**CONSTITUTION****ARTICLE I—NAME AND MEMBERSHIP**

**Section 1.** This body shall be known as the Surry Baptist Association.

**Section 2.** Membership in the Association shall be composed of the Association's Officers, ministers who are pastors of churches affiliated therewith, and messengers elected by affiliated churches.

**Section 3.** Churches of fifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers in addition to the pastor. One additional messenger shall be allowed for each additional fifty members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall have more than ten messengers.

**Section 4.** Any church found to be unfaithful in faith or in practice shall be investigated by the Officers of the Association in an effort to correct such errors. If the church fails to correct such errors and the errors are of such nature as to alienate the church from the orderly and faithful churches of the Association, the Officers of the Association shall recommend to the Association that fellowship be withdrawn from the church.

**ARTICLE II.—PURPOSE**

**Section 1.** The purpose of this Association shall be to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony and spiritual power of the churches within our bounds, and to promote and develop their energies in advancing God's Kingdom throughout the earth in compliance with the teachings of the New Testament and in cooperation with the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

**ARTICLE III—ANNUAL CHURCH LETTERS**

**Section 1.** The churches shall report annually not only the statistical information but any facts concerning the general welfare. The Clerk shall furnish each church with printed forms for their annual report at least six weeks before the annual meeting of the Association, and the churches are requested to have these reports returned to the Clerk at least two weeks before the annual meeting of the Association.

**ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES**

**Section 1.** The Officers of the body shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Missionary, and the heads of the organizations as set forth in Article IV, Section 6.

**Section 2.** The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside over all sessions of the Association and the Promotion Committee if available. In their absence the body shall elect a Moderator Pro-tem who shall preside. The Moderator shall be the fraternal visitor of the churches throughout the year. He shall be elected for one year and shall not succeed himself after the second consecutive year.

**Section 3.** The Vice-Moderator shall preside at the request of or in the absence of the Moderator at the meetings of the Association and the Promotion Committee.

**Section 4.** The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the body, furnish the churches with the blank letter forms, supervise the printing of the minutes, and distribute them to the churches as soon after adjournment as possible. He shall also serve as secretary of the Promotion Committee.

**Section 5.** The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds of the Association, and shall disburse the same in accordance with the budget of the Association or for the purposes for which the funds were contributed. He shall render an itemized report of his receipts and disbursements to the budget committee upon request and to the Association in the annual meeting.

**Section 6.** The Associational Sunday School Superintendent, the Associational Training Union Director, the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent, and the Associational Brotherhood President shall be elected by their respective organizations according to their own methods. The names of these officers shall be furnished the Nominating Committee who shall present them to the Association for approval at the time of the election of the Officers of the Association.

**Section 7.** The Officers shall be elected at the morning session of the first day of the annual meeting. They shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting at which they were elected and shall serve until the close of the next annual session, with the exception of the Clerk. The Clerk shall assume his duties at the beginning of the session at which he is elected and shall serve until his successor is elected.

**Section 8.** The Associational Missionary shall be nominated by the Missions Committee at any regular session of the Association or any regular meeting of the Promotion Committee. His election shall be by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers or members present. He shall serve until the relationship is terminated by mutual consent. He shall prepare annually a Calendar of Activities setting forth dates and places of meetings of the organized work. He shall work with the churches at their invitation and as time permits. He shall promote the whole program of the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Conventions, seeking to arouse missionary interest among the churches, and enlisting the churches to cooperate in the support of the causes fostered by the Association. His work shall be under the direction of the Missions Committee, and he shall have administrative supervision of such work as shall be assigned him by the Association, the Promotion Committee, or the Missions Committee.

#### ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

**Section 1.** The Committees of the Association shall be: Committee on Organization and Admission of New Churches, Program, Ordination, Budget, Nominating, Trustees, Missions, Promotion (Executive), Place and Preacher, Resolutions, and Committee to nominate the Nominating Committee. The Moderator and Associational Missionary shall be ex-officio members of all committees.

**Section 2.** The Committee on Organization and Admission of New Churches shall be elected annually and shall consist of three pastors and three deacons suggested by the Nominating Committee from the churches in full fellowship with the Association.

