QUICK SWEDISH CREAM

- 1 package (3¹/₂ ounces) vanilla instant pudding
- 1 cup half-and-half

Page Six

- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup plain yogurt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Combine pudding mix, halfand-half, sour cream, yogurt, and vanilla in a medium-size bowl. Beat at high speed with electric mixer 2 minutes or until smooth and thick. Cover and chill 3 or 4 hours.

Spoon into dessert dishes and top with fresh fruits sweetened to taste.

Makes 6 servings.

EASY EGG SALAD

- 6 hard-cooked eggs, peeled and chopped
- 1/4 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 to 2 tablespoons cream or milk (if needed to moisten mixture)

Toss eggs, celery, onion, mayonnaise, salt and pepper lightly in a medium bowl. Cover and chill until ready to serve.

EGG SALAD ROLLS

4 soft round sesame or poppyseed rolls

- 1 cup Easy Egg Salad
- 1 tablespoon sweet pickle relish
- 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley

1/4 cup bottled sandwich and salad mustard sauce

1 can (21/4 ounces) deviled ham

Halve rolls horizontally and scoop some of the bottom portion out to make a shallow pocket.

Combine egg salad with sweet pickle relish; mix celery and parsley and spoon into roll pockets, dividing total amount evenly. Spoon 1/4 cup egg salad into each pocket on top of parsley and celery.

Spread top half of bun with mustard sauce, then deviled ham, again dividing total amounts evenly.

Sandwich buns together and serve.

3 unbaked pie shells 4 cups sugar 1/2 cup cocoa 2 tablespoons plain flour
