### Reception

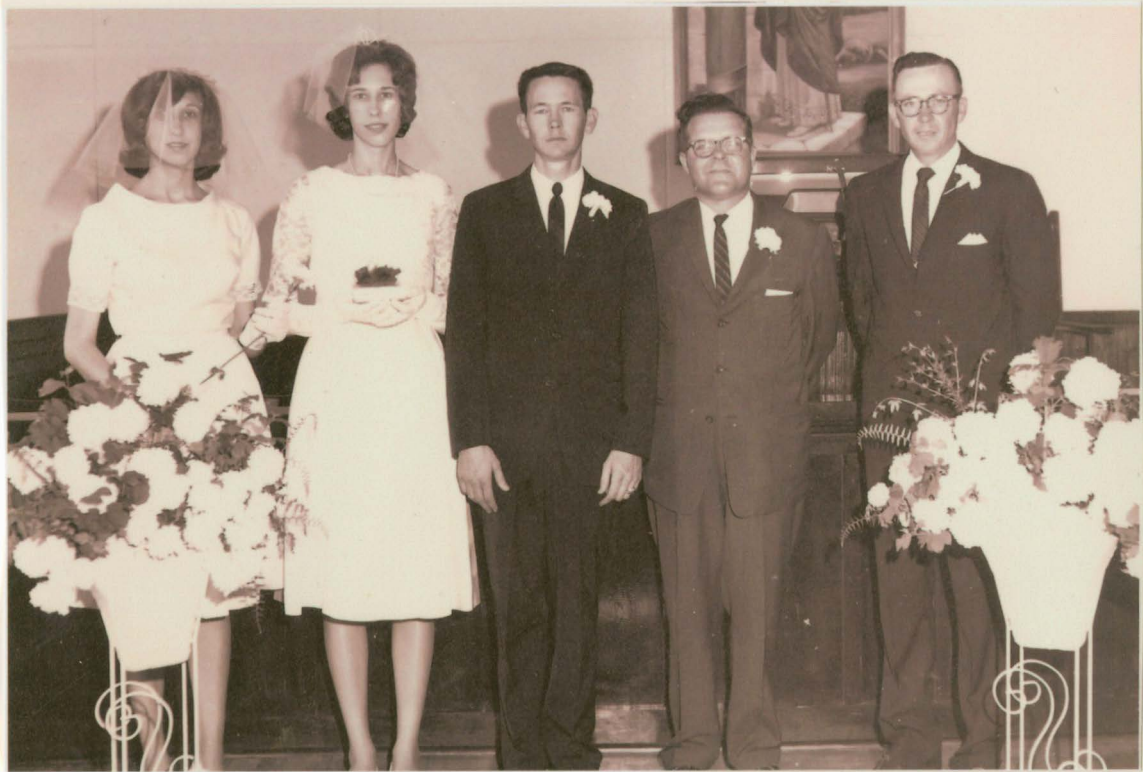
Following the ceremony, the parents of the bride entertained with a reception at their home.

Approximately 150 guests called during the appointed hours.

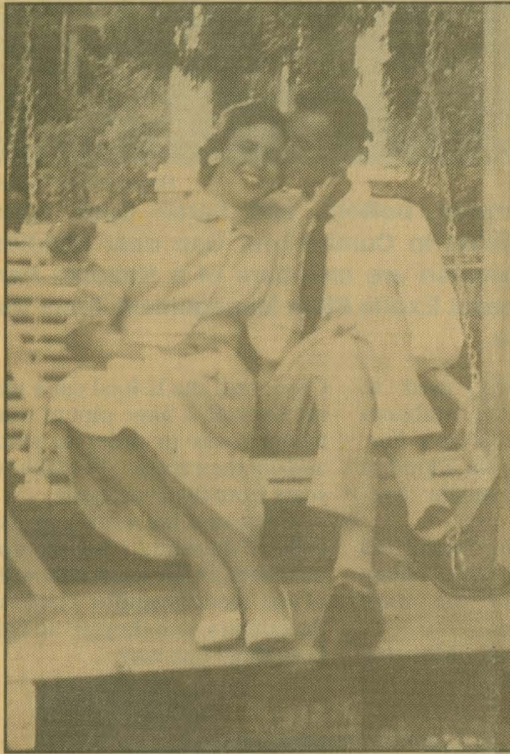

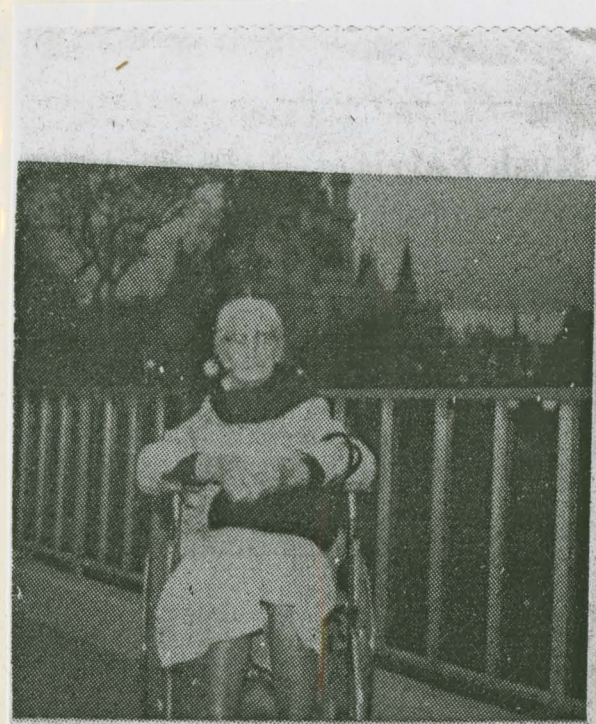

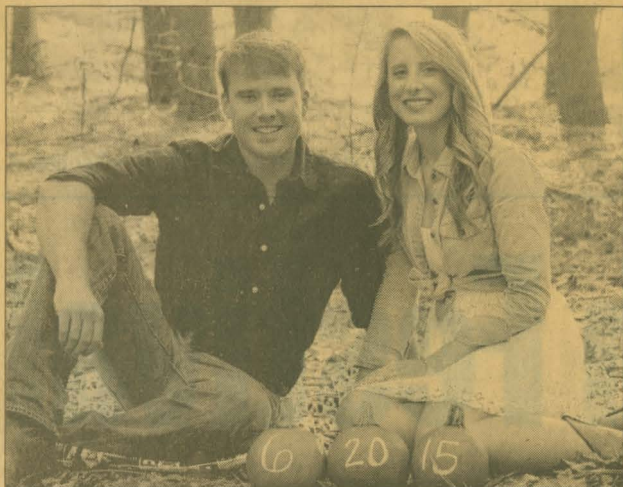
