FISHER'S RIVER PRIMITIVE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

CONVENED AT

ARARAT MEETING HOUSE,

SURRY COUNTY, N. C. April 10th, 1868.

WINSTON, N. C.: SENTINEL PRINT; 1869. The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder T. S. Ring, from Acts 7th chapter and 34th verse: "I have seen the affliction of my people which is in Egypt, and have heard their groanings, and am come down to deliver them." And after prayer by Elder William Moran, letters from the following churches were handed forward and read, and their Messengers names enrolled as follows:

Then called for correspondence. When from Mayo, Elder Thomas S. Ring, and Brethren Calvin Blackburn, Benjamin Sprinkle and John Lowlance, were invited and took seats with us. Then chose Elder John Jones, Moderator, and Moses Pilson Clerk. Then chose Elder T. S. Ring, Wm. Moran, Calvin Blackburn, with the Moderator and Clerk, a Committee to arrange the business of this Association. Then chose Elder John Jones, C Blackburn, E. Cain, to preach on Sunday, worship to commence at 10 o'clock; and Elders T. S. Ring, Wm. Moran and Alexander Moran, to preach on Sunday, worship to commence at 9 o'clock; adjourned.

Met on Saturday according to adjournment, and after prayer by Elder Thomas S. Ring, the Messenger.' names

were called, and the rules of decorum read, the committee then made their report, the same being received, they were discharged, the business of the Association was then disposed of as tollows: 1st, Called on the Presbytery appointed to Tom's Creek Church to report, which reported that they attended at Volunteer and constituted it a Church, and also set apart brethren James, George and P. W. Lawrance to the office of Deacon, and also called on the Presbytery appointed to request of Ararat Church to report, which reported that they did not attend. The same Presbytery to be continued.

2nd, The request of Fisher's Gap Church, was laid before the Association, which concluded to keep up the Spring and Fall Associations both. Agreed that our next Association be held at Volunteer Meeting House in Stokes county, N. C., 4 miles north-east of the Pilot Mountain to commence Friday before the 4th Sunday in October next, and Elder Wm. Moran to preach the introductory sermon and in case of failure, Elder Alexander Moran.

Saturday the stand was occupied as follows: Brother H. Cain opened the services of the day from these words "I have loved thee with an everlasting love," Elder H. Jones followed from Jude, 1st Chapter and 12th verse, Elder N. Alberty closed from 2nd Timothy, 4th Chapter and 2nd verse. Preach the word, &c.

Sunday the Brethren appointed to preach to-day met a large congregation, Elder Wm. Moran opened the services of the day from 2nd Timothy, 3rd Chapter, 16th and 17th verses, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God," and Elder Thomas S. Ring followed from Luke, 15th Chapter and 20th verse, and Elder Alexander Moran closed from Isaiah, 55th Chapter and 1st verse. "Ho every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters," &c.

MINUTES OF THE SAME ASSOCIATION, CONVENED AT VOLUNTLER MEETING HOUSE, STOKES COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, OCTOBER 23, 1868.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder John Vass, from Songs of Solomon, 6th Chapter, 10th verse. "Who is she that looketh forth in the morning, fair as the moon, clear as the sun and terrible as an army with banners." And after prayer by Elder Samuel J. Lacky, letters from the following Churches were handed torward and read and minuted as follows:

Then called for correspondents, when from Mayo, Elders R. W. Hill, T. S. Ring, Samuel Arrington and Brethren Calvin Blackburn, L. H. Southern, Pryor May, T. M. Pucket, James A. Leek. Smith's River Elders, S. J. Lackey, C. Plaster. J. M. Blancet. New River Elders, John Vass and George Quesenbury and Brethren John Moran from Smith's River, and John Lawrance from Mayo being present were invited and all took seats with

us and received a file of Minutes from each. Little River Kehukee and County line Associations then chose Elder John Jones, Moderator and Moses Pilson; then chose Elder R. W. Hill, S. J. Lacky, J. M. Blancet with the Moderator and Clerk, a committee to arrange the business of this Association, then chose Flders Plaster, Ring and Arrington to preach on Saturday, worship to commence at 9 o'clock and Elders Hill, Lacky and Blancet to preach on Sunday, worship to commence at 10 o'clock. Then appointed Brethren M. G. Harbour and A. M. Denny a committee of finance, then called for the circular letter which was produced by Elder T. J. Lawson and refered to the committee, then adjourned.