The duties of this committee are set forth in the following paragraphs:

Any group of baptized believers in Christ desiring to organize themselves into a new church with the purpose of seeking the recognition of and fellowship and cooperation with this Association shall be requested to fulfill the following requirements:

- A. Notice shall be given to the Moderator of the Association of the desire to organize a church before any such organization takes place. The Moderator will then instruct the Committee on Organization and Admission to visit and counsel with the group desiring to become a church and bring a report to the Promotion Committee which shall study and pass upon the need and practicability for such an organization.
- B. The location of said church shall be sufficiently removed so as not to interfere with the work or encroach upon the territory of the churches already affiliated with this Association. This will be determined by the Promotion Committee.
- C. Upon being approved by the Promotion Committee the group



will then request the Committee on Organization and Admission to examine the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith of the proposed church. If this committee approves the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith the group will then proceed to be constituted into a Baptist Church of the same faith and order.

- D. The new church having been duly organized and constituted may at the next annual meeting of the Association, or any annual meeting thereafter, present a letter to the Association asking for recognition and seeking fellowship with the Association, including with this letter a copy of the Church Covenant and Articles of Faith adopted by the body, as well as a report of the work since the time of organization as it regards all phases of our Baptist Program. The church shall be expected to have had a part in the support of the causes fostered by the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.
- E. The Organization and Admission Committee shall examine the letter and report of the new church and will recommend one of the following decisions:
- a. Acceptance of the church under watchcare for one year
  - b. Further consideration for action at the next annual meeting
  - c. Rejection of the request for membership.
- If the church is accepted under watchcare this committee will at the end of that year recommend that the church be accepted into full fellowship provided that after examination the record of work done and cooperative spirit of the church is commendable. A two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present shall be needed for such action. The Moderator will extend to the messengers the right hand of fellowship.

**Section 3.** The Program Committee shall consist of five members who shall prepare an order of business for the annual meeting. Printed copies of the suggested order of business shall be distributed to those attending the opening session of the Association. The chairman shall be designated by the Nominating Committee.

**Section 4.** The Ordination Committee shall consist of five pastors. Initially one member shall be elected for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year. In each succeeding year one member shall be elected for a term of five years. When necessary others may be elected to fill vacancies of unexpired terms. Churches desiring to ordain preachers are requested to place their candidate before this committee for examination on the following principles: Christian experience or conversion, call to the ministry, moral and spiritual fitness, doctrinal beliefs and knowledge of the Bible, attitude toward denominational work and objects, support of denominational causes, and purpose to serve.

No candidate shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member for at least one year of a Baptist Church affiliated with this Association. Candidates are to be looked upon with favor for ordination only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or have actually been called as pastor of a Missionary Baptist Church.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in regularly recognized Baptist colleges and seminaries. Recommendation will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

**Section 5.** The Budget Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Association and the Chairman of the Missions Committee. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman. This committee shall meet before the annual meeting of the Association and prepare a budget to cover all anticipated needs of the Association for the next annual Associational year. The committee will cause this budget to be printed and distributed to the messengers at the annual meeting. The committee will suggest a pro rata share of the budget for each church affiliated with the Association for their consideration and approval.

**Section 6.** The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members. They shall be elected by the Association and serve from the close of the annual session in which they are elected until the close of the next annual session. This committee shall nominate all the Officers except those specifically provided for otherwise and members of the following committees: Organization and Admission of New Churches, Program, Ordination, Trustees, and Missions. They shall also nominate representatives for the following denominational institutions and work: Religious Literature, Evangelism, Hospital, Orphanage, Homes for the Aging, Temperance and Public Morals, Relief and Annuity, Stewardship, State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Memorials, and any other representatives that may be deemed necessary. Those selected shall be placed before the Association at the annual meeting for election. The Nominating Committee shall present for approval the names of those selected by the various organizations to head their work. The Nominating Committee will furnish a name or names to proper Officers of the Baptist State Convention for the member of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention from Surry Association. This committee shall make nominations to fill vacancies occurring during the year at the regular meetings of the Promotion Committee.

**Section 7.** The Trustees shall consist of three members. Initially one member shall be elected for three years, one for two years, and one for one year. In each succeeding year one member shall be elected for a term of three years. No trustee shall succeed himself in office. The chairman shall be the member with the longest term of service as a trustee. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold in trust all property and effects of the Association, take care of and keep the same in repair, accept gifts for the Association, and perform all other duties which the Association may signify.

**Section 8.** The Missions Committee shall consist of seven members. Three members shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and the remaining four shall be the heads of the four associational organizations: Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U., and Brotherhood. The chairman shall be designated by the Nominating Committee. This committee shall direct the work of the Associational Missionary and confer with the churches concerning their cooperation with and financial support of the Associational program and the program of the State and Southern Baptist Convention.

