I REMEMBER THE BENNETTS

Lucinda Letitia Johnston Hull was born November 11, 1856, and James Martin Bennett was born March 12, 1861, in the same foothills area of the Blue Ridge Mountains at Pine Ridge near Mt. Airy, North Carolina, which is near the North Carolina-Virginia Line.

Cindy was a young girl when the Civil War (or the War Between the States or the War of the Northern Aggression, depending on your viewpoint) sent some girl children fleeing from the area so they would be safe from the Yankee soldiers. She was sent to Charleston, South Carolina, where she spent several years. (Some question the authenticity of this because all information uncovered at Mt. Airy was that an escape route had been planned should the Union soldiers get too near and it was necessary to evacuate the girls. However, the Bennett sisters told this to me several times as a true happening and additional credence is given in the fact her name included "Johnston", which the girls said was added because she stayed with a family named Johnston.)

Her father, Edward (Ned) Hull, was a sout for Lee and was said to have cried, along with other Confederate soldiers, when they stacked the rifles at Appomatox when Lee surrendered.

During the Reconstruction which followed, many young people could not afford to marry and set up housekeeping, which resulted in marriages at older ages. James Martin (I think she called him Martin) was 25 when he married Cindy, who was almost 30 at the time of their wedding September 5, 1886. In the next 13 years they had eight children, somehow managing to alternate girl/boy/girl. (As of this date, 12-1981, James Bennett, only remaining living child, says there was a stillborn between Emma and Lee. I have no record.) The children were:

Sallie Rebecca, born June 29, 1887 (also listed as Sarah Rebecca)

Edward William, born March 1, 1889

Mary Emma, born April 26, 1890

Benjamin Lee, born August 10, 1892

Nettie Susan (I think her name was really Jeannette) born May 26, 1894

John Bryan, born August 7, 1896

Celia Diannah, born January 24, 1898

James Washington, born January 10, 1900

The Bennett forebears lived in the North Carolina/Virginia foothills and mountains since the earliest settlers filtered through in the 1600s. Granddad Bennett worked at many things to support his big family-- he taught school, was a justice of the peace, ran a sawmill and blacksmithy and farmed. His helper was a black man named Charlie Tucker and Grandma's assistant in the house was his wife, Mrs. Ollie Tucker, also black.

(Many years later my father, Ed, took his wife to see Mrs. Tucker, whom he remembered with respect. In telling about the visit, my mother said they were invited for the noon meal and were seated at an immaculate table with white tablecloth and well-cooked food, the kind Mrs. Tucker prepared for Ed and his siblings when they were growing up. When she was ready to serve, Mrs. Tucker looked at numerous little grandchildre and said, "All right, you little pickaninnies, get out of the room. Mr. Ed doesn't want to see your black faces while he's eating." She would not sit down with her guests, but stood and served.)

About 1908-1909, Granddad moved his family to Missouri. Why he left the place where he grew up, where everyone for miles around was related to him or knew him, where he was established in his work, no one ever knew. One theory is that he wanted to work with hardwoods and make wagons, rather than the pine and other softwoods, but no one really knows. He looked in several places, including in Texas.

Granddad bought a farm near Bolivar/Humansville/Flemington, Missouri, a place of rockstrewn upland, a few good bottom acres, extensive woods, clear rocky streams. The two-story house was built of logs covered with wooden siding which had weathered to silver grey. A long porch went across the front and entrance was into a large living/dining room with a native rock fireplace which provided heat for the first few years. To one side was the parlor with high platform rocker, a lovely walnut pump organ and a hand-held stereoscope that one looked through to see scenes of other places, somewhat of a forerunner of modern slide projectors.

The kitchen, perhaps 20 feet long but narrow, had a huge black range for cooking, a sink, freestanding cabinet and a cream separator. Twice a day the intricate little funnels were fitted together, the pails of milk were hoisted into the big top bowl and the handle turned to separate the cream, which was churned for butter or sold. Skimmilk was fed to the pigs.

Icy cold water came from a deep well in the yard and was lifted in a cylinder pulled by hand over a pulley, the whole well covered with a well house.

The yard was fenced with ornamental wire about 3 1/2 feet high with flower beds planted around the perimeter. A series of little buildings stood on two sides of the backyard, making something like a functional courtyard. They included a big smoke-house where the aunts (Emma, Celia, Nettie) took homesmoked hams and bacons, all carefully wrapped, from long storage bins filled with ashes. One building held feed for their big flocks of chickens, a few turkeys and guineas, one sheltered small equipment, one was a walk-in cellar where crock jars of dried apples, also fresh apples and potatoes were kept for winter use. There was also the outdoor "bathroom".

