Committee on Queries report:

Should we as Baptists retain members in our churches, who persistently fail to pay accounts, and would it not be better for the cause, if our churches would be more careful to discipline members who walk disorderly?

Answer. If a member persistently fails to pay a debt on account of poverty or misfortune, his creditors and church should bear with or assist him in paying the debt. but if he persistently refuses to pay an acknowledged debt, when he is financially able the church should take action against said member—and we also maintain that our churches should be careful to discipline their members. Report discussed by Bro. J. W. Bowles and adopted. Committee on Periodicals report.

Baptists have ever believed in the training of the mind as well as the heart. They believe that correct information is essential to the best results in our work. REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Baptists have always favored education and they realize each year that one of the greatest needs of the churches is an educated membership and ministry.

We have two great institutions for the education of our young men and young women. The Baptist University for women at Raleigh, although in its infancy is one of the strongest and best woman's college in the country. Wake Forest College has been established over 70 years and has a glorious history, but is young in heart, aggressive in purpose. Last year was its most successful session. There were 228 students enrolled. A good meeting of two weeks was held in which many of the students were led to the Savior. Additional buildings are being erected. Your committee endorses the projected establishment of of an associational school and commends this effort on the part of our brethren to found such an institution under purely denominational influences. REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Our Lord commanded His followers to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. This great work extends from our own hearthstones to the uttermost parts of the earth.

State Missions embraces the giving of the gospel to the destitute parts of our own association and throughout the state. It is our nearest field of missions.

We must remember though we have 1792 churches and more than 182,000 members in N. C., there are yet large sections that are Baptistically destitute. There are also many weak churches that need help or they will decline.

We are working on a basis of \$30,000 this year and are supporting more than one hundred missionaries in different parts of the state.

The need being so great there is an urgent call for an advance of thirtythree and one-third per cent in our offerings for State Missions this year. We recommend that this association take this forward step.

Brethren, let us rally to the Lord's call on this line and do our duty by sending liberal contributions to the board and help them to give the gospel to the benighted heathen.