**Section 9.** The Promotion (Executive) Committee shall be composed of the Officers of the Association, the ministers who are pastors in the Association, and one lay representative elected by each church. In no case shall any church have more than four members on this committee. Between annual meetings of the Association this committee shall act as the Association in matters requiring consideration. The officers of this committee shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and the Clerk who shall be the secretary. The Moderator shall see that the committee meets at least quarterly and at any other time deemed necessary. He shall be expected to have a

written report of the actions of this committee presented to the Association at the annual meeting. Fifteen members shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meeting has been given to all members. The committee shall act as an agency of the Association in the promotion of the causes fostered by the Association.

**Section 10.** At the first session of the annual meeting the Moderator shall appoint the following committees to report at this meeting of the Association:

- a. Place and Preacher
- b. Resolutions
- c. Committee to nominate the Nominating Committee.

**Section 11.** Other committees for specific reports and work shall be appointed by the Moderator as the need arises.

#### ARTICLE VI—MEETINGS AND VISITORS

**Section 1.** The Association will meet annually on Thursday and Friday after the third Sunday in October and can be called into special session if necessary by a majority vote of the Promotion Committee. All business shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's "Parliamentary Law", but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the Moderator may exercise his discretion, subject to appeal to the Association.

**Section 2.** Visitors from sister churches and similiar bodies may be invited by the Moderator to sit with the Association, to participate in its deliberations, but may not have the privilege of voting.

#### ARTICLE VII—POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

**Section 1.** The Association shall have no power whatever to infringe upon the rights or usefulness of the churches. It may advise or recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption and guidance, but cannot bind them in any way. However, it may justly claim for itself, for its purpose, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

**Section 2.** The Association may withdraw fellowship from any church that becomes disorderly in practice, or that treats with contempt its purpose and requirements, or upon the request of a church for its own dismissal.

**Section 3.** The churches constituting this Association shall each retain complete self-government under Christ as the supreme Head, Lawgiver, Governor, and Lord over His churches, and unite only that they may more successfully promote the cause of Christ throughout the world.

#### ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS

**Section 1.** Any section of this constitution, except Article VII, Section 3 which shall remain forever intact, may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day, provided the amendment is presented in writing on the first day and voted on and passed favorable on the second day, or that notice be given during the meeting in one year and presented in writing and voted on favorably the following year.

### RULES OF ORDER

1. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by such persons as the moderator may designate.
2. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the Moderator.
3. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without permission of the Association.
4. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator before discussion.
5. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion without the consent of the Association.
6. When a motion is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be considered, except a motion to adjourn.
7. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a consideration.
8. All questions except as relate to the amendment of the Constitution shall be decided by the majority of the votes cast.
9. The Association shall have the right to determine what subjects it will consider and the order of their consideration.
10. These rules may be amended at any time during an annual session of this Association by a majority.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three persons in the Godhead: The Father; The Son; The Holy Ghost.
2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and order.
3. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
4. We believe baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.
5. We believe baptism is the immersion of a believer. And only those who are thus baptized are in fellowship with the church by Christ, in faith and doctrine, and they only should take the Lord's Supper.
6. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints.
7. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgement.
8. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joy and happiness of the righteous will be eternal.
9. We believe that the right to administer the ordinances is vested in the Church and that no person should perform the ordinances except as authorized by a Church.
10. We believe in the doctrine of growth in grace and sanctification as set forth in the New Testament. But we do not believe that sinless perfection is attained by anyone in this life.

## PROCEEDINGS

Thursday, September 29, 1955

### MORNING SESSION

1. The Fifty-third annual session of Surrey Baptist Association was called to order at 9:30 A.M., on Thursday, September 29, 1955 at Shoals Baptist Church, Rt. 2, Pinnacle, by the Moderator, Rev. J. F. Woodruff. Rev. Marvin Willis led in the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers" accompanied by Mrs. J. W. Hylton at the piano. Words of welcome and the reading of the scripture was given by Rev. Glenn Mendenhall, pastor of the host church, and prayer was led by Rev. J. L. Powers, a former pastor.

2. Rev. Marvin Willis presented the order of business and moved its adoption with any changes that were found to be necessary. The motion was so adopted.

3. The Moderator recognized five new pastors in the Association and several visitors attending from other Associations.

Moderator Woodruff announced the appointment of the following committees to serve for this annual session: Time, Place, and Preacher—Mrs. J. S. Belton, chm., Rev. Marvin Willis, Rev. Roy Davis. Committee to receive Minute Funds—Rev. Silas Smith, C. W. Stone, Rev. Glenn Mendenhall. Entertainment—Pastor, deacons, and deacons' wives of Shoals Baptist Church.