Met on Saturday according to adjournment, and after Prayer by Elder R. W. Hill, the Messengers' names were called, marked the absentees and read the rules of decorum. The committee then made their report, the same being received, they were discharged. The business of

the Association was then disposed of as follows:

1st, Called on correspondents appointed to sister Associations to report, which reported satisfactorily, and were discharged.

2nd, Called on Presbytery appointed to Ararat to report, which reported that they attended and set apart Brethren Edmond Denny and F. Stone to the office of Deacon.

3rd, Appointed a Presbytery of Elders, John Jones, H. Jones, N. Alberty, Wm. Moran, A. Moran to attend to the request of Tom's Creek Church to ordain Brother H. Cain to the ministry if found qualified.

4th. Called on the committee of finance to report, which reported the present contribution to be \$10.65 cents and found in the Clerk's hands eight dollars and twenty-five cents, as he could not get the last years Minntes printed, making \$18,90 cents, and the Association agreed to allow the Clerk \$4 for his services leaving \$14,90 cents.

5th, The Circular Letter was read and received, and ordered to be annexed to our Minutes, and Elder Wm. Moran appointed

to write the next Circular Letter.

6th. Appointed correspondents to sister Associations to

7th, Agreed that our next Association be held at Cody's Creek Meeting House, Surry County, North Carolina, seven miles south west of Dobson, to commence Friday before the 2nd Sunday in April, 1869, and Elder Alexander Moran to preach the introductory sermon, in case of failure, Elder John Jones, and the Fall Association to be held at Fisher's River Church, 4 miles north-east of Dobson, to commence Friday before the 4th Sunday in October, 1869.

8th, Agreed that the Clerk have 400 copies of Minutes printed, and also agreed that the Churches write the amount of their contribution money in their letters to the Association,

and receive Minutes according to what they pay.

Saturday the stand was occupied as follows: Elder T. S. Ring opened the services of the day from Jeremiah, 22d Chapter, 26th verse. "O earth, earth, hear the word of the Lord." Elder C. Plaster followed from Revelations, 21st Chapter, and part of the 9th verse. "Come hither, I will shew thee the bride, the Lamb's wife." Elder S. Arrington closed from Isaiah, 28th Chapter, and part of the 16th verse. "Behold I lay in Zion for a foundation, a stone a tried stone."

Sunday the Brethren appointed to preach to-day met a large congregation, J. M. Blancet opened the services of the day from Ezekiel, 37th Chapter, and 1st verse. "The hand of the Lord is upon me, and carried me out in the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the midst of the valley which was full of bones." Elder R. W. Hill followed from Luke, 2nd Chapter, 14th verse. "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace, good wil 'toward men.' Elder S. J. Lacky closed from John, 7th Chapter, 37th verse. "In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried saying, if any man thirst let him come unto me and drink."

CIRCULAR LETTER.

Dear Brethren and Sisters that compose the Fisher's River Baptist Association, and the Associations with whom she cor-

responds. As I was appointed by your delegates to write a Circular Letter to be annexed to our Minutes, if approved by the Association, we will proceed to the task if the Lord's will. Dear Bretnren, we find that in the last days perilous times shall come, for men shall be lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God. Great has been the opposition which the Church of Christ has had to encounter in past ages, and perhaps will be still greater for many ages to come, the enemies of the cross are many, some are professors, some are not; and yet, their strength is concentrated in opposition to way of truth. Dear Brethren, though there be Lord's many and God's many, but unto us one true and living God, one Lord, one Faith and one Baptism. Let us earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the saints, " for without faith it is impossible to please God, for he that cometh to God must believe that he is a rewarder of

them that diligently seek him."

Dear Brethren, we find that the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ, and Christ is the end of the law, for righteousness to every one that believes.
