation then sang "Amazing Grace." Eph Whisenhunt preached the annual doctrinal sermon using for his text: Matthew 16:17-18. The subject was "A New Testament Church."

The report on Ministers' Relief and Annuity Board was discussed by I. T. Jacobs. The report was adopted.

Eph Whisenhunt made an oral report for the executive committee.

The committee on B. Y. P. U. reported. W. O. Lawrance, Miss Lizzie Norman and Wallace Shelton, Chairman. This committee is to reorganize the Associational B. Y. P. U.

The executive committee reported as follows: District 1 A. V. West; number 2, I. W. Reece; number 3, N. E. Boyles; number 4, J. F. Fields; number 5, Eph Whisenhunt; number 6, F. T Lewellyn; number 7, Mrs W. L. Reece; number 8, J. R. Venable and number 9, Ernest Wood.

Finance committee reported the minute fund, \$54.46 and for Brother Arrington \$3.00 with co-operative program amount at \$3.00.

The matter of printing the minutes referred to the Executive committee. The clerk to submit the manuscript to the printer and report back to executive committee.

Dr I. T. Jacobs made a motion to extend a vote of thanks to the Little Richmond Church for her hospitality during the association.

Upon a motion made the Association adjourned until Sunday morning at 10 o'clock.

Sunday Morning Session

The Association convened at 10 o'clock. Opening song by the congregation. Opening prayer was offered by Brother A. J. Vernon. The subject of Sunday School work was taken up and discussed by E. B. Draughn and T. M. Chand ler. J. H. Hall and T. S. Draughn also spoke on this work.

The hour came for preaching and J. H. Hall was appointed to deliver the 11 o'clock sermon. He read for his lesson the first 13 verses of the 4th chapter of Exodus. Text, two verses of this lesson and using for his subject, "Serving God with What We Have." Adjourned for dinner.

Sunday Afternoon Session

The Association convened at 2:30 with congregation singing, "Shall We Gather at the River." Brother Whisenhunt lead the Association in prayer. Rev T.S. Draughn preached for us and delivered a great message using the 6th verse of the 3rd chapter of Joshua for his text.

An offering was taken, for minutes and other objects, amounting to \$2.91.

The Association adjourned to meet with Mountain Park Baptist Church on Friday before the first Sunday in August, 1933.

Report on Foreign Missions

We are passing through trying times. For several years the financial and industrial world has been tested to the limit. Practically every issue of the daily press gives an account of man's failure—banks have closed their doors, factories have ceased to operate, railroads have gone into the hands of receivers, stocks and bonds have reached a low level in prices and even municipal, state and the national governments are staggering under the strain of meeting their obligations.

The failures and disappointments of the past few years are nothing more than a process of discipline through suffering by which God will bring us to our senses. Generally speaking, we have forgotten God. His church has neglected its duties. Our people have been pleasure mad. The evangelizing of the world has suffered for lack of workers and funds. We have been on a prodigal Son lark.

Many of our missionary Baptist Churches are missionary in name only. Some of the churches of this Association do not contribute the value of one stalk of tobacco to send the gospel to foreign lands. Can we expect God to continue to bless us when we persist in neglecting our duty to Him?

It is high time that we as Christians should do as the Prodigal Son did-come to ourselves, arise and return to our Father's home with the avowed determination to fully discharge our duty in evangelizing the world.

The report of our Foreign Board shows that the Southern Baptists have 417 missionaries on foreign fields and 2305 native workers. These men and women are serving 2651 churches with a membership of 177,196. The additions to the churches in foreign fields last year were 18,605. Now glance at these figures and they will readily reveal the fact that this is an average membership per missionary of 427 and average addition of 44 for the year. How many churches in this association, even with all of our advantages, have added 44 members during the past year?

This was the best report in the history of our foreign work even in face of all the handicaps. We are familar with the distressing financial conditions of our Foreign Mission Board. You have been advised that several missionaries have been recalled and other fields must be closed unless the Baptist churches of the south rally to the cause and furnish the finances.

