

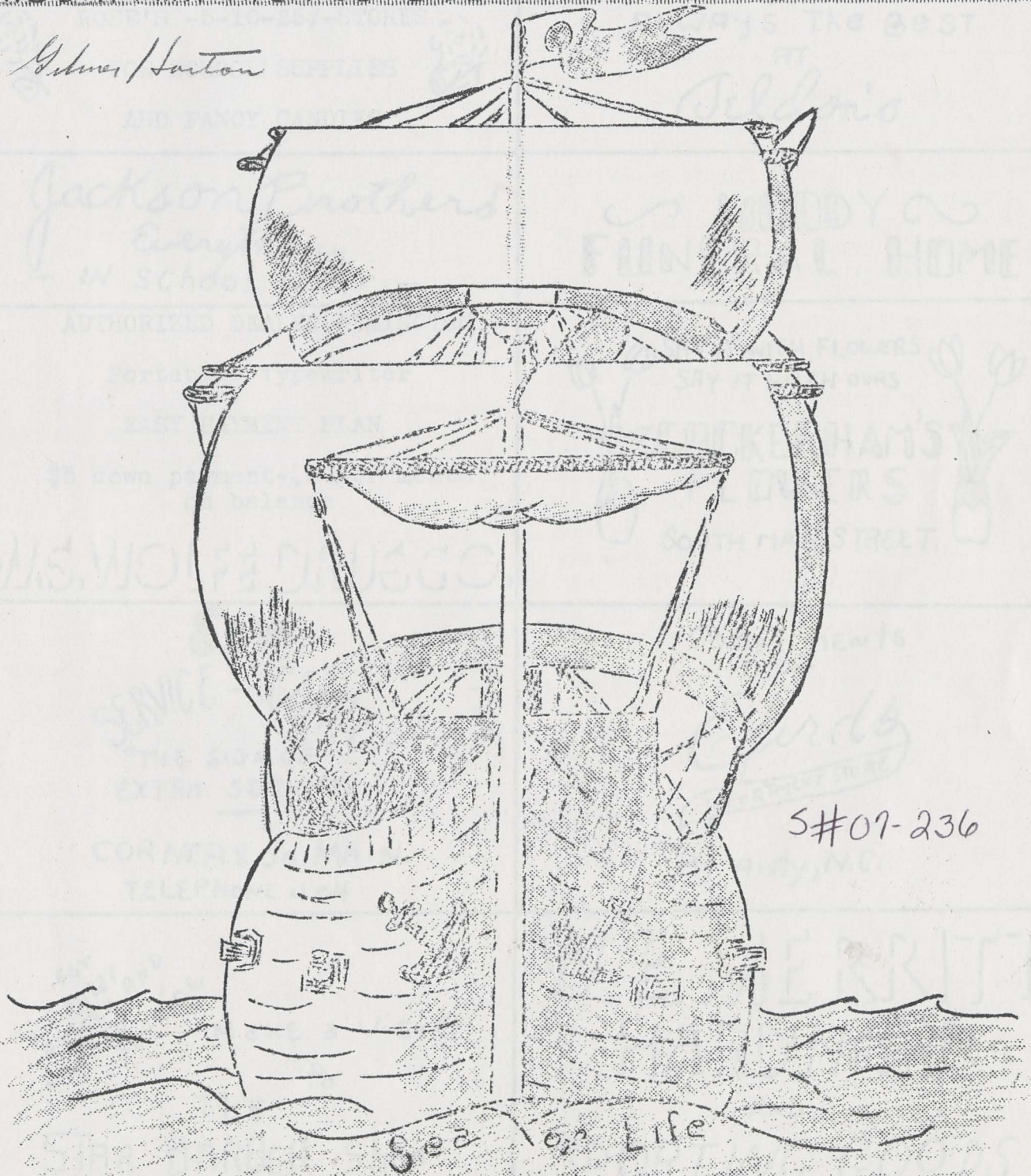

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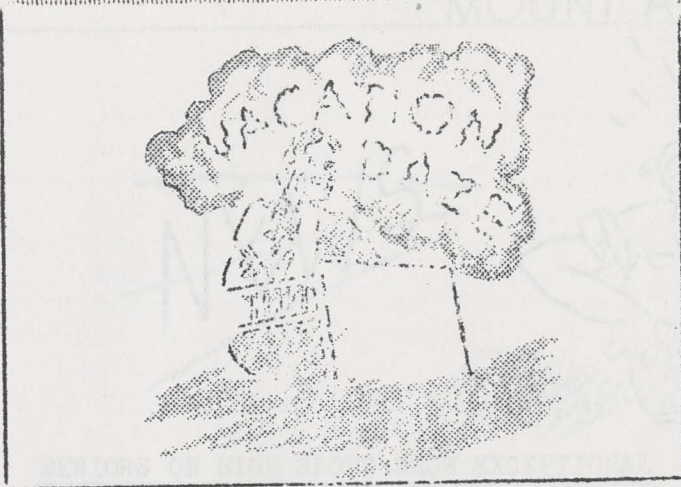

