## History of the Copeland Ruritan Club

The Copeland Ruritan Club was organized in October of 1962. A group of five men in the community felt a concern for a better community that would make a positive impact on the family, neighbors and friends. With this as the goal, they met in the Masonic Lodge along with the Zone Governor to make plans for a Ruritan Club in the Copeland Community. The second meeting of this group was held in the lunchroom of the school and a Ruritan Club was organized with 24 charter members.

The early monthly meetings were held in the Copeland lunch room. There was much enthusiasm in those first meetings and by the end of the second year, the members borrowed \$35,000 to build a Community Building that served the community in various ways for many years. During the following years, club membership grew by leaps and bounds, whereby, the Copeland Club became the second largest in the nation and members began to receive national acclaim. The Ruritan Club was organized as a non-profit organization. All money received by the club through fundraising projects, gifts and building rental went for needed projects in the community, and that guiding principle continues today.

Much of the success of the Copeland Ruritan Club can be attributed to the people in the community who have supported the many varied projects, ranging from Fish Fries and Gospel Singings, to Barbecue Chicken dinners, Golf Tournaments, Talent Shows, Cash Give-A-Ways, Organized Softball and Hot Dog sales, to Bingo games and many other projects. And, hopefully, all who supported and participated in those events enjoyed Fellowship and felt Goodwill which resulted in Community Service. Those objectives have always been the guiding principles of our Club.

A special note of appreciation goes to the Copeland Homemakers Club which was organized in the mid-fifties. The members were always by our side and gave outstanding support for forty-eight of our fifty years of existence. Without the support of these ladies, we just might not be here today; they were that supportive!

The current goal of the Copeland Ruritan Club is to continue to provide opportunities for Fellowship, create a sense of Goodwill and provide Community Service where there is a need, as the Club has always done. With continued success with these three guiding principles, the Copeland Community will continue to be a good place to live, work, and to raise a family.