A large chickenyard with several chickenhouses backed up to the lawn fence and a prolific garden with hollyhocks along the fence was next to the part of the yard nearest the back door.

Down a slight slope in two directions were the barns and granaries where there were always pigs and cows and calves and horses and sometimes puppies and kittens.

A railroad mainlined across the farm, requiring strong fences and always closed gates to protect the livestock. Down the track about a half mile was a station stop called Snell which had absolutely nothing except an occastional boxcar parked on the siding. No shelter of any kind. Before my dad, Ed, bought a car, we would take the train from our home in Deepwater to Granddad Bennett's farm and ask the conductor to let us off at Snell. He would pull a cord, the train would stop with wonderful snortings and puffings, and we would get off and walk to the house. Farther down the line was Clicquot, another stop that had a small shelter.

Trains sometimes had trouble along the way and more than once the Bennetts had a houseful of uninvited guests who came for shelter and food while the train was repaired.

The house had a long bedroom downstairs and two bedrooms with sloping ceilings upstairs. It also had a large closet at the head of the stairs where I remember seeing two spinning wheels, a small flax wheel and a large one.

On Sundays when we visited Granddad and Grandma Bennett, the house was filled with my three bachelor uncles and three spinster aunts, plus a few close neighbors, usually. The women fried delicious ham, made huge pans of biscuits and cooked vegetables from the garden. Sometimes it was fried chicken, which began with catching a chicken or two. The three Bennett sisters were competent cooks, an art I have no idea where they learned. I never saw my Grandmother Bennett do housework of any kind, she never swept nor cooked nor washed dishes. All I ever saw her do was sit in a little rocker and knit, crochet, embroider and sew and sometimes sing. She did delicately beautiful handwork, including knitted popcorn stitch bedspreads of fine thread for each of the daughters (she died before she could make spreads for the sons, as she intended to do). My graduation pres-

ent from her was a red and white quilt, every stitch handmade, including the seams that joined the blocks and the intricate quilting design.

After a big dinner, usually with two settings of the long table, the women busied themselves in the kitchen, then spent the afternoon visiting, trading recipes, talking about sewing projects and church. Grandma would usually sit quietly with no work in her hands because it was Sunday, but she would continue to dip a bit of snuff occasionally. She always kept her little snuff box and stick with brushy end on the wide window sill where it was handy.

The men congregated in the big room and talked. Actually, they argued or debated most of the afternoon. They never became angry, but there was much thumping of fists, jumping up to get the big Bible or books from Granddad's reference library, usually the red leather bound books of Ridpath's History of the World. The book pages would be turned rapidly and a finger would point to a reference to prove the speaker's argument. It went on until they broke up to do the evening chores. Sometimes I played with my doll and the clothes my aunts made for it, but usually my granddad would invite me over to sit on his lap. "Come here, little girl, and let me nurse you," he would say, but in his soft southern accent it came out more like, "Come here, little gull, and let me nuss ye." I loved those afternoons, listening to the oratory, the logic of their arguments, their confidence in what they were defending.

My dad said before they moved to Missouri they would attend the Baptist Church on Sundays, then invite "everyone they met" to come for dinner as they walked out the door. They never knew how many they would have any given Sunday, but it didn't matter because they "just fried more ham and made more biscuits until they had enough for everyone."

What seems today to have been a tragedy occurred in the late 1920s when the three aunts moved to Flemington and took their mother with them, leaving their father alone in the country. It might have been because the three "old maids" were prudes of the worst kind and could not tolerate men. Sometimes Grandma Bennett would go to the farm to spend a weekend with Granddad. Aunt Lena

(Uncle Lee's precious wife) remembers seeing the two elderly people coming up the lane holding hands at the end of such a weekend.

Granddad was tall and bony, a bit stooped. He wore a mustache of sizeable proportions and had deepset eyes of the bluest bluewith a gentle but keen look. Grandma was tiny and round with a sweet apple-cheeked face and blue eyes and luxuriant white hair pulled back into a knot. Her feet were so tiny that she wore a size 2 1/2 shoe and usually bought children's slippers. Once when she went into a store to buy shoes, the clerk laughed at her and said no grown woman wore a size 2 1/2. If she did, he said, he would give them to her. He brought a size 2 1/2 Mary Jane and it slipped on just like the glass slipper went on Cinderella's foot. (She didn't pay for them.) Her dresses were to her ankles, usually pastel and with gathered skirt. Some had lace collars. But despite her deceptively sweet manner, she was a strong, determined matriarch and "laid down the law" to her children as long as she lived. I remember her coming to visit Dad and Mom when I was a tomboy youngster and hearing her appalled voice saying, "Ed, you can't let Alice climb trees. It just isn't right for little girls!" When I was tiny I called my parents Ed and Janett, because that is all I heard them called. She informed Dad, "The child shouldn't call you anything but Mom and Dad!"