4. After singing of a hymn led by Rev. Marvin Willis, the Moderator asked for a report of the special committee elected last year to present a re-written Constitution for the Association. Rev. Paul Hester, chairman, asked that Rev. Willard Jenkins, a member of that committee, present the report. After a careful reading a motion and second was received that it be adopted as presented. In good Baptist fashion the matter was discussed. A rising vote indicated its adoption with 129 for its adoption and 1 opposed.

5. The report of the treasury was presented by Associational Treasurer, C. W. Stone. The report was adopted as read.

**REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY**

The first year as your missionary has been a very busy one. Re-activating the associational missions program and meeting each request from the churches has necessarily made for a heavy schedule of work. Much of the work done during the year cannot be recorded in statistics, for the increased interest, the enthusiasm, and the fine response of the people can only be shown in the reports of the churches themselves. 9. A hymn by the congregation was led by Marvin Willis. In the absence of Lonnie C. Brown, Superintendent of Sunday School work, Rev. Paul Hester presented the report on our Sunday School growth which was adopted. The report contains some excellent recommendations which were adopted as a part of the report.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Bible teaches "the entrance of Thy Word giveth light", and "the Word maketh people wise unto salavation": therefore, the importance of the Bible teaching ministry of the Sunday School.

The Sunday Schools have proven themselves to be a great teaching, evangelizing, enlisting, and financing agency of the churches. We rejoice in the growth and service of the Sunday Schools in our Association.

This year our Surry Association reports 64 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 10,989 which is an increase of about 17% over last year; 524 baptisms, 52 Vacation Bible Schools, and an active associational Sunday School organization.

The State Sunday School Department, L. L. Morgan, Secretary, reports a total of 3,160 Sunday Schools. The enrollment at the close of 1954 was 703,853 which is 89.9% of the total church membership of Baptist churches in the state. We are happy to say that North Carolina ranks above all the other states in the Southern Baptist Convention in this respect. Next in rank is South Carolina with 87.6% of the total church membership enrolled in Sunday School. The Sunday School Department reported 2,549 Vacation Bible Schols in 1954, an increase of more than 200 over 1953. 32,464 training awards in 1955, 36 Standard Sunday Schools, a 20% increase in Sunday Scholl enrollment, and 2,700 Vacation Bible Schools. We urge our Sunday Schools to help reach these challenging goals.

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That we maintain a complete associational Sunday School organization with regular meetings, and that we urge all of our Sunday Schools to cooperate fully with this program.
2. That we set a goal of 20% increase in Sunday School enrollment this year, a Vacation Bible School in every church, one or more study courses for teachers and officers, the observance of Bible Study Week in January, and the use of the Standard of Excellence as a minimum for our Sunday Schools.
3. That our Sunday Schools maintain their present enrollment with the exception of death, moving out of the community, or becoming a member of another Sunday School.

4. That our Sunday Schools cooperate with the special days as promoted by our North Carolina State Convention.
5. That the Executive Committee of the Sunday School Association appoint a nominating committee three or four months in advance of the annual Associational meeting for the purpose of nominating an Associational Sunday School Superintendent to be presented to the Executive Committee for approval and election; and that the newly elected Superintendent be given the authority to select and enlist the other officers to be nominated and presented to the Executive Committee or the Sunday School Association. This procedure is suggested in order to have the Sunday School organization completed and ready to function at the beginning of the Associational year.

#### VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

"Learning from the Great Teacher"—This has been our greatest year in Vacation Bible School. Two clinics were held early with emphasis on prayerful and careful faculty training.

There were fifty-two Vacation Bible Schools held in Surry Association, 51 white and one colored school with 3,171 enrolled and an average attendance of 2,678. Gifts for all causes were \$550.18, with \$463.82 of this amount going to all parts of the world through our Cooperative Program.

May we take this opportunity to thank you for your interest in training boys and girls to love the Lord and share in His work. We are truly grateful to Rev. and Mrs. Willard Jenkins for helping with the pupils books and to Mr. Murray DeHart as co-worker.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

14. Thursday afternoon session was called to order at 1:30 by Moderator Woodruff. "We're Marching to Zion" was led by Rev. Marvin Willis. The devotional was presented by Rev. Gilmer Denny of the Salem Fork Church.

15. The Moderator referred the petitionary letter of the new Closer Walk Church to the committee on new churches, Rev. Roy Davis, chairman.

