# THE CREATION

Haydn's oratorio was written at the suggestion of the impressario Salomon who presented the aged composer with a libretto, written originally for Handel and compiled from Genesis and Milton's "Paradise Lost." However, it is known that Haydn, upon hearing Handel's crowning work, "The Messiah", expressed a desire to celebrate his declining years by the production of a work along similar lines.

What "The Creation" lacks in grandeur and sublimity it more than makes up in the charm of its bright melody and sunny imagery. The entire oratorio is permeated with those personal characteristics which made Haydn the man, beloved by his circle and contemporaries. In this, his master work, we find: the expert and consciencious muscianship which the composer sought so hard to obtain during his early years of poverty and difficulties; the enate happy-heartedness and naive simplicity of a kind and sympathetic being; and, a child-like faith in the all-embracing gcodness of God's world and its creator—a devout trust which neither adversity nor prosperity could shake.
