

CLASS HISTORY

Our entrance into Elkin high school in 1943 was not as dramatie a freshman entrance as others have been. This was really our "second" high school year, because we were the first elass that would have twelve years of school. At this time the eighth grade was in the high school building but was still considered one of the grammar grades.

Most of us had become accustomed to the changing of classes, which we liked very much, and also had become familiar with the faculty members and their "unique" methods of teaching. The upper classmen couldn't really call us "greenhorns", because we were well adjusted to the high school routine of activities at that time.

During our freshman year under the eapable direction of Mr. Thomas Graybeal thirty-five of us made a brave attempt to develop ourselves intellectually and to maintain high ideals and standards for Elkin high school. We felt that a beginning like this would aid us in meeting the duties, opportunities, and obstacles of life which we would encounter on commencement day.

Miss Mary Holland was our sophomore teacher and was fully aware of our needs during that year. Under her keen guidanee we toiled to ecooperate wholeheartedly with every school function. The year ran very smoothly with the development of no special classroom events.

As our junior year approached, we began to realize that our duties in Elkin high school were numerous and that each of us had a responsible place. During this year Jack Park was elected president of our class; Jack Shore, vice president; and Ruth Masten, secretary and treasurer. We received our class rings during midterm examinations and felt that we were the proudest juniors who had ever roamed the halls of our school.

After deciding on the theme, "April Showers", for our Junior-Senior banquet, we entertained the seniors in April at the Gilvin Roth Y. M. C. A. Our year was elimaxed on class night when we juniors carried the daisy chain for the graduating class. Mrs. Gilliam was our junior class sponsor, and it was because of her perseverance and ingenuity that we were successful in accomplishing our year's work.

Mr. N. H. Carpenter assumed his duty as superintendent of the Elkin schools in the fall of 1945 as we assumed our places as juniors in Elkin high school. We learned to appreciate Mr. Carpenter as an efficient, industrious, and eapable principal and also as our friend.

Finally, we emerged as seniors under the direction of Mrs. Nixon and Miss Whitley. The enrollment during our senior year was enlarged because of many veterans who returned to earn their diplomas. Class officers during this year were Claude Eldridge, president; Ketehel Adams, viee president; Ruth Masten, secretary; and Jaek Shore, treasurer.

The seniors chartered a bus in September to attend Senior Day at the University of North Carolina. On that day we saw Carolina play V. P. I. in Carolina's first football game of the season.

The elass of 1947 is very proud of *The Elk*, the Elkin high school annual, because we were the founders of it. We shall cherish through the years the memories that have been recorded in this book.

Now, as our class history ends, let us remember to uphold our class motto, "It matters not how long we live, but how".

CLASS PROPHECY

At the end of our high school career and with the commencement of a new life for Elkin high school seniors of 1947 thoughts must be directed now toward the unveiling and foretelling of their future lives. The following information has been obtained and compiled about these very distinguished citizens through an imaginary tour of the states.

A group of seniors met in Miami, Florida, in 1967 for a cross-country flight in a "Lockheed Constellation" to discover the whereabouts of their classmates of Elkin high school. At this time Charles Walls was making a very successful business manager of Burdine's, the largest department store in Miami. Our first stop after leaving Florida was Savannah, Georgia, where we discovered that Christine Hayes was an English teacher in the Savannah city schools. According to schedule on its next flight "Connie", the airliner in which we traveled, landed in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for a visit with Claude Eldridge, Henry Ford's most noted automobile dealer. Then our party took off for a non-stop flight to Raleigh, North Carolina and learned upon landing that Jack Shore was professor of geology at State College. As we left Raleigh, a unanimous decision of the group guided us to Durham where Dr. Ketchel Adams, head surgeon in the Duke Hospital, directed us over the Duke University campus. In the university Catherine Walls was head of the business administration. We were soon on our way again with Chapel Hill in sight. At the University of North Carolina our visit with little Fred (Choo-Choo) Ratledge, head coach in Carl Snavely's place, was greatly enjoyed. Greensboro was our next destination, and here Mabel Stanley was in charge of a nurse's course in the home economics department of the Woman's College. Finally, as we approached our home territory, a stop was necessary in Winston-Salem in order to transfer to a *Piper Cub* for our journey to Elkin. In Winston-Salem Mary Johnson was serving as Dean of Women at Salem College, so after a brief visit with Mary, our plane ascended into the air again for a flight to the Swan Creek airport in the foothills of our home town, Elkin.

By automobile our party toured toward the Yadkin river but found upon reaching the old familiar bridge that many changes had taken place. Frances Dave was operating it as a toll bridge between Jonesville and Elkin, and after submitting to a toll of fifty cents, we were taxied into the famous Chatham blanket town. The following discoveries were found about our former classmates: Jack Park, secretary of the Gilvin Roth Y. M. C. A.; Bob Park, manager of the Reeves' theaters; Fred Hemric, owner of the Basketeria with Eugene Collins as assistant manager; Joc Whittington in complete charge of the Home Furniture Store; Coney Couch, postmaster; Jim Crowe, a "big shot" at Chatham University; Bob Harris, coach of all sports at Elkin high school; Dallas DeBorde, owner of his own electrical shop on West Main Street; and Josephine Steele, head nurse at the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital. As our journey continued into North Elkin, Betty Jean Collins was found to be living a happily married life with Thomas Q. Thumb. Into Poplar Springs we toured and met the newly elected mayor, Joe Guyer. Our time was limited, so a snappy trip to Boiling Springs was made in order to visit Ruth Masten, teacher of Bible at Gardner-Webb College.

An awareness of many more miles to go hastened us on to Winston-Salem to catch our plane for a northern flight. Stopping in Washington, D. C., Sammie Adams, who had taken his seat in the Senate Chamber and was trying to do away with unnecessary laws, greeted us at the National Airport to show us over the city. Verna Alexander, a famous soloist, was performing in the National Theater at that time, and Irene Johnson was kept busy as religious secretary at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. Our next stop after departing from Washington was New York City. Many of the former students were here and were employed in various enterprises. Bob Ratledge with his main office in this city was owner of a chain of service stations throughout the United States, Betty Mitchell was starring in the Metropolitan Opera House, Marie Park had settled down quictly as secretary to the governor of New York, Robert McCann was operating with a very serene tone a subway out of New York City, Gilmer Phillips was captain in the Navy and had been stationed in New York since his re-enlistment twenty years ago, and Edward Chappell was vice president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. Our plans directed us next to Cincinnati, Ohio, via Washington, and there the gay party discovered that several of their classmatcs were maintaining a comfortable livelihood. Bob Browning had purchased a country home several miles from the city and had become famous over his volume of Poetry. Paul Blackburn was head manager of a Kaiser and Frazer automobile firm and had