16. Rev. Reese Kyzar presented the report on our Hospital. Dr. W. K. McGee, Director of Denominational Relations at the hospital, spoke to the report. He reported that the hospital was now, for the first time in a long time, operating in the "black". He indicated that two things are responsible—people are more able to pay their bills, and better Mother's Day offerings. The report was adopted.

### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL 1955 REPORT

Our Baptist Hospital fills an important place in the life and work of North Carolina Baptists. It will probably serve 50,000 patients this year, touching every area of our State.

In addition to this great host of sick people, our hospital provides an educational program for more than 450 young people who are in training to become nurses, doctors, technicians, pastors and other Christian workers.

The Department of Pastoral Care provides Christian counseling and guidance for the patients, students, hospital staff and personnel, as well as hundreds of others who come to the hospital from over the State for this purpose alone.

It is not easy to estimate the value of these and other services rendered by our hospital to multiplied thousands of people of all ages in the fields of health, education, and spiritual guidance.

The opportunities for Christian service and witness through our hospital are truly great. We need to give it a much more generous support through our Mother's Day offerings and the Cooperative Program.

The Hospital provided free services in the amount of \$500,-494.33 in 1954 in addition to free doctor's care to all service patients. This was rendered to patients in the Hospital and the Out-Patient Clinic and was made possible by individual contributions, welfare agencies, the Duke Endowment—and, mainly through the Mother's Day Offering.

17. An oral report on the orphanage work was presented by Rev. Claxton Hall who devoted most of his time to Mr. Marse Grant, Editor of "Charity and Children", who gave a challenging address on our responsibility to our youth. He stated that since its beginning in 1885 the Baptist Orphanage has ministered to about 70,000 children.

18. A hymn, "Our Best", was led by Marvin Willis. Dr. P. W. Green presented the report on our Homes for the Aging. After discussion by Dr. Green, Rev. J. M. Hayes, General Supt. of the Homes, was recognized and further discussed the work of the Homes. The report was adopted.

### REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

The fifth year of operation for the Homes for the Aging is very encouraging from a State level, and exceptionally encouraging from the support of our good people of the Surry Association.

The two Homes, Winston-Salem with a capacity of 19 and Albemarle with a capacity of 35, have both been filled. Needless to say, a long list of applicants for admission that cannot be accepted due to lack of room awaits the day of completion of our new building in Winston-Salem that will accommodate 40 additional residents.

Of the residents of the Homes approximately 10% have turned over enough assets on the Life Plan to pay the entire cost of their keep. Of the remaining some pay about two-thirds of keep, and others pay about one-third. Aid from our Denominational sources, of course, takes care of that 90% who need some assistance in paying their expenses. Regardless of financial condition an applicant is received into the Homes on the basis of need and room available.



The Trustees plan to let the contract for construction of our new \$300,000 Administration and Residential Building in Winston-Salem prior to the meeting of our 1955 Baptist State Convention. Two-thirds of the necessary funds are now on hand for the construction of our new building and it is the hopes of the Trustees that by the time the new building is ready for occupancy that necessary funds will be on hand to pay the entire cost.

Those desiring to make a memorial gift toward our new building may do so in the following ways: a gift of \$300 will furnish a new room; \$1,000 will endow, furnish, and maintain a room; \$3,000 will pay the cost of building a room. In either case a memorial plaque bearing the name of the donor and the name of the person memorialized or honored will be placed on the door of the room.

The goal of \$100,000 for our 1955 special day offering will probably be reached by the end of the year. Something better than \$70,000 is now on hand with some of our churches including the Homes in their budget and wait until the end of the calendar year to send in their gifts. In addition to the special day gifts, the Homes will receive \$39,850 as their share of the nine year program, according to the estimated budget.

From an associational level, your representative sent special informative letters to our Sunday School superintendents and pastors, and in addition to this, enough of our "Baptist Homes Bulletins" for each family group to get a copy of the publication prior to the special day offering in February. As a result of this public relations activity a total of 43 of our 64 churches have sent in contributions of \$1,673.97 to date, or \$447.33 more than the 1954 associational report.

Your representative, together with our General Superintendent Mr. J. M. Hayes, saw a few of those in our Association personally who are especially interested in the Homes. These friends gave a total of \$1,275. These special contributions together with the funds sent in by the churches of our Association makes a grand total of \$2,948.97, or an increase of \$1,722.33 over 1953-54 for the residency of the Surry Association.

Please allow me to thank one and all who cooperated so beautifully this past year.

21. Dr. Courts Redford was presented by Rev. Claxton Hall who made an announcement emphasizing the evening session at Haymore Memorial Church. Dr. Redford spoke briefly. A motion to adjourn was adopted, and Rev. Joe Crews led the closing prayer.