The foreign Mission Board has reached the place where it must have immediate help from Southern Baptists. Our missionaries are out on the fields and cannot lay down the work. We must furnish the money on which they are to live and operate. Under present conditions our Board cannot borrow additional funds. May every Baptist of this association fully appreciate the serious condition our Foreign Board is facing and then act immediately and adequately as God directs. Man's endeavers may fail but God's cannot.

This will, more than anything else, help our Sunday School on it's road to success.

But because of indifference and hard times this great object with all others have been empaired, and we believe that this work can be put back on foot and as for the Surry Association we recommend that every church take a special offering for State missions and praying God's blessings on all our work.

Report on Home Missions

"Be strong and of good courage, fear not, nor be not afraid of them; for Jehovah thy God, He it is that doth go with thee, He will not fail thee nor forsake thee" Deut. 5:6.

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always even unto the end of the world. Amen."

With an abounding faith in the promises of the Lord contained in the above scripture and others of the New and Old Testaments, the Home Mission Board was organized in the year 1845. During the eighty-seven years of its existence it has enjoyed the reputation of having a record of accievement unsurpassed by any oganization in the world.

During this period of time the Board employed 41,062 missionaries. These missionaries reported as a result of their labors 785,500 baptisms. They organized 8,570 churches. These 785,500 baptisms represents one fifth of the total membership, at present time, of southern Baptists These 8,570 churches organized by the Home Board missionaries represent one out of every three of total number churches Southern Baptist now have. The Board received and expended in its work for this period \$20,500,000. Millions of dollars of this money were spent in the erection of churches and other enterprises, and yet based on this total, the 785,500 baptisms reported by missionaries of Home Board cost on an

average of only twenty-five dollars each.

From year to year the Home Board has balanced its budget with its receipts. It has also lived within its income. To do this it has been forced to reduce its work each year. At the annual meeting of the Board May, 1931 the budget was fixed at \$412,880. After providing for interest and the principal on its indebtness \$162,880 was left for the current work of the Board including adminstration. Although the receipts of the Board were many thousand dollars less this past conventional year than they were for the year before, yet, due to the care exercised by the Board in balancing its budget at the beginning of the year the Board has lived within its receipts and has also paid a creditable amount on the principal of its debt. The above administration in this achievement has been no little undertaking.

Through the statistical reports we find that God has wonderfully blessed the faithful service of our missionaries during the year for they report 1,574 baptisms as compared with 1,543 last year. Our school and Good-Will centers, including the Seaman's Institute and the Rescue Mission, report 1,944 conversions, making a total of 2,618 that have been won to Christ the last year.

The work of the Home Board embraces a large field of service. It has established schools and Good-Will centers among foreigners, churches and missions among Indians, negroes and deaf mutes. It also has Rescue missions for the distressed, Institution for Seaman, Mountain schools and special missionionary among the Jews, Church Extension department and other activities.

Space forbids going into details of the work of the Home Board, so I have given you only the brief summary of its work and achievement since its foundation and for past year. "Wherefore seeing that we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin that doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us." That after this life's hardships and toils are over we all may be admitted into that home not made with hands but eternal in heaven.

Report on B. Y. P. U. Work

In the Surry Association eight unions comprise the totality of B. Y. P. U. endeavor. Insofar as I have been able to ascertain, only 2 churches are actively engaged in this phase of Christian activity, Mount Airy and Elkin. Other churches have reported temporay and embryonic organizations, but there is genuine need for concerted action in the formation of Baptist Young Peoples Unions throughout the Association.

You folks who dote on statistics, or in this case the lack of them, have food for thought in this altogether embarassing report. In our work we are reaching 163 of some 7,000 prospects in this Association. That's only two percent—only two out of one hundred attend B. Y. P. U. This is pathetic. Where the fault is I do not know. But the fault and the fact exists.