Granddad accumlated money over the years, probably because he spent frugally and worked hard. During the Depression I can remember him as he sat all afternoon in his daughters' house (several of the other family members were there that day) and played with a check for \$1,000, a huge sum at that time and place. It was repayment of a loan he had made to one of the county's most prominent physicians.

Grandma was plagued with "rheumatism" and at times would be kept in bed by "the girls", propped up on big white pillows and with immaculate ironed sheets. She died January 10, 1935, soon after her 79th birthday and was

buried in the Flemington Cemetery. Granddad, who was nearly five years younger, survived her by more than six years. He lived to see--and have his picture taken with-- two great grandchildren, Martha Ann Hartsock, born January 25, 1938, and Paul Bennett (Biff) Hartsock, born November 5, 1940. He died April 30, 1941, a little more than two months after his 80th birthday and was buried beside his beloved Cindy.



I will long remember Jack Bennett, not only for the fact that he was a childhood chum of one of the most famous actors of all time, but also because of the way he never seemed to forget a face or someone's name.

It amazed me when someone walked into *The Ripple* office, someone who had not made an appearance in maybe 10 years, and Jack would call him by name.

It was the same way when Jack stepped out to smoke or sat down on the bench in front of Ace's. He could call almost anybody he had ever met by name. "Hello, Pauline." "Good to see you again, Phyllis." "How have you been, Robert?" "Will you get me a doggie box, Caroline?"


I felt good having Jack nearby. When someone spoke, and I did not know who it was, I needed only to whisper: "Jack, who is that?"

One day about a week ago, I asked Jack how it happened he always knew who everybody was. He confessed: "I've got a photographic memory for names and faces."

If a photographic memory was Jack's secret weapon at *The Ripple*, he had another everybody knew-he was an expert on being friendly. "Anybody that's friendly to you, you like them," he said.

I really liked Jack. A friend of mine, truly he was-a devoted friend who kept working on Tuesday nights long after he had really finished. He stayed late for no other reason than just to be with me while I finished, too-as Jackson Street darkened and the town quieted down into the eerie silence of early Wednesday morning.

I am glad Jack's retirement day came on Monday when I was able to leave while he was still at his desk. Telling Jack goodbye at 1:30 am on Wednesday, often our parting time as we closed *The Ripple*, would have been hard to do.

'Education Is The Key' Says Newspaperman Now Retired

Jack Bennett, who retires this week as associate editor of *The Yadkin Ripple*, grew up in a working class neighborhood of Mount Airy.

His father, Caleb Henderson Bennett, was the Merita bread man; his mother, Evelyn Tolbert Bennett, a homemaker.

Though he lives now on a farm at Siloam, not far across the river from Yadkin County, Jack still gets his hair cut at Floyd's Barbershop in downtown Mount Airy and likes to eat at the town's famous Snappy Lunch.

The Snappy Lunch, he said, was started in 1923 by a friend of his father's, George Roberson.

"People all over everywhere know about the Snappy Lunch," he said. "Andy Griffith put it on the map."

Jack, at 70, is the same age as Andy. He fondly remembers Andy's

mother. "I loved Andy's mama," he said. "She had a beautiful smile. I called her 'Geneva,' and Andy called her 'Neenia."

Andy was gone from Mount Airy, and already a famous star of stage, screen and television, when he moved his mother out to California—not long after the day Jack saw them downtown for the last time.

"Geneva died 10 years ago last May in California," Jack said.

He noted that Andy, when he was a boy, lived on Houston Street on Pine Hill in a plain house with lots of apple trees around it. This house, which was torn down years ago, predated the Griffith house on Haymore Street.

Growing up in Mount Airy, Jack said, afforded him "a million dollar boyhood."

He described as "fabulous" the

fun he and his friends used to have:

"Swimming and fishing in Lovill's Creek, hiking up and down the railroad tracks, roller skating on cement sidewalks and on the street, playing ball with a ball made of twine, riding two-wheeled scooters, picking blackberries and huckleberries, hunting for hazelnuts, rambling around, climbing trees, riding horses and mules, riding bicycles for miles and miles and damming up the branch and swimming in it.

"We just took all these things for granted," he said, adding that "the most fun of all was spent down on

the creek bottom.

"In those days, parents thought nothing of letting their sons go out to have fun on their own. Now, you'd be afraid to let your children

out of sight."

