

Legislators to vote on waste agreement

RALEIGH — Gov. Jim Martin is expected to issue a proclamation Monday calling for a special session of the General Assembly Dec. 7, when lawmakers will be asked to ratify a regional agreement reached this week on hazardous waste.

The legislature had been expected to meet on the hazardous-waste issue months ago, but negotiations faltered when Alabama, which has a key hazardous-waste landfill, said it would work only with states that

have existing facilities. North Carolina has none.

Alabama relented Wednesday by accepting a proposal for a regional incinerator and a landfill for the incinerator's ash as North Carolina's chief contribution.

The governor and leaders of the House and Senate have agreed to call a session beginning at noon Dec. 7, with committees in the Senate and House working on the hazard-ous-waste proposal the day before.

Diamont gives up coaching

RALEIGH — State Rep. David H. Diamont, D-Surry, has decided to give up coaching high school football to spend more time with his family.

Diamont, 43, told his East Surry High School Cardinals that this season—his 21st in coaching—would be his last. He will continue to teach sociology, economics and government at the school in Pilot

Mountain and will seek a ninth term in the House next year.

Although Diamont discounts talk of expanding his political horizons, he said there was no way he could continue to coach and take advantage of any new opportunities.

"One thing's for sure," he said.
"To continue coaching football, I wouldn't have a chance to look at anything. If there are opportunities that open themselves for me politically in the future, it means I'll have a chance to assess what I can and cannot do."

More money possible for N.C. 88

Rep. David Diamont says Trust Fund is freeing up money

Rep. David Diamont (D-Surry) told local Chamber of Commerce members Tuesday night there's a "very good possibility" Ashe County can get more money for improvements to N.C. 88.

The money would come from the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Ashe is one of two counties not scheduled to receive any funds for fourlaning highways in the TIP, he said, and the availability of money from the new Highway Trust Fund will free up some TIP funds.

Ashe is only to receive money for secondary road paving from the trust fund, Diamont said.

"Three of the top five counties with unpaved roads are in my district, and that's why I voted for it (trust fund)," he

Richard Lemly, chairman of the county commissioners, told Diamont the state should allocate miles, not money, for road construction.

"It costs more to pave roads up here than down in the Piedmont," Lemly said. "We don't particularly like the way the money was whacked up because we're now in a district with much larger towns."

Diamont said citizens can look forward to a tax increase in 1991 when about \$200 million that was taken out of the trust fund for teachers' salaries must be replaced.

The representative, who served as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said he was proud of the

"Folks, it was open, and I am very proud of the process," he said.

In the past, he said, a "Gang of Eight"—four representatives and senators-would get together behind closed doors and hammer out the state budget.

This year, following the ouster of openness of the past legislative House Speaker Liston Ramsey and the election of Rep. Joe Mavretic as speaker, the entire 71-member appropriations committee had a voice in the process and all meetings were open.

> "My job was, flat out, to have appropriations process open," he said. "Everyone had a

chance to speak, and the process worked. People were forced to compromise and work together."

Diamont said he put his legislative career on the line when he joined the coup last winter to oust Ramsey.

"On the personal side, I lost a lot more than I anticipated," he said. "I lost a lot of friends."
