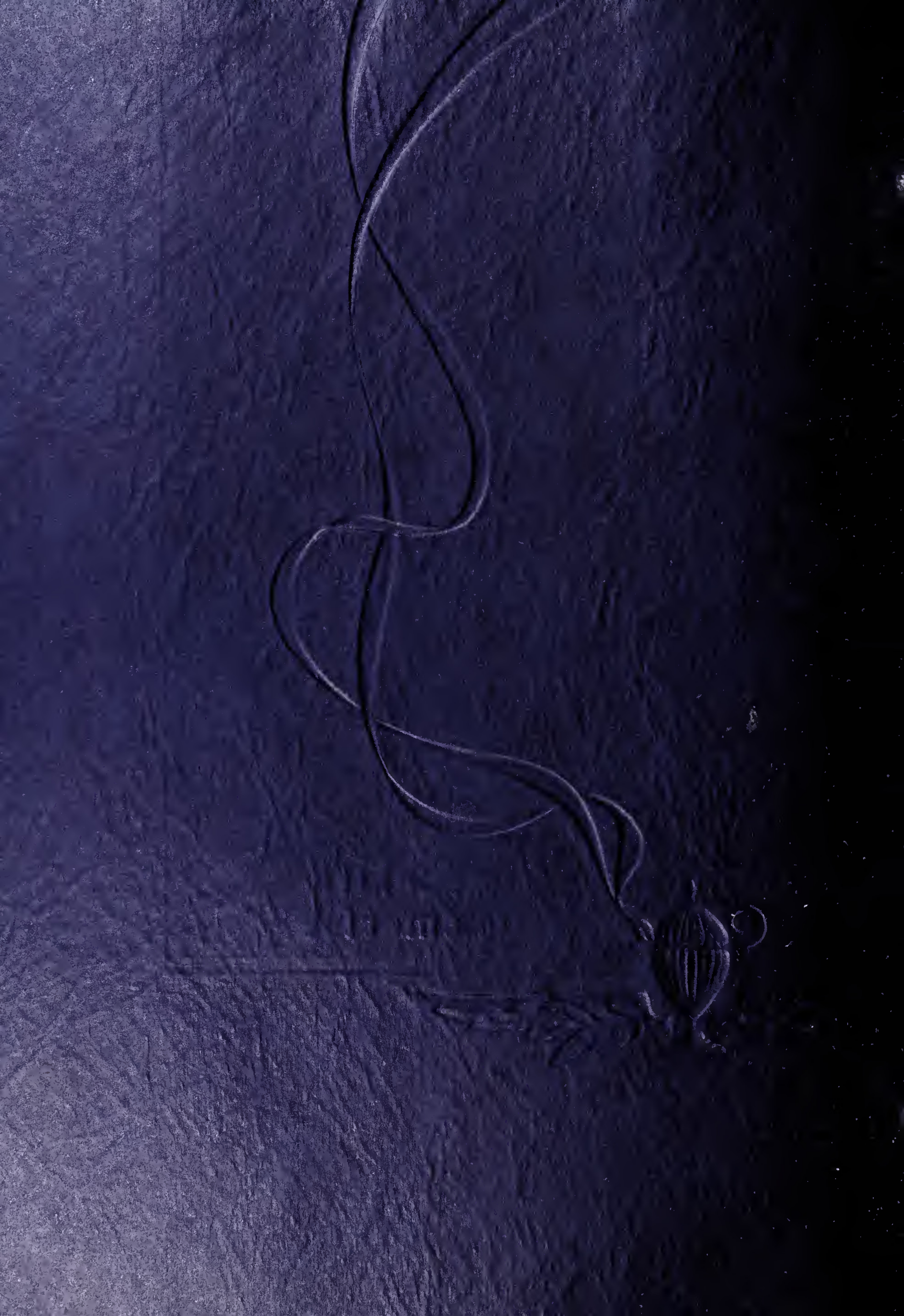
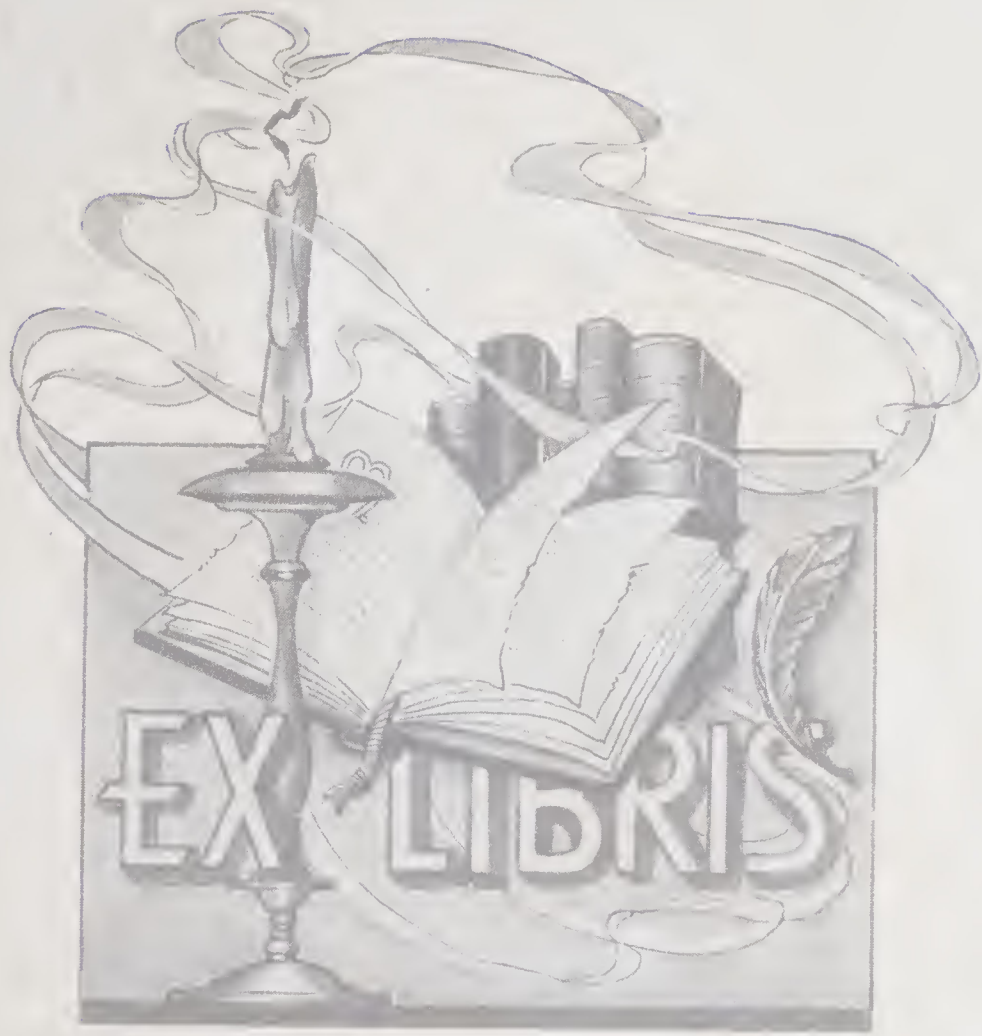

