

President's Attendance Awards Given

One hundred forty-eight employees received the President's Attendance Award for 1989.

Filling:


- 1 small can crushed pineapple 1/2 cup sugar

Employee Assistance Program Can Help With Depression

When a simple case of "the blahs" goes on for several weeks, it is no longer simple. Bad feelings that last that long may be symptoms of clinical depression. This is one of the most common mental disorders.

Clinical depression affects about ten million Americans, of all ages, races, and cultures. This includes men and women and teenagers. Depression is a persistent illness and tends to reoccur.

Some depression can be severe enough to interfere with normal functioning which includes work. Other types may only cause unhappiness but not interfere with everyday activity.

Depression can be hard to detect in friends or loved ones. Often someone depressed will try to hide feelings of sadness, pessimism, worthlessness, and guilt. They seem indecisive and disinterested in activities they normally find exciting. Other symptoms include loss of appetite and loss of sleep. This can lead to low energy, backaches, headaches, and other physical symptoms. Sudden changes in behavior are also common.

If the symptoms of depression persist for more than two weeks or so, your friend or you may be experiencing clinical depression. The problem should not be ignored.

According to the American Psychological Association National Task Force on Women and Depression, the "average" woman today stands a 25 percent chance of experiencing a major depression. Overall, professional women are three to five times more likely to commit suicide than nonprofessional women.

Depression destroys self-esteem. The depressed person needs to know that someone cares. Your Employee Assistance Program is here to help. Counselors confidentially assist with the problem. This help can lead you or a friend into the right direction.

Depressive illness is not only one of the most common mental disorders but is also one of the most treatable. Almost 80 percent of all serious depressions can be cured. So before your depression or a friend's jeopardizes your job and future contact your Employee Assistance Counselor.







An apple a day keeps the doctor away. Why? Because apples are a fruit, and fruit is one of the best things you can put in your diet.

You already know that fruit tastes good. Also, fruit is full of good nutrients. Fruit has several nutritional factors that have been associated with lower risk of disease. Fruit has fiber, minerals, vitamins, carbohydrates and other health promoters. The one thing fruit has very little, if any, is fat. Fruit has fewer calories, little or no sodium, and no cholesterol.

When purchasing fresh fruits in the supermarkets, select fruits that show no signs of bruising. Bruising can cause loss of some nutrients. Nutrients can also be lost by paring, slicing, dicing, and mashing fruits through exposure to air and light.

Also, refrigerate and use fresh fruits within a few days to cut down on spoilage and waste.
