Union Cross Church, Rusk, N. C. August 17th, 1916.

Morning Session—11 A. M.

The fourteenth annual session of the Surry Baptist Association convened with Union Cross church, August 17, 1916. The introductory sermon was preached by A. J. Williams, Text: 133 Psalms, 1st verse.

Friday, August 18th, 9:30 Morning Sessions.

Religious exercises conducted by Dr. C. E. Brewer. On motion the Association extend a welcome to visiting brethren, when Dr. C. E. Brewer of Meredith College, E. L. Middleton of the State Sunday School Board came forward and were welcomed by the moderator. Minute of yesterday read and adopted. Committee on Sunday schools report as follows:

Sunday School Report.

We find Sunday schools used by all evangelical denominations. Whenever and wherever God's people magnify teaching His word.

His cause grows, but if neglected His cause languishes. This is unanswerable evidence of God's favor on the Sunday school work.

We note progress in this Association but by no means what we ought to have. We have not reached our people as we ought and we have not equipped ourselves for the best service.

We recommend the following to our people: 1 That we give loyal support to the Sunday school convention of this Association by sending messengers from our church

2 That all our schools remain open 12 months in the year, and that they endeavor to reach more of our church members.

3 That we secure free tracts from our Secretary, E. L. Middleton, Raleigh, N. C., in order that we may know the best methods in Sunday school work. We also urge our Sunday schools to cooperate in supporting Sunday school missions by giving at least one collection a year to this object.

4 That our officers and teachers shall secure the "Normal Manual" and study it diligently that they may become trained for their tasks.

5 That we neglect not the main business of the Sunday school, viz: the winning of the lost to a saving knowledge of Jesus. Let every teacher pray and work to the end that every lost pupil may be saved.

#### Committee on Education Reports as Follows:

The Baptist people believe in the possibility of growth and development. Baptists are heartily engaged in educational work. They believe that efficiency comes through training; that man is saved to serve. They are following the command and example of the great Teacher, teaching the people. With the writer of Hebrews Baptists are saying "let us go on into perfection."

Hence the Baptists of North Carolina have invested largely in Christian education. We now have three colleges in North Carolina, Wake Forest, Meredith and Chowan: We have fifteen secondary schools, ten of which are under the watch care of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The annual report of the state convention shows that the high schools reported last year an enrollment of 2,619 and a property valuation of \$324,700. (This state convention report does not include our own school, Mountain Park. The colleges report an enrollment of 957, and a property valuation of \$1,174,280. To the list of schools given above should be added our Theological Seminary and the Woman's Missionary Training School at Louisville, the former for ministers, the latter principally for training of women who are preparing for mission work, but open also to any women who wish to take the courses of instruction offered there.

Four years ago some of the members of the Surry Association

conceived the idea of having a school within the bounds of the Association to advance the work of the Association. After consideration of this conception of progress in our Association work, a board of trustees for the proposed school at Mountain Park was elected three years ago. Within the past few weeks the school property at Mountain Park has been conveyed by deed to the Surry sAssociation. About a year ago successful effort was made to place the school under the supervision of the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Mountain Park is now a school of the system of Mountain schools under the Superintendency of Dr. H. E. Brown of the Home Board.

The new relationship of Mountain Park school should call forth the best efforts of Surry Baptists.

Report of education was discussed by Dr. Brewer, Prayer by T. S. Draughn, dismissed by K. Thompson.

#### Committee on Temperance read as follows:

Temperance is what the word implies. Moderation in all things, especially those habits which are detrimental to our spiritual as well as our temporal welfare. We are gratified with the progress temperance has made in the last few years in regard to intoxicating drinks but there is yet a great deal to accomplish. Our church people should use their influence to help wipe out the blind tiger and blockader. Our ministers should warn young men about the use of cigarettes and our older men and women about the excessive use of tobacco and all other habits that might be detrimental to their spiritual or temporal welfare.

Joy riding and pleasure seeking on the Sabbath and neglecting to attend church or Sabbath school is getting to be one of the great sins of today. Now let us remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.

#### Committee on Orphanage Report as follows:

The orphanage at Thomasville belongs to the Baptist of this state and is now caring for about 500 children. If there is anything that the Baptist have a right to be proud of it is the orphanage, but there is another phase of the orphanage work that demands our serious consideration, and that is the fact that hun-

dreds of orphan children are being refused admittance on account of means, The work of the orphanage is also handicapped by great indebtedness of the orphanage

Saturday, Aug. 19, 1916. Morning Session, 9:30 A. M.

