





FLASH: (HIGH SPOTS, October 1, 1925)

THE MOUNT AIRY SCHOOLS OPENED Monday August 31.

M. A. H. S. had physic and music, classes then. Where have they gone?

Our honorable Coach, Mr. Shelton, was Sporting Editor, Miss Sue Mae Hendren was Assistant Managing Editor, and Mrs. Joe Jackson (then Annie Fawcett) was an Associate Editor. Former newspaper work ers, have some suggestions for our paper?

Could you believe that our school once had an orchestra all its own? It did and Miss Atkinson, music teacher at the time, made it a big success. Music lovers there's an old idea to renew.

(HIGH SPOTS, NOVEMBER 1, 1925)

Mount Airy High School rated seventh in standing of state schools.