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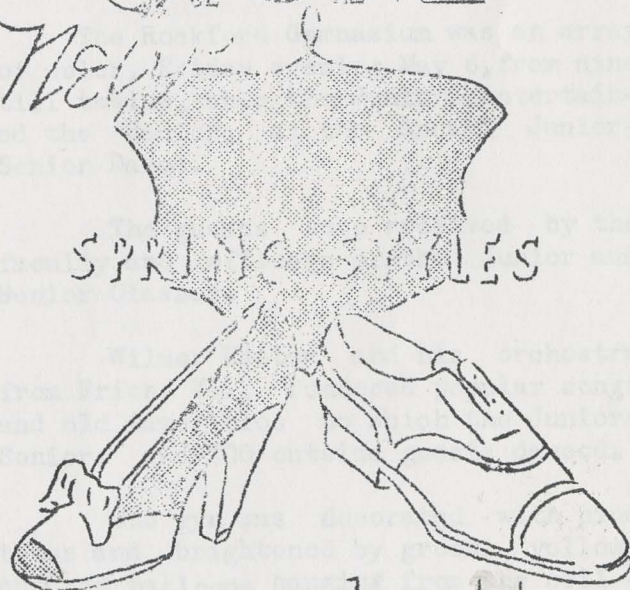

Wilmer Hester and his orchestra from Fries, Va., rendered popular songs and old favorites to which the Juniors Seniors and 200 outside guests danced.

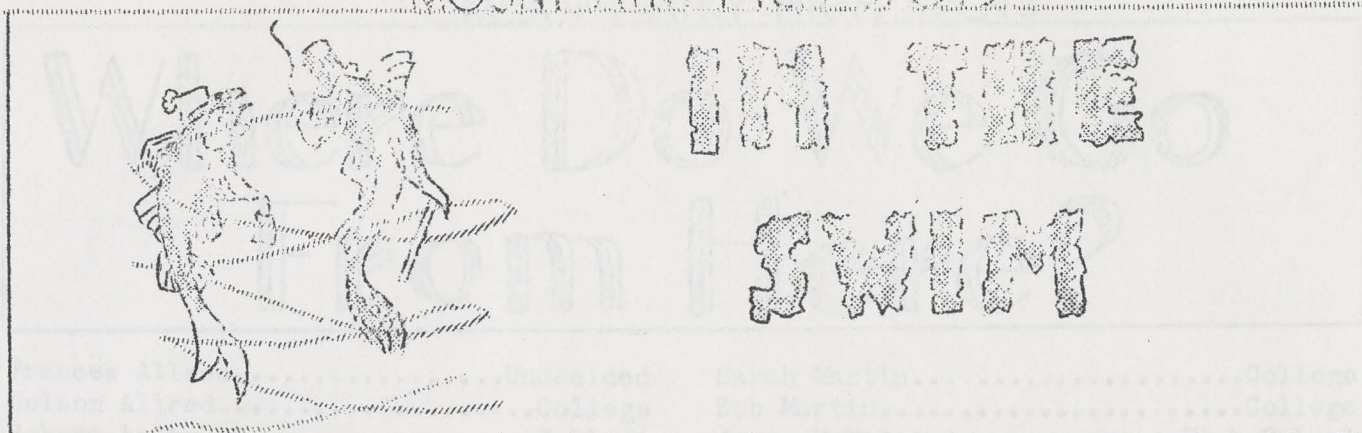
The gym was decorated with pine trees and brightened by green, yellow, and red balloons hanging from the ceiling.

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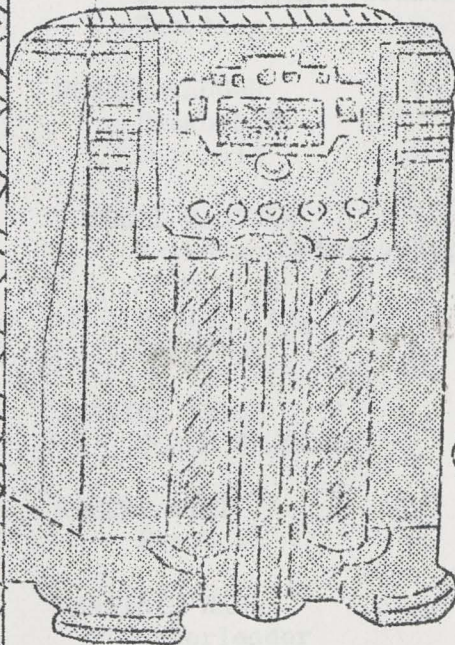

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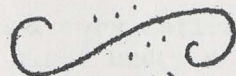
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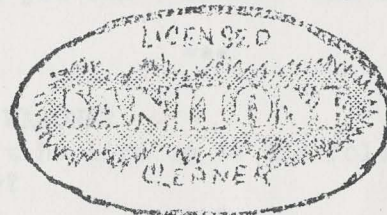

Mount Airy High School rated seventh in standing of state schools.

Under the Honor Roll for the first six weeks we found only three names for the whole school and among those was Miss Sue Mae Hendren's. Congratulations, Miss Hendren, even though we are a few years late. It makes us feel pretty good to read of a teacher's accomplishments.

1926 was a pretty lucky year for M.A.H.S. for our beloved principal, Mr. Finch, was added to the faculty. Fifteen rags for '26.

The paper that year had four of our faculty members on its staff. (No Wonder, it was such a success.) They were Annie Fawcett (excuse us Mrs. Jackson), Managing Editor, Lillian Johnson, Literary Editor, Wallace Shelton, Business Manager and Sue Mae Hendren, Reporter.