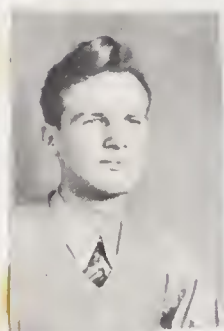

HISTORY

We entered Franklin High School in 1937 fifty-six strong--twenty-three boys and thirty-three girls. We soon outgrew the "red-headed step-child" feeling, and under the leadership of Jack Johnson, began to assert ourselves both socially and academically. Many of our members became interested in that most popular of sports --basketball, while others entered dramatics, journalism and acoustics.

As Sophomores, Harvey Wagoner held the reins of government, and we continued to pursue our various extra-curricular activities.

In the fall of 1939, we were promoted to the rank of Juniors. '39 was indeed a full year. What with basketball tournaments, plays, clubs, the "Junior-Senior", our days were crammed to the utmost, and yet we found a little time to study. Lela Lawrence carried off honors in the Home Economics Fashion Show, Marshals were Haywood Weddle, Jack Johnson, Dorothy Morris and Lela Lawrence.

The last chapter makes exciting history for thirty one members of the class of '41. We were Seniors in deed as well as in name. Our president, Harvey Wagoner, efficiently kept us in line. Significantly our scholastic honors were awarded to Lela Lawrence, Dorothy Morris and Harvey Wagoner. It is with alacrity not unmingled with compunction that we turn the last page.
