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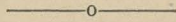
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### FOREWORD

We had a good report from churches this year. Forty-four churches reported this year by letter.

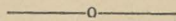
No new churches were received into the association this year.

## PROCEEDINGS

Copeland Baptist Church  
Copeland, N. C.  
July 19, 1929.

The Twenty-Seventh Annual Session of the Surry Baptist Association met with the Copeland Baptist Church. Congregation sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." W. L. Reece, M. D., opened the Association by reading a part of the 11th chapter of Ecclesiastes.

Dr. C. E. Maddry led the Association in prayer.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator, W. L. Reece.

Roll call showed 44 churches present.

The following officers were elected to serve until next session: W. L. Reece, Moderator; J. H. Hall, Clerk; and F. T. Llewellyn, Treasurer.

At 11 o'clock Dr. I. T. Jacobs preached the introductory sermon, using for his text the 48th Psalm, 12th to 13th verses. Dr. Jacobs brought to us a great, inspiring message which we all enjoyed very much.

Following the sermon the congregation sang "We Are Marching to Zion."

Dr. Jacobs read a report of the committee on resolutions.

A committee on resolutions, composed of Eph Whisenhunt, J. K. Williams, and T. S. Draughn, was appointed.

A committee on finance was appointed: I. F. Armfield, J. Luther Wood, and Silas Stone.

The following brethren were recognized by the Association: Dr. J. E. Maddry of Raleigh and Rev. M. F. Booe, pastor in Pilot Mountain Association.

Adjourned for dinner. Prayer by Rev. C. F. Fields.

### FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association convened at 1:15 o'clock. Song, "Loyalty to Christ."

The devotional was conducted by Rev. S. F. Morton, reading for his scripture lesson the 11th chapter of St. Mark. Prayer by Brother Morton.

Dr. Jacobs made a statement concerning the colored Baptist Church in Mount Airy.

Rev. R. E. Blake, pastor of the colored Baptist Church of Mount Airy, spoke a few minutes concerning his church. A collection was taken for him, amounting to \$11.14, for the church.

The program for this session was unanimously adopted. A collection was taken to pay for printing the program: amount, \$3.00.

Report on State Missions was read by Dr. I. T. Jacobs.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS

North Carolina Baptists have grown from a weak, struggling band of Christians to a mighty host of nearly 40,000. Today they own and maintain schools, orphanages, hospitals, and are engaged in every worthy cause that is known to advance the Kingdom of Christ on Earth.

But with all their past history and glorious service, much still remains to be done. Who will carry on this great task to completion but the General Board of Missions. This Board is asking for a budget of \$90,000 to do its work for the coming year. It will take \$32,000 of this amount to carry on the work among the churches and on needy fields calling for help.

There are 87 missionary pastors at work on the field, serving 134 churches. These workers built 11 churches, repaired 67 churches, had 1,775 conversions with 1,233 baptisms, as a partial result of their labors.

The Board employs four full time men, two giving their labors to evangelism, one to church building, and the other laboring among the colored people.

The school for preachers at Meredith College is a great success. Here 325 pastors had an opportunity to study for 10 days this last year, the methods of better service for the Master.

The Baptist Book Shop at Raleigh sold \$40,919.92 worth of books last year. We urge the churches of this Association to buy their literature from this Book Shop.

This Board is doing a large and heroic work, but does not have the funds to do what it might in the mountainous section of this state. We plead for more money for this Board.

Report on Home Missions was read by Brother Eph Whisenhunt.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions is the united effort of all our Southern Baptist churches to provide workers, churches, and schools in the fields where the conditions, situations, and missionary problems are common to more than one state where there is found a field too great for the Baptist forces in such states to evangelize unaided by sister states. Southern Baptists have such Home Board opportunities as:

### Native Born People

(1) There are 10,000,000 Negroes. Our work among them is done in cooperation with their own home board. (2) 500,000 French-speaking people in Southern Louisiana. (3) 500,000 Jews. We have one missionary to the Jews. (4) 161,987 Indians compose the smallest group of native born people that forms a mission field. 10,000 of these are found in Eastern North Carolina in Robinson County. These are probably descendants of the Lost Colony of Raleigh. Brother and Sister J. K. Henderson are our missionaries and are located at Pembroke, N. C. We have 2,833 Indians in Western Carolina. These are of the Cherokee Nation who refused to move Westward. Here we have 14 churches with Brother and Sister J. W. Lee as our missionaries. In Southern Alabama there is a small group of people called the Cajans whose ancestry is unknown. They have been neglected for a long time. We have one church there and one missionary, L. A. Weathers. In Southern Mississippi we have a remnant of the Choctaw Tribe which refused to move West. Our work is growing slowly with S. E. McAdary as missionary. In Oklahoma we have work among the Osages, Pawnees, Otoes, Sac and Fox, Iowas, Poncas, Kickapoos, and Kaw Indians. We have four white men missionaries, four Indian pastors and two women missionaries. We have a total of 124 Indian churches with a membership of 7,181.