To foster interest in any enterprise work must be expended. I place the Christian enterprise at the top of legitimate endeavers, and I daresay less time and work is expended in this "business" than any other. Now I contend that we are missing a great opportunity to work our youth when we sadly neglect our B. Y. P. U. work. I would like to submit to you that we do something to rehabilitate the B. Y. P. U. forces in this Association.

We have got to do all we can to take care of our young people. Since that bunch of short-sighted, aristocratic, pinchpenney bunch of legislators at Raleigh have curtailed the educational opportunity of our youth to the veritable bone. The church must come to the rescue. We must not let our impressionistic youths get a negative outlook on life. I know that some of our great thinkers are terming this, the "Age of Challenge." Maybe so, but how many are going to accept the challenge? We must now educate, scotch the idea that there is no chance for youth. There is a chance and the B. Y. P. U. should be a great force in advertising this fact. And B. Y. P. U's. do not cost anything They will support themselves. Page the school legislators! Let us get to work on our Paptist Young Peoples Unions.

Report on Baptist Hospital

During 1931 Baptist hospital at Winston-Salem treated 3025 patients at a cost of \$114,000. Of these, 1944 were treated free, or paid only a part of the cost of hospitilization; at a cost to the institution of \$55,000. The institution received from the churches and Sunday schools of the state only \$26,000, or less than one-half the cost incurred by such free patients

To meet this deficit it was necessary for the institution to cut corners, impair efficiency, slash pay checks and refuse many worthy patients because of inability to treat them This institution was built by Baptists of the state to care for our own Baptist folks who find themselves unable to pay for hospital care in private institutions. It is carrying out the Master's injunction to heal the sick and care for the weak. If it is to continue to do this work the Baptists must provide the means. We urge that each church take a Mother's Day offering for the hospital and that each church that sends a patient to the institution during 1932 see to it that the church raise and send to the institution a dollar and fifty cents for each day such patient is in the hospital.

Report on Christian Education

We are grateful to Almighty God for the record North / Carolina Baptist have made in the field of Christian Education. One hundred years ago our first Baptist College [Wake Forest] was chartered. Since then other schools have been born and now we have three senior colleges, namely, Wake Forest, Meridith and Chowan, and four junior colleges, namely Mars Hill, Campbell, Wingate and Boiling Springs. Last year we had over twenty three hundred young men

Last year we had over twenty three hundred young men and women enrolled in the regular term and nearly one thousand enrolled in summer schools, of this number eighty were student volunteers and one hundred fifty-two were preparing themselves to preach the Gospel.

These school have property valued at over three million dollars, and have an endownment of over three million dollars, but their greatest wealth is not in property or endownment but in the thousands of Christian leaders they have sent out into the world. These schools have given the world some of our greatest preachers, doctors, lawyers and scholars We now have over twenty-three hundred Baptist churches in North Carolina who are largely dependent upon these schools for their trained leaders.

Let us not forget that these schools are our schools. So when our boys and girls are ready for college, let us give them a chance for a Christian education by sending them to one of these schools.

Report on the Baptist Orphanage

On November 11th, 1885 the first child was received into the Home. The last one enrolled, not including mother's aid, on October 1st., 1931 runs the number up to 2916. The institution was at first sponsored by the N. C. Baptist Orphanage Association, but after a few years the Baptist State Convention adopted it as one of its children.

Our population changes very little, as we have now, June 4, 1932, in the Home 632 children, of these 136 are in the Kennedy Home There were 696 children enrolled last year.

There are now 298 children with 74 mothers cared for in their own homes by Mother's Aid. From the beginning we have helped by Mother's Aid 929 children and added to the whole number received into the Home runs the total up to 3852 children.

We are falling in debt and may reach the limit of our ability to borrow before the next Thanksgiving Day offering comes in. We urge every Sunday School to take a oncea-month offering for the Orphanage.