Devotional exercises conducted by D. S. Hubble. Minutes of yesterday read and adopted. Committee on Sunday school report as follows: This work is of the Lord. He is showing his favors in many ways. The number of Sunday schools is increasing every year and the membership increased 30000 last year. This is among our own Baptist schools in North Carolina. These schools are growing in benevolence also. They gave last year nearly \$40,000 to the orphanage, missions, etc., besides paying their own local expense. They are showing an increase in general efficiency as attested by the increase of standard schools, the growth of teachers training, the registration of organized classes, etc. We recommend the Sunday school convention of this association as worthy of the support of all our churches and Sunday school. We urge everyone of these to send pastors, officers and teachers in order to secure information and inspiration for their work. F. S. Eldridge, M. B. Phillips, J. W. Hardy, committee. Report discussed by E. L. Middleton. On motion we extend a welcome to visiting brethren, Hall from Yadkin association, C. E. Owen from Buncombe association came forward and were welcomed by the moderator.

Committee on State Mission Report as Follows:

Your committee wants to commend a part of article 12 of the constitution of our State convention "The Board of Missions shall encourage the churches to give liberally to all objects of the

convention, so far as the means at it disposal will allow, supply our destitute portions of the state with faithful and efficient ministers of the gospel, give pecuniary aid for building houses of worship at proper points in the state and commend them to the beneficence of the churches. Encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature in the homes, in the church and in the Sunday school.

Here we see the object of state mission, First fullest possible enlistment and co operation of the churches in helping on the objects of the convention.

Second, To give the fullest training in systematic giving, this in order that the mission board may be able to supply all destitution in the state by building houses of worship and supplying faithful and efficiently— all the members giving and all the pastors doing their level best.

#### Afternoon Session.

George We, the Surry Association heartily endorse the action of the Yadkin Association in accepting Mountain Park school, and selecting trustees thereof. We rejoice to have them enter into fellowship with us in building a great school within the bounds of the two associations Resolution was adopted.

Report of committee on Foreign missions was read as follows.

Jesus our Lord commanded his disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. Till this command is fulfilled or revoked it is binding on every christian. We cannot shirk our duty here without submerging ourselves in guilt before God. This command is still in the book. More than half the race is all in the heathen darkness. Shall we do our duty at once? Jesus our Lord commanded it. The motive of our religion requires it. The condition of the heathen demand it. We recommend that every christian in this association give and pray for this great cause. J. C. Owen for committee. Report discussed by J. C. Owen and adopted.

#### Committee on Obituary Report as Follows:

We, your committee offer the following report: on Sept 5, 1915. Rev. C. H. Stone departed this life to live with God. Brother Stone was a devout consecrated christian man. a kind husband and loving father, was a preacher of the gospel for about 40 years was pastor of many churches, and did a good work in building up the work of God in destitute places and is greatly missed in our churches and homes, but let us submit to the will of God and strive to meet him in the church triumphant above.

Mrs. Daniel Crowder of Dobson church died Aug. 12, 1915. Brother G. W. Lasiter of Gum Orchard church died May 1916, age 70 years. Brother Lasiter was a kind neighbor and always ready to comfort distressed and afflicted A. J. Williams for committee. Report discussed by Rev. A. J. Williams and adopted.

The Committee on Pastor and Church Relation report: The pastor is the chosen leader of the church and is to the church what a shepherd is to his flock. He shares alike both their joys and their sorrows, and is always ready to lend a helping hand and speak a word of consolation in the home of the troubled. He also has their material and spiritual welfare at heart and whatever hurts the church wounds the heart of the pastor. The pastor realizes that church is bound closely to him by the strong ties of love and friendship and that they are ungrafted branches of the same true Jesus Christ. The pastor should be highly esteemed by the church for the works sake, the pastor should visit the rich, poor, and afflicted alike and not to slight any one for to do so would be a sin of omission. The pastor should not be high minded but humble as a worthy servant of the Lord.

The church should show their appreciation by fulfilling every promise they make and every obligation that they assume and should love their pastor. Both pastor and church should work together in love and harmony, with the one great object in view, the salvation of souls of men and to this end they should put forth their best effort that their work may be well pleasing in the sight of the Lord and to the end that all may have a home with him. #### Report on Minister's Relief.

This board was created by the Baptist State Convention. Its purpose is to extend aid to every aged and afflicted minister who is in want, and whose poverty is the result of a life given to the preaching of the gospel.

Last year the number of beneficiaries ranged from 33 to 39. These received \$3430.50, an average of nearly \$100 each. Of course they do not all receive the same amount because their needs are not the same.