### Foreigners Born in Other Countries

(1) 1,000,000 Mexicans, mostly in Texas and New Mexico. (2) 550,000 Italians. In some of our larger cities we find from 6,000 to 20,000. (3) 50,000 Cubans in Florida. (4) 7,180 Chinese and Japanese. (5) All other foreigners in the South number 3,346,110 including 26 nationalities. In all we find 15,953,290 alien-thinking people in the South. Leaving out Western Cuba and Panama but adding the population of the mountain regions, about 7,200,000, and we find the total of 23,000,000 souls in our Home Mission fields.

### Our Workers

The Home Board has 171 missionaries in these fields and about 100 teachers in our mountain schools. Our greatest need today is a missionary consciousness that will make of every Baptist a missionary within his own personal reach. We will never reach to "the uttermost part" until our nation is evangelized. America was the first nation to be born Christian. God picked her first settlers, they came in the name of God. We have inherited a Christian nation. What shall we hand down to the coming generations?

Report on Foreign Missions, not being ready, Brother J. K. Williams is to draw the report and hand it in later.

Dr. C. E. Maddry of Raleigh, our General Secretary of State Missions, spoke to us on the Mission work of our various boards.

Brother Eph Whisenhunt read the report on resolutions as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved: (1) That this Association request its Executive Committee, in cooperation with the churches of the Association, to have the names of the churches placed on said churches, in such a place and manner that they may be read from the highway on which they are located.

(2) That the Association appoint a committee to prepare the history of the churches of the Association, one each year, beginning with the oldest, and to have this history read each year as prepared, and printed in the papers of the county, and a copy sent to the Historical Society of North Carolina.

(3) That a committee be appointed to visit those churches of this Association, which have not been represented by either letter of delegates for the past two years, and report their condition to the next meeting of this Association, and unless they propose to cooperate with the Association in some way, that they be disciplined.

(4) That article nine of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: "That this Association provide annually an Executive Committee consisting of nine members with the Moderator and Clerk as Ex-officio members. Said committee to be one from each of nine groups of the churches in the Association. Said members to be elected as follows: three for three years, three for two years, and three for one year. At each succeeding meeting of the Association three new members shall be elected. Said committee shall have charge of Associational Missions and such other objects as may be entrusted to them by the Association. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid them by the Treasurer of the Association for objects under their charge, and to collect and disburse funds for those objects during intervals of the meetings of this body, and they shall make an annual report of all their work to the Association, including a report of collections and expenditures. Said committee shall meet quarterly.

The devotional was conducted by Rev. H. R. Stanley. Prayer by Brother F. T. Lewellyn.

The Moderator called the Association to order. The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

The Moderator gave an invitation for the reception of new churches; none came.

Brother Eph Whisenhunt spoke to us on the subject of Home Missions. The reports on State and Home Missions were unanimously adopted by the Association.

Dr. I. T. Jacobs read the report on the women's work of our Association and the report was adopted. Mrs. Eph Whisenhunt spoke to us on the subject of our W. M. U. work.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE**

The Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville belongs to the Baptists of North Carolina and is now caring for some six hundred orphan boys and girls while many are denied the privilege of being cared for on account of room. If we, as a denomination, were as interested as we ought to be in orphan children, this would not be so. Your committee urges the importance of all Baptists becoming more familiar with conditions that now exists in connection with the orphanage work.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE**

Our homes will read something or other. Any person who is able to read craves information and that mental invigoration that comes from contact with the thought and action of the outside world. Hence the flood of literature that sweeps all about us. Both young and old must and will satisfy the craving of the mind for reading matter. We are interested only in the enterprises that we know about.

This explains, it seems to us, the reason for the marked falling off in contributions to our missionary enterprises. The Baptist home that subscribes for and reads such periodicals as the Biblical Recorder, Charity and Children, Home and Foreign Fields, and even occasionally purchases a Baptist Publication Society book, will inevitably show a marked interest in Kingdom affairs as contrasted with the home where no such literature is ever read. With a world full of trash, we can not urge too strongly upon our Baptist folks that they supply the home with wholesome literature, and wholesome literature will have a religious tone, whatever name it may bear.

However, not all so-called religious literature tends to the creating of religious sanity and wholesome views of life. The agents of all sorts of religious "isms" and "fads" are abroad in the land. This very summer so-called Bible tracts and books have been peddled in the Surry Association and our Baptist folks have bought and paid good money for them, not knowing that behind such interpretations of the Bible are ideas and underlying principles averse not only to Bible doctrine but to the fundamentals of Protestantism. Baptists may suffer at times from lack of enthusiasm, but the nature of our faith is such and the doctrines promulgated by our publications are of such a nature that they never lead us who read and feed on them into religious fads and theological fancies. If Baptists would keep sane let them read Baptist literature. And if they have any doubt as to it, then see how that literature squares with the New Testament teaching.

**B. Y. P. U. REPORT**

The letters to the Association reveal the following figures: number of churches reporting no unions, 44; number reporting unions, 3; these churches report 1 adult union, 3 senior unions, 3 intermediate unions and 4 junior unions; 111 members contribute systematically to the churches and 51 read the Bible daily; there is one standard union, the senior union, First Church, Elkin; the total membership of these 11 unions is 247.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AGED MINISTERS' RELIEF