**THURSDAY EVENING SESSION****Haymore Memorial Church — 7:30**

22. The evening session was opened with the singing of "O, Zion Haste" led by Rev. Marvin Willis, the Moderator presiding. Selected passages of scripture were read by Rev. Roy Davis, host pastor, who also led in prayer.

23. Mrs. Isaac Jones, Supt. of Women's work, gave an inspiring report of the Woman's Missionary Union work for the past year. The report was adopted. Mrs. Jones also presented recommendations relative to the W. M. U. and the Royal Ambassador work which were adopted.

**W. M. U. REPORT**

As we of W. M. U. in Surry have sought divine guidance during 1954-55, the words of the Lord "Come, follow me" have been our challenge. We have felt His eyes entreating us to give Him our best; we have felt His hands beckon us to follow where He leads; and we have felt some of the compassion of His heart as He looked on our beloved Surry County. With a deep sense of humility we have felt our utter dependence on Him as we have accepted the challenge to follow Him. To Him we give thanks for those serving with us—our associational officers and all our 948 members who have been faithful and loyal to our Lord through Woman's Missionary Union. For these, and each opportunity of service, we humbly express our thanks to Him who says "Come, follow Me". We regret that we lost the following officers: Mrs. Claude Johnson, associate supt.; Mrs. Claxton Hall, community missions; Mrs. Joel Thompson, G. A. Counselor; Miss Ruth Johnson, pianist; Mrs. Addie Poore, Y. W. A. Counselor; and Mrs. R. E. Hiatt, Stewardship.

However, from the following new officers we draw strength and inspiration: Mrs. Joe Maye, associate supt.; Mrs. R. L. Wilson, Youth director; Mrs. Roy Davis, prayer chairman; Mrs. Ainslie Hair, community missions; Mrs. Lester Campbell, Stewardship; Mrs. Marvin Willis, literature; Mrs. J. T. Gant, Y. W. A. Counselor; Mrs. R. L. Kizer, G. A. Counselor; Mrs. W. L. Jenkins, publicity; Mrs. John Simmons, White Cross; Mrs. R. B. Holder, pianist.

Attendance and interest have increased in our quarterly meetings where we meet for instruction, inspiration and fellowship. The annual meeting was held at Calvary Church in April with a large group present. Inspiration was the order of the day as our guest speakers stirred our hearts and challenged us to "Come, follow Him".

Our next annual meeting will be held at Fairview Church, April 5, 1956. Our leadership conference will be held with Bannertown Church on Oct. 27, 1955. Mrs. Gordon Maddrey, state president of W. M. U., will be our guest.

The consecrated leaders of our youth have done and are doing much work for our Lord. We are grateful to Mrs. Roy Davis and her associates for the foundations they have laid. These have served to challenge our present youth officers to further His cause by striving to enlist more young people and to strengthen the existing organizations. Since 1950, when there were 24 youth organizations, the number has grown until now there are 84 youth organizations. a total of 29 new youth organizations have been reported this year.

Our hearts have thrilled this past year as those of our enlisted youth have participated in our youth banquets and camps.

Nov. 12, 1954, led by associational R. A. Counselor, Rev. R. L. Wilson, our first Surry associational R. A. Conclave was held at Calvary Church. There were 172 boys and counselors present. All phases of R. A. work were emphasized. A movie, "Empty Shoes" was shown followed by an inspirational message by Rev. Roy Davis. Dillard Hiatt was elected Ambassador-in-Chief.

Nov. 23, 1954, under the direction of Mrs. Roy Davis and Mrs. Joel Thompson, the G. A. banquet was held at Haymore Memorial. From 11 churches came 124 G. A.'s and counselors. Miss Ruth Swan, former missionary to Jordan, was guest speaker. The associational Y. W. A. Council met for the annual banquet at First Church, Mt. Airy, on Feb. 17. This was under the direction of Mrs. Roy Davis, Mrs. Addie Poore, and Mrs. Joe Joyce. Nine churches were represented with 98 present. Miss Annie Laura Lambert presided. The beauty of the setting, the loveliness of the young women, and the reverence of the program made us rejoice anew for Y. W. A. in Surry. Our guests, Miss Janet Wilson, state youth director, and Mrs. Marvin Garrett, missionary to Southern Rhodesia, stirred our hearts and challenged our young women to deeper consecration.