At the age of 17, Jack found a summer job in Newport News, Va., where he was assigned to keep track of blueprints for the construction of the aircraft carrier *Hornet*. He was once a shoeshine boy in downtown Mount Airy; and at the time the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, was a delivery boy for a Mount Airy drugstore.

His employment experience also includes working in two different furniture factories and two bottling

companies.

At the age of 18, he was drafted into the U. S. Army, which trained him as a truck driver in the Quartermaster Corps, but assigned him duty as a medic driving an ambulance carrying wounded World War II servicemen in the Hawaiian Islands.

In 1947, Jack entered Brevard College, and became a member of the Class of 1949. He then went on to UNC at Chapel Hill, studied in the School of Journalism and finished in 1952.

As a journalist, his first job was on the Catawba News-Enterprise, but after a year there he joined the staff of Billy Arthur's News & Views, an afternoon daily newspaper at Jacksonville. He had been a general assignment reporter for Billy a year when he was called back home-to the Mount Airy Times, where he worked from 1953 to 1966.

He was a copy editor for the Roanoke Times from 1966 to 1970.

It was while at Roanoke that he and his wife, Bonnie, bought the tobacco farm at Siloam. They built a new home there and moved in with their family on his birthday (March 28) in 1970.

In the mid-1970s, Jack found himself back at the *Mount Airy Times* once more, this time as one of the owners, who built the circulation up from 3,000 to almost

10,000.

For a while, Jack's cousin, Roy Park—who amassed a fortune at Duncan Hines and later as owner of numerous newspapers and radio and television stations—talked about buying the *Times*, which was later purchased by the *Mount Airy News*.

"Boy, have the years slipped by!" said Jack. "I came to the Ripple in July 1983-it has been 13

years now.

"I have really enjoyed working here. I love Yadkin County and its people. They are wonderful and

friendly."

He has also enjoyed, he said, his career in journalism—even though he found out long ago that the financial rewards of working for any newspaper are not great.

Pg. 364: Under <u>UTIE</u>: John Utie, his wife Ann, their Son, John and three servants were listed at Hog Island on the south side of James River, below Jamestown, in the muster 1624/5. John came to VA in 1620 and secured a patent for 100 acres in 1624, on the main River near the mouth of Chippoakes Creek. He also had an active military career, serving in 1626 as an officer of Southampton Hundred & Archer's Hope. He died sometime before July of 1637.

Ann Utie, widow of John then married (by 1641) Richard Bennett, later Governor of Virginia. She had three sons by John=John, Jr, Nathaniel & George. Pg. 639: UTIE-HENNETT: Ann (_____?) THE BENNETT GENEALOGY by W. M. HOUGHTON-1939: (sent in by David Rice to share.)

Allied families. Sources: The Bennett-Weatherly Reunion Book, tombstones in the Bennett-Weatherly Cometery near West Laurens, NY-on Maple Grove Rd. J. Morrell Bennett of Milford, NY: the original account book of Ezekiel Bennett, listing his children, their birth dates, accounts kept in pounds, shillings & pence, with various people who worked for him. Various other informants of both families also contributed to the Genealogy. "Col. Ezekiel Bennet-in his own handwriting-came from Newtown, MA, was a veteran of the Revolutionary War, born in 1762 & died in 1846=m. Sarah Perry. Resided in CT for sometime before coming to NYS; some of the oldest children were born there. Settled in a log house, just outside of West Laurens. "The first Bennett-Weatherly Meeting was held on 13 Aug 1900, at the home of Mr & Mrs Perry Webster, those attending were Delon H. Houghton, his wife ?, son & daughter of Sheldon, IA. Mr. Houghton & Mrs. Webster were both descendents of Ezekiel Bennett & Henry Weatherly, Sr.; being Great Grandchildren. Mr. Webster also was a Great Grand child of Ezekiel Bennett. This gathering formed the first Reunion. The elected Officers were, Pres.=Daniel Weatherly--Vice Pres.=Leroy Weatherly--Sec. & Treas.-Ella E. Scofield. Invitations were printed & mailed to descendants. The second meeting was held at Leroy Weatherly's home on 21 Aug 1901. They voted to go back to the descendants of Benoni Weatherly, his wife, Ruth Ackley-the father & mother of Henry, Sr. The two families were related so closely through intermarriage: three daughters, (Nabby, Clarissa & Emeline) of Ezekiel Bennett, married three Weatherlys-two of whom (Samuel & William) were son of Benoni Weatherly and the third (James) was a Grand son. The two families lived in the same general local, near West Laurens and those not directly related were good friends and neighbors.