As a climax to the Youth Rallies, Mrs. R. L. Wilson, Mrs. Raymond Weldon, and her associates held the first Sunbeam Day Camp at Calvary on August 14. 169 children were present from 10 Sunbeam bands. Donald Midkiff was camp pastor. The children enjoyed the stories, songs, games, and the picnic lunch. An August Christmas tree was trimmed with gifts for missionaries brought by the children.

The first Recognition Coronation Service was held at Mt. Airy First Church with 21 girls from Mt. Airy First and Welcome Churches participating. At this time Carolyn Vaughn of First Church and Ruth and Patricia Couch from Welcome were crowned queens. It is our hope that others may follow in their train.

The following are new societies this year: Fairview, Woodland, Indian Grove, Albion, New Bethel, and Sulphur Springs.

Fully graded unions are at Calvary, Flat Rock, Flippen Memorial, Haymore Memorial, Highland Park, Mt. Airy First, and Mt. Carmel. Mount Airy First has an A-1 Sunbeam Band led by Mrs. Howard Loflen and an A-1 Y. W. A. led by Mrs. Joe Joyce.

4. That the Brotherhood item in the budget be made sufficient to share equally with the WMU in providing for the needs of Royal Ambassador work.
5. That the Royal Ambassador counselor or Youth Leader (according to associational plan) shall report quarterly to the Regional Royal Ambassador counselor and to the state Royal Ambassador Secretary.
6. That the Joint Committee report annually to the Association.

24. A report of Brotherhood work was presented and discussed by Associational Brotherhood President Wendell Simmons, The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD

25. After the singing of a hymn, "Christ for the Whole Wide World", the Moderator recognized Rev. Claxton Hall who introduced the speaker, Dr. Courts Redford, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Home Mission Board. Dr. Redford stressed the need of building up our spiritual strength and resources at home in order

to do a better job as witnesses abroad. His message, "Forward with Christ in World Vision" challenged his congregation deeply. The closing hymn was "Rescue the Perishing", and prayer was led by Rev. Marvin Willis. The Association adjourned to meet with New Hope Church on Friday morning at 9:30 A. M.

#### MORNING SESSION

Friday, September 30, 1955

26. Moderator J. F. Woodruff called the Association to order at 9:30 A. M., on Friday at the New Hope Church near Dobson for the second day's session. After the singing of "Faith of Our Fathers" led by Rev. Marvin Willis with Mrs. J. W. Hylton at the piano, Rev. D. E. Couch led in the devotionals and asked Rev. M. H. Kendall, visiting from Mars Hill College, to lead the prayer. The Moderator recognized new pastors who were not present the first day, and the following visitors: Rev. M. H. Kendall, Mars Hill, Rev. W. P. Biggerstaff of Raleigh, and Rev. C. W. Bazemore also of Raleigh.

27. The Moderator spoke briefly about the need for unity in our work, and expressed dissatisfaction in the preparing and presenting of some phases of the business items upon which action was taken the previous day. The items in question were the new Constitution and the report of the Nominating Committee. The official actions of the previous day were declared out of order by the Moderator which produced a variety of discussion by various persons too numerous to mention, but several who discussed phases pertinent to the issues are referred to.

Associational Missionary Willard Jenkins rose and was recognized for a point of personal privilege in which he sought to clarify the means used in preparing the new Constitution. Rev. Paul Hester, chairman of the Constitution Committee, related the procedure used in trying to faithfully fulfill the obligation which the committee had in trying to present a comprehensive, practical document in the new Constitution, stating that the work of the committee had been done in "good faith".

Rev. Roy Davis questioned whether the Moderator's statement about the previous day's action being out of order would be ruled valid and a re-vote be made. At this point Rev. R. L. Wilson moved that further discussion concerning the Constitution be taken up at the business period designated on the program. The motion carried.

Mr. J. W. Hylton seemed to save the day when in his mild mannered way he suggested that the Moderator withdraw his declaration that the actions of the previous day were out of order. This statement was withdrawn and the session moved on as planned.

28. At the suggestion of Rev. Claxton Hall, Rev. D. E. Couch moved that those having reports present the motion for their adoption without being read in order to conserve as much time as possible. The motion was carried.

29. Rev. C. W. Bazemore was recognized and presented. He spoke on the significant ministry of Christian Literature, representing especially the Biblical Recorder, journal of North Carolina Baptists.

30. Rev. Eugene Olive of Wake Forest College addressed the body on the work of Wake Forest pointing out the fact of its approaching removal to our neighboring city, Winston-Salem, in the spring of 1956. Rev. M. H. Kendall, in his traditional manner, brought greetings from Mars Hill College and injected a hypodermic of humor into the meeting. He announced the centennial celebration of the College this year, among other things.

31. Rev. Tommy Johnson presented a motion that the report prepared by him on Christian Morals be adopted without a reading.

The motion carried and he presented Rev. W. P. Biggerstaff, Associate Director of the Allied Church League for the Abolition of Beverage Alcohol, who spoke to the report. Rev. Mr. Biggerstaff challenged Surry Baptists to fight for a referendum on the sale of beer in the county, pointing out that a very high percentage of the elections held were victories for the "dry" cause.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN MORALS

As Paul declared in II Corinthians 3:2, 3, Christians are the epistles of God written in the flesh known and read of all men. Then it becomes our duty as such to look at the problem of beverage alcohol in our land.

With the cost of strong drink amounting to approximately \$14,160,000,000 each year and when we have an average of 2,000,000 problem drinkers in our American industries, it is time we did something about it.

This can be done through the aid of the Allied Church League, of which we as Baptists are members. We have joined hands with several other denominations in our state to do everything possible to fight and wipe out the use and sale of alcoholic beverages in our state and county.

County after county have arisen and voted out the sale of beer and wine since the local option was granted in 1948. A total of 49 counties have banned the sale of beer and wine since this happened.

With the united efforts of every Christian working together we may eliminate the sale and use of alcohol and its problems in our state.

When we realize the great toll in deaths and crippled people, the number that go to the divorce courts (in one area it was 19 out of 21); when we realize that for every one and one-half cent per capita we gave to fight it, the liquor people spent \$1.50 per capita to support it; when we realize our duty as church people and Christian citizens we will put up a better fight against it.

Let us hope and pray and give our ultimate support to this united effort, that the remaining 51 counties (of which ours is one) may be on the list next year as having banned the sale and use of beverage alcohol.

32. Rev. Joe Crews of the Bannertown Church presented the report on Evangelism by a motion that his report be accepted without reading. Motion was carried, and an encouraging report is printed here without being brought to the attention of the delegates who would have been definitely encouraged by it.

### REPORT ON EVANGELISM 1955

The fires of evangelism have burned brightly in some of our churches this year as we have felt the impact of the Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade and other special efforts in evangelism. More of our churches are experiencing perennial revival among their membership. It seems that these churches are now "lifting up their eyes and looking on the fields for they are white unto harvest". The Christian men and women and the ministers are uniting their hearts in the common cause of persuading the lost to accept Christ. There seems to be a feeling of spiritual urgency in the preaching and teaching of the Word.

Now as we turn our attention to a partial report of the work done, let us keep in mind that figures do not and cannot reveal the real picture, for yet while we reap, other seeds are being sown. Churches have reported 524 won to Christ and membership in our churches by baptism, while 314 were added by letter and otherwise, making a total of 838 added to our churches this year.

One distress signal is indicated in the number of churches which reported no baptisms at all. There were twelve churches which added no members by experience in baptism. Let us be reminded that only as we reproduce do we survive. Someone has truly said "the fruit of a Christian is another Christian".

It is encouraging to note, however, that 41 churches reported two or more revivals during the year. These efforts will pay great dividends, and we feel confident that great victories lie ahead for us.

If these victorious fires of evangelism are to burn bright and continue to give forth a radiant glow we must say in our hearts:

"Ready to go, ready to stay, ready my place to fill;  
Ready for service, lowly of great, ready to do His will."

**MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING  
WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

**APRIL 26, 1955**

The Surry Baptist Association was organized at Richmond Church, now Little Richmond, Surry County, North Carolina, August 13, 1903. Fourteen of the original nineteen churches are now members of the Surry Association. All of the churches are in Surry County except Paul's Creek and Willis Gap which are in Virginia.

This Association was formed from the Yadkin Association which held its first session at Eaton's Meeting House in Rowan County on August 28, 29, 30, 1790. It extended over all the northwestern part of North Carolina. The statistical tables show churches from Surry, Wilkes, Rowan, Iredell, and Burke Counties.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution

1-A substitute for Article five (5), Section four (4), Paragraph two (2).

A candidate shall be looked upon with favor for ordination who is a member of a missionary Baptist Church and who has been called as pastor of a missionary Baptist Church and who is in agreement with historic Baptist principles and is in harmony with our cooperative program of work.

2-A substitute for article five (5), section eight (8), first two sentences.

The Mission Committee shall consist of seven members. Two of whom shall be nominated by the nominating committee and the remaining five shall be the heads of the four associational organizations: S.S.; Training Union; W.M.U.; Brotherhood, and the associational treasurer.
